Candie Tremblay and the House Called Earth will provide live music throughout the evening.







# An intimate evening with Clint Black Oct. 16

Singer and songwriter Clint Black will perform at Lebanon Opera House on Friday, October 16, 2015. Seats for the 7:30 pm show are \$59.50 & \$69.50. Prolific singer-songwriter Clint Black has long been heralded as one of country music's brightest stars. His many talents have taken him even further, as Black has transcended genres to become one of the most successful artists in all the music industry. To date, Black has written, recorded and released more than 100 songs, a benchmark in any artist's career. An astounding one-third of these songs eligible for major single release also achieved hit song status at country radio, while more than 20 million of his albums have been sold worldwide. While it's well-known that Black is an accomplished singer and guitarist, people may be surprised to learn that he is also proficient on drums and harmonica.

Black's continued success can be attributed in part to his deep sense of country music history, and his humble gratitude in being an important part of it. The 1989 debut of his critically acclaimed fan favorite, the Triple Platinum Killin' Time, marked a shift in the industry, with a return to the more traditional sounds



of the genre. CMT lists this album as one of the "100 Greatest Albums in Country Music."

Released while Black was still an unknown Texas-based artist and writer, Killin' Time boasted five #1 hits — unprecedented from a debut album in any genre — and won Black a collection of awards.

For Black, Killin'Time was only the beginning. Put Yourself in My Shoes followed in 1990, and quickly went Triple Platinum. Since then, Black has had nearly two dozen #1 hit singles, and almost as

many Top 5 and Top 10 hits — all of them his original compositions, which is itself a notable rarity in popular music. The overall number of his awards, including a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, surpasses the number of his hit records, while he has performed for a staggering number of dedicated music fans in concerts through the years.

With such a long and productive career, Black still keeps his output as fresh now as when he was a hungry, up-and-coming artist. When he felt that his music was in danger of becoming a bit repetitive in the late '90s, Black took a brave risk and shook things up by leaving his label of more than a decade, and took a much-needed break to reevaluate where he wanted to take his career next. At that time, he and wife Lisa Hartman Black decided to start a family, and the birth of daughter Lily Pearl subsequently gave Black a new perspective and vigor that affected not only his personal life, but his professional and creative sides as well.

Clearly, Black's devotion to family was the best thing for his career. In 2003, he boldly founded Equity Music Group, an especially artist-friendly record company that became home to his own recordings, as well as those of other like-minded artists. 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

Hail to the leaf from the seat of a car, train, bike, chairlift or zipline; there's more than one way to peep a leaf in Mt Washington Valley, NH

Mt Washington Valley, located in the heart of the White Mountains of New Hampshire, says hail to the "peep" each fall as Mother Nature provides a spectacle of color unmatched anywhere else in the USA. Offering not only spectacular foliage but a wide variety of ways to enjoy the harvest hues of nature's artistry, this region offers plenty of great ways to enjoy fall foliage throughout this autumn. Here are some conventional and a few unconventional suggestions for viewing Mt. Washington Valley's fall foliage. Try them all! Simply visit www.mtwashingtonvalley.org and click on EVENTS for a complete list of fall events to augment your leaf peeping itinerary.



From The Seat of a Train: Mt. Washington Valley offers a host of train rides year round, and fall rides add that spectacle of color in September and October. Book your seat on the Mt Washington Cog Railway and take this famous train ride to the top of Mt. Washington, the tallest peak in the Northeast, or enjoy fabulous scenic tours to Conway, Bartlett and Crawford Notch on the Conway Scenic Railroad.

From the Top of the Notch: Scenic drives through Crawford Notch to Bretton Woods or Pinkham Notch to Gorham offer everything from ridge top vistas and rock formations to moose sightings. Be sure to have the camera ready because around every turn there's a new surprise.

From the Moose Van: Take a ride along the picturesque Androscoggin River and into the 13-Mile Woods area or travel into "Moose Alleys" in other parts of the Valley on a choice of spectacular and scenic Moose/Wildlife Tour. As many as 23 moose have been spotted in one tour. Tours also includes folklore and historic features of the region. Choose from three different tours including Dan's Scenic Tours, Gorham Moose Tours and MWV Moose Bus Tours/Moose Safari. The Omni Mt Washington Hotel also offers moose tours from the hotel.

From a Gondola, Chair Lift or Zipline: Fall is the time of year to take in the spectacular vistas from Mt. Washington Valley's mountaintops. For those who'd rather not hike up, take the lift. 

# **Different types of apples:**

#### **SHAMROCK**

**Description:** Shamrock is a crisp and juicy, tart,

green apple. At its peak,
Shamrock develops a red
blush. Its flesh is a creamy
light green, and it has a coarse
texture with a flavor similar
to McIntosh, only more tart.
Good for both fresh eating
and cooking, but enjoy them



close to harvest, because they have a short storage life. Shamrock is an excellent choice to include with other apples in pies and sauce.

