Goffstown considers increased penalty for not registering dogs

Police Chief Robert Browne, Town Clerk Cathy Ball, and State Representative Claire Rouillard met with the Goffstown Selectmen were to discuss the problem with getting people to license their dogs. It is taking up the Police Department's time, as well as the Town Clerk's, to chase them down.

The Board asked Representative Rouillard if there was something that could be done at the State level. Representative Rouillard suggested that the issue of the fees, if they are too low or should be increased, is left to the Police Chief and Town Clerk.

The Board was more concerned with the growing number of individuals who don't get their dogs registered and must be tracked down, send out certified letters, have them summoned, and have them appear in court.

It's about the time that it takes the officers and Town Clerk to do this. It's a big cost. The Board wants to have more of a deterrent.

Hopkinton's \$3.3 million track

Scott Zipke and Lance Whitehead presented the Hopkinton selectmen their proposal to construct a new athletic area, adjacent to the High School. The Committee believes that the High School athletic area has substandard soccer fields, no track, no lacrosse field to practice on and the tennis courts are deteriorated.

The proposal would include a turf surface field for soccer, field hockey, lacrosse and football, bleachers, upgraded tennis courts, relocation of the baseball diamond and easier access to the fields. Whitehead said the cost of the project is estimated to be \$3,348,475.00. The Committee would like to put forth a Petition Warrant Article for 2016.

Representative Rouillard said RSA 466:39 gives the Town the option of passing an ordinance for the civil forfeiture aspect. Selectman Adams said "We have folks who are given multiple opportunities to license their dogs. We have many who are repeat offenders year after year. Unless we hit them where it hurts we're

going to keep going with it." A graduated penalty is what he'd like to see. It would increase over time for repeat violators.

Chairman Georgantas said he thinks the first step would be to have the Town Attomey look at RSA 466:39 to see if we can raise our penalty. It does say "not exceeding \$50."

Bow Public Safety Building Committee issues report

The Bow Public Safety Building Committee has been meeting since May to discuss and plan for the construction a new combined public safety building to house the Police, Fire and Emergency Management Departments. The Committee has been tasked the objective of a the facility to range in size from 20,000 to 25,000 square feet at a cost not to exceed \$5,000,000. To date, the Committee has:

- * Conducted a site walk for neighboring residents;
 - * Hired a consultant to assist with

preparation of the Request for Proposals and to review the proposals received;

- * Performed test pits on the site to determine and confirm that the proposed site is adequate for the siting of a new building; and
- * Presented a conceptual site plan to the Planning Board

A pre-proposal conference and site walk will be held on Wednesday, September 9, 2015 at 10:00 a.m. at the existing Bow Fire Station on Logging Hill Road.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Researchers publishing in *Cell Metabolism* have discovered that mirabegron (trade name Myrbetriq), a drug FDA-approved to treat overactive bladder, may boost brown fat's metabolic powers, making it a promising candidate for combatting obesity. Unlike energy-storing white fat, brown fat burns energy to generate heat, which can help maintain body weight and prevent obesity.

Patients who experienced a certain type of heart attack who received the anticoagulant fondaparinux (trade name Arixtra) had a lower risk of major bleeding events and death both in the hospital and after six months compared to patients who received low-molecular-weight heparin (LMWH), although both groups had similar rates of subsequent heart attack or stroke, according to a study in JAMA.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has granted accelerated approval to Lenvima (lenvatinib) to treat patients with progressive, differentiated thyroid cancer (DTC) whose disease progressed despite receiving radioactive iodine therapy (radioactive iodine refractory disease). The most common type of thyroid cancer, DTC is a cancerous growth of the thyroid gland, which is located in the neck and helps regulate the body's metabolism. The National Cancer Institute estimates that 62,980 Americans were diagnosed with thyroid cancer and 1,890 died from the disease in 2014. Lenvima is a kinase inhibitor, which works by blocking certain proteins from helping cancer cells grow and divide.

Goffstown drowning victim identified

Goffstown Police responding to a noise complaint arrived, in stead, to a frantic search for a missing woman whose body was found Sunday morning in the Piscataquog River. Her body was recovered about 12 hours later by divers from the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department, one of several agencies that joined the overnight search as hopes of finding the woman alive faded with every hour. Goffstown police Sgt. Dave Rivard said it was unclear how the woman ended up in the water and disappeared beneath the surface, something investigators expected to learn when they spoke further with the other people.

If possible the school would like to



Selectmen nix naming Schaefer Station

Longtime firefighter Dick Lord presented a plan to name the Contoocook Fire Station after Fire Chief Richard J. Schaefer. The proposal included lettering on the front of the building and the addition of a clock in the peak. Lord said that Chief Schaefer was instrumental in the renovation of the station. Sue Strickford said that she was very fond of Chief Schaefer, but not in favor of naming the station after anyone. She suggested that there were also other chiefs involved and would like to see all honored, not just one person. Sara Persechino echoed Strickford, while Janet Krzyzaniak stated that Chief Mumford supports naming the station after Schaefer. Chair Jim O'Brien requested that Lord consider ways to honor all chiefs.

Newport still discussing ambulance service

Newport is looking to see if they should continue outsourcing their ambulance service and what to charge towns if they continue service. Croydon, Goshen and Sunapee contract with Newport for its ambulance service. Each town pays a set fee for Newport's ambulance to be available then individuals are billed for the service they receive. According to Todd Fratzel Vice Chair of Newport Selectboard, one out of every four ambulance calls is outside of Newport. Fratzell is concerned that an ambulance with the best staff won't be available for Newport residents and wants the board to reconsider serving the other towns. Chief Wayne Conroy took issue with Fratzel's comments. Conroy added that in his seven years as Fire Chief that scenario never happened. The Selectboard and Town Manager Shane O'Keefe will take a vote on this issue at their retreat on September 14.

