# Newport ZBA upheld

#### Variance needed to process sewage on property

Newport's Zoning Board of Adjustment's (ZBA) decision on requiring a variance was upheld in Superior Court. Judge John C. Kissinger of Cheshire Court upheld the Newport's Zoning Board decision requiring a variance for Richard Kelley to process and store sewage on his property at 566 Unity Road in Newport.

Kelley, who lives in Sunapee, owns a start up septic hauling service. Kelley intended to process that sewage on his Unity farm property to fertilize hay.

In April the ZBA ruled that the proposed sewage processing and storage was a commercial use and the hay farm was a secondary use. An appeal to the ZBA made by Kelley was denied after a hearing on June 18, and on August 4 the Zoning Board voted 4-1 against a second appeal for Kelley.




# Weare FIRST® LEGO® League team participates in Tournament

# Major savings anticipated as Goffstown replaces 469 street lights

Goffstown Public Works Director Adam Jacobs informed the Selectmen that he received the amended proposal from TANCO Street Lighting and had talked to them about the assumptions of the project costs. They were happy to reduce their estimate by \$6,000 or so based on NH not being a prevailing bridge state as Massachusetts is. They also discussed a "not to exceed" cost. And were given a 10% contingency "not to exceed" cost with provisions in the contract proposal that would allow them only to pay on a per fixture basis.

Right now the estimate that TANCO, Eversource and the town have agreed upon includes 469 fixtures and brings the total to \$154,259.00. That's the "not to exceed" price. If they only install the 469 fixtures they will actually pay about \$14,000 less. TANCO gave a rough timeline of 90 working days, and they need a 6-8 week window for procurement. There will be an additional four weeks for closeout and the town could start seeing savings in as little as 8 weeks or in as much as 12 weeks. If the go-ahead is given, they will place the order this week. At the end of January they could

#### Croydon students to remain at Newport's Montessori School

A Sullivan County Superior Court judge has denied a preliminary injunction that would have pulled Croydon school children from Newport Montessori and returned them to a public school. The district has 37 students in grades 5 to 12. Most of those students attend the Newport public middle and high school, which costs the school district about \$12,000 per student. Five attend Newport Montessori School, which goes up to the eighth grade. Tuition at the private school is \$8,200 a year. start being seen and would be close to seeing a full year of savings.

Another thing mentioned is that in phase 1, with the audit portion, it was about \$7,000 to pay for the audit. Because they would be going with the company that did the audit, that \$7,000 bill goes away. If it were to go out to bid, they'd have to pay this company for this audit as well as try to find a better deal. Jacobs suggested they go with this company. The Board agreed by a vote of 4-0.



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
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


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# Sunapee Police & Fire retain New London's Dispatch Service

New London Selectwoman Janet Kidder and Police Chief Ed Anderson attended Monday's Sunapee Selectmen's meeting seeking the continued use of New London's Dispatch Center by both Sunapee's Police and Fire Departments.

Chief Anderson explained that supplemented by a number of grants, New London taxpayers have expended many thousands of dollars to replace and upgrade the Dispatch Center.

The consoles have bee upgraded, a new back-up radio system installed and a new repeater installed on Mt.Kearsarge. As future grants become available Phase II will see the installation of another repeater in New London with Phase III being the installation of a third repeater on Mt. Sunapee.

Both Police Chief David Cahill and Fire Chief Dan Ruggles praised the progress made by New London. Cahill did suggest that a Capital Improvement Program be funded to provide for future upgrades and improvements and avoid the problems of the past. Kidder assured him that she and her collegues were committed to maintaining the quality of the system. With that, the Board unanimously approved a 1-year contract for New London to provide dispatch services for \$70,162.24.

## Weare man nominated to Superior Court

Ruoff was recommended by the Governor's Judicial Selection Commission. He is currently a trial attorney and owner of Law Offices of David W. Ruoff, PLLC in Manchester, and he is also an adjunct professor at the University of New Hampshire School of Law, where he has taught advanced trial advocacy since 1997.

# Personnel change sparks discussion among Henniker Selectmen

As part of a discussion of budget issues at Tuesday's Henniker Selectmen's meeting, Town Administrator Christine Trovato suggested that part-time Executive Assistant Cherry Palmisano be made full time. The Board had been considering hiring a second part-time person to pick up the workload while holding costs down, by avoiding a fulltime benefit package of about \$29,000.

Knowing the position had already been budgeted for 40 hours per week, Chair Kris Blomback said he would support the move only if Trovato could find \$29,000 in savings elsewhere in the budget. She reported that it had been done including the elimination of one assessing position.


The discussion became somewhat heated when member Leo Aucoin suggested that it was a conflict of interest for fellow member Bob French to vote on the matter as Palmisano works directly for Trovato, French's sister.

French initially agreed but when Trovato objected, he recanted and voted in favor of the appointment with fellow Selectmen Kris Blomback and Scot Osgood. Aucoin and member Tina Hooper opposed. In other matters, Engineer Jennifer McCourt reported that work on the French Pond Road reconstruction project was incomplete because the highway department had run out of time and personnell. She recommended approval and final payment on the Canal Bridge Project which came in just shy of the state's specs because the contractor had gone beyond the scope of his bid by providing extras to the town at no cost.

Finally, the Board approved spending \$17,000 for new plow and wing for the loader and approved hiring a highway worker.

