Community building saved

Bow voters want Community Building preserved

Bow residents came to their Town Meeting Wednesday night expecting a debate on whether to adopt an \$11.6 million operating budget and another \$2.1 million of warrant articles in light of the recent \$5.7 million principal payment made to Eversource.

To their surprise, much of the discussion focused on a \$7,145 petition warrant article that would keep the portion of Bow's Community Center that houses the Parks and Recreation Department open. Originally, the article was projected to cost \$94,345. But an

amendment by Michelle Vecchione, brought the cost down substantially.

The money will replace the stage curtains with fireproof versions the most expensive repair at \$4,500, replace doors between the gym and storage area, complete fire separation between the stage and the storage area. and create an exit threshold in the storage area behind the stage. Voters also passed the \$11.6 million operating budget and a 20-year tax increment finance district (TIF) in the Bow Mills area.

After 5 hour debate - mixed results at Hopkinton School meeting

It was a full house at Hopkinton's School District meeting on Saturday as residents debated for about five hours over a budget increase and a proposal to relocate the district's administrative offices.

The \$20 million budget, with its \$652,000 increase over the 2017-18 approved budget did pass, but not before a lengthly debate. Although the budget has

NEASC at Winnisquam High

Winnisquam Regional High School will be hosting the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) from March 18 through the 21st. NEASC accredits many types of schools, including New England public high schools. The official accreditation visits occur once every 10 years. A team of 12 educators throughout New England will comprise the visiting team. There are seven standards of accreditation that the school is evaluated on during the visit. The visiting team will collect evidence of WRHS's progress toward meeting each standard in their four days at the high school. They collect evidence through meeting with community members, the WRSD board, central-office personnel, high school administration, faculty, staff and students.

They will also visit classrooms during instruction and refer to the school's self-study evaluation completed by WRHS personnel on how well they felt the school community is currently meeting the standards of accreditation. It will take a few months before WRHS receives the formal report from NEASC. The accreditation visit is not a test; rather, it is a process to provide feedback to schools as to how well they are meeting the best practices of educating students.

a zero percent tax impact, opponents were upset that the proposal relied on one-time savings and revenues that won't be available in in following years.

A 20-year bond for a \$7 million renovation of Maple Street Elementary School and Hopkinton Middle/High School was paid off, freeing up \$553,500 which many felt should have made it back to taxpayers. An amendment to reduce the \$20,000,471 budget by \$553,500 failed by 100 votes a

proposal to purchase and renovate the current Boys & Girls Club building in Contoocook, for \$ 200,000 to relocate the SAU offices was easily defeated in a secret ballot vote of 381-35.

The School Board, supported the proposal, but the budget committee did not. The Board had planned on asking voters to appropriate \$225,000 for future building projects, but seeing the writing on the wall. decided against it.





The theory that antidepressants outperform placebo merely by means of side effects making the patient realizing that he or she has not been given placebo, and thereby enhancing the expectancy of improvement, may be rejected according to a new study of the antidepressant efficacy of two of the most commonly used SSRIs, paroxetine and citalopram. The analysis, which comprised a total of 3,344 patients, shows that the two studied drugs are clearly superior to placebo

with respect to antidepressant efficacy also in patients who have not experienced any side effects. The researchers conclude that this study, as well as other recent reports from the same group, provides strong support for the assumption that SSRIs exert a specific antidepressant effect. They suggest that the frequent questioning of these drugs in media is unjustified and may make depressed patients refrain from effective treatment.

Children whose mothers took multivitamins during pregnancy are roughly 30 percent less likely to develop autism with a co-occurring intellectual disability, according to a new study published in *BMJ* (formerly *The British Medical Journal*).

Among adults without asthma who developed an acute lower respiratory tract infection, use of the oral steroid prednisolone for five days did not reduce symptom duration or severity, according to a study published by *JAMA*. Acute lower respiratory tract infection, defined as an acute cough with at least one of the symptoms of sputum, chest pain, shortness of breath, and wheeze, is one of the most common conditions managed in primary care internationally and is often treated inappropriately with antibiotics.

Attempts to cut the Chichester budget fail

Chichester twice tempted to reduce the District's \$6.4 million school budget during the annual meeting Saturday. Resident Tim Hammond's motion failed, 39-24, and a motion made by resident Mike Williams to reduce the budget \$127,596 – approximately 2 percent – also failed, 44-19. The 47-12 approval vote approved funds for a full-time reading specialist at the Chichester Central School, along with the purchase of Google Chromebook computers for first- and second-graders and the completion of a parking lot repaying project. Warrant articles for the installation of five new security cameras, a public address system and a power generator at the school also passed. Hammond's motion would have cut \$33,411 allotted for an increase in hours for the school's hardware specialist. Principal Brian Beaverstockcountered that the position is necessary as the school works to implement a 1-1 Chromebook to student ratio. Last year, the district implemented 1-1 Chromebooks ratio for thirdthrough eighth-grade. A total of \$11,330 was allotted in the 2018-19 budget to provide Chromebooks to first- and second-graders as well. The district was also approved for \$6,977 from taxpayers to install security cameras and a new public address system, with 805 as a state grant.

