## Vote or others decide

Ever wondered what the story was behind these two famous party animals? The now-famous Democratic donkey was first associated


with Democrat Andrew Jackson's 1828 presidential campaign. His opponents called him a

jackass (a donkey), and Jackson decided to use the image of the strong-willed animal on his campaign posters. Later, cartoonist Thomas Nast used the Democratic donkey in newspaper cartoons and made the symbol famous.

Nast invented another famous symbol—the Republican elephant. In a cartoon

that appeared in Harper's Weekly in 1874, Nast drew a donkey

clothed in lion's skin, scaring away all the animals at the zoo. One of those animals, the elephant, was labeled "The Republican Vote." That's all it took for the elephant to become associated with the Republican Party. Democrats today say the donkey is smart and brave, while Republicans say the elephant is strong and dignified.

## Newport road rage

### *Newbury teenager charged with firing four shots*

Nathaniel Hargreaves, 18, of Newbury has been arrested and charged with felony reckless conduct after a road rage incident last Sunday in Newport during which four rounds were shot from a moving truck, police said. Hargreaves posted \$10,000 cash bail and will be arraigned Nov. 8, in 5th Circuit Court – Newport on a class B felony charge of reckless conduct with a deadly weapon.

Authorities say Hargreaves had a run-in with two people on October, 21, described as

road rage. Two days later, he saw the individuals again and allegedly fired four shots at their car from his pickup truck. No one was injured.

Newport Police asked area departments to look for the shooter's truck, which they said had distinct marks making it possible to identify. Bradford Police later identified the truck and Newbury Police located it at Hargreaves' residence. Investigators then obtained a search warrant for his vehicle and home, gathering evidence of the alleged crime.

### **Veteran Hancock Town Clerk Joan Joseph arrested**

Hancock Town Clerk Joan Joseph has been arrested and charged with disclosing confidential motor vehicle records to someone not authorized. Joseph, 51, the veteran town clerk of seven years, said she was helping out a friend and researched a specific numbered license

plate; she said she disclosed only the town where that plate and vehicle were registered. "They were trying to track down a plate that was in their family," Joseph told the Union Leader on Monday. Joseph faces up to a year in prison and a \$2,000 fine if convicted.

## Negligent homicide trial of New Boston teen postponed until March

The trial of a Milford teen accused of killing his friend in a drunken crash more than a year ago has been postponed until March 2017. Benjamin Cook, 19, formerly of New Boston, was scheduled to stand trial later this month in Hillsborough County Superior Court, a judge recently granted Cook's request to postpone the trial to give his new attorney additional time to prepare.

Cook was previously represented by Tony Soltani of Epsom, but in recent months a public defender was assigned to his case, because the Cook family could no longer afford a private attorney.

Public defender Julian Jefferson is now representing Cook, who faces charges of negligent homicide, aggravated driving while intoxicated and driving after license suspension. All three charges stem from the July 3, 2015 crash on Route 114 in Weare that killed Trevor Gonyer, 17, of Dunbarton. Police say Gonyer was ejected from a 1997 GMC pickup truck that crashed in the early-morning hours. Gonyer was one of two passengers in the truck; the other was Aaron Hodgdon of Weare.

Prosecutors allege Cook negligently caused Gonyer's death when he drove the truck in speeds in excess of 75 mph without the headlights on while intoxicated. Cook had a blood alcohol level of 0.12 percent, well above the 0.02 percent that is legal for drivers younger than 21.

Authorities have previously said Gonyer, Cook and Hodgdon were leaving a closed business when New Boston Police Officer Stephen Case spotted the truck with a broken taillight and began a pursuit. They reported that Cook sped off, crossing about 2

miles into Weare and rolling the truck near an RV dealership.

Cook and Hodgdon suffered serious injuries. A dog was also thrown from the

truck and had to be euthanized. A final pretrial conference is scheduled for March 1, with jury selection slated to begin March 13 in Manchester.

## Two injured in roof collapses at Bow Safety Project

Two carpenters were injured when a roof truss collapsed at the site of Bow's new public safety building Monday. The incident is being investigated by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. OSHA remained on site for several hours after the incident, but did not say when its final report would be completed.

