## New London Remembers

*Ceremony marks 12th Anniversary of Sept. 11th*

A large and appreciative crowd was on hand as New London marked the 12th Anniversary of the attacks of September 11, 2001. Campbell Webster's bagpipes escorted the KRES fifth graders from the school to the Fire Department, followed by a contingent of firefighters and police officers.

Fifth grade teacher and New London firefighter Amy Lyon served as MC for the ceremony and introduced Fire Chief Jay Lyon who welcomed all and led the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by the singing of our National Anthem by the combined fifth grade classes. Cindy Johnson from the First Baptist Church gave the blessing. A representative of each of the four fifth

grades spoke on a different patriotic topic they had researched.

As taps was played, the Department's older United States flag was lowered and a new one raised in its place. Amy Lyons acknowledged the Canadian military personnel who attended and in their honor, played the Canadian National Anthem. ## Court gives Azmys a November 15th deadline

Time appears to be running out for Gamil and Lois Azmy of Warner as the Merrimack County Superior Court has ordered them to comply with an agreement to clean up their property by November 15th. The latest court hearing is but the most recent chapter of an extended legal battle that has been to the New Hampshire Supreme Court and back. On

Monday, Judge Richard McNamara ordered the Azmys to clean up their 18-acre property on Route 103 in Webster and Warner by the deadline or the towns will do it at their expense.

At an earlier hearing, the court had ordered the couple to pay a fine of \$50 per day for each day past Nov. 15, 2011, that they did not comply. They now owe \$29,600.

## Girl Scout Council to sell Antrim's Camp Chenoa on Gregg Lake

The Girl Scouts of the Green and White Mountains Council has decided to sell Camp Chenoa Girl Scout camp on Gregg Lake, citing declining attendance and girls choosing other Girl Scout programs. CEO Patricia Mellor said, "Although the decision was difficult, divesting of Camp Chenoa will enable us to invest in our other properties, to provide programming and improved accommodations so we can better serve girls in this second century of Girl Scouting."

Although the council has several properties in Vermont and New Hampshire, Camp Chenoa is the only overnight Girl Scout camp in the state.

Chenoa is a 300-acre camp property on Gregg Lake that was once a Boy Scout camp. When the council purchased it in 1991 the structures had to be rebuilt, and ran as a very rustic experience for Girl Scouts in the first few years. Over the years Camp Chenoa became known for its adventure activities such as rock climbing, ziplining and indoor skydiving as well as Gregg Lake activities like boating and swimming.

The Camp's climbing wall has always

been very popular with girls, and will be moved or rebuilt at Camp Farnsworth in VT. A closing camp fire event is planned

for this fall so that former Camp Chenoa campers and staff can come together and reconnect with the camp one more time.

# Henniker Community School students attend Sargent Camp

## Sturm Ruger to receive \$15 million to open NC plant

Sturm, Ruger & Co. will reportedly receive about \$15 million for opening a new factory in the North Carolina community already home to America's largest firearms maker.

The Mayodan town council on Monday approved offering Sturm, Ruger more than \$850,000 over 14 years if it meets investment and job targets. The community is already headquarters to Freedom Group Inc., which owns Bushmaster, Remington and other firearms brands. The plant is

expected to employ more than 470 workers. Sturm, Ruger also could receive nearly \$950,000 from Rockingham County. Production is expected to begin early next year in the county struggling with an unemployment rate of 10.2 percent in July. Sturm, Ruger has completed the purchase of a vacant Unifi Inc. textile plant and is scheduled to invest \$4.25 million in improvements to the building and \$21.5 million in new machinery and equipment over five years.

The Hillsborough Chamber of commerce has asked the selectmen to close Main Street between Central Street and School Street during the Schnitzel Fest. The Board gave Administrator Laura Buono permission to OK the request if the police and fire chiefs also agree.

## TAKE YOUR MEDICINE

Although the drug zoledronic acid (trade names Zometa, Zomera, Aclasta and Reclast) slows bone loss in osteoporosis patients, it also boosts levels of a biomarker that stops bone formation, according to a recent study published in *The Endocrine Society's Journal of Clinical Endocrinology & Metabolism* (JCEM). Osteoporosis weakens bones and increases the risk patients will suffer fractures.

