## **Technology Upgrade**

## Technology at New Boston Central School revamped

This summer was a busy one at the New Boston School District. The technology infrastructure at the New Boston Central School was revamped, top-to-bottom, with the assistance of the Tech Team from the neighboring Goffstown School District.

An important advantage gained in the upgrade is the sharing of resources and support between the districts, and improved economies of scale. The students in New Boston will benefit by making their transition between the districts smoother, and giving them uninterrupted access to their work from the elementary grades when they move to the Goffstown middle and high schools. The tasks completed this summer include: Unifying the authentication system and deploying new servers; revamping the IP address scheme for simplicity and uniformity; reconfiguring the firewall; optimizing the wireless network for faster performance; adding network drops to classrooms and the library; improving the backup system; and finally revamping the New Boston Central School website. The new "mobile friendly" website will be publicly available at the beginning of the school year.

#### Accident leads to the arrest of Henniker man on a warrant

Concord Police arrested two men last week after responding to a two-vehicle accident on Penacook Street. Richard E. Hewey Jr., 24, of Penacook, was charged with driving after revocation or suspension, and Nikolas R. Carr, 20, of Henniker was arrested on a bench warrant. When officers arrived, Hewey allegedly admitted to being the driver even though his license was revoked in May and suspended in July.

He was previously convicted of operating after suspension in Concord District Court in November 2012. A second officer responding to the accident noticed a man sitting on the sidewalk near Columbus Avenue and went to ask if he had any involvement with the accident. He stated that he had not but that another subject from the accident on the sidewalk had been a passenger in Hewey's truck.

When the officer went back and asked for an ID, the man gave the officer the name "Albert Emery." The officer, however, knew from prior information that Carr had previously been hanging out with both Hewey and the female passenger. Carr had an active warrant out of Hillsboro District Court for nonpayment of a fine on a driving after revocation or suspension charge from June.



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## TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has granted accelerated approval to Opdivo (nivolumab), a new treatment for patients with unresectable (cannot be removed by surgery) or metastatic (advanced) melanoma who no longer respond to other drugs. Melanoma is the fifth most common type of cancer in the United States. It forms in the body's me-

**BY SARAH CHAPIN** Ianocyte cells, which develop the skin's pigment. The National Cancer Institute estimated that 76,100 Americans will be diagnosed with melanoma and 9,710 will die from the disease this year.

A large international study, published in *The Lancet*, has shown conclusively that statin treatment reduces the risk of cardiovascular disease in women. Whether statin therapy is as effective in women as in men is debated, especially for primary prevention. This study compared the effects of statin therapy between men and women. The research confirms that statins are beneficial not only to women who have already had a cardiovascular event such as a heart attack or stroke, but also in those who — while they have not yet developed cardiovascular disease — are at an increased risk of such diseases.

Women with Alzheimer's disease showed stable cognition for a year when leuprolide acetate (Lupron Depot), used to treat cancer in men and severe endometriosis in women was added to their drug regimen, according to a new study published in the *Journal of Alzheimer's Disease*.

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## Pair escapes injury in Hopkinton crash

A teen and a juvenile were able to walk away from an accident without injuries yesterday after the SUV they were in flipped and crashed. According to New Hampshire State Police, around 6 p.m. on Aug. 22, 2015. Troopers responded to Broad Cove Road in Hopkinton for a report of a Ford Explorer that crashed. The vehicle was being driven by a 17-year-old boy in a westerly direction on the road when he lost control. "The vehicle came to a rest on its roof," according to Sgt. William Graham. "The male, along with a juvenile passenger, had both been wearing seatbelts and were able to crawl from the overturned vehicle." The trooper concluded that the driver was traveling at an unsafe speed, according to the report, and came over a rise in the dirt road that caused the loss of control. Neither passenger was injured in the crash, according to Hopkinton Fire and Rescue teams, which were at the scene to assist.

