Highway Dept to purchase a bulldozer

Hillsborough Highway Department Superintendent Bill Goss presented the Highway Department Budget for 2016. The budget in itself is pretty straight forward and Administrator Laura Buono said the large increase in the Equipment Leases line item is for the truck that was purchased in 2015. The initial payment was through the warrant article and the payments now are within the budget. The sidewalk maintenance line item was eliminated and a capital reserve fund for sidewalk maintenance will be started so that money can be placed in it to maintain and build sidewalks in town. Goss mentioned that he has an opportunity to purchase a used bulldozer from the government for a cost of \$3,500. The equipment has a value of about \$72,000 and there is only 108 hours of use on it. Mr. Goss said he's going to spend more than \$3,500 to rent a bulldozer next year so he would like to get on the list to see if Hillsborough will be awarded the purchase. The Selectmen agreed.





New London still unsure of fate of 1941 Building

At the last New London Selectmen's meeting, School Board Chair Ken Bartholomew explained that the School Board is seeking a number for demolition of the 1941 Building but hasn't decided to take this route. Nothing has been put in the 2016/2017 budgets for anything to be done to the building. The School Board feels the use of the building should be compatible with the needs of the SAU as a neighbor, and board members are sensitive to the traffic and safety issues with having the elementary school next door. If the Town doesn't have detailed plans for the use of the building and how it may affect the traffic patterns and their status as a neighbor, he isn't sure that the School Board would be interested.

Bill Helm said he and Mark Kaplan went to the School Board under the context that the Town realizes its need for more space. The logical space is the 1941 Building. They proposed that the School Board and the Town carve out a space of about two acres in such a way that the Town would gain control of that piece of land. The carve-out would be done in such a way so the existing driveway in and out of the school district on Main Street would remain. The two acre parcel would not include this driveway. There is a curb cut beyond where the old SAU was that could be utilized to access the cut-out parcel of land. This could also be a right of way for the Outing Club and school to get to the fields behind the 1941 Building and to the James House area.

Helm said they suggested to the School Board that the Town take control of the property at the beginning of the new fiscal year (July 1, 2016) and would then be responsible for the costs associated with it. The Town would then go through a further

planning process to determine the usage of the property and how it would evolve. They will need to determine the costs associated with the plans they have in mind. Helm said that they walked away from the meeting with the feeling that the School Board was not interested in having a discussion with the Town at all. Something that kept coming up was a concern about parking. There was talk about a possible 200-seat meeting room near the cafeteria, but this sized meeting room would require much more parking to be created. He feels that the School Board was not interested in moving forward with anything having to do with the Town's ideas.

School Superintendent Winfried-Feneberg said there was conversation after Helm and Kaplan left the meeting. He stressed that he didn't want to leave the impression that the School Board was closing the discussion with the Town; the School Board wants to relay the message that if a viable plan were presented, taking into consideration the enormity of the renovation necessary to use the building, they would be interested in the discussion, but the Town taking possession of the building as of June 30th, and maintaining the status of the building as it is now, is not something the Board is interested in. A lack of a plan could result in further deterioration or possible demolition of the building which may or may not be advantageous to the School District. Mr. Feneberg said the School Board is interested in further development of the area if a thought-out plan is presented. Helm said the Town's position is that it doesn't make sense to make plans for the space and get the taxpayers on board only to have the School Board deny the use to the Town. Mr. Feneberg noted his understanding of this remark.
