### Major drug bust

### Hillsborough four charged with intent to distribute

Authorities said four people were arrested in Hillsborough during the execution of a search warrant for drug trafficking on Wall Street Thursday. Hillsborough Police and members of the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office Street Crimes Task Force seized cocaine, heroin and a firearm during the investigation. Joseph Sindoni, 20, of Hillsborough, was charged with possession of heroin with intent to distribute, possession of cocaine with intent to distribute and default of

bail conditions.

Brandon Coombs, 20, of Hillsborough, was charged with possession of controlled/narcotics drugs. Douglas Nettleton, 62, of Hillsborough, was charged with possession of controlled/ narcotics drugs and default of bail conditions. Hillsborough Police said the Henniker Police Department also assisted in the arrest of Courtney Estes, 21, of Hillsborough, who had a warrant for her arrest.

### Franklin Police confiscate a 'one pot meth lab'

Franklin Police are investigating the discovery of a dozen methamphetamine bottles, used in a "meth lab," near Spring Street Wednesday night, Oct. 21. According to Police Chief David Goldstein, a resident was walking his dog and noticed "one dozen suspicious looking bottles" and reported them to police.

Franklin responded and set up a perimeter, police said, and the fire department was called to assist them. A Drug Enforcement Administration clandestine lab team responded and confirmed the various bottles were "one-pot meth labs." The toxic materials were processed and disposed of by the clandestine lab team.

### Hillsboro-Deering School Board has its head in the clouds

At its Monday meeting, the Hillsboro-Deering School Board was briefed on the implementation of the district's Google Apps For Education initiative by Technology Director Glenn Woods and Curriculum Director Dr. Kevin Johnson.

Currently, three teachers in each of the Elementary, Middle and High School are being trained on the computer based system, with the goal of providing the opportunity for all teachers in all schools to access its use by the opening of school next fall. As the district transitions to cloud-based applications, there may be the opportunity to reduce locally installed applications. The Google Apps service is provided at no charge, but the district will need to spend about \$7,000 per year to back-up the data.

Once fully implemented, the Google Classroom will allow the teacher to post homework assignments, and monitor student progress.

Facilities Director James Bailey presented the board with three quotes for an energy audit of all school buildings. Two companies bid \$23,500 each while Honeywell offered to do it for free as it has performed work for the school before. The discussion centered around the fact that the oil tank piping in the high school must be addressed by the next heating season or the school faces possible fines. Replacing the pipes is estimated at \$30,000 to \$50,000. If the tank is also replaced that would add another \$100,000 and adding a boiler replacement jumps the cost even more, Bailey was asked to come back with firm figures for all aspects. The board seemed convinced that if the whole system is to be replaced it should be converted from oil fired to propane.

High School Principal Jim O'Rourke informed the board that the NHIAA requires that the Redhawks Football program, currently run as a JV program in cooperation with Hopkinton must be elevated to a varsity program next year. He said that the cost of coaches, officials

and transportation would be an additional \$14,000 which would be split 50/50 between H-D and Hopkinton. The board discussed but did not decide whether the \$7,000 H-D portion would be included in the budget or placed as a separate warrant article

### **Capital Improvement Committee briefs Selectmen**

Mike Wayne, Chairman of the Bow CIP Committee, presented the CIP Plan to the Selectmen. Wayne asked Nicole Gage to forward the entire report to the Department Heads. Selectman Anderson noted the plan will be available on the Town's website. The Selectmen asked Manager David Stack to check with the Department of Revenue Administration regarding presenting all CIP contributions as one warrant article at Town Meeting.

The 1995 Sewer Bond was paid off in

July 2015. The High School will be paid off in 2017-18 and reduce the tax burden by \$586,000. The definition of equalized tax rates and how property values come into play was discussed. Reviewed was the Project priorities list, with the Public Safety building as number one priority, then Birchdale Road, Page and Dunklee Road, and rotary. Mr. Stack is arranging for the Town engineer to come in regarding options for Birchdale, Page and Dunklee and he will invite the CIP Committee to attend that meeting.





### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Valacyclovir (brand name, Valtrex), a common herpes drug, reduces HIV-1 levels — even when patients do not have herpes, according to a report published online in *Clinical Infectious Diseases*.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved the first generic version of Nexium (esome-prazole magnesium delayed-release capsules) to treat gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD) in

adults and children ages 1 and older. Esomeprazole is a proton pump inhibitor that reduces the amount of acid in the stomach.

Phenytoin, a drug commonly taken to prevent seizures in epilepsy, may surprisingly protect the eyesight of people with multiple sclerosis (MS), according to a study presented at the American Academy of Neurology's 67th Annual Meeting. About half of people with MS experience at some point in their life a condition called acute optic neuritis, in which the nerve carrying vision from the eye to the brain gets inflamed. The condition can cause sudden total or partial blindness, foggy or blackened vision and pain. Even though eyesight can recover eventually, each attack still damages the nerve and the eye. The study found on average that the group who took phenytoin had 30 per cent less damage to the nerve fiber layer compared to those who received the placebo. The volume of the macula, the most light-sensitive part of the retina, was actually 34 percent higher in those who took phenytoin than those who received the placebo.

### Antrim department heads present budget

As part of the budget process, some departments presented preliminary budgets to the Board. Chief Scott Lester presented a zero increase for the second year. He cautioned the Board that while this may not continue next year and he may have to adjust his projections based on directives from the Police Standards and Training Council, he was pleased with his current recommendations. He also stated that he's been working to keep the police vehicles in top shape and has added more money to his maintenance budget, but because of that will not be asking for a replacement cruiser until 2017. The library also presented their budget, with a 1.27% increase, mainly for a 2% increase for salaries and benefits. Although prices for oil have decreased, it was decided to leave the line item for fuel level because the new furnace is a "work in progress." It was also noted that in part because they have 5 public access computers and the library is a wi-fi "hot spot," they need to increase the band width, which will cost more money.

### Goffstown teen calls police - deters burglary

A Goffstown teenager's call to police about a suspicious man approaching his home has resulted in the arrest of a homeless man, Tyler Fitzgerald, 29, for attempted burglary.

Police said a 13-year-old resident of an East Dunbarton Road home called at about 12:20 p.m., Oct.16, saying a suspicious male approached the house with what was believed to be a firearm in his possession. The man fled after discovering the young teen inside the house. Police said a second residence in the area was the site of an attempted burglary minutes before that incident. After an investigation, and with the assistance of the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office as well as the Dunbarton and Hooksett police departments, Goffstown Police arrested Fitzgerald. He refused bail and was housed at the Belknap County Jail, scheduled for arraignment Friday in 9th Circuit Court-Goffstown District Division, on two felony counts of attempted burglary, two misdemeanor counts of possession of burglary tools and two violations of prowling.

### New people at the Weare Transfer Station

Weare DPW Director Tim Redmond presented two candidates he recommended for opened positions at the Transfer Station; Transfer Station Foreman and Truck Driver/Transfer Station Attendant. He recommended Matt McLain as Transfer Station Foreman and Robert Peters for the position of Truck Driver/Transfer Station Attendant. The selectmen unanimously approved both hires.

### Power outage forces evacuation of Weare schools

There was an unexpected field trip for students at the Weare Middle School and Center Woods Upper Elementary School on Friday, Oct. 23. Both schools were evacuated and students traveled by school bus to John Stark Regional High School for most of the day due to lack of water in their building related to an overnight power outage.

"I am happy, but not surprised, to report that all the transitions ran very smoothly. Lessons were taught, recesses occurred, and lunches were served to all students in the John Stark Cafeteria. I am so proud of all our SAU 24 students, teachers, administrators, and staff," said Dr. Lorraine Tacconi-Moore about the day.