## **Delays on Sunapee's Jobs Creek Road**

The Sunapee Highway Department will be replacing some existing failed drainage pipes that are located under Jobs Creek Road (between the intersections of Route 11 & Jobs Creek and the intersection of Woodland Road & Jobs Creek Road) beginning on or about the first week of September 2015. One lane of traffic will be maintained during most times throughout the duration of the project. Pavement patches of the specific drainage pipe locations will be re-paved before the end of October. Minor traffic delays may occur during the replacement of the culvert pipes in order to complete the project. ## New Boston Police capture car burglar

During the overnight hours of Saturday August 22nd into the 23rd, 13 motor vehicles were entered in the Joe English and Meadow Road area of town. On Sunday afternoon, August 23rd at 1730 hours, Officers Matthew Koziol and Ryan MacLean arrested the individual responsible. The collaborative effort of our officers and citizens led to this very quick positive result. NBPD is currently attempting to recover the stolen property and will follow up with each victim in the coming days.

## Bow man charged with sexual assault

Foad Afshar, 55, of Bow, was arrested on July 14th, and charged with aggravated felonious sexual assault for fondling, which is a felony, and two counts of unlawful practice. Authorities say Afshar operated a mental health practice called the Cleer Institute on Tremont Street, reportedly without a license, and allegedly sexually assaulted a boy he was treating.

## Weare Police Department accredited subject to conditions

Weare Police Chief Sean Kelley informed the selecmen that he has a cruiser that is in need of approximately \$2,500 in repairs necessary to get it inspected. There is a list of repairs needed for Cruiser 5 and he was seeking approval for that before proceeding. The Board asked Chief Kelly if he had enough cars for two weeks, as they would like to discuss this issue then. Chief Kelly stated that it has been a while, but two more weeks would be fine.

Kelly stated that the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) awarded the Department "Law Enforcement Accreditation" status. Recognizing that the Weare Police Department is in the formative months of transition, the Commission is requiring the Department to prepare separate reports to demonstrate compliance with four key time sensitive activities. The following reports must be presented to the Commission in time for consideration at their July 2016 conference:

1. A Use of Force Analysis for calendar year 2015;

2. A progress report of the Recruitment Plan;

3. Completed year-end performance evaluations for all department employees;

4. A second comprehensive audit of the evidence room, or an inquiry into discrepancies found in the July 2015 audit. Chief Kelly stated that accreditation would not have been achieved this quickly without the full commitment

of every member of the Weare Police Department.

## Marine Corps League asks relief from Bow's Fee Scale

Bryan Westover, of Bow, President of the Marine Corp League introduced the Bow Selectmen to five other Marines, four who reside outside of Bow. Westover and his companions were following up a letter to the selectmen asking for financial relief for using Old Town Hall.

He pointed out the numerous projects they have done for the Town of Bow in the last 24 years. They are the only Veterans organization that meets in Bow. He discussed the many projects that the Marine Corps League does for Bow, Concord, Boscawen and the County, including funeral and flag details.

To continue meeting monthly at Old Town Hall they would now have to pay \$2,500-\$3,000 under the new town policy for groups that have less than 10% Bow members. Westover was requesting that they pay \$100/year, which is twice the rate for a Bow-based organization. Aware of the good works the group does but unwilling to set a precedent by amending the new policy the Board will re-address this at a future meeting, perhaps by giving a credit for the work of the League.

## Weare searching for its oldest citizen

Weare town officials are searching for Weare's oldest resident to be the next custodian of the Boston Post Cane. The now defunct Boston Post newspaper dispersed a gold-topped ebony cane to many New England Towns in 1909. Weare Selectmen are charged with presenting the cane to the town's oldest citizen. The cane shall remain in his or her care as long as they live in the community. The Weare Boston Post cane was recently returned to the Town Clerk by the family of Margaret Colburn. Mrs. Colburn passed away recently at the age of 107. ## Newbury man to spend 1-2 years in jail

Nicholas L. Fuchs, 29, of Newbury has been sentenced to serve 1-2 years in New Hampshire State Prison after pleading guilty Friday in Sullivan County Superior Court to a charge of Reckless Conduct with a Deadly Weapon/Firearm. Fuchs was charged with firing several shots at a residence located at 17 Bradford Rd. in Sunapee last september. Through investigation, it was established that Fuchs fired several rounds from a 9mm weapon into the Bradford Road residence while it was occupied. Investigation by Sunapee Police revealed the residence was singled out as an act of retaliation.

