# **Truancy Court**

### Another effort to keep kids in school

Facing an 11.84% drop out rate, one of the highest rates in New Hampshire and following the reinstitution of the city's juvenile curfew, Franklin is considering establishing a truancy court, based on a Nashua model.

Franklin Police Chief David Goldstein and SAU 18 Superintendent Daniel LeGallo agree that the concept, which is in its early stages, has merit. They hope to have it in place some-

time during this academic year.

Nashua Superintendent Mark Conrad has told them it worked well in his city. New Hampshire state law defines truancy as "an unexcused absence from school or class." Habitual truancy is 10 half days of unexcused absences during the school year. Goldstein and Legallo say their only goal is to keep kids in school and hold families accountable.

### **Burglary at Goffstown church shocks community**

Goffstown Police are investigating the burglary of a church Tuesday morning. Electronics, audio equipment including guitar amps, a portable residential generator and family belongings were taken from the rectory of Saint Lawrence Parish on the corner of Main and East Union streets.

The thieves apparently spent quite some time in the house and made off with several valuables as well as private church documents, police said. "A lot of electronics, computers and some other audio equipment also some paperwork associated with the parish was taken," said Lt. Pierre Pouliot of the Goffstown Police Department. Police said the church was burglarized between 4 p.m. Monday and 8 a.m. Tuesday. It's likely that a van or utility-type vehicle was used to haul stolen items away from the church.



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

### John Stark High School certified for 'Project Lead The Way'

John Stark Regional High school has received national certification for its Project Lead The Way (PLTW) program. There are only 13 certified Project Lead the Way high schools in New Hampshire. PLTW, a nonprofit organization and the nation's leading provider of STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) education programs, offers a rigorous, world-class curriculum that allows students to apply what they are learning in math and science class to real-life activities, projects and problems. PLTW also prides itself on high-quality professional development of its teachers and an engaged network of business, community and university partners to give students the full experience.

When we changed teachers, we were granted conditional certification status, but I'm happy to report that due to the hard work of Project Lead the Way Teacher Colin Stone, we now hold full certification for the next five years," said Principal Christopher Corkery. Mr. Stone has focused attention on meeting the full certification requirements since joining the John Stark teaching staff in 2013.

One of the areas for improvement for full certification was fostering a partnership team of community engineering professionals.

The JSRHS Project Lead the Way Partnership Team now has engineering members from NHTI, Autodesk, EFI, ProCon, and UPS that meets twice a year. John Stark Regional High School offers Introduction to Engineering Design and Principals of Engineering. Stark is offering a new PLTW class this year in Environmental Sustainability, which addresses the growing market for jobs in biological engineering. This class is being taught by Dr. Kevin Seeley. Other classes offered, depending on student interest, include Civil Engineering and Architecture, Computer Integrated Manufacturing, and Digital Electronics.

### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Multiple myeloma is a form of blood cancer that arises from plasma cells, a type of white blood cell, found in bone marrow. According to the National Cancer Institute, approximately 21,700 Americans are diagnosed with multiple myeloma and 10,710 die from the disease annually. Primarily affecting older adults, multiple myeloma causes plasma cells to rapidly multiply and crowd out other healthy

BY SARAH CHAPIN blood cells from the bone marrow. When the bone marrow has too many plasma cells, the cells may move to other parts of the body, which can weaken the body's immune system, lead to anemia and cause other bone and kidney problems.

In a National Institutes of Health supported clinical trial comparing three drugs for diabetic macular edema (DME), Eylea (aflibercept) provided greater visual improvement, on average, than did Avastin (bevacizumab) or Lucentis (ranibizumab) when vision was 20/50 or worse at the start of the trial. However, the three drugs resulted in similar average improvement when starting vision was 20/40 to 20/32. Investigators found no major differences in the safety of the three drugs. The results were published in the New England Journal of Medicine. DME can occur in people with diabetic retinopathy, a type of diabetic eye disease that can cause the growth of abnormal blood vessels in the retina. The macula is the area of the retina used when looking straight ahead, for tasks such as reading, driving, and watching television. Macular edema, or swelling, occurs when fluid leaks from retinal blood vessels and accumulates in the macula, distorting vision. Macular edema can arise during any stage of diabetic retinopathy and is the most common cause of diabetes-related vision loss. About 7.7 million Americans have diabetic retinopathy. Of these, about 750,000 have DME.