Some of the unique learning experiences occurred in the Language Department at the high school when Spanish teacher Stephanie Harpring had an idea and enlisted the help of French teacher Chandra Hackenberg. The result, John Stark language students taught the visiting students their target language. "When I presented this idea to my AP French students, they literally jumped for joy," said Ms. Hackenberg. "John Stark senior Tori Bamford ran to her locker and grabbed a rubric for lesson planning that she got from her peer leadership class. The hour long lesson they planned and taught to 4th grade students included greetings, numbers, singing and more. The class was a huge success," summarized Ms. Hackenberg.

Weare Middle and Center Woods Upper Elementary School students were able to return to their building before the end of their school day. "We received many compliments from parents regarding the level of communication from the SAU during the day and they were pleased with

how we turned an unfortunate situation into a day full of learning and positive experiences, " said Superintendent Tacconi-Moore.

### Library & Town sign Memorandum of Understanding

Library Trustee Chairman Bill Gould was present to meet with the New Boston Selectmen to discuss the revised Memorandum of Understanding confirming arrangements that have been made between the library and the town for library procedures. Gould asked if the library could budget for its own salt and sand next year as it is independent from the town per NH RSA. The school is also independent and will be asked to budget for its own salt and sand next year. Gould noted the inside of the library is separate and independent from the town but the building and grounds are the towns and it seems odd to budget separately for salt and sand for the parking lot. He is ok with the language of the MOU and understands the

town roads are the first priority of the Highway Department.

Road Agent Dick Perusse was also present and noted it is a great idea to have town department's budget for their own salt and sand needs. He said the library has been very arrogant with expectations of the Highway Department and the Highway Department has done a lot of maintenance at the library parking lot including guardrails. This is added work to be included in the Highway budget.

Resident Brandy Mittof said the library trustees have no standing outside the library. She said the MOU does more than memorialize what is happening and, legally, if it is signed it will be an agreement of what the town will do.

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The Deering Fish & Game Club recently hosted another successful "Women On Target" shooter education workshop.

### **Newport crash claims Newbury woman**

Police identified the driver of a car that crashed last Friday on John Stark Highway as Baylee Allard, 29, of Newbury. The crash happened at 12:15 a.m. just west of Barton Whitney Road. Police said Allard had been driving east toward Newport when she crossed into the westbound lane, went off the road and struck a tree. The 2001 Ford Ranger caught fire. She was pronounced dead at the scene. A dog also was found dead inside the vehicle. A second dog, a Scottish terrier, was taken by a good Samaritan to Wendell Veterinary Center in Sunapee. That dog had no injuries and was released to family. Police said contributing factors and the cause of the collision remain under investigation.

### Hancock planning Meetinghouse upkeep

Hancock DPW Supervisor Kurt Grassett spoke to the selectmen about the scope of the Common Commission and said landscape design and maintenance of the Meetinghouse grounds is outside of the scope. Grassett will provide a graphic to the selectboard defining the responsibilities for the Common Commission and Department of Public Works. The Selectboard agreed to rescind the decision to ask the Common Commission to create a landscape design and plan for the Meetinghouse. The Selectboard requested the formation of an Adhoc Meetinghouse Landscape Committee to be made up of one person from each of the following: Common Commission, Church Council, and Historic District Commission. The committee will be tasked with: designing a landscape plan to include planting and retaining walls, creating a plan for continued maintenance and proposing a 2016 warrant article for purchase of materials. Ongoing maintenance may be included in the DPW budget for general landscape maintenance.

### State Senator Lou D'Allesandro tours Goffstown's schools

State Senator Lou D'Allesandro completed his 17th annual visit to the Goffstown Schools on October 23rd. Each year, Senator D'Allesandro tours all five Goffstown schools, visiting classrooms and talking with teachers, administrators and students.

Superintendent Brian Balke accompanied the Senator to the five Goffstown schools – Bartlett Elementary, Maple Avenue Elementary, Glen Lake School, Mountain View Middle School and Goffstown High School. The Senator began his day with a question and answer period at Bartlett Elementary School with Principal David Bousquet and Bartlett's 4th grade class.

