## Charges against Chief dismissed

### *Weare Police Chief pleased with decision*

A charge of violating Election Law against the Weare Police Chief, Gregory Begin has been dismissed after a court ruling that it was filed in court after the 90-day statute of limitations had passed. Attorney General's office filed charges in February, nearly one year after the incident, charging Begin of illegally entering the voting area while he was helping an elderly man to a voting booth at the Town elections in March 2011. Under NH law, those violations must be filed within three months unless it involves "misconduct in office by a

public servant" which charges can be filed up to two years after a public official leaves office.

In his ruling, Judge Edward Gordon found that Begin was not acting in his official capacity as police chief at the time of his violation, and thus the statute of limitations could not be extended. Begin told the Concord Monitor that he was "very excited" that the case was dismissed. His attorney, Tony Soltani, had argued that the case never should have been filed, as Chief Begin did nothing wrong by assisting an elderly voter.

## Charges against Newbury driver in fatality dismissed

Charges of negligent homicide and vehicular assault against a Newbury man after he struck and killed a bicyclist and seriously injured another in June have been dropped because his worsening dementia prevents him from participating in his defense.

Merrimack County Superior Court Judge Richard McNamara dismissed the charges against Charles Crosbie, 87, after the state's forensic examiner testified that no treatment

would restore his competency to stand trial.

Family members and friends on both sides attended the hearing.

The decision was met with frustration and disbelief by the families of Robert Satturley, 64, of Newbury, who was killed in the accident, and former probate court judge Michael Feeney, also from Newbury, who suffered permanent brain damage as a result of the crash.

# New London Selectmen reject engineer's 'partial' proposal

The New London Selectmen met with Rod Findlay of Pathways Engineering on Monday morning, expecting Pathways would be prepared to give the board their proposal on the scope of the Elkins Project, including the tasks to be completed, how many hours each task will take, the type of engineer to complete the task and a price they feel would be correct for each task. To the Board's disappointment, Findlay came prepared to discuss only phase I of a three phase proposal for the project. Chair Peter Bianchi interrupted Findlay's presentation to express his concern that the town could not select an engineering firm without knowing the full scope and cost of the project. Town Administrator Kim Hallquist agreed saying it was clear from discussions with William Rose of the NH DOT that the project would consist of three phases but should be bid as one. "How do we decide if Pathways is the firm to do the work if we don't know the total cost?" she asked.

Findlay offered to come back with a "rough estimate" of the cost, but Bianchi said that was "unacceptable," as the town could not budget based on a "rough

estimate."

Findlay will return on July 23rd with plans for all three phases and a firmer price for his firm's services.

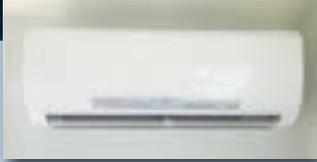

## Sunapee will reconstruct School Street

Sunapee Road Agent Tony Bergeron would like to resurface the road and reconstruct the sidewalk on School Street. If this was done he would probably not be able to reconstruct the intersection of High Street that was scheduled to be done. But, in his opinion School Street is in worse condition and the sidewalk is a safety hazard to the children walking up the hill. Chairman Gallup asked if only the sidewalk could be done and save the street for later? Bergeron replied the pavement, particularly by the school, is falling apart. Selectman Hastings stated that if there is no money in the budget for the High Street project then money should be set aside in the budget for next year. Bergeron will be starting the project at the end of July.

## Weare Fire Department seeks federal grant

Weare Fire Chief Robert Vezina met with the Selectmen to request that the Board authorize the Fire Department to apply to the US Department of Homeland Security, Assistance to Fire Fighter Grant Program for the purpose of obtaining new personal protective equipment for its members. There is a 5% match to this funding. Chief Vezina proposes to use funds from the Protective Clothing account. This grant program has proven itself a successful program to fire departments including the Weare Fire Department, to obtain needed equipment in a cost effective manner.

Although the Board felt that it would be good practice to see every grant in its final form before it is applied for, but in this case the deadline is before the Board meets again, so it voted unanimously to approve applying for the grant.

## New London offices need a new furnace

During Monday's selectmen's meeting the board received seven bids to replace the aging furnace in the Town Office Building. The bids ranged from \$26,000 from ARC for a boiler twice as large as the others to First Choice which offered two bids; \$11,000 for a single boiler and \$18,000 for two boilers. The decision was put off so that member Janet Kidder could review them with her husband, who is knowledgeable on the subject.

