of 1994, it was decided to concentrate on Thanksgiving and Easter, primarily because of lack of funds.



#### Combining Newport town & school finances delayed

Newport Select Board Chair Gary Nichols reported that further investigation into the feasibility of combining School District and Town finances has been put on hold until the question of withdrawal from SAU 43 has been settled.

Jeff Kessler noted that the School Board would have to budget additional funds to support the SAU budget should the withdrawal take place, and suggested that discussions on combining finances should begin prior to the vote.

Nichols reported that the deadline for introducing legislative bills was September 30, so it appears to be too late to introduce 2016 legislation to allow towns and school districts to combine financial resources. Superintendent Gallagher an,d Nichols expressed disappointment that Newport's legislators had not introduced the necessary bi11(s) following earlier discussions with them.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Xtoro (finafloxacin otic suspension), a new drug used to treat acute otitis externa, commonly known as swimmer's ear. Acute otitis externa is an infection in the outer ear and ear canal, usually caused by bacteria in the ear canal. Activities in which the ear is underwater can create a moist environment where bacteria may sometimes grow. The infection causes inflammation of the ear canal leading to pain, swelling, redness of the ear and discharge from the ear.

A National Institute of Health white paper published in the Annals of Internal Medicine finds little to no evidence for the effectiveness of opioid drugs in the treatment of long-term chronic pain, despite the explosive recent growth in the use of the drugs. The paper finds that many of the studies used to justify the prescription of these drugs were either poorly conducted or of an insufficient duration. An NIH white paper finds little to no evidence for the effectiveness of opioid drugs in the treatment of long-term chronic pain. Yet despite this, prescriptions for opiod drugs (also known as opiate drugs; the two terms are technically distinct, but most physicians use them interchangeably) have more than tripled in the past 20 years, with more than 219 million prescriptions written in 2011, according to the study. At the same time, the abuse of these drugs has also skyrocketed, leading some to the study. refer to prescription drug abuse as an epidemic. More than 16,000 people died from prescription opioid overdoses in 2012, according to the Centers for Disease Control, and drug overdose now causes more deaths than motor vehicle accidents for people ages 25-64. This level of opioid use and abuse is unprecedented in the world: the United States, with just 4.6 percent of the world's population, consumes 80 percent of the world's opioid drugs.

#### Popular Hillsborough couple dies in head-to-head collision

A Hillsborough couple was killed when an SUV hit their vehicle head-on along Route 9, in Antrim.

According to state police, Withington was driving a white 1997 RAV4 with Bouchard in the passenger seat when a westbound Kia Sorrento, driven by Liam P. Flaherty, 18, of Farmington, NY veered off the road to the right, swerved back to the left and continued across to the eastbound lane where they collided.

Janet Withington, 67, and James Bouchard, 63, died from injuries suffered in the accident, while Flaherty did not appear to have any injuries. Bouchard was pronounced dead at the scene, while Withington was taken to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, where she died a short time later. Withington worked as a nurse at Concord Hospital's Family Tree Health Care facility in Hopkinton. She and Bouchard were well known throughout Hillsborough. A spontaneous vigil held Sunday night for the couple was attended

by more than 60 people. The cause of the crash remains under investigation. Police said it does not appear that drugs or alcohol were factors. Anyone with information is asked to call State Police Trooper Thomas Conlon at 223-8614.

We wonder "why" it was necessary for this harmless yet loving couple be taken from us; I have no answer and it is doubtful that anyone has. 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#### Weare Middle School students learn on several musical instruments

Middle school music programs are special to Brian Fanning. After all, that's when he discovered his own love of music and began playing the trumpet. "And, by the time I was in high school, I knew I wanted to teach music as my life's work," said the soft-spoken Fanning. "Since my love of music began in middle school, it is kind of special to me to be able to work with students of that same age."

Fanning teaches students three distinct instruments during each quarter they have music: guitar, African drum, and keyboard. He also teaches general music to Upper Elementary School fourth grade students as well as directing four Weare Middle School ensembles: chorus, band, beginning band, and guitar. Even with this very busy schedule, he is already thinking of ways he'd like to add more offerings for students.