### Grant Bosse named editor of the editorial pages of the Union Leader

A New Hampshire native whose first job was delivering the Union Leader as a paperboy will be delivering the newspaper's opinions as editor of its editorial pages. Starting next month, Grant Bosse will take over the post from Andrew Cline, who is leaving the company to start communications consulting. Bosse grew up in Hillsborough where his parents still own and operate The Messenger, a local weekly newspaper. He graduated from Hillsboro-Deering High school in 1990, Dartmouth College in 1994.

He was a reporter and anchor for WGIR Radio in Manchester and later news director for WTSL Radio in Lebanon, which won multiple journalism honors on his watch.

New Hampshire Union Leader and Sunday News President and Publisher Joseph W. McQuaid said that Bosse's combination of news and political experience "makes him a natural for a job that often entails running facts to ground before putting them in perspective."

"Our editorial pages are known for letting readers know where we stand. Like Drew Cline, Grant Bosse has the courage of his convictions. We wish both of them well."

"I am a First Amendment zealot,"



Bosse said, "and I can't imagine a better opportunity to compete in the marketplace of ideas than on the editorial pages of the Union Leader and Sunday News. I'm looking forward to continuing the tradition of opinion journalism

that is informative, entertaining, and persuasive."

Bosse spent five years as editor of NH Watchdog, an independent news site run by the Josiah Bartlett Center for Public Policy, a free market think tank. Earlier, he worked at the New Hampshire State House for Speakers Donna Sytek and Gene Chandler and was press secretary for Craig Benson's successful 2002 gubernatorial campaign.

He also spent five years on the Washington, D.C., staff of U.S. Sen. John E. Sununu. He returned to New Hampshire in 2008 and sought the Republican nomination in the 2nd Congressional District. He has spent the past two years on the staff of the New Hampshire Senate. Bosse is 43. He and his wife, Jane, live in Lee.

### Chief concerned about workload at Bow Dispatch

Police Chief Erin Commerford met with the Selectmen to discuss Bow Dispatch. She handed out an agenda for the discussion and discussed statistics for Calls for Service, both past and present, and the dispatch fees, both past and current.

There have been increases in right-to-know requests; criminal investigations by the Attorney General's office; requests for logs, tapes, and copies of recorded calls and stops; subsequent motor vehicle requests and requests for anything run criminally. All this takes more manpower. The Chief highlighted one follow-up right-to-know re-

quest for another dispatched town that took 22 hours of the Chief's time and 16 hours of the Supervisor's time. Currently Bow provides dispatch service for Bow, Weare, New Boston and Dunbarton.

However, the Town of Dunbarton recently put out a Request for Proposals for new dispatch. There have been no issues regarding operations or satisfaction - it is all about money.

Chairman Harry Judd pointed out that 20% of the dispatch budget comes from these three towns, but they take approximately 55% of the calls.




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### Henniker awards \$5.4 million Western Avenue Bridge contract

The Henniker Selectmen dealt with several major items at a sparsely attended meeting Tuesday evening. On the recommendation of Hoyle, Tanner & Associates they awarded the \$5,460,834.90 contract on the Western Avenue Bridge to E.D. Swett, Inc., the lowest of six bidders.

The Board also decided to borrow the town's \$1,208,940 share of that cost from Lake Sunapee Bank at 2.79% interest over 15 years. Also approved was an agreement with the NH Department of Transportation for Phase 2 of the Safe Routes To School Grant. Henniker's portion is \$60,000 which was approved at March's



### **New Boston Fire Station plans progressing**

New Boston Fire Chief Dan MacDonald and the Fire Wards were present to meet with the Selectmen for final confirmation that the land on Mont Vernon Road can be used by the Fire Department as other town departments are considering how they could use the land as well. The Warrant Article authorizing purchase of the land did not specifically say it was for the Fire Department but that was the intent and it was presented to the town and the former landowners as such. The Selectmen asked if the new location would change Fire Department response time to calls and the Fire Wards said it is not expected to have a huge impact as it is still in the downtown area. MacDonald noted Fire Ward Wayne Blassberg has been doing a great job planning for a new station. Wayne recently attended a workshop in Baltimore about building fire stations and has been working with Surveyor Bob Todd and Architect Roger Dignard on a plan for New Boston. A planning committee will be formed and a Selectmen will be asked to serve on the committee. The Fire Wards hope to have the design quote ready by the end of 2015 and bring it to Town Meeting vote in March 2016 for approval and funding. The Fire Department is trying to be frugal in planning the new fire station. Joe was concerned they might be too frugal with the plan and wants them to make sure the new fire station will meet the town needs. The Fire Wards noted the New Boston Fire Service now have 59 volunteers allowing them to respond appropriately to calls.