## Newport Planning Board holds consultation on shooting range

The Newport Planning Board's Conceptual Consultation with Ruger & Company and the Mountain View Gun Club on their proposed gun range on John Stark Highway was moved from the Town Hall to Newport Middle High School to accommodate the anticipated crowd and allow for broadcast on Community Access TV. After quickly dealing with an annexation and four small subdivisions, the Board recessed to meet with Town Council regarding procedural issues.

Upon reconvening, Chair Howard Dunn recused himself and Vice Chair David Burnham presided. Town council announced that as Ruger and Mountain View had not yet filed a site plan application, this hearing would be simply a consultation between them and the board, but the public could raise any possible concerns the board would handle if and when a site plan application is filed. Ruger attorney James Leboe said the range would be the "safest outdoor shooting range in NH."

Designed as a "no blue sky" range, shooters are prevented from seeing above the safety berms and thus shots can not travel outside the range. He promised that it would meet national safety and environmental standards. The range is proposed on 67 acres on John Stark Highway with four gunshot/skeet shooting ranges and three handgun/rifle ranges. Only trained gun club members would use the ranges, which would also be a test site for Ruger.

Although public comment was limited,

several residents who live nearby expressed concerns over safety and noise issues. No

further action will be taken until an application is filed.

## Complaints raised over Peterborough shooting range

Gun range issues were raised in Peterborough Tuesday night when disgruntled neighbors of The Monadnock Rod and Gun Club on Route 202 meet with the selectmen to air their complaints. Their complaints were prompted by the club's recent event featuring a group firing semiautomatic weapons. They came to complain about the noise and stray bullets coming from the grounds, but were told the board has no jurisdiction to control

the way the club operates, as no state or local laws were violated. Select Board Chair Barbara Miller said that not only does the town have no noise ordinance, the club has been in operation since 1947, prior to any zoning ordinance and is grandfathered. At the suggestion of members Joe Byk and Liz Thomas, the board agreed to draft a letter to the club urging them to meet with the neighbors to address their concerns.

Visitors will have the opportunity to view French and Indian battle re-enact-



# TAKE YOUR MEDICINE

Treating ovarian cancer with the drug bevacizumab (Avastin) delays the disease and may also improve survival, show the results of an international clinical trial. The findings, published in the New England Journal of Medicine, report that the drug halted the cancer's return for two months overall. However, for women with the highest risk of contracting the disease, the delay was five to six months and in this group, the findings also indicate a strong trend to improve overall survival.

Aspirin taken within five days of cardiac surgery is associated with a significant decrease in the risk of major postoperative complications, including renal failure, a lengthy intensive care unit stay and even early death (30-day mortality), according to a study in the journal *Annals of Surgery*.

Rituximab, (trade names Rituxan and MabThera), a monoclonal antibody for human CD20, was shown to be safe in patients with primary biliary cirrhosis (PBC) who had an incomplete response to the standard ursodeoxycholic acid (UDCA) therapy, also known as Ursodiol, in a study reported on in *Hepatology*. According to the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases (NIDDK), PBC — an autoimmune liver disease characterized by inflammation of the bile ducts that ultimately cause bile to build up and damage the liver — typically occurs between the ages of 40 and 60, primarily affecting women. Currently, the standard therapy for PBC is UDCA or liver transplantation in patients who have progressed to end-stage liver disease. However, previous studies have shown that UDCA may be ineffective in up to 40% of PBC patients and 10% could require transplantation or die from the disease.

## Newport approves \$208,964 budget cut

Forced to cut over \$200,000 from its municipal budget when voters rejected it a Town meeting, the Newport Selectmen have approved the following reduction totaling \$208,964 as recommended by Town Administrator Paul Brown: Non-union employees raise tied to union contracts-\$11,474; Final health insurance costs-\$11,020; Highway truck-\$7,943; Custodian to 1/2 time-\$40,141; Selectmen's salary-\$6,794; Finance Department staff-\$65,940; Recreation staff-\$6,281; Police Department staff-\$5,814; Overtime-\$30,000; Senior Center-\$2,000; Library-\$3,918; Recreation-\$3,000; General reductions-\$14,739.



## Christensen seeks County Commission seat

State Representative Chris Christensen (R-Merrimack) spoke to the Amherst Republican Town Committee regarding his position as a member of the Hillsborough County Delegation, and his candidacy for the District 3 seat as County Commissioner. The two positions are "incompatible" so Christensen will not be running for re-election as state representative. District 3 includes 24 towns in Hillsborough County. Christensen's primary point was that the incumbent, (C. Holden, (R-Amherst) had supported spending nearly all of the available surplus, and raising taxes on the cities and towns by 2%."