Maple Avenue 4th graders prepared questions for the Senator that were focused on New Hampshire government and Kindergarten classrooms were visited at Glen Lake School. Mountain View Middle School hosted the annual Fire Fighters' Challenge, an exciting event that was enjoyed by the Senator. Lastly, the Senator visited Goffstown High School where he met with GHS students and

faculty. Senator D'Allesandro concluded his day by meeting with several members

of the undefeated Goffstown High School Football Team including Coach Hufft.

Pair of Pit Bulls attack Bow man & dog

Police in Bow are investigating an attack by two pit bulls that left another dog with serious injuries. Fish and Game Deputy Dave Eskeland said he and his leashed dog, Lady, were walking on a popular trail in town when they were attacked by the other dogs. Lady is recovering from multiple wounds that required more than 30 staples. "All of a sudden, I was pulled over backwards," Eskeland said. "One jumped up, and afterward, I looked at the fleece vest I was wearing, and it was shredded." The retired sergeant and now deputy with the Fish and Game Department said it was his closest call in more than 20 years of law enforcement. The owner of the nearby home where the dogs live eventually arrived to help. Eskeland carried his dog home and then took her to the veterinarian. Bow police said the owner of the dogs faces six local violations, two each for letting the dogs run loose.

### **Former Franklin Deputy Sheriff indicted**

A former Belknap County Sheriff's department sergeant was indicted by the October Hillsborough County North Grand Jury on a felony charge of aggravated felonious sexual assault. Ernest Justin Blanchette, 36, of Franklin, is accused of driving a 31-year-old prisoner he was supposed to be transporting to the state prison to an abandoned home and sexually assaulting her July 2. The indictment alleges that at the time, he was in a position of authority over the prisoner and used that authority to coerce the prisoner to submit. Blanchette resigned from the sheriff's department Aug. 27, after being placed on paid administrative leave July 20. Before joining the sheriff's department in October 2011, he was a Laconia police officer.

### School House Road bridge closed TFN

Greenfield officials are closing the School House Road bridge until further noticeafter learning that it was a safety hazard. DPW Roads Manager Neal Beauregard informed the Selectmen that the state's Department of Transportation has issued a letter of deficiency on the bridge, wanting to reduce the weight limit on the bridge to 10 tons. Beauregard was concerned because a school bus rides over that bridge. The board also discussed the leaking Highway Department roof. DPW Buildings and Grounds Manager Patrick Greene has received quotes in the \$28,000 range to fix the roof, but the board directed him to research the cost if DPW employees were to repair the roof using corrugated metal.

### State donates computers to Goffstown

The Goffstown School District recently obtained a donation of equipment from the State of NH Department of Social Security Disability Determination Services. The department had just refreshed their computer workstations and monitors and their old equipment, including 23 monitors, 32 workstations, and 2 servers, which were made available to the district. Rebuilding this hardware and putting it to good use will be a project of the Goffstown High School Computer Repair program.

### Hazard Mitigation Plan to be updated

Hopkinton's Hazard Mitigation Committee will soon be meeting to begin its work to update the Hopkinton Hazard Mitigation Plan. Every 5 years, the Plan must be updated to ensure the Town's eligibility for federal disaster recovery and mitigation grant funding. The Committee will identify existing mitigation measures and develop mitigation actions to reduce the impact of these hazards to Hopkinton's people, buildings, and property. The Committee will meet on Monday, November 9 at 3:00 PM at the Contoocook Fire Station, 9 Pine Street, Contoocook, Additional meetings will be scheduled at this time. The draft Hazard Mitigation Plan Update 2016 is anticipated to be completed in spring 2016. With a projected surplus of nearly \$1,000,000 and after much discussion, the selectmen decided to retain \$532,000 and return \$477,000 toward reducing the taxes. As a result, the tax rate will be \$27.73 per thousand.

At the urging of Selectman Mike Genest

the Board will work on a policy to try to define how much should be retained each year that there's a surplus.