If anyone sees the emu, officials ask that they call the police department at 228-0511 with the information and not try to approach the bird alone.

### One lane on Goffstown's Hooksett Road

The Goffstown Department of Public Works announces road construction work on Hooksett Road, has begun. The road will be down to one lane from 7AM - 8PM, while the Town is working in this area. Hooksett Road will be open to all traffic, but significant delays should be expected in the work zone due to the narrow width of the existing road and ongoing construction work. DPW highly recommends using an alternate route over the next few weeks until work is completed.

### Hillsboro-Deering School Board recognized dedicated staff members

The Hillsboro-Deering School Board got some good news and some bad news during Monday's meeting. Building 7 grounds Supervisor James Bailey gave the Board a tour of the three buildings on the campus, pointing out the major deficiencies in the Elementary and High School boilers. Both will require expensive replacements in the not too distant future. Bailey recommended exploring a long-term maintenance contract similar to Hopkintons, in which annual payments are flat and savings are reinvested in future improvements. The Board asked him to get more information on the concept.

### Stolen items recovered at Goffstown store

Investigators executed search warrants against EZ Computer & IPhone Repair locations in Concord and Goffstown on Tuesday. "It is alleged that large volumes of stolen property were being bought and sold at the businesses which also serve as pawn shops as well as doing phone and computer repair," according to Lt. Timothy O'Malley. Items found at the Goffstown location included a firearm listed as stolen out of another New Hampshire community, as well as a cell phone and some home repair tools reported stolen out of Goffstown, among other items.

### Franklin multifamily fire is "suspicious"

A fire at a multifamily home on School Street in Franklin has been deemed 'suspicious,' according to the fire chief. Everyone who was inside the home got out safely, but the building is a total loss. More than 50 firefighters from eight surrounding towns responded, according to Chief Kevin LaChapelle. "We have enough witnesses in the area that were here before the fire and after the fire that leads us to believe that the fire is suspicious," LaChapelle said. Crews remained on the scene well through the night Wednesday.

### Traffic stop result in \$250 Maddie check

Maddie Carlson, 17, of Goffstown, who is suffering from a rare form of cancer, was riding through town Monday, with her mother when they were pulled over by the Goffstown Police. Rather than give her a ticket, Maddie was presented with a check for \$250. A video of the event, posted on the police department's Facepage has been viewed over 100,000 times in three days. The next day, however, she learned that an experimental surgery at Boston Children's Hospital to remove her right shoulder failed to get rid of the cancer, and her tumor had metastasized. 

### An abuse of taxpayer dollars

I recently received this slick piece in the mail from our Congresswoman Annie Kuster.

Titled "A message from Congresswoman Annie Kuster" is nothing more than a pre-election propaganda piece, telling us what a wonderful job she is doing for us in Washington.

That would be fine, until you read the fine print on the back which tells us that

"This mailing was prepared, published and mailed at taxpayer expense."

Before being thrown out of office in 2014, Kuster's counterpart in the First Congressional District Carol Shea-Porter held the national record for sending out the most mail at taxpayer expense. It appears Congresswoman Kuster is determined to keep that record in New Hampshire.

#### **Dear Editor:**

I rarely get involved in partisan fights... but our Governor has left me no choice. I have been asked why Republicans won't compromise with the Governor. Despite Gov. Hassan's making it very difficult to do that, we have tried repeatedly. Her first counter proposal was literally dropped on the desks of NH House and Senate leadership as she headed for a press conference to announce it. That isn't working together, or collaboration. It is important to remember that we began with a budget that her office wrote and that we worked

very hard to find enough of your money to accomplish it all. A NH Governor begins the process knowing that they will get most of what they want, whoever controls the Legislature. Despite many Republican voters wanting reduced spending, we crafted a budget with more health and human service spending than any in our state's history. We recognized the need for investing in solutions to the addiction crisis and taking care of our veterans. We even found that a cut to nursing home funding that she proposed was not needed to accomplish her goals, and we added that money back in.



