The Day the Music Died

Canterbury trio sues to block Speedway's 3-day music festival

Canterbury residents Arnold Alert, Judith Elliott and James Snyder are suing New Hampshire Motor Speedway to prevent the racetrack from holding a three-day music festival this summer. A hearing was held Monday on the lawsuit, which claims that a 1989 understanding about what could happen on the land where the racetrack sits also applies to land adjacent to the track. That land was acquired after the agreement was in place. "They knew that this racetrack was going to be expanded," said Stephen Gordon, the plaintiffs' attorney. Part of the agreement states that there will be no standalone concerts. NHMS has approval for a three-day country

music festival, but Gordon said the former owner of the track, Bob Bahre, made promises to the plaintiffs that must be upheld.

Bill Glah, the lawyer for the speedway, agreed that the covenants are binding on the land where the track sits and the original parcel, but he said that's as far as it goes. He said the plans are to hold the music festival on land that was bought after the agreement was made."Nothing in their agreement, nothing that they've been able to point to shows anything in this agreement that would apply to after-acquired property," Glah said.

A judge has taken the matter under advisement and hopes to have a decision soon.

H-D set to receive \$278,439.20 Safety/Security Grant

The Hillsboro-Deering School District has been recommended to receive \$278,439.20 in School Safety/Security Grants from the Public School Infrastructure Fund.

If approved by the Governor and Council, the High School will receive \$66,502.40 for School Cameras and \$15,464.00 for Security Window Film. The Middle School will receive \$79,817.60 for School Cameras and \$19,000 for Security Window Film.

The Elementary School is scheduled for \$72,647.20 for School Cameras and \$25,008.00 for Security Window Film. The recommendation comes after a school visit by Homeland Security. The 80% grant requires a 20% district contribution of \$70,608.80.

Admitted Loudon child abuser reaches plea deal with prosecutors

A Loudon man will be sentenced later this month after pleading guilty to abuse of a child in Concord last summer. Bradley Mobbs, 28, of Loudon, who plead guilty in March to two counts of felony seconddegree assault will be sentenced later as part of a deal reached with county prosecutors. The plea deal is not fully negotiated, meaning both sides will argue for a slightly different sentence at the April 26 hearing. Under the agreement, Mobbs faces a maximum of nine months to serve in jail, as well as two years probation and a oneto three-year suspended prison sentence. A misdemeanor charge of simple assault will be dismissed.

Mobbs is charged with causing a laceration to a 7-year-old's ear by pushing the child into a wall and of causing bruising to the child's buttocks by excessively

spanking him in June 2017. The child was treated for his injuries at Concord Hospital and later released.

The boy told police the abuse was not an isolated incident and that he'd been hurt by Mobbs many times before, according to a police affidavit. Mobbs remains free on bail conditions but continues to be monitored due to prior instances of noncompliance. Prosecutors filed a motion with the court in December to revoke bail after Mobbs committed seven violations, mainly for using marijuana and cocaine, according to court records. Mobbs had also failed to comply with required daily checkins as a participant in Merrimack County's Pretrial Services program. The court had scheduled a bail hearing in January to take up the request, but it was postponed on the condition that Mobbs undergo a substance abuse evaluation by a certified alcohol and drug abuse counselor.

Washington voters elect new Selectman & Moderator

Washington voters delivered a few surprises at Tuesday's continued Town Meeting. They defeated an incumbent selectman and elected a write-in candidate for moderator replacing Barbara Gaskell, who state officials said illegally postponed last month's Town Meeting due to a nor'easter.

Selectmen Chair Bob Williams lost his bid for reelection by a 2-1 margin to challenger Jed Schwartz.

As Gaskell chose not to run for reelection, there was no candidate for moderator on the ballot. Guy Eaton,

who won reelection as school district moderator, won the town position over Gaskell, in write-in tallies.

Voters approved the proposed \$2.1 million annual budget as well as a new snowplow, a salt shed for the Public Works Department and restoring windows and doors at the town's Meeting House

The only articles defeated would have converted the job of fire chief from a one-year elected to a five-year appointed position and to reclassify certain rural roads.

Andover drone manufacturer lands \$1.8 million Government contract

The tragedy of last year's California wild fires triggered a tremendous opportunity for one NH company. When it became too dangerous to fly planes into the smoke from the wildfires, a drone from an Andover company was called in to help. According to Adam Sloan, co-owner and CEO of BirdsEyeView Aerobotics, "With a drone like ours, you can put a thermal camera on there, you can fly through the smoke, you can see the fire through the smoke," he said "It just gives them a way to be more effective in a particularly dangerous situation."

Co-founded by two former NASA interns, the company was recently rewarded with a \$1.8 million contract from the U.S. Department of the Interior to provide up to 50 drones over the next three years. Mark Bathrick, director of the Department of

On Tuesday I had the great pleasure of attending a New Hampshire Jump\$tart Coalition presentation of its "I Can Save" program at Center Woods Elementary School in Weare. The initiative is designed to encourage elementary school children to began a savings habit for a lifetime. The interactive program was a tremendous hit with the 2nd graders who were both entertained and informed.