## Goffstown and New Boston hold joint Emergency Response Exercise

On Wednesday, August 19, 2015, over 50 members from the Goffstown and New Boston School Districts, Police Departments, and Fire Departments of Goffstown and New Boston participated in a Table Top Emergency Response drill conducted by the State of New Hampshire Homeland Security and Emergency Management. This drill provided school administrators, teachers, and support staff from each of the schools in Goffstown and New Boston the opportunity to continue to collaborate with the Police and Fire Departments around emergency preparedness.

Superintendent of Schools, Brian Balke stated, "School safety is our highest priority; we can't be too prepared to keep our students and faculty safe."

Today's training reinforces monthly meetings held between Goffstown and New Boston schools with first responders over the last two school years focused on emergency preparedness.

New Boston Chief of Police Jim Brace shared, "Today's training is an excellent example of the continued collaborative efforts between the SAU, Goffstown, and New

Boston Emergency services to keep our children safe while in our schools. While this training was directed towards school safety, it provides emergency responders opportunities to plan, update, and exercise procedures which will ultimately keep all citizens safe. New Boston PD was proud to have partnered with the SAU and the Town of Goffstown during this training."In conjunction with the New Hampshire Homeland Security, a full scale drill is being planned for the fall where emergency management plans will be tested through a simulated emergency. Parents and community members will be provided additional information over the next several weeks.

Goffstown Chief of Police Robert Browne shared, "The Goffstown Police Department consistently endeavors to provide safety for our citizens, especially our student population."

The exercise today was yet another proven example of why police, fire and school administrators in our community need to work together to facilitate those safety measures. By having all of the stakeholders together in one training exercise, everyone is able to see the unique responsibilities that we all have to lead our community through any form of serious event at our schools. Today's training provided further evidence of the continuous strong working relationship that the police, fire and school district shares."



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

## No injuries in Weare equipment fire

On August 20th, the Weare Fire Department responded to a report of a logging vehicle fire off Brown Hill Road. Engine 5, staffed with the on-duty crew from the Center Fire Station responded, and once on scene personnel found a piece of logging equipment on fire. Weare firefighters were provided access to the burning equipment, known as a feller-buncher, by a logging skidder as there was not a suitable vehicle access. The effort to extinguish the fire was complicated by the distance into the woods, the fuel burning in the equipment, the terrain of the area. Mutual aid was requested from Goffstown, New Boston, and Bedford. After 3 hours firefighters were able to contain the fire damage to the machine and a small area of woods. "Thankfully, the operator was not injured or trapped when the equipment overturned," said Weare Fire Chief Robert Vezina, "All hands did a great job in dealing with the special challenges involved." The machine is likely a total loss. No civilians or fire personnel were injured.

## Lightning strike ignites Newport fire

Lightning striking a tree and smoldering for several days caused a forest fire on Coit Mountain in Newport. Lt. Corey Conroy said the firefighters hiked up the mountain to investigate smoke in the woods and discovered a 300 by 400 foot area smoldering near the area of Break Burn trail. Because of darkness and distance, terrain extinguishing was impossible. The firefighters returned on Thursday morning with off road equipment and mutual aid from Newbury, Sunapee and Lempster. Even with the off road equipment it took firefighters 35 minutes to reach the fire area. A call for more manpower went out and New London and Claremont Fire Departments arrived and Ascutney VT Fire Department was called in for more manpower. Lt. Conroy said about 35 firefighters helped extinguish the fire that consumed over half an acre.

## New Boston to stick with Putnam Fuel

New Boston Town Administrator Peter Flynn reported that the town has been using Putnam for fuel oil for many years. Their bid this year is \$2.179 per gallon and they are considered a more local company. Rymes bid was \$2.139 and they are considered an out of town company. The town is expected to need 9,000 gallons. The town will spend \$700 more with Putnam but a few years ago the town used Rymes and it cost \$800 more than a competitive bidder. The Board unanimously voted to contract with Putnam Fuel for fuel oil this year.

## Newport's Lil' Red Baron Restaurant available for purchase

At this year's Town meeting, Newport voters authorized the selectmen to negotiate the repair or replacement of the failed septic system at the Lil' Red Baron Restaurant at Parlin Field. It was anticipated that an agreement would be reached with the owner-operators of the restaurant which would soon reopen.