Low serum vitamin D levels are a risk factor for pneumonia, according to a study published in the *Journal of Epidemiology and Community Health*. The risk of contracting pneumonia was more than 2.5 times greater in subjects with the lowest vitamin D levels than in subjects with high vitamin D levels.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Diclegis (doxylamine succinate and pyridoxine hydrochloride) to treat pregnant women experiencing nausea and vomiting. Diclegis is a delayed-release tablet intended for women who have not adequately responded to conservative management of nausea and vomiting during pregnancy, such as dietary and lifestyle modifications. These modifications include eating several small meals instead of three large meals, eating bland foods that are low in fat and easy to digest and avoiding smells that can trigger nausea.

Maternal use of valproate (a drug used for the treatment of epilepsy and other neuropsychological disorders) during pregnancy was associated with a significantly increased risk of autism in offspring, according to a study in *JAMA*.

### Joubert's sexual assault trial Sept. 23rd

Lawyers for a former coach accused of sexual assault are asking a judge to throw out evidence in the case. Robert Joubert is a former baseball and hockey coach who is accused of sexual contact with a minor. His lawyers have asked a judge to throw out a search warrant, saying it was unconstitutionally broad. Defense lawyers asked the court to exclude all evidence police seized, including cellphones, computers and videotapes. Prosecutors said the police were well within their power to take what they did, and they said the search warrant was sufficiently specific. Prosecutors said the ruling on the warrant will have no bearing on whether they proceed to trial. Jury selection is scheduled to begin Sept. 23.

### Old Graded School repairs are underway

In Warner's Old Graded School, the damaged sheet rock on the basement level is being repaired and will be ready to paint. Ed Mical will put in the base board and repaint the repaired walls as soon as this work is completed. Jim Bingham has reviewed the 2 quotes for installing the carpet and flooring in the CAP office. The quote from Concord Carpet Center is \$4,938, and the quote from Karpets by Kerry in Contoocook is \$2,933. Bingham met with Karpets by Kerry to re-measure the floor space and confirm the scope of work, and recommends the Board accept the bid of \$2,933 from Karpets by Kerry for replacing the carpet and flooring in the CAP office and Headstart. The board approved.

### Emerald Lake Inlet dredging postponed

At Tuesday's meeting the Hillsborough Selectmen voted to postpone dredging the Emerald Lake Inlet until next year. Chair Russ Galpin explained that the Governor and Executive Council had not yet approved the project which was to be completed by November. In addition, the Board has received information that the project, initially estimated at \$35,000 may well exceed \$125,000 to complete.

## Greenfield school awarded \$4,500 grant

## Ausbon Sargent Preservation Trust adds Wendell Marsh North easement

The Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust added its 124th property to its list of protected properties in its 12-town region. With the addition of the Wendell Marsh North easement, Ausbon Sargent now protects 10,135 acres, continuing its mission to help preserve the rural character of the Mt. Kearsarge/Lake Sunapee region.

The Wendell Marsh North Property is primarily undeveloped forest land with scattered small wetlands and approximately 2200 feet of frontage on both sides of the outlet stream from Perkins Pond. A portion of the property is in the Wendell Marsh watershed and helps maintain the quality of the water flowing into the marsh, an important wildlife area. A variety of wildlife habitats are on the property and the Lake Sunapee Snowmobile Club maintains a snowmobile trail on the property that is used year round for pedestrian and snowmobile recreation.

This 136-acre parcel of upland property was conserved when Dr. Jolyon Johnson conveyed the Wendell Marsh North property to the Town of Sunapee and the town granted a conservation easement over the land to Ausbon Sargent. The Sunapee Conservation

Commission provided most of the funding for this conservation project and will manage the land for recreation, wildlife and sustainable forestry, but thanks go to many local donors who contributed to the funds that were necessary to secure this property.

There are two existing water wells on the

Wendell Marsh North property that may be used in the future for Sunapee's municipal water supply and the Perkins Pond sewer line will pass through the property helping to improve the water quality in the pond in its outlet brook that flows through the Wendell Marsh North land.

## Publisher's Perspective *by Leigh Bosse*

### AN APPEAL TO HILLSBORO-DEERING TEACHERS

For the last several years there has been a perception of hostility and alienation between the teachers at Hillsboro-Deering schools and the district's taxpayers. Teachers have viewed taxpayers as unappreciative of their efforts and anti-education in general. Taxpayers, burdened with a prolonged economic recession, perceive that teachers, who are among the highest paid residents, have the best pension and insurance benefits and the strongest job security, seem unwilling to share the burdens and hardships the economy has imposed on the rest of us.

