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Last-chance tax breaks for parents and homeowners


Uncle Sam is handing out a few extra breaks to parents and homeowners on their 2011 and 2012 tax returns. Although the filing deadline is months away, some of these tax benefits require forward planning. Others may influence decisions you make now about child care, college and your home.

The easiest credit parents can claim is the Child Tax Credit, says Jessi Dolmage, spokesperson for TaxACT. "By simple virtue of being a parent, you can claim \$1,000 for each eligible dependent on your 2011 and 2012 returns. Even better, you can receive cash back for the credit, as long as your earned income is over \$3,000 and your tax liability is less than the credit."

Daycare can account for a big chunk of working parents' income. Fortunately, you can recoup some of those costs with the expanded Child and Dependent Care Credit in 2011 and 2012. The credit is worth between 20 and 35 percent of up to \$3,000 of qualified expenses per child under the age of 13, or \$6,000 for two or more children. The credit amount decreases as adjusted gross income increases.

Parents who initiate and finalize an adoption by the end of 2012 may qualify for the expanded Adoption Credit. For 2011, the credit is worth up to \$13,170 and is refundable (like the Child Tax Credit). In 2012, the maximum amount changes to \$12,170 and becomes non-refundable. Keep in mind the IRS requires adoption documents and Form 8839 to be mailed with your return. It takes 6 to 8 weeks for mailed returns to be processed, so select direct deposit rather than a check for the fastest refund.

College costs are higher than ever, but



Dolmage also notes, "For the first time in three years, there won't be a homebuyer credit available on federal returns. However, homeowners can still save on taxes in other areas."

The Nonbusiness Energy Property Credit is worth up to \$500 for insulation, exterior windows and doors, central air conditioners, water heaters and other improvements. Caps have been placed on furnaces, water boilers, windows, water heaters, air conditioners and biomass stoves. In addition, if you claimed the credit on your 2009 or 2010 returns, you must subtract the collective amount from the \$500 available for 2011.

Investing in solar hot water property, geothermal heat pumps and wind property before Dec. 31, 2016, also has tax benefits. The nonrefundable Residential Energy Efficient Property Credit allows you to claim 30 percent of the expenditures, although certain improvements have caps. 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Take your home from summer to fall

Aguerri-Gomez recommends taking a bamboo or wicker rug and overlapping it with a more classical rug. "It's a great way to bring contrast, color and texture to the room."

Aguerri-Gomez predicts that mustard will be a key color this fall. Add a mustard table runner and change up your dinnerware and placemats to bring your table from light and airy to warm and welcoming. Don't want to part with the lemons and limes nestled inside your glass vase as table decor? Try compromising and replace the citrus with artichokes and pomegranates for a fall final touch.

For those that like to have feng shui ele-



ments in their home, you'll be happy to know that gold is making a comeback. Try mercury or gold canisters, vases and accents. In the past, gold and mercury were reserved for the holidays or special celebrations, but now you can bring them out earlier to bring that shiny pop the room will need.

The last touch to bringing your home from summer to fall is mood lighting. Polish recommends utilizing energy efficient LED lights and bulbs. Because you've most likely added thicker curtains to keep the cold out, make sure key areas are lit. Where you don't need too much light, go for the dimming effect. - Set up a well-ventilated spray area by covering a flat work surface and the floor with a drop cloth.
- Disassemble the table top and chair bases from the legs and then clean all surfaces.
- Cover or fill screw holes with small pieces of tape so that paint does not clog the holes.
- To paint the table top, turn it upside down and first paint the bottom surface.
- Once it's dry, turn the table top right side up and elevate it by 2 to 3 inches to ensure coverage of the edges.
- When painting the chairs, begin by inverting them and painting the bottom sides first. Be sure to paint from every side so that you don't miss any surface. Allow to dry completely, turn right side up and finish painting from each side.
- To paint the base of the table, spray one side at a time, allowing it to dry in between.
- Finally, closely inspect each piece before you reassemble to make sure that the surfaces are fully covered.

Roof maintenance done today saves trouble later

- Clear gutters of dust and debris. Twigs and other debris will often settle on your roof and then get washed into your gutters. Clearing your gutters at the beginning of the warm season can help to ensure that water won't collect in them. Allowing gutters to clog and overflow could possibly cause water damage, put undue stress on your gutters and create potential ice dams.
- Install roof and gutter de-icing cables. These specially designed electric heating cables help protect your property by efficiently reducing ice formation along roof edges,



in gutters, drains and downspouts. When properly installed, these products create a path for the melt water from ice or snow to drain off the roof. Installing de-icing cables during the warmer months can keep you from having to deal with ice dams in the winter. For additional information you can contact a heating cable manufacturer, such as EasyHeat Roof and Gutter De-Icing Cables.

Inspect the places where your gutters are joined to the roof to make sure they are securely attached. Inspect your roof for mosses or other vegetation that may be growing on your shingles. After sweeping off debris or vegetation, it is recommended to apply a special removal solution (approved for use on your roof), or call a professional service to clear the roof.

Another way to minimize ice dams is

to inspect your attic space to make sure it is properly insulated and ventilated. Improperly insulated attics can cause hot air to collect at the top of your home during the winter, heating the roof and causing snow to melt and ice to form. Properly insulating your attic can also help you save on heating and cooling costs, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. It may be advised to consult with a local professional service on this type of work if you aren't familiar with insulation and ventilation systems. Once you've gone through your roof maintenance checklist, you can rest easy that you won't have to get out the ladder to fix a problem and your roof is protected against the frosty weather. 