"It also appears to me that supporting spending \$25,000 for out of state travel for commissioners, while cutting \$63,000 out of the budget to support elderly and disabled Meals on Wheels recipients is just a bad set of priorities" added Christensen. He noted, in full disclosure, that he serves on the Board of Directors of Meals on Wheels. "It's time for a fresh perspective on the Board of County Commissioners, and I ask for your vote in the September primary election," he concluded.

## Business group urges full-time positions

The Hillsborough Selectmen met with Dennis Roberts, Jr., Chair of the Town's Economic Development Commission and Steve Heavener, of Capital Region Development to discuss business promotion in town. Roberts requested that funding for the commission be included in the annual town budget rather than as a separate warrant article as in the past.

Both gentlemen, along with Doug Hatfield, urged the Board to hire both a full-time Administrative Assistant and a full-time Planning Director to fill those vacant positions.

## Crotched Mountain Resort taxes tripled

Taxes at the Crotched Mountain Ski Resort in Franconstown have nearly tripled after a recent reassessment. In 2011, the facility was assessed at \$229,300, which covered the land, but not any of the equipment. The new total assessment values the facility at \$598,000. It includes the land which went up from \$229,300 to \$337,600, plus an additional \$260,400 for the equipment in use on the property. Under Franconstown's current tax rate of \$21 per \$1,000 of assessed value Crotched Mountain would have been taxed \$4,815 under the old assessment, but must now pay \$12,558 under the new formula.

Chairman Fred Gallup stated that the Board should take some time to review the information that was presented and come back with thoughts and comments to the July 16 meeting with what the Board would like to see in a "draft" ordinance.

### Warner selects Exit 9 traffic engineers

Warner Selectman David Hartman asked the Transportation Committee members what engineer firm they recommend. Both Town Administrator Laura Buone and Road Agent Matt Waite liked the McFarland presentation. Selectman Clyde Carson agreed that McFarland would be good for public information sessions. The Transportation Committee ranked McFarland second. When Carson suggested everyone to submit their choices in the order they ranked them, the results were as follows: 1. McFarland 2. Dubois & King 3. Hoyle & Tanner 4. KV Partners 5. Provan & Lorber. A letter will be sent to McFarland to begin negotiations. If negotiations cannot be met then the Selectmen/Committee moves onto the second choice.

### Free-range politicians: Have ZIP code, will travel

A resident of Lee, which is in New Hampshire's 1st Congressional District, has declared his candidacy for the Republican nomination in the 2nd Congressional District.

That is his right, under the Constitution. It is also the right of the Republican voters in the 2nd District to ignore this fellow come the September primary.

New Hampshire has but two districts because of our small population. One can argue that the issues faced in either district are not that dissimilar (although the folks hard by the Connecticut River, on the Vermont and Massachusetts borders, may beg to differ that their issues are the same as those living near the Atlantic Ocean).

Fact is, the closer one's elected representative is to the issues and the people he or she represents, the better. We find absurd, for instance, the Legislature's drawing of Executive Council District 2 so that it stretches clear across the state.

Dennis Lamare says those who oppose

His opponents, including incumbent Charlie Bass, won't have to debate him on the issues. They can just point to his residence and dismiss his bid as unworthy of voter support.

So the Sanborns have moved to Bedford and have filed to represent that area.

As with Lamare's run, there is nothing in the law that says the Sanborns can't do this. It is how Hillary Clinton, former First Lady of Arkansas, among other titles, came to be elected as a U.S. senator from New York. Before her, Bobby Kennedy did the same thing.

It is called district-shopping in some quarters, although in the post-Civil War South, such people were called carpetbaggers and the locals were not amused.

In a democracy, voting should be encouraged and as easy as possible. Instead, the NH House tried to restrict college student voting access (HB176), and same-day voter registration (HB223). The selectmen then opened a separate sealed pricing option, and chose Baybutt.

A group of upset residents, parents of special ed students, attended the Sunapee School Board meeting on June 6th armed with a long list of demands, including the resignation of the elementary school Principal. Members presented an amendment to the Reporting Requirements and Parental Notification policy that calls for parental notification within 24 hours of a restraint incident to by the end of the school day, and requested the board to develop well

defined guidelines for teachers and students in regards to bullying."