The gap between them has been exacerbated by a School Board which has, year after year, accumulated a six figure surplus on default budget yet continues to spend those surpluses and ask for additional six figure increases. Taxpayers are left with only two unpleasant alternatives. 1. Vote against teacher raises; 2. Defeat the budget.

Last week the Hillsboro-Deering School Board took the first step at closing that gap and restoring mutual respect. By voting to

return approximate \$650,000 in surplus funds to the taxpayers, the Board has shown residents it understands and cares about their burdens. On behalf of those taxpayers I sincerely congratulate and thank the Board for its efforts.

The next step at closing this gap of mistrust is in the hands of District teachers. Again on behalf of all taxpayers, I ask you to instruct your Union Representatives to give up the major obstruction to District harmony and unity - The Evergreen Clause.

Area residents are proud to acknowledge that Hillsboro-Deering schools are blessed with an abundance of motivated, talented and dedicated teachers, the key ingredient to a quality education. However, to the average citizen, worried about losing a job and struggling to pay the bills, the Evergreen Clause, with its automatic benefits, is a slap in the face and divisive wedge between the two groups.

Teachers have long sought the respect of taxpayers. Surrendering Evergreen would go a long way toward earning it.

Hutchinson called police, who along with DCYS as launched an investigation.

## Hillsborough woman pleads guilty, avoids jail time

The Hillsborough woman accused of stealing nearly \$20,000 from her Contoocook employer may avoid jail time if the court accepts the plea deal negotiated with the County Attorney.

If approved, Theresa Wareing will plead guilty in exchange for a reduced sentence

which includes completing the county's diversion program and repaying the \$19,650 she took from Excalibur Shelving Systems between November 2011 and July 2012, plus a 17% administration fee. Her prison sentence would then be suspended if both conditions are met.

## Antrim EMT's case sent to Superior court Grand Jury

Jeremy Bouchard, 34, of Antrim, the former Peterborough Fire & Rescue clinical director arrested for alleging stealing medication stored on ambulances waived his right to a probable cause hearing.

He has entered a not guilty plea, and the case was bound over to the Hillsborough County Superior Court where a grand jury will consider possible indictment.



The Family and Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. These rights are:

The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the school receives a request for access. Parents or eligible students should submit to the appropriate school principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected. The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights under FERPA. Parents or eligible students who wish to ask the School to amend a record should write the appropriate school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it should be changed. If the School decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the School will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of the right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

The right to privacy of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school district as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the district has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or a parent, student, or other volunteer assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

# Six reasons to switch Medicare plans for 2014

Each year, Medicare open enrollment brings with it changes that can affect nearly 50 million people. **4. Your plan premiums, co-pays or deductibles are increasing.** Price changes occur year to year, so examine the prices you have been paying and what you can expect to pay in the coming year.

**5. You have moved or are planning to move.** It's important to consider your Medicare plans when moving because you may leave the plan's service area or have additional options.

**6. Your current plan no longer will be available.** In these instances, beneficiaries must select a new plan, or they may default to another plan chosen by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. # Protecting yourself from the 'invisible' crime of identity theft

Identity theft: It's the subject of articles everywhere you turn. That's because the problem has exploded in recent years, as new methods for collecting, storing, sharing - and stealing - your personal information have developed.

"Identity theft is an increasingly pervasive problem, particularly in today's digital economy," says Trey Loughran, president of the Personal Solutions unit at Equifax.

Identity theft topped the list of national consumer complaints received by the Federal Trade Commission in 2012, for the 13th consecutive year. It accounts for 18 percent of all complaints, up from 15 percent in 2011.

Identity theft can involve taking over your credit account, stealing your tax refund, taking out loans in your name, accessing personal bank accounts or even running up medical bills using your name. You might not notice these crimes until they're done, which can mean you'll have months of inconvenience and time spent correcting the problem, in addition to the financial cost.

You may be more vulnerable than you realize. Common opportunities for identity theft include:

- Collecting personal information you've shared over unsecured websites
- Completing change-of-address forms to redirect your mail
- Going through your mail or trash to find credit offers, bank and credit card statements, or medical records



- Stealing personal information you're carrying if your wallet or purse is lost or stolen
- Stealing your mobile device

You could turn around and discover bad checks, loans or credit card bills that are suddenly your responsibility. Your savings account could be wiped out and your credit ruined.