The State auditors recommend between 5-18% of the gross operating budget, which the Board has achieved for the past few years.

After years of planning, and investigating, New London Town and Kearsarge School District officials have not decided what to do with the old 1941 school building. At Monday's selectmen's meeting Janet Kidder, who attended a recent school board meeting, informed her collegues that the school board is asking the selectmen and planning board to support its building committee's recommendation that the 1941 building be raised to provide more parking. Kidder opposes the idea and feels that the school board should hold hearings and present the idea to the voters.

Chair Nancy Rollins said she believes because the town has not put forth a plan for utilizing the building, the school board is not in favor of transferring it back to the town.

Budget Committee Chair Rob Prohl felt that because New London taxpayers built the facility before transferring it to the Kearsarge District, it should be transferred back to the town if the school has no further use for it.

Selectman Peter Bianchi believes there has been adequate study and discussion and in light of the renovation and repair of Academy Hall, Whipple Memorial and the library, the town should not undertake another multi-million dollar project.

The board asked Town Administrator Kim Hallquist to write to the Kearsarge board requesting a joint hearing to present the plan to the public and ask for their input.

### **Location of Warner fire station debated**

When Warner officials scheduled a public hearing to receive public input on the proposed location of a new fire station, they probably did not expect the reaction they got. During the nearly two hour hearing, residents were almost unanimously in opposition to that 21/2-acre site in downtown. Planning for a new fire station began a few years ago, when the town purchased land on East Main Street, in hopes of building a new station there. It was later determined that the site was not suitable. However, at the hearing, Selectman Allan Brown said it could still build on that land, although it would require added expenses, such as building a retaining wall along the edge of the river to prevent erosion. Some alternatives were proposed, including building a satellite station on a different plot of land, building at the town's police station to create a public safety complex, and choosing a different plot for a new fire station. A decision must be made within the next couple of weeks. If the board chooses to proceed with this site, it will be presented to voters at the 2016 town meeting.

### Franklin man's standoff with police results in cash only bail

A Franklin man accused of 15 crimes related to a standoff with police officers Friday morning, including allegedly assaulting and trying to "terrorize" his girlfriend and threatening their 1-month-old son, was ordered held on \$25,000 cash bail Tuesday morning. Thomas Carroll, 33, watched from a holding cell via video monitor as a prosecutor asked Judge Ned Gordon to keep his cash bail. Arguing to keep the high cash bail, prosecutor Chris

Ahern told Gordon of Carroll's criminal history, which includes many convictions for assault, criminal mischief, driving while intoxicated and seven cases of resisting arrest. The judge shook his head several times, saying he had read the

arrest affidavit detailing the incident, and given Carroll's "lengthy" criminal record, he would not allow Carroll to have any contact with his son. "There's no way I would allow him to have unsupervised contact with that child," Gordon said.

### **Competitive pay for New Boston Police**

Police Chief James Brace was present to meet with the New Boston Selectmen to discuss the Police Department pay scale. The town is planning a 1.5% COLA increase for town employees this year. The Chief has analyzed this for the Police Department and prepared a proposal as an incentive to retain new quality officers that the town hires periodically and invests money in them to make them competent as officers in New Boston including uniforms and Police Academy training, approximately \$26,500. He is concerned if New Boston's officer salary is not competitive they will get their training here and then move on to a Police Department nearby that pays more. Joe asked what happens when an officer gets to the top of the pay scale and Jim said in that case a longevity bonus is available. Peter noted the 1.5% COLA salary increase is planned for all town employees this year to be used in conjunction with the town step and grade system that is continuous. Jim noted he researched police salaries in surrounding towns this year and found New Boston's salaries to be competitive, but is concerned that if a nearby town decides to increase these with a COLA and grade New Boston will no longer be competitive. He said New Boston's police salaries have to be competitive to keep good officers. Joe moved to adopt the plan as articulated in the meeting backup. The Board approved the plan.



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
