Franklin 6 hour standoff ends

Benjamin Geddis, 27, of Franklin held local police and the State Police SWAT team at bay for six hours Tuesday before finally surrendering late that afternoon. He was arrested on several outstanding warrants at about 4:50 p.m., after police had tried to arrest him since 10:45 a.m. Franklin Police tried to negotiate with Geddis and get him to come out, and the SWAT team was called after he refused to surrender. Geddis had outstanding warrants for felony second-degree assault, two felony counts of being a habitual offender, one count of felony possession of fentanyl, two misdemeanor counts of simple assault, and one misdemeanor count of theft by unauthorized taking. Franklin Police were assisted by officers from the Merrimack County Sheriff's Department, the Belknap County Sheriff's Department, and police officers from the Tilton, Northfield, and Sanbornton police departments, and the Franklin Fire Department, Ball said.

Historic buildings reborn as a major dental facility

With renovations nearing completion, the cupola was reinstalled on the new Bara Dental Facility in Hillsborough.

Spokesman Ed Forester said December 1st is the target date to officially open and transfer all the equipment and furnishings to the new facility, with

the remainder of work to be completed by the end of the year.

Forester had high praise for General Contractor Darrell Murdough who has been supervising the enormous project. Once completed, the facility should attract a number of dental specialists including oral surgeons.







About a quarter of all atrial fibrillation patients at the lowest risk for stroke receive unnecessary blood thinners from cardiology specialists, according to University of California San Francisco researchers. Their research letter appears in JAMA Internal

Few doctors are prescribing a low-cost drug that has been proven effective in preventing the onset of diabetes, according to a UCLA study. The study,

published in the peer-reviewed journal Annals of Internal Medicine, found that only 3.7 percent of U.S. adults with pre-diabetes were prescribed metformin during a recent three-year period.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Kybella (deoxycholic acid), a treatment for adults with moderate-to-severe fat below the chin, known as submental fat. Using Kybella for the treatment of fat outside of the submental area is not approved and is not recommended. Kybella is administered as an injection into the fat tissue in the submental area. Patients may receive up to 50 injections in a single treatment, with up to six single treatments administered no less than one month apart. Kybella is being provided in single patient use vials and should not be diluted or mixed with any other com-pounds. The safety and effectiveness of Kybella for treatment of submental fat were established in two clinical trials with enrolled 1,022 adult participants with moderate to severe submental fat. Participants were randomly assigned to receive Kybella or a placebo for up to six treatments. The results showed that reductions in submental fat were observed more frequently in participants who received Kybella versus placebo.

The New Boston Board of Selectmen have received confirmation from the State of NH Department of Revenue Administration that the 2015 tax rate is set as follows:

State School Rate	\$2.40	\$.02 increase
County Rate	\$1.29	\$.05 increase
Total:	\$26.71	\$1.26 total increase

The New Boston Finance Committee/Board of Selectmen/ School Administration had projected a 2015 total rate of \$27.81 per thousand. This new rate, although higher than last year, fell below that projection by \$1.10 per thousand.

Quick response saves New Boston home

A two-alarm fire in a home at a New Boston home caused heavy damage Sunday night. Fire Chief Dan MacDonald said Donald Vandenberg, owner of a Francestown Road home called 911 at 5:32 p.m. MacDonald, who lives near Francestown Road, was first on the scene, and saw fire coming from the roof and the chimney area of the home, and called for a second alarm. Firefighters got to the attic quickly and managed to keep the flames to the attic and part of the second floor, the chief said. The fire was under control in about 90 minutes. The cause of the fire is under investigation, but is not considered suspicious.

Bow's tax rate down .97/1000 to \$28.54

The New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration has set the Town of Bow's 2015 property tax rate at \$28.54 per thousand dollars of valuation. This rate represents a \$0.97 decrease from the 2014 tax rate of \$29.51. The 2015 rate breaks down as follows: \$6.71 for the Town, \$16.48 for School District, \$2.38 for State Education, and \$2.97 for Merrimack County for a total rate of \$28.54. The property tax rate has dropped due in large part to a \$30 million dollar increase in the Town's net assessed valuation of property. The Town's net assessed valuation increased from \$1,054,318,690 to \$1,085,097,061.

Resident praises compassionate aid by Goffstown Firefighters

Goffstown resident Robert Blais recently sent a letter to Town Administrator Sue Desruisseaux commending FF Paramedic Patrick Laforge and FF/EMT Stefan Donahue.


H-D Equestrians seeking new members