Franklin's Hope For Recovery survives cuts

Two weeks after New Hampshire's largest drug recovery organization announced the closure of four facilities, the Executive Council has stepped in with financial relief that will keep the centers open in some cities Councilors voted unanimously Wednesday to approve a \$600,000 state contract with the organization Hope for New Hampshire Recovery, which will keep the organization's facilities open in Franklin, Berlin and Manchester. But Concord and Claremont's locations will remain shut, according to the organization.

5 Sunapee bridges scheduled for repairs

The State will soon begin four bridge reconstruction projects in Sunapee. The bridge on Route 11 at the Information Booth, to begin between April 1st and April 15th. The State will also be reconstructing three other bridges in Sunapee, one being the bridge on Route 11 at Sleeper Road and the other two being at the intersection of Routes 11 and 103. The Town will repair the bridge on Bradford Road on May 14th.

One dead, one injured in Epsom accident

Emergency personnel were at the scene of a fatal two-car accident in Epsom Sunday night. Epsom fire personnel confirmed crews were dispatched to the scene of a two-car accident in the area of 980 Suncook Valley Highway. One person was confirmed dead on arrival, while a second individual was transported with serious injuries. No further information was available Sunday night.

Goffstown voters reject request for eight additional firefighters

Goffstown voters braved Tuesday's storm and approved the proposed municipal operating budget of \$21,694,414 by a vote of 838-514. A petitioned warrant article asking for \$338,973 to cover the first six months of salary and benefits for eight new firefighters, was defeated, 829-515. The proposal would have provided the department full-time 24-hour staffing. Voters did support collective bargaining agreements calling for a \$39,667 contract increase for police patrolmen, and \$27,456 for the town's dispatchers and clerks. Also approved were separate

New London rejects land buy

Although supported by both the Selectmen and Budget committee a request for a \$500,000 for purchase of land for future use for municipal buildings failed by a vote of 72 - 154, as did a change back to semi-annual as opposed to quarterly tax billing failed, so we will continue to collect taxes four times. Voters approved placing a conservation easement on town owned property on Pleasant Street and extended the \$500 tax credit to all veterans by vote of 119 to 28.

Dunbarton full-day kindergarten returns

The Dunbarton Elementary School's gym erupted into cheers when Moderator Rene Ouellet announced the 194–61 vote in favor of the project which will add three new classrooms and refurbish two existing classrooms into small instructional spaces, for a total of one new classroom. The project also fixes the school's HVAC system, redesigns the front office area, repairs parts of the building's exterior and upgrades the school's security system. In order to get to that point, voters survived 2½ hours of debate, warrant articles rearranged and almost switched back) and an hour-long mandated waiting period to approve the \$2.2 million facilities bond and an article that added \$240,000 to the Dunbarton School Capital Reserve Fund. in order to fund the project. The additional space will also allow Dunbarton to bring back its full-day kindergarten program at a cost of \$96,000, which is included in the school's \$6.9 million budget, approved by voters.

Voters OK new Boscawen school access road

Voters from Boscawen, Loudon, Penacook, Salisbury and Webster approved the Merrimack Valley School District's \$40.4 million budget which is \$372,381 more than this year's budget, an increase just under 1%. A new three-year contract for administrators was also approved. The tax rate per \$1,000 of property value is expected to go up 04 cents in Webster, 50 cents in Salisbury, 36 cents in Penacook, 17 cents in Loudon and 18 cents in Boscawen. Voters alsp approved a plan to purchase the property at 217 N. Main St., Boscawen, for \$360,000 to build an emergency access road from Boscawen Elementary to Main Street. The district plans to use surplus funds to buy the property and expects to be able to resell the home for much of its prior value once the road was built. A petitioned article creating a budget committee for the district, voting, was tabled by a vote of 152-37. In the only contested race, Hilary Denoncourt beat out Louise Andrus, 234-89, for a one-year seat on the Merrimack school board to represent Salisbury.

Goffstown man dragged across parking lot

Matthew Johnston, 52, of Mancheter is facing felony charges in a hit-and-run charges for dragging Paul Decarney, 46, of Goffstown, 25 feet at the parking lot of Wa Toy Restaurant. Goffstown policeresponding to the scene found Decarney lying on the ground. He was conscious and was transported to Catholic Medical Center in Manchester with injuries that weren't life-threatening. Witnesses told police Johnston's vehicle, backed into Decarney' sedan. When Decarney attempted to stop Johnston he was dragged across the parking lot Details leading up to the incident are still unclear.