### **Letters to the Editor**

One of Gov. Hassan's early sticking points was the delay in the pay raise for state employees. A pretty big deal was made of this. We have since found the money and offered that, in full. She rejected it and said that we are not serious about compromise. Now, the sticking point is the business tax cut we proposed... while still meeting and exceeding program spending proposals. House Democrats said that tax cuts don't help business or create jobs. New York disagrees. Have you seen the commercials about tax breaks for businesses that move there? They spend millions on that advertising because it works. More to the point, Gov. Hassan herself disagrees. Read her press release from August 31 of this year at http://governor.nh.gov/media/news/2015/pr-2015-08-31-r-d-taxcredit.htm where she claims credit for jobs created as a result of a tax break. I guess they only don't work when Republicans propose them. This partisanship has to stop. I have voted for many bills proposed by Democrats when I thought they were good for my district. I didn't check the sponsor's party affiliation first.

Governor Hassan says that these tax breaks will "blow a 90 million dollar hole" in the budget. No they won't. The non-partisan Legislative Budget Office says that the budget is balanced. Independent analysts say that the budget is balanced. Gov. Hassan bases her statement on projecting years out and assuming that we lose revenue from the tax break, and that there is virtually no growth in our businesses or jobs. I have more faith in you than that. I think that if we make it a little easier to do business here, NH businesses will work hard and succeed. We make our budget in 2 year cycles so that we can react to changing circumstances. Her argument is baseless, and not representative of how our process works. Recent projections have shown that we have enough trouble forecasting out 2 years, much less multiple cycles. If she is just against the tax break, she should say so.

There are a lot of good programs that can help people waiting for the funding that it contains.

### Minor injuries in Sunapee car accidents

A two car crash on Route 11 in Sunapee occurred on Friday. One vehicle was traveling West and the other traveling East. The vehicle traveling East crossed the yellow line and the vehicle traveling West took action to avoid contact and was unable to. Both vehicles received extensive damage and the only occupants were the drivers and they were both alert and responsive and were transported to New London Hospital. Speed and alcohol were not factors and the Sunapee police continue to investigate why one of the vehicles crossed the center line. Sunapee Police were assisted on scene by the Sunapee fire department, Newport Ambulance and New London Ambulance.

A second head-on collision occurred on Route 103 Tuesday afternoon, just west of Nutting Road on Route 103. The operators of both vehicles were the only occupants and were transported by Newport Ambulance Service to New London Hospital with unknown injuries. Preliminary investigation revealed the westbound vehicle crossed over the center line into the lane of oncoming traffic. The operator of the vehicle was able to tell the Sunapee Police that her attention was distracted as she was reaching for something in the passenger's compartment of the vehicle when the crash occurred.

### Goffstown accident severs utility pole

Police are investigating an accident on East Dunbarton Road. Goffstown Police say a car hit a utility pole, causing nearly 200 outages in the area. Eversource officials say the pole is 45 feet high and was snapped in half due to the accident. There is no word on the condition of the driver of the vehicle.



### New Boston's Riverdale Road Bridge open

New Boston's Riverdale Road Bridge project began in 2011 when the voters supported a warrant article for \$70,000 to partially fund the 20% needed to commit to the state Bridge Aid Grant approved by the State of NH DOT. In 2014 the bridge contract was awarded to Daniels Construction of Vermont and was completed two weeks early and under budget by almost \$150,000 as originally projected by the engineers, Hoyle Tanner. This project consisted of a complete rebuilding of the Riverdale Road Bridge and after many obstacles such as utilities, purchasing State Conservation land, and obtaining easements from an abutter, it finally came to fruition.

### **Improvements at Bow Center planned**

The Board reviewed estimates for a full roundabout (\$770,000), Traffic Signal (\$630,215), and Mini Roundabout (\$449,999) at the Bow Center intersection. A study for signalization would cost an additional \$7,500 and then would have to be reviewed and approved by NH DOT, which does not look optimistic. The Selectmen agreed they do not want to pursue a signalization study: it will cost the tax-payers too much; there is a greater risk it will be dragged out longer and then not approved by the State; and it is the least safe of all the options. They asked Mr. Stack to continue working on this issue without signalization.
