Seastrand's accuser sent to court diversion program

Janelle Westfall, 19, of Alexandria, the Colby-Sawyer College student who reported former New London Police Chief David Seastrand for asking her to pose nude in exchange for dropping her charges has been referred to a court diversion program. If she successfully completes the Merrimack County Diversion Program, her criminal case will be dismissed later this year, according to court documents.

Westfall was arrested in March and charged with walking on County Road intoxicated while holding a 12 ounce can of beer. She reportedly provided a false name and date of birth to Seastrand when arrested.


Westfall had entered not guilty pleas to the charges of under-age possession of alcohol and providing false information to authorities. After her arrest, she reported Seastrand's offer, the chief then resigned as part of a negotiated deal with the NH Attorney General's office.

Westfall's attorney has said that he anticipates filing suit against Seastrand, once the attorney general's officecompletes its investigation.



Hillsborough Police K9 Team successful

Sgt. Nick Hodgen and K9 Fanto of the Hillsborough Police Department traveled to Boston and attended the Untied States Police Canine Association Region 4 field trials hosted by the Boston Police Department on June 1-2. These trials serve as the teams' primary patrol certification and the participating K9 teams compete against each other for high scores overall and In each category. In order to achieve the USPCA's Police Certification, an officer and his/her canine must score a minimum of 490 points (70 percent) out of a possible 700. Officers scoring 560 points or more are then eligible to attend the USPCA National Police Dog Field Trial held once a year in various locations around the country. The test to obtain certification is made up of four parts that includes obedience, agility, evidence and suspect search and criminal apprehension. Hodgen and K9 Fanto received a score of 634 points, making them the fifth highest overall out of 35 teams from New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Connecticut and New York. The Hillsboro K9 team also received trophies for finishing in second place for both obedience and agility. Hodgen received a top decoy award and was also the recipient of the Thomas Minkler Memorial Sportsmanship Award.

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

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

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The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Cometriq (cabozantinib) to treat medullary thyroid cancer that has spread to other parts of the body (metastasized). Medullary thyroid cancer develops in cells in the thyroid gland that make a hormone called calcitonin, which helps maintain a healthy level of calcium in the blood.

BY SARAH CHAPIN This type of cancer may occur spontaneously or in families with certain genetic mutations that result in one or more cancers of the endocrine system, including the thyroid gland. The National Cancer Institute estimates that 56,460 Americans will be diagnosed with thyroid cancer and 1,780 will die from the disease in 2012. About 4 percent of thyroid cancers are medullary thyroid cancer, making it one of the rarer types of thyroid cancers.

People who exercise along with taking statins to lower their high cholesterol levels can dramatically reduce their risk of dying, a large new study published online in *The Lancet* suggests. Statin drugs include Lipitor (atorvastatin), Lescol (fluvastatin), Pravachol (pravastatin), Crestor (rosuvastatin) and Zocor (simvastatin).

Diabetic patients with ovarian cancer who took the drug metformin for their diabetes had a better survival rate than patients who did not take it, a study headed by the Mayo Clinic shows. The findings, published in the journal *Cancer*, may play an important role for researchers as they study the use of existing medications to treat different or new diseases. Metformin is a widely prescribed drug to treat diabetes, and previous research by others has shown its promise for other cancers. The Mayo-led study adds ovarian cancer to the list.

Community Alliance may cut services

Barbara Brill, the Executive Director of Community Alliance of Human Services said her organization is doing everything it can before we look at cutting services in light of federal funding cuts. The federal government recently announced a \$249,000 reduction in transportation funding for the Community Alliance of Human Services. The buses connecting Charlestown, Newport and Claremont, as well as the volunteer drivers who take people to medical appointments and to work, could be cut if funding gaps are not plugged soon. The organization supplies buses to help people in Charlestown, Claremont, and Newport get to grocery stores, work sites, and doctor's visits.