**History:** Shamrock is the result of a Spur McIntosh crossed with a Spur Golden Delicious. It is an East Coast alternative to the wonderful heirloom, Rhode Island Greening, and to the slower-growing Granny Smith. It originated in Summerland, British Columbia, in 1992. It typically ripens at the end of September.

### **WEALTHY**

**Description:** Wealthy is a fragrant red heirloom

variety with wide red striping. Its white flesh, sometimes stained with red, is sweet, crisp, and juicy, and tart with a hint of strawberry. Its skin tends to be tough. Wealthy is a good pie, sauce, and cider apple. Harvest is early August to mid-September.



**History:** Minnesota farmer Peter Gideon grew the first Wealthy from seed of Siberian Crab in 1861 and named it after his wife, Wealthy (Hull) Gideon. Although it has decreased in popularity, a century ago, Wealthy was one of the nation's five most popular apples, as well as a prized New England variety.

#### **FALLAWATER**

**Description:** Fallawater is a large, round apple,

with dull green color and red highlights. Its mild flavor

is unremarkable and, while its flesh is crisp, Fallawater has a tough, chewy skin.

**History:** Fallawater is a Pennsylvania native from the early 1800s. It was once grown in New England. Its parentage is not known.



#### **HAMPSHIRE**

**Description:** Hampshire is a firm, crisp, and juicy

Mac-like apple. This nearly solid red apple has a thin, sturdy skin and bears a mild sweet, sub-acid flavor that becomes more aromatic as it ripens. The cream-colored flesh is firm and crisp making it an excellent fresh-eating

and cooking apple. Hampshires are harvested from late September to mid-October, and they have good keeping quality.

**History:** Hampshire is a 1990 chance seedling that was discovered among a row of McIntosh trees at Gould Hill Apple Orchards in Hopkinton, New Hampshire.

#### HONEYCRISP

**Description:** Exceptionally juicy with a crunch

beyond compare, Honeycrisp has a variable bright red skin (40 - 95 percent) with pale green highlights. Its crispy flesh is cream colored and very juicy. The Honeycrisp has a sweet, sub-acid (slightly tart) flavor. It is excellent for salads or for



fresh-eating. Some warn its high water content makes it better suited for eating than for baking. Honeycrisp can be picked as early as late August. It is a good storing apple.

**History:** Honeycrisp was developed from a 1960 cross of Keepsake (MN447 x Northern Spy) x unknown,

as part of the University of Minnesota apple breeding program to develop winter hardy cultivars with high fruit quality. The original seedling was planted in 1962, and it was introduced commercially in 1991.

### **HUBBARDSTON NONESUCH**

**Description:** Hubbardston Nonesuch is a very

large apple with an unusually small core. Its uneven colored and textured peel displays russeting. Its hard flesh is crisp and extremely sweet, making it a good choice for cidermaking. Ripening is usually in October.



**History:** This heirloom variety dates back to 1700s Hubbardston, Massachusetts.

#### MOTHER

**Description:** Mother is a beautifully large, red apple with some yellow patches. Its flavor has been compared to the better-known Esopus Spitzenburg, although it may fall short in flavor and storage quality.


**History:** Also known as Queen Anne, Mother was discovered in Bolton, Massachusetts, before 1845. It used to be a standard in many old orchards, valued for its beauty and crisp, rich, sweettart flesh.



### **HIGHTOP SWEET**

**Description:** Hightop Sweet, also known as High Top Sweeting, Summer Sweet, and Sweet June, is a medium-sized apple with smooth greenish-yellow skin and an occasional red blush. Its yellow flesh is dry, and its

flavor sweet. It is used mostly for baking and drying. Among the earliest ripening of apples, it is harvested in late June to July in most areas.

### CIDER-N-PIES

Fresh apple cider is the sweet, unfermented juice of the apple available year-round. Fresh cider requires no added sugars or other ingredients, just apples, pressed for their translucent, coppery brown juice.

Cider is as varied and versatile as the apple itself. Try it over ice in the summer, or spiced and heated in the dead of winter. Freeze it, ferment it, cook with it! Whatever the apple variety, whatever the condition (dings and dents welcome), pasteurized or not, fresh cider delivers.

Substitute fresh cider for water in any apple recipe from applesauce to some soup recipes. Freeze cider for later use, just drain half a cup from the jug first, to allow for expansion.

Hard cider, which is about as strong as beer, was America's drink from Colonial days until well into mid-19th century. For the early European settlers, hard cider was the main reason for growing apples, and nearly everyone had a small orchard. Hard cider was cheap, sweet (cane sugar was not available yet), intoxicating, and it stored well. Everyone drank it, even children. In some cases, it was a safer choice than water! By the end of the 19th century, hard cider had fallen on hard times, a victim to the rise in popularity of beer, to the migration of people to cities, and to

the temperance movement. But both fresh and hard cider are experiencing a revival, from large commercial producers, to small orchards and cider mills that make unique blends, to people experimenting with small batches in their homes.











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