"Since arriving, I've discovered that the school has a dozen or more ukuleles, so I'd like to add a ukulele unit to a grade offering," said Fanning. Maximizing what is available seems to be one of Fanning's strong suits as he would also like to utilize the Unified Arts Team's Chromebooks to incorporate more technology

into some of his upper level classes. "There's a great website for music composition that allows kids to see how music is progressing-not the usual musical staff on paper writing, but it uses visuals. I'd like to have my students try

it," continued Fanning.

Not being afraid to try new things also seems to be part of Brian Fanning's repertoire. "When I got here, I offered violin, but only had two takers, so I offered guitar and have five guitar students," he said. He's also a big fan of recruiting students. "I tend to stand in the hallway as classes pass. You know, get my face out there so students get to know the new teacher and maybe ask me a question about

A New Hampshire native, Fanning comes to the Weare Middle School from the Freedom Elementary School. He earned both his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from UNH, and, while in college, he also studied in the Netherlands for a semester at University College Utrecht. "It's curious," notes Fanning, "as the other music teacher in the building, Mrs. Wilhemina Bodine, and I often collaborate as she teaches the 5th grade music classes. She's Dutch. Just one of those little coincidences that make life interesting," said Fanning.

Outside of school, he sings with the Manchester Choral Society and his instrument of choice is the oboe, though he prefers to play oboe in bands, not the standard orchestra that most would attribute to an oboist's style of play. His passion outside of music is, well, outside. He loves to hike and has already summited 25 of the 48 peaks in New Hampshire over 4,000 feet.

When asked what he likes best about being at the Weare Middle School (besides the students) he says, "I like being part of the Unified Arts Team because we often collaborate, and I like the space. The space we have here for music and the resources we have at this school. It's great," concluded Fanning.

## Franklin's Mayor Merrifield supports Northern Pass

Franklin Mayor Ken Merrifield has blasted a lawsuit brought against the Northern Pass project by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests as "a threat to the "decades-old" state policy of using public rights-of-way for beneficial uses." "What they are asking a judge to do," Merrifield said, "presents a serious threat

to the state, municipalities and thousands of private landowners. The state has a longstanding policy that utilities can use the rights-of-way along public roads."

A direct current transfer station in Franklin is part of the Northern Pass plan. The station would bring the city, which has an annual budget of about \$10 million, more than \$7 million a year in tax revenues.

Merrifield said the Forest Society suit "undermines the efforts of the city of Franklin to continue to build our local economy, improve our infrastructure, support our schools, and bring needed relief to the taxpavers."















The Town of Henniker Planning Board will hold a public hearing on December 9, 2015 at 7 pm at Town Hall, 18 Depot Hill Rd, Henniker NH to discuss the following proposed Chapter 133 Zoning Regulation amendments:

- 1. Are you in favor of amending Chapter 133, Zoning Regulations, Article V RV Village Proper District and Article VIII 133-32 CV Village Commerce District by allowing Housing for Older Persons projects for households that have at least one person 55 years or older living in the housing unit, up to 8 units per acre will be allowed, the minimum lot area will be 1 acre, 30% minimum open space will be required, a minimum of 75 feet of frontage required, units may be single family, two family or multi-family buildings with a maximum of two bedrooms in each unit and the project must be developed in a manner that is in keeping with community character.
- Are you in favor of amending Chapter 133, Zoning Regulations, Article X Lot Size Regulations, Section 133- 40 Lot Size Table by reducing the Minimum Frontage requirement in the RV Village Proper District from 125 feet to 100 feet.
- 3. Are you in favor of amending Chapter 133, Zoning Regulations, amending Article IV General Provisions, by adding the following new Section: Section 133-20A Conditional Use Permits: Accessory Uses - Agriculture, Subject to the provisions of RSA 674:2, the Planning Board is hereby authorized to issue Conditional Use Permits for Accessory Uses on Agriculture lands in the Town of Henniker, subject to the process and criteria in this section and Chapter 203 Site Plan Review Regulations. In order to support farming and encourage diversity of farm operations, this amendment would allow accessory uses on farm for the hosting events and activities with more than 20 participants, not including farm staff. Events and activities may include but are not limited to functions, ceremonies, receptions, meetings, day long events, farm-to-table meals, as well as potentially farm stands, corn mazes, and animal petting, etc. The conditional use permit process shall take into consideration such issues as compatibility with neighboring uses, traffic, noise, parking, hours of operation, quantity of activities, road access and other related matters.