Weare voters say 'NO' but John Stark voters say 'YES'

Weare voters rejected both the town and school district operating budgets in Tuesday's voting. The town's \$6,074,660 budget was defeated by a vote of 668-383 invoking the default budget of \$5,997,260. Voters also defeated a \$41,544 article for a new full-time police officer by a 737-246 vote. The Weare School District's budget of \$15,299,618 was also defeated by a vote of 542-443.

By contrast John Stark School District

Washington NH stands alone

Washington town moderator Barbara Gaskell defied the Secretary of State's and Attorney General's edict to not cancel voting, by postponing Town Meeting until Saturday because of the blizzard warning. Gaskell's husband, Larry, works for the town highway department and told her was no way to keep the road from their home to town meeting safely open. "I see no reason to require the citizens of Washington to risk life and limb to vote on Tuesday when we could vote just as easily on Saturday," she said.

New Boston voters reject new fire station

The New Boston Fire Wards requested \$2,510,000 to design and construct a new fire station. A study has been thoroughly investigated and a plan developed by the Fire Station Building Committee over five plus years. The results have been reviewed at the CIP meeting as well as a the Finance Committee/Board of Selectmen that explains in detail all aspects of the project. The land for the building had been purchased in 2015. Town meeting voters rejected the proposal 513-747.

\$450,000 H-D Elementary project rejected

Hillsbor-Deering School District voters approved the \$21,939,631 operating beget by a vote of 310-269. Also approved were \$25,000 for a new pick-up truck, and \$50,000 for the Technology Trust FundOverwhelming rejected was an \$450,000 request for an Elementary School Entrance Enhancement and new Playground.

New ConVal Principal to be named soon

A committee of members at ConVal have whittled down a group of potential candidates for the high school principal position down to Michelle Voto and Larry Pimental. Voto is serving in research and development at the Region 14 Applied Technology Center, while Pimental is currently the principal at Conant High School. The salary for the job will range between \$100,000 to \$120,000 per year. The candidates visited the high school last Wednesday. Saunders said the hiring committee was slated to meet on Friday to further discuss the two finalists.

Sunapee voters reject Hwy & fire trucks

Sunapee voters narrowly rejected a new \$125,000 forestry truck for the fire station in a 340-337 vote. It is expected that the fire department would request a recount. Voters also turned down the purchase of new voting booths to replace booths that officials say are so old they shake when people write on them. Voters turned down the purchase of a new highway truck a \$55,000, even though the expense would have come from an existing capital reserve fund. All other articles were approved including the creation of a new commercial zoning district on Route 11.

Boscawen may consider posting its roads

The Town of Boscawen is one in a few towns that don't post their roads for weight limits in the spring. Surrounding towns have posted already. Dean suggests that we may want to consider posting as the Town has worked on quite a bit of paving. He mentioned that he will work with individual businesses that may need waivers. Signs will be ordered for next year.

\$3.6 million Newbury Fire Station proposal draws record crowd

In was elbow to elbow, standing room only as Newbury voters gathered for Town Meeting Wednesday night. They came to vote whether to raise \$3,600,000 for the design and construction and the original equipping of a new Fire Department Building located beside the Veteran's Memorial and its related site work. Approval would require the issuance of not more than \$3,600,000 of bonds with a 2/3 ballot vote required although the Selectboard recommended this appropriation. Voters rejected it after a prolonged debate.

Voters then approved the remaining requests, including; \$3,974,667.00

Most Newport Articles rejected

Newport School District voters passed only four of the 14 articles, including the Operating Budget, the use of funds for unanticipated special education costs in 2017-18, the purchase of a bus and van, and participation in the community wide solar program.

All other articles failed. The District's participation in the Newport Solar Program is contingent upon a similar article passing in the Town meeting in May.

Rep. Neal Kirk addresses the Weare Selectmen

"As a result of a superior court decision after the town meeting deliberative session, the Selectmen removed about \$60,000 from the default budget representing new contract increases not previously approved by voters.

Simultaneously, the Selectmen revisited the default budget and increased it by approximately the same \$60,000. This was accomplished by increasing lines, such as insurance, to the prior year's appropriation amounts even though you know that lower amounts will be spent this year.

At its meeting last week, the Board suggested that these increases in the default budget were agreed to by both parties to the law suit, the town and me. That was not the case; there was no agreement of

any kind.

The town's attorney asked my attorney whether the town could increase the default budget and provided a list of the proposed increases. My attorney told the town's attorney that the statute gave the Selectmen authority, based on "relevant new information" – that's the statutory language of RSA 40:13, to change the default budget any time prior to the printing of the ballots.

I don't believe the statute contemplated the loss of a lawsuit as "relevant new information." So, my question to you is this: what was the "relevant new information" on which you based your \$60,000 increase in the default budget? I believe the voters of Weare deserve an answer."