The public safety building has been offered at a price \$5,000,000, with approximate interest of \$2,300,000, bearing in mind this does not include some site work, heating, ventilation, and air conditioning.

Other projects to consider prior to voting this Thursday:

• According to the CIP, a new community building for the sum of \$4,000,000 (interest of \$1,800,000?);

• School Building renovations of approximate \$5,200,000 (interest of \$2,400,000?);

• Also noteworthy, the school board just increased the budget beyond the budget committee's recommendations, including all day kindergarten, which is an \$85 increase on a \$250,000 assessed value.

I find the \$20,700,000 figure to be rather daunting for a town of Bow's size, financially speaking.

In regards to time frames, these projects could be implemented in just a handful of years resulting in overlapping bonding and a significant tax burden.

Finally, we all had to take a deep breath when we read about the Bow power plant being sold, which currently pays 17% of the taxes in Bow. What will be the impact of the sale? Any predictions at this time are mere speculation at best, and therefore the financial impact over the years to come is unknown.

Considering the numbers, I'm truly concerned about the likely tax ramifications of these sizable projects. How will Bow attract new families and businesses if the tax rate increases in a significant manner?

## Hillsborough Board supports a 'Wanderer Registry'

Dana Brien of the Senior Advisory Committee brought forward the idea of a "Wanderer Registry." She stated that having such a registry would help if someone with Alzheimer's or other dementia, an autistic person or one who's developmentally disabled were to wander away. The registry would be strictly voluntary and kept in the vault in the town office. The SAC was looking for support from the Board and would be asking the Police and Fire Departments for their help as well.

In other business, after a Public Hearing

the Hillsboro Board of Selectmen granted a Preservation Easement for Whitney Power's barn in Hillsboro Center. The Easement ordinance was adopted by the town in conjunction with State statutes by lowering property owners' taxes to encourage the maintenance and repair of historic buildings. In this case the barn is in the Historic Hillsborough Center, although not as visible to the public as other buildings that have been granted an easement. Therefore, the Board gave an easement of 25% of the current assessment of \$8000.00.

#### Hopkinton man arrested on drug charges Albert Emery, 19, has been arrested and charged with simple

Albert Emery, 19, has been arrested and charged with simple assault, domestic violence-simple assault, and possession of controlled drugs. Officers were sent to the Concord Gardens apartment complex for a report of an assault by a woman who claimed Emery had pushed her to the floor. The woman stated that she had allowed him to stay at the apartment since he was homeless. She came home that day to find three strangers in the apartment. She alleged that Emery had needles, a spoon, a glass smoking piece, and cotton, and was possibly using heroin. The woman ordered him to leave and gave him some time to pack things up but he allegedly became angry, yelled, and attempted to swing at her. She put her arms up to defend herself and he allegedly grabbed her and pushed her down. While speaking to the victim, another officer arrested Emery at McDonald's and allegedly found him to be in possession of a glass pipe with marijuana residue and a digital scale.

## New Boston flag pole to be taken down

New Boston Executive Assistant Laura Bernard told the selectmen that the Town Common has three flagpoles, two for American flags and one for the state flag. The Selectmen's office and the Fire Department have been responsible for raising and lowering the flags as needed. One pole is too close to trees and the American flag gets tangled in branches and torn if half-staff is need. The Road Agent has offered to remove that flagpole, store it at the Highway Department until it is needed in the future, possibly at the new Fire Station. Alternatively the tree could be removed but it is pruned regularly and needed for shade. The Board decided to take down the flagpole and store it until it can be relocated.

## Trio uninjured as car drops 30 feet in Peterborough accident

Peterborough Police Capt. Ernest Belletete reports that three people escaped without suffering any significant injuries when the car they were riding in dropped 30-feet off Route 202.

Douglas Dunton, 18, of Fitzwilliam was driving south on Route 202/Concord Street Tuesday. As the car entered the Main Street and Route 202/Pine Street intersection Dutton attempted to turn onto Pine Street but drove between Pine Street and the Main Street Bridge and crashed into a chain link fence, dropping 30 feet to the edge of the Contoocook River.

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


