



Former Goffstown Police Chief to receive the 3rd Commander's Service Award

The Committee of the New Hampshire Police Cadet Training Academy (a program of the New Hampshire Association of Chiefs of Police) and Association President Chief Bob Cormier of



the Tilton Police Department announce that retired Goffstown Chief of Police Stephen R. Monier has been selected to receive the 3rd Annual Richard D. Sexton Commander's Service Award.

The award, named for the first Cadet Academy Commander, recognizes a person for their long term service and commitment to NH Police Cadet Academy.

In 1973 as the Goffstown Police Department's Youth Officer, Chief Monier was assigned by then Chief Bob Wike to work with the Daniel Webster Council of the Boy Scouts of America to find grant funding and a location for the first Cadet Academy. He served on the staff of the very first Cadet Academy held at the Hidden Valley Scout Reservation in Gilmanton Iron Works and served as a staff member for three Academies.

As he rose through the ranks of the Goffstown Police Department, he continued to support the Cadet Academy as a volunteer instructor and by allowing several members of the Goffstown Police Department to serve on the staff, with 2 officers being assigned for the week each year since the beginning.

The first former Cadet to become the Academy Commander, Lt. Pierre Pouliot of

the Goffstown Police Department, started his career as law enforcement Explorer under Monier's command.

Upon his retirement in 1984 and through his post career positions with the Red Cross, as United States Marshal for the District of New Hampshire, member of United States Senator Kelly Avotte's staff and Life Member of the New Hampshire Association of Chiefs of Police he has continued to support the Cadet Academy by providing resources and encouragement. Chief Monier will be presented the Sexton Award at the 3rd Annual Winter Gala to Support the Cadet Academy. The Gala, which is a dinner-dance, award ceremony, raffle and silent auction, will be held on Friday February 5, 2016 at 6:00 p.m. at the Grappone Conference Center in Concord and the public is invited, tickets are \$40.

Weare Police facing another lawsuit

Another lawsuit against Weare police officers scheduled for trial next month in federal court. Filed nearly two years ago, Shane St. Onge claims officers Ken Cox and Kim McSweeney repeatedly shocked him with a Taser even after he followed their direction and dropped to the ground after the first shock. He also claims that they later punched or kicked him while he was in handcuffs.

Cox is also accused of trying to prevent him from receiving medical attention. In the suit, St.Onge's attorney Tony Soltani says his client was eventually taken to a hospital and treated for seizure-like symptoms, burns, scars and bruising to his head, neck and upper body. The town denies each of the charges. Cox is still with the department but has was demoted from sergeant to patrol officer following a failed sting 2013 operation. McSweeney resigned last month, and has taken to social media to criticize the supervisors. She says she did so after the department threatened to report her to the county attorney's office for possible criminal charges involving a cruiser accident. She has denied those allegations on social media. St. Onge was arrested in the early hours of March 14, 2012, while attempting a burglary at Route 77 Motors. Cox and McSweeney were called to the business after a security alarm was tripped. He was charged with burglary, criminal mischief, resisting arrest and possession of burglary tools. He pleaded guilty to the burglary charge alone. The others, all misdemeanors, were dismissed.

ConVal's has NH's Principal of the Year

ConVal High School Principal Brian Pickering was named the NH High School Principal of the Year by the N.H. Association of School Principals. He accepted the award Tuesday at a ceremony in Concord. Superintendent Brendan Minnihan nominated Pickering citing Pickering's leadership to the creation of Teachers in Academic Support Centers, or TASC. The program is a period each school day reserved for students meeting one-on-one with a teacher of their choice for help.Six years after the program started, about 60 different schools from as far as Georgia and California have adopted it, providing personalized instruction that engages students outside of class.