# Sunapee Police Sergeant Tim Puchtler graduates from Command Training

The Justice System Training and Research Institute at Roger Williams University in Bristol, Rhode Island, in partnership with the New England Association of Chiefs of Police, recently recognized Sergeant Timothy Puchtler of the Sunapee Police Department for the successful completion of the "Command Training Series: First Line Supervisor Course," a two-week comprehensive training program for police supervisory personnel. Graduates of the session represented police departments from throughout New England and included Sergeant Puchtler.

## **Antrim Selectmen discuss budget requests**

During Antrim's 2015 Town Meeting, voters approved spending \$95,000 to install lights at the Shea Field's athletic fields. This year, the Recreation Department has requested an additional \$40,000 in its capital reserve account. \$30,000 of that would be used to put up two more lights to complete lighting of the baseball and softball fields. The department would use an additional \$10,000 from the Recreation Dept. The Highway Department is asking for \$30,000, to be taken from capital reserves, to replace the 1-ton pickup truck. The Grapevine Family & Community Resource Center has requested the same as the last two years; \$7,000 for operating expenses and \$12,000 for the operation of the Avenue A Teen Center. The Grapevine will also be asking Bennington and Hancock, whose residents use Grapevine resources, for \$4,000 for operations and \$1,000 for the support of the Teen Center.

## Santa is touring Goffstown this Sunday

The Goffstown Fire Department is once again taking Santa for a ride through Goffstown on the streets listed below, weather permitting, on Sunday, Dec. 20. This route may be subject to change. Finley worries that on Election Day unidentified strangers enter the school. Every other day of the year, those visitors would be carefully screened.

# TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Research has shown that a regular dose of aspirin reduces the long-term risk of cancer in those who are overweight in an international study of people with a family history of the disease in the *Journal* of *Clinical Oncology*.

If you are over age 75 and taking an anticoagulant, the old standard may be the gold standard, Mayo Clinic researchers and collaborators have determined. In a study released online in the *BMJ*,

a team of researchers from Mayo Clinic, and other collaborators, showed that for older patients, particularly individuals greater than 75 years of age, the risk of gastrointestinal (GI) bleeding is 3 to 5 times higher when taking newer anticoagulant medications dabigatran or rivaroxaban compared to when using warfarin. Warfarin has been in use since the 1950s, and is an effective anticoagulant. Because it is so powerful and long acting, users are required to have regular blood tests to monitor the effects. Dabigatran and rivaroxaban are as effective as warfarin at preventing blood clots and reducing the risk of stroke and clotting complications, but do not require the regular monitoring. This convenience factor has resulted in an upswing in prescriptions for the newer medications as a replacement for warfarin. One of the most common reasons people take anticoagulant medica-- which lessens the blood's tendency to clot - is to reduce potential or severity of clotting complications in patients with atrial fibrillation or venous thromboembolism. People with atrial fibrillation and venous thromboembolism have a much higher risk of strokes, heart attacks and clots in the lungs and legs, which can result in disability or death. Use of anticoagulants lessen the likelihood of stroke and other clotting complications, but brings a different set of risks, one of which is excessive bleeding due to reduced ability to form blood clots. Excessive GI bleeding in particular can itself be life threatening.

## **One Solitary Life**

He was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant woman. He grew up in still another village, where he worked in a carpenter shop until he was thirty.

Then for three years he was an itinerant preacher. He never wrote a book. He never held an office. He never had a family or owned a house. He didn't go to college. He never visited a big city. He never traveled two hundred miles from the place where he was born. He did none of the things one usually associates with greatness.

He had no credentials, but himself. He was only thirty-three when the tide of public opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. He was turned over to

At last week's meeting the Hillsborough Selectmen debated whether Recreation Director Peter Brigham should be reappointed to oversee the Manahan Park Summer Program. Has everyone forgotten what way the summer program and the Park Board were run just a year ago?

With Selectman Jim Bailey then the long-time Chair of the Park Board there were no minutes kept, no policies established, no criteria set for use of town property and not a single new program offered. If Jim liked it, it was OK, but heaven forbid if he didn't like your proposal.

Bailey oversaw the hiring of Cathy Bennett as the summer program director at \$750 week at the same time she was on the school's payroll to oversee its summer program.

It was well known that only Bennett's friends and their families were hired as lifeguards. No records were kept and only later did we learn than none of her water safety instructor were certified by the Red Cross because she failed to submit the paperwork.

All this changed almost overnight when Peter Brigham was hired and Bailey left the Park Board. Hiring for the summer program was done by merit and his enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves.

While he was dying, his executioners gambled for his clothing, the only property he had on earth. When he was dead, he was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend. Twenty centuries have come and gone, and today he is the central figure of the human race and the leader of mankind's progress.

All the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the parliaments that ever sat, all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man on this earth as much as that One Solitary Life.

all the new water safety instructors were trained and certified by the Red Cross. Job descriptions were drafted, several new programs were instated, all at a lower cost that the prior year.

The Park Board is now keeping minutes and has adopted a policy for the use of town facilities, all without support of the selectmen. Bailey and Chair Wendy-Brien Baker have been withholding support for Brigham and the Park Board, if not outright opposing them.

Last week Bailey had the gaul to suggest that everything ran smoothly in his 18 years, on the Park Board serving more children at a lower cost. That is not true. Brigham instituted several new programs serving more children for \$18,000 less than Bailey's last budget. If that were not enough, Brien-Baker has now suggested Bailey should be the Selectmen's representative on the Board. Those two statements are no more than the substance that emanates from the rear end of a male cow.

Hillsborough is not only fortunate, it is blessed to have the services of Peter Brigham. His efforts have been given an exemplary review by Town Administrator Laura Buono.

It's time for the Selectmen to back off and let Peter do his job.