Equally impressive was the cast of NH officials assisting Jump\$tart instructor Tori Berube, NH Education Commissioner Frank Edelblut, State Treasurer Bill Dwyer, and NH Banking Commissioner Gerald Little joined Joe Murray from Fidelity Investments in teaching the essentials of how to "Save, Spend and Share," while seemingly enjoying it as much as the kids.

To see these high powered business and government leaders step away from their desks and into the classroom to share their knowledge and experience with the next generation was inspiring. Typical bureaucrats they are not.

Unjustified fear of "School Choice"

On the same day school administrators and teacher representatives urged lawmakers to reject a school choice bill, SB 193, the Josiah Bartlett Center for Public Policy and EdChoice released a report on school spending. The report by the free-market think tank shows that New Hampshire public school spending and staffing increased much more rapidly from 1992-2014 than student enrollment, and the staffing increase came overwhelmingly in non-teaching positions.

The study also calculates that of the \$16,205 in per-pupil revenue New Hampshire public schools received in 2015, \$11,716 (or 72.2 percent of total per pupil expenditures) can be classified as variable rather than fixed costs.

"School choice opponents always claim that losing a student won't save a school money because the remaining students must continue to be taught, so the school can't fire the teacher. These data show that the spending increases of recent decades have been concentrated in non-teaching positions and have far outpaced student enrollment growth. As such, schools have options for finding savings that need not include cutting teachers," said Josiah Bartlett Center for Public Policy President Andrew Cline.

Among the highlights of the study:

• Between the 1992 and 2014 fiscal years, real spending per student in New Hampshire public schools increased by 56

percent, even though student enrollment grew by only 4 percent. In that same time, teacher salaries rose by only 2 percent.

- From 1992-2015, the number of full-time-equivalent personnel increased by 56 percent. These were mostly nonteaching positions. The number of teachers increased by 29 percent, while the number of non-teaching staff positions increased by 89 percent - 22 times the rate needed toaccommodate student growth.
- The student-to-staff ratio in New Hampshire fell from 8.6 students per full-time staff member in 1992 to 5.8 in 2015. The national average in 2015 was 8 students per full-time staff member.
- New Hampshire has a lower studentto-staff ratio, student-to-teacher ratio and student-to-non-teaching staff ratio than the national average. Nationwide in 2015, there were 16.1 students for every nonteaching public school staff member. In New Hampshire in 2015, there were 10.8 students per non-teaching public school staff member.

"The claim that Education Savings Accounts will cause property tax increases is just not borne out by the data," said Cline. "With an 89 percent increase in non-teaching staff from 1992-2015 and a 56 percent overall increase in spending, there are opportunities to find savings on the nonteaching side of the ledger should schools lose some revenue from families choosing Education Savings Accounts."

The NH Teacher of the Year award is presented to a teacher who is capable of speaking for, energizing the teaching profession, who represents the positive contributions of all teachers statewide, and who intends to continue in the teaching profession.

Paquette and Burke joined 21 other nominees in a forum where they presented evidence of their teaching and school leadership.

Semi-finalists will be notified in the next two weeks and then the review committee will visit each school to interview staff, parents, and students to help with their final decision.

The finalist will be announced in September 2018 and will be recognized at the NH Education Awards in December 2018.

Peterborough budget increased by voters at session

Peterborough voters came to their Deliberative Session in a spending mood, and agreed to increase the proposed budget from \$15,097,314 to \$15,247,314. The increase was needed to account for a \$15,175 lease payment for the police cruiser, and to cover abatements and tax credits on grants. \$200,000 was approved to refurbish the town's ladder

truck, after Fire Chief Ed Walker reported that refurbishing it will increase its lifespan by five years.

The articles moved to the ballot will be voted on May 8 at the Community Center from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The remainder of the warrant, including bonds, will be debated and voted on on May 9 at 6 p.m. at the Town House.

Hopkinton Board reorganizes Transfer Station

With the passing of DES director Steve Clough and upon the recommendation of Town Administrator Neil Cass, the Hopkinton Select Board voted to reorganize the Transfer Station to report directly to the Director of Public Works and the operation of the Sewer Department will be contracted out to WSO of Henniker.

The Board also discussed the use of the town fields, particularly in relation to school sports and football.

Neil asked for direction in how to proceed as work needs to be done on Field 4,

which is used by the Red Hawks football team. Because of the many teams using the fields, scheduling can be difficult and policies need to be in place as to who has priority.