Construction of the building on Knox

Road, nicknamed "Guns and Hoses," is being handled by Weare-based Gary Chicoine Construction Corp. and is expected to wrap up by the end of the year at the earliest. Walls have been erected and roof truss installation began last week, but work on the roof is now on hold during the investigation, though other aspects of the project can still be constructed.

Maurice A. Belmore Jr., 51, of Bennington has been indicted on charges of receiving stolen property and operating after certification as a habitual offender. Authorities say Belmore received a 1998 Volvo in Hancock on June 10, 2016, believing that it had probably been stolen, and drove the vehicle, despite his license being under revocation or suspension. Receiving stolen property is punishable by three and a half to seven years in prison and up to a \$400 fine, and Operating after certification as a habitual offender is punishable by two and a half to five years in prison.

### Newport Middle/High Principal resigns

Linda Sutton has resigned as principal at Newport Middle and High School. Sutton's resignation, for personal reasons, was accepted by the Newport School Board at its meeting Thursday. She was named a Newport principal at the start of the 2012-13 school year. Newport School District Superintendent of Schools Cindy Gallagher told the school board that the position would be filled for the remainder of the current school year by an interim principal while a search is conducted for Sutton's permanent replacement.

# Henniker committee considering reviving a 'Family River Festival'

Henniker's Economic Development Committee has discussed the creation of a family river festival to celebrate this significant resource in the community and expand environmental tourism. Access to and highlighting the River was a major theme reported in master plan survey. The Committee has reached out to a number of New England College professors specializing in outdoor recreation, business/marketing and environmental resources. The NEC staff would like to coordinate with the Town on the project and believe it will create a number of educational opportunities for

their students.

Discussions had occurred about a spring event to take advantage of the high river water flow. The consensus now seems to be that a September event would be better to ensure superior weather along with warmer water. Consideration is also being given to hosting a separate event in the spring for

a kayak race event along the "Fright Train Rapids". This event would be geared toward experts and further discussions need to take place to determine viability.

The Committee met in August and believes that at this point, the support of the Board of Selectmen is needed to initiate this program.

## Antrim Police Chief wants a new part-time Officer

Antrim Chief of Police Scott Lester has proposed hiring a permanent part-time officer. The department is authorized five part-time positions, although only two are maintained consistently. Lesater believes that

## Resident challenge transparency of Henniker Board of Selectmen

Former selectman Leo Aucoin challenged the recent trade of a Viet Nam era Army motorized mule belonging to the highway department and \$1,000 to Joe Damour for a body for a highway truck that could not pass inspection. Town policy requires that surplus equipment valued at \$1,000 or more be placed at the state auction at White's farm. At a prior meeting authorizing the transaction, the Board was told the value was \$800 and when member Ben Fortner inquired if there was any antique or historical value, Town Administrator Christine Trovato replied that there was not. Aucoin said that his research showed the value of the mule to be \$3,000 to \$5,000 and criticized the board for not doing the proper research and costing the town money. He said the town had just wasted about \$7,000 on a truck that was not worth \$3,000 and was to be replaced in March. Resident Bruce Trevolini was also critical of the Board for not following established policy. The Board, with the exception of member Tia Hooper, stood by their decision.

In a separate matter Aucoin questioned why no bid was solicited to remove

sand and debris from Army Corp of Engineers land adjacent to the Highway Department, as he had heard estimates as high as \$20,000 to do the work with town policy requiring bids for work over \$15,000. When Trevolini asked if the Board had discussed or authorized the work, Chair Kris Blomback replied that

although the Army has been pressing for the removal since 2015, the Board had not recently discussed it and was unaware the work was authorized. When asked directly Trovato said she had given the work to McComish Excavation, and although she had received no estimate, she told him he could not exceed \$15,000.