Even children are vulnerable because of their clean credit histories.

Equifax recently launched a website, IdentityProtection.com, that provides consumers with information on identity theft and how to help protect themselves. "Consumers who are armed with useful knowledge and tools can be a powerful deterrent to the rapid growth of this 'invisible' crime," Loughran says.

The identity theft experts at Equifax offer some advice:

- When you sign up for a catalog or add your name to a mailing list, consider if the

benefit is worth sharing your personal information with someone who could potentially sell it.

■ If you sign up for email coupons or loyalty programs, don't share your full address or any financial information.

■ Ensure your passwords used for online banking and shopping sites are strong and unique; use a different password for each site. Mark your calendar to change your passwords every 90 days.

■ Request that your medical and insurance providers assign you a unique personal identification number. Don't reveal medical or insurance information by phone or email unless you made the first contact. File paper and electronic copies of your records in a secure location, and shred any outdated medical documents, including old prescription labels.

■ If your passport has been lost or stolen, prevent someone from ordering a new one in your name by contacting the U.S. State Department's Passport Services Department.

# Are your food and cooking choices accelerating the aging process?

When it comes to health, many people are aware of the major do's and don'ts of maintaining a healthy lifestyle and diet. However, people often focus on their cholesterol, blood pressure, and body mass index (BMI), and overlook another key medical marker: Advanced Glycation Endproducts (AGEs). AGEs are harmful compounds in the body that accelerate the aging process and are linked to many of the top health concerns people face today.

AGEs develop in the body or are ingested through certain foods, including browned, sugary and processed foods. When people consume too many of these foods, higher than normal levels of AGEs build up in their tissues. This accumulation accelerates the aging process from the inside out. Slowing the progression of AGEs is vital to living a long, healthy life.

In an effort to educate the public about AGEs, the A.G.E. Foundation, a global not-for-profit organization, is unveiling the findings of its U.S. survey on the effect of eating habits and cooking methods on aging. The A.G.E. Foundation is dedicated to educating consumers about AGEs and how they can protect themselves.

### The impact of eating habits and cooking methods on aging

Seventy-six percent of Americans know that eating and preparing processed food can accelerate aging, according to the survey. Thirty-two percent cited the manner in which they prepare food as having an impact on aging, while just 11 percent indicated cooking



food at high temperatures affected aging.

As temperatures warm up and outdoor cooking season begins, people will be heating up the grill with limited awareness of the way to reduce AGEs. The survey showed that six in 10 people prefer grilling their meat over oven-roasting (23 percent), stir-frying (9 percent), steaming (3 percent) and poaching (1 percent).

"It is important for people to limit the amount of barbecued, sauteed or even toasted food," says Dr. Michelle Davenport, a board member with the A.G.E. Foundation. "We've found that the higher the temperature you cook something, the higher the AGE level - and excessive AGEs cause our bodies to age prematurely."

The survey also showed that when people are eating processed, fried or sugary foods, 81 percent are more concerned with the impact

on their weight compared with 58 percent who are more concerned about the effect on their internal organs.

### Controlling your AGEs

The key to lowering AGEs is to reduce heat, extend cooking time and incorporate more water and acid into your food preparation, according to the A.G.E. Foundation. Water-based cooking methods (i.e., steaming, poaching) dramatically reduce AGEs. When queried about healthy ways to prepare meats for grilling, herb and oil ranked the highest (34 percent), followed by "straight to the grill" at 21 percent. Only 17 percent of respondents knew that adding an acid-based marinade was the best cooking method to reduce AGEs. "Adding a marinade in the form of lemon, lime or vinegar can cut AGEs by 50 percent," says Dr. Davenport.

Avoiding foods high in AGEs and opting for brightly colored fruits and vegetables and whole grains, which are low in AGEs, is also recommended. Opt for foods that include iridoids, which are healthy elements produced in plants and found in certain fruits and vegetables like noni, blueberries, olive leaves and Cornelian cherries, as well as the supplemental beverage TruAge Max.

In addition to eating a healthy, fresh diet and preparing low-AGE level foods, it's important to quit smoking, exercise regularly, get enough sleep and control stress levels to achieve an AGE-less lifestyle.