Francestown's Board fills two positions

A group of about 30 Francestown residents were on hand to witness the swearing in of the towns newPolice Chief and Town Administrator. Jamie Pike, will begin his duties on September 8. He previously was the administrative assistant in Chicester. The new Police Chief, Fred Douglas, begins immediately, having served as the Francestown Department's administrative manager since March. Douglas, a Lyndeborough Selectman previously served as Police Chief in Milford.

DES issues Keyser Pond bacteria warning

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (DES) has issued a cyanobacteria lake warning for those who recreate on Keyser Pond, Henniker, due to bluish-greenish globs of cyanobacteria working. The August 27, 2015 warning will remain in effect until future samples reveal cyanobacteria levels have diminished.

Second of former Chief's assistants suing Town of Weare

Dawn Wheeler, who was hired in February 2008 and served six years as an assistant at the Weare Police Department, receiving an exemplary ranking in her 2013 performance review by the prior chief, has sued the town alleging the town violated the Americans With Disabilities Amendments Act and a state law prohibiting disability discrimination, when then Chief John Velleca fired her and replaced her "with another employee, Jennifer Posteraro, with whom the chief (Velleca) would have a sexual affair."

The suit claims "lost wages, lost earning capacity, lost employment benefits, emotional distress, humiliation, inconvenience and loss of enjoyment of life." On June 1, 2015, she received a "notice of right to sue" from the EEOC and filed her suit in federal court within 90 days, in accordance with the notice.

Wheeler's is the latest lawsuit against the town. Posteraro, who claims she was assaulted by Velleca during an affair in the fall of 2014, is also suing the town. At least two former employees of the Weare Police Department have recently settled lawsuits with the town resulting in payouts of more than \$250,000.



Capitol Comments By District 8 State Senator Jerry Little

OTHERS MADE IT SO

Last Saturday was an absolutely beautiful summer day. I took a cup of coffee outside at 6:00 a.m. and walked the dogs behind the barn, feeling very grateful to be able to live my

life in New Hampshire. I contemplated the day ahead, understanding that I am only able to be here in this beautiful place and peaceful moment because others made it so.



The sky was blue and cloudless and

the air was still cool at 7:30 a.m. so I put on a jacket before mounting my motorcycle, thumbing the starter and heading north to Newport. I followed Route 114 out of Weare to Henniker before turning onto Route 103 in Bradford and rolling on through Newbury, Sunapee and eventually Newport. Each small town was waking up. People were shuffling out of convenience stores with newspapers and coffee. Fishermen were launching boats and parking their trucks and trailers along the road by Lake Massasecum. All of us were able to enjoy our relaxing, late-summer Saturday morning these ways because others made it so.

At the circle in Newport I fell in line behind several other bikes, then we all made a slow turn into the High School parking lot and put our kickstands down in long and growing lines of other riders who also understand that we have homes and families, high schools and hospitals to keep them well and growing and the freedom to choose to either go for a motorcycle ride or fishing, to work in the garden, read the newspaper and sip coffee or take the dog on a hike because others made it so. I was at the starting point for the Ninth Annual Rollins Ride for the Fallen to honor those who died to make it so.

Army Specialist Justin A. Rollins of Newport was killed in action on March 5, 2007 in Samarra, Iraq when an IED exploded near his unit during combat operations. Six other soldiers also died from the blast. The Rollins Ride held in their memory raises funds for a scholarship program benefitting Newport area students.

I never met Justin, but had the good fortune to meet his father, State Representative Skip Rollins of Newport, when I decided to run for office. I was told by friends that I could do worse than mold my public service after his. During our first meeting Skip told me, "Whatever you do, don't forget the little guy and we'll get along fine." Since then I've also met Justin's lovely mother, Rhonda, and now I know where Sgt. Justin Rollins got his sense of duty with dignity.

The Rollins Riders passed beneath a large American flag held aloft by two Newport Fire Department trucks as we headed out behind a State Police motor officer escort. rolling slowly down Main Street and Route 10 through Goshen, then Route 31 through Washington. While cruising through a rural stretch we rounded a sweeping right-hand bend to see another large American flag flying high in the sky, held there by a boom truck. It was breath-taking. The Stars and Stripes against a clear blue sky, framed on each side by tall, dark green pine trees and a line of motorcycles rumbling underneath, stretching out farther than I could see ahead or behind.

Our destination was the American Legion Hall in Hillsboro for a short ceremony. Flowers were laid at the base of flags representing every branch of the military, plus police and fire in honor of the first responders who died in the World Trade Center attacks. The names of all 64 servicemen from New Hampshire who have died serving our country since September 11, 2001 were read – a bell tolled for each.

The name of another friend's son, Sgt. William J. Tracy, Jr., is on that roll call. Justin's name was read last. There was a 21 gun salute. We heard Taps. A lone bagpiper played Amazing Grace in the distance. There were hugs and quiet conversation as we returned to the bikes. Then it was time to mount up for the return ride and a chance to reflect on the ceremony.

Our ride home took us east on Route 202 and then north on 114 and 103. There were more vehicles heading in the other direction than when I crossed these same roads earlier in the day, but no more traffic; most drivers pulled into the breakdown lane and stopped to watch, wave and salute as mile after mile of motorcyclists rolled by in honor of those who gave their lives serving our country. They seemed to be well aware that the freedom to enjoy a beautiful, late-summer New Hampshire day however we wished was possible because others made it so.