It was brought up two years ago in a discussion of the work being done and the need for an alternative space for the football team. The question is, does the Town extend the use of the field? It was decided that Jim O'Brien of the Select Board will have a conversation with the School Board to discuss field use.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



For many women, the side effects of menopause don't call it a day when they do. Between 40 and 60 percent of women in perimenopause and early menopause face issues with sleep because of this physical change. The majority also report hot flashes and night sweats, which can be disruptive to falling and staying asleep. A new study published in *Menopause: The Journal of The North American Menopause Society* has found that low-dose hormone therapy may be effective in

easing sleep issues in this population. The goal of the study was twofold: find out how two forms of hormone therapy affect sleep quality and assess the ties between hot flashes, sleep quality and hormone therapy.

In a *Pharmacology Research & Perspectives* study, the asthma medication montelukast (trade name Singulair) was linked with neuropsychiatric reactions such as depression and aggression, with nightmares being especially frequent in children.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has granted accelerated approval for benznidazole for use in children ages 2 to 12 years old with Chagas disease. It is the first treatment approved in the United States for the treatment of Chagas disease. Chagas disease, an American trypanosomiasis, is a parasitic infection caused by Trypanosoma cruzi and can be transmitted through different routes, including contact with the feces of a certain insect, blood transfusions, or from a mother to her child during pregnancy. After years of infection, the disease can cause serious heart illness, and it also can affect swallowing and digestion. While Chagas disease primarily affects people living in rural parts of Latin America, recent estimates are that there may be approximately 300,000 persons in the United States with Chagas disease.





Judie Milner named Franklin Manager

Franklin's Acting City Manager Judie Milner has been formally approved for the position. As the former Finance Director, Milner has been Acting City Manager since Elizabeth Dragon left in September to become city manager in Keene. Franklin's city council contracted with an Atlanta-based consulting firm, The Mercer Group, and narrowed down dozens of applications to just a few, but the city Council hoped Milner would apply. Milner put in her application after receiving a lot of public support, and was approved by the City Council Monday night.

Loudon man rear-ends Bow police cruiser

A Bow Police cruiser, operated by officer Matthew Pratte, which had slowed for heavy traffic in the right hand lane, was rear-ended by a pickup truck, driven by Jerry Turner, 30, of Loudon. The cruiser was forced off the highway into an embankment. Pratte was treated for minor injuries at the scene and cleared, and his K-9 partner, Roxy, was also cleared after being transported by Hooksett Fire Chief James Burkush to CAVES Animal Hospital in Concord. Turner was cited at the scene for following too closely. Both vehicles sustained significant damage.

Upgraded security at Hopkinton Schools

Superintendent Steve Chamberlin updated the Hopkinton School Board on progress concerning security at the three schools. The Harold Martin and Maple Street Schools each have three controlled entrances for staff and one for visitors, while Hopkinton High School has six for staff and two for visitors. They expect to have a total 15 cameras, some of which will replace existing cameras, but are more advanced in design to cover more area seen. The staff doors would operate by key cards held by staff and Seniors. In discussing the placement of cameras, Chief Pecora stated that he was particularly interested in cameras showing the outside of the buildings. They hope to have the work done this summer, but it will depend on the vendors as there are a large number of schools upgrading security due to the grants that have been given.

Under the direction of English teacher Cathy Riley, the students composed five to seven minute original speeches that apply the Rotary Four Way Test in our everyday relationships with other people. The Rotary Four-Way Test is: Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it build goodwill and better friendships? Will it be beneficial to all concerned? Rotarians scored the speeches based on content, organization, and delivery. LaPierre received third place, Hall second and Hautanen first. Hautanen will go on to compete at the District level on May 6th.

Northfield votes to end curbside recycling

Faced with hefty increases in the cost of disposing of recycled materials the Northfield Board of Selectmen voted to end curbside recycling effective May 28th . The decision was made after a public hearing on the topic held on March 27th. At the hearing the Board reported that in the last few months the cost of disposing of recyclables has skyrocketed, from \$17.19/ton in August 2017 to \$95.06/ton in February 2018. The increase is due to changes in global recycling markets; disposal rates are expected to remain high at least 3 to 5 years and possibly much longer. The Board is working with Public Works Director Andy Buteau to make adjustments to the Transfer Station to allow for a resumption of sorted recycling at that facility. These plans will be presented to Northfield residents when they are complete.

Multimedia Center at Veterans Cemetery

The New Hampshire State Veterans Cemetery in Boscawen has plans for a new multimedia learning center. Veterans Heritage Learning will capture the stories of New Hampshire veterans and the state's military history. The 1,200-square-foot center will include an interactive touchscreen, kiosks and a theater. Officials have raised almost 40 percent of their \$700,000 goal for the center. They say the fundraising plan will go public when the center raises \$350,000. The center is scheduled to open Nov.11th during a Veterans Day ceremony.

According to a release, Schofield had barricaded the door with furniture and refused to open it before brandishing a gun and threatening to shoot the officers. He disarmed himself and was arrested. Police seized a number of handguns and long guns with ammunition, police said.