Breast cancer patients undergoing treatment with trastuzumab-containing regimens should be monitored for heart damage regardless of age. This is among the findings of a new study published yesterday in the *Journal of Clinical Oncology*. Trastuzumab-containing regimens (commonly marketed as Herceptin) for breast cancer have significantly improved survival for breast cancer patients. However, this treatment is known to carry a risk of congestive heart failure which is particularly of concern when used along with anthracyclines (another class of drugs). Accordingly, treatment guidelines generally advise careful monitoring of older patients who are assumed to be at higher risk of heart events.


The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Adlyxin (lixisenatide), a once-daily injection to improve glycemic control (blood sugar levels), along with diet and exercise, in adults with type 2 diabetes. Type 2 diabetes affects more than 29 million people and accounts for more than 90 percent of diabetes cases diagnosed in the United States. Over time, high blood sugar levels can increase the risk for serious complications, including heart disease, blindness and nerve and kidney damage.

Women undergo more cesarean sections each year in the United States than any other major surgery, with the procedure carrying a significant rate of infection at the incision site. A new study in *The New England Journal of Medicine* suggests that rather than prepping patients with iodine-alcohol — a common antiseptic combination in C-sections — the research indicates that chlorhexidine-alcohol is significantly more effective. The researchers argue that the evidence is strong enough to change standard skin-prep practices for C-sections.

## Tax Rates set in several area towns

### Hopkinton & Contoocook

Hopkinton's town tax rate has been set at \$33.55 per thousand, down from 2015's rate of \$33.62. For someone with a home valued at \$250,000, that will bring their tax bill down by \$20 to \$8,388, Cass said. Hopkinton Village District also saw a decrease from \$34.08 to \$33.95. Contoocook Village District saw an increase from \$35.61 to \$33.66.

### New Boston

The New Boston Board of Selectmen have received confirmation from the State of NH Department of Revenue Administration that the 2016 Tax rate is set as follows: Town Rate \$ 4.56, a \$ 1.37 decrease Local School Rate \$15.46 a \$ 1.63 decrease State School Rate \$2.14 a \$ .26 decrease

County Rate \$ 1.19 a \$ .10 decrease Total \$23.35 a \$3.36 total decrease from 2015 rate. The New Boston Finance Committee/Board of Selectmen/School Administration had projected a 2016 total rate of \$28.51 per thousand. (Town Report) This fell below that projection by \$3.36 per thousand.

Factors that contributed to the reduction are 1) Budget cuts at Town Meeting both School and Town; (2) increase in revenues from the State and Departments -Town; and, 3) approximately \$70,000,000 increase in property values, (4) the SAU turned back \$661,000 to the general fund to offset taxes.

### Weare

Chairman Lacasse moved, Selectman Meaney seconded to set the total tax rate at \$22.31 using \$150,000 from the unassigned fund balance. Motion failed 3-2-0. Vice Chairman Clow, Selectman Hippler and Selectman Bohl voted no.

Vice Chairman Clow moved, Selectman Hippler seconded to apply \$100,000 for the tax rate for a total rate of \$22.37. Motion passed 5-0-0. This indicates a reduction of \$0.04 from last year's tax rate.

### New London

The county rate is up \$.02, local education is down \$.06 and state education is down \$.04 bringing the total tax rate to \$15.92. Using this amount will result, subject to verification by the State Department of Revenue, in a town tax rate of \$4.35 which is 30¢ higher than 2015. The overall tax rate (including school and county) is expected to be \$15.67 (a 1.5% increase over 2015 rate of \$15.45).

# Franklin City Council's SAU withdrawal vote ruled invalid

The Franklin City Council's 5-4 vote to withdraw Franklin School District from SAU 18 last week has been ruled invalid by the NH Department of Education.

The withdrawal plan must be accepted by 60 percent of the school district's governing body, or more than five of the nine Franklin city council members.

The ruling comes after more than a year of considering the idea. Franklin formed a withdrawal study committee in August 2015, and the state's board of education approved the committee's plan for withdrawal this past August.

If approved, the plan would remove the Hill School District from the SAU, making Franklin a one-district SAU. Last week, four councilors voted for the withdrawal, and four voted against. Mayor

Ken Merrifield broke the tie, saying that was the only way that the school and city

could consolidate finances and close the budget deficit.
