# Dunkin Jenkins Trustees propose an H-D Performing Arts Auditorium

The Duncan Jenkins Trustees hope to create a more lasting legacy to Sally Jenkins for the generous gift to the communities of Washington, Hillsboro and Deering.

Duncan Jenkins, in conjunction with the Administration of the Hillsboro Deering School system, is proposing the construction of a new building on campus that will contain an auditorium, band room, music studio, art studio and gallery for the advancement of the arts and a large multi-purpose room.

The auditorium will provide a space to further promote the performing arts in our communities. It will serve the district as well as the communities to provide a space for the arts to flourish.

The additional arts space will free up much needed space in the high school so that many of the Voc ED classes may be moved back on campus; and the multi-purpose room will provide a location for the seniors and other groups to meet in town on a regular basis.

To accomplish this the Duncan Jenkins committee is prepared to offer significant financial support in the construction of the building as well as financial assistance in the day to day running of the new building. Due to many reasons the window on this offer is limited.

The preliminary cost of this building is unknown but from internet searches we anticipate the cost to be between 5 and 10M. If the school board decides to move forward on this proposal:

Form a subcommittee of the board for the purpose of researching an appropriate site and building plan.

Perform a feasibility study for above item which we believe will cost the district between 50 and 100K.

Once the above items are completed the Duncan Jenkins committee will determine the level of financial support they are willing to commit to.

If the school board accepts the amount the DJ committee will petition the courts for the funds to distribute pending a positive vote from the public. We bring it to the public for a vote on the bond to cover the district portion. The only condition placed on the funds besides the appropriate use is that the Dunkin Jenkins committee will have naming rights to the new building. A possible name being considered is Duncan Jenkins Center for the Performing Arts.

# Deering OK's converting town garage to LED lighting

The Deering Select Board discussed awarding the bid to change to LED lighting in the Highway Garage as has been done at the Town Office. The Town has realized a nearly 25% energy saving at the Town Office since changing the lighting and windows and bids went out for new lighting at the Garage. After reviewing two bids, it was decided that Revision Energy (the same company that did the Town Of-

fice) had the best bid as it included rather than trying to retrofit old ones. Therefore the Board voted \$11,614.00 to the Concord firm. The Board will continue to look at solar panels to be installed.

The Board praised Diane Kendall for achieving her designation of Certified Public Supervisor and voted to pay her training to become a Certified Public Manager.

# **H-D School Board rejects policy changes**

At Monday's meeting, policy committee member Steve Hahn and Chris Bober proposed an amendment that would require members of the public to preview their comments before the Superintendent before being put on the agenda and allowed to speak at a School Board meeting. Superintendent Hassett supported the amendment saying the Chairman should be able to stop someone from discussing issues that might not be appropriate and the proposed policy would "give teeth" to that. After much discussion, public input and a couple of amendments, Chairman Pelletier made a motion to remove the entire paragraph from the new policy and by a 3-2 vote that language was deleted and the new policy was approved by the same 3-2 vote, with Bober and Hahn objecting.

# Milk tanker rollover closes Tilton Exit 20

A driver was injured when a commercial vehicle carrying milk rolled over Tuesday morning on Interstate 93 in Tilton. While driving onto the Exit 20 ramp on the southbound side of the highway, the tanker left the paved portion of the road and rolled over, coming to rest on its side. The 64-year-old driver was transported to Concord Hospital with non-life-threatening injuries. The tanker, which is registered to Mountain Milk, of North Haverhill, was hauling a full load of milk. It spilled about 3,500 to 4,000 gallons of milk in the crash.

# Mount Sunapee Resort will soon be sold

Colorado's Vail Resorts Inc. has announced plans to buy the parent company of Mount Sunapee Resort in Newbury. The Colorado business, which already owns Stowe Mountain Resort in Vermont, said it had reached agreement to purchase Triple Peaks LLC from the Mueller family for \$82 million, subject to certain adjustments.

Hillsboro-Deering will be receiving \$14,500 as part of the reading proficiency component of the Smarter Balance Assessment. The funds are due to the State forgetting to inclue the third grade in the original equations.

# Henniker Select Board approves 'deduct meters' for sewer charges

The Henniker Select Board held a productive meeting Tuesday evening. At the suggestion of Mike Lambert, the Board reestablished the Trails Committee to develop, map and maintain trails for hiking, snowmobiles, mountain bikes and OHRVs.

They adopted Vice Chair Tia Hooper's draft of an Administrative Police on Deduct Meters without change, awarded a crack sealing contract to HW Dow for \$18,500, approved Police Chief Matt French's grant request for a \$2,700 contract with NH Fish & Game for OHRV trail patrols and hired Kyle Parker as part-time Building Inspector.

The Energy Committee reported that the town currently spends \$19,260 on street lighting which could be reduced by 45.1% to \$10,582 by converting to LED lights. The committee recommended signing a contract with Affinity LED to do the job.

Member Leo Parker objected because the committee only dealt with one company, and Chair Kris Blomback suggested Eversource be asked if it could do the job. Questions were also raised as to who would perform needed maintenance on the new lights.

The Board asked the committee to return with these answers as well as a draft contract with Affinity.

# TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A supplement that combines antioxidants with zinc and copper is a relatively inexpensive and effective means of halting progression of the 'wet' form of age-related macular degeneration (AMD), a degenerative eye disease, concludes research published online in the *British Journal of Ophthalmology*. In 'wet' AMD, abnormal blood vessels grow underneath the retina. These vessels can leak fluid and blood, which can damage the macula — the part of the retina responsible for central vision. But the drugs

(anti-VEGF therapies) currently used to treat 'wet' AMD are expensive and have been linked to heightened risk of inflammation of the inside of the eye (endophthalmitis) and possibly stroke as well.

Antibiotics prescribed by dentists may contribute to the growing problem of Clostridium difficile (C. diff), a serious and potentially deadly infection that causes severe diarrhea, suggests research presented at a recent Infectious Diseases Society of America conference. And many of those antibiotics are likely unnecessary, researchers note. Taking antibiotics can put patients at risk for developing C. diff and illustrates the importance of using the medications only when needed.

A new study ranking the safety and effectiveness of four drugs taken to enhance concentration, memory, alertness and moods found that done-pezil was most likely to effectively improve cognition in patients with Alzheimer's dementia. However, patients who took donepezil were more likely to experience side effects including nausea, vomiting and diarrhea than those who received a placebo, according to the study, published online in the *Journal of the American Geriatrics Society*. In 2015, 46 million people worldwide had Alzheimer's disease, according to the study.

# Certainly, We Can Do Better

Last week, I read a story in the Union Leader detailing how city crews cleared out homeless camps along the Merrimack River, telling homeless people to move on. Officials placed signs along the river alerting residents that personal property would be removed, and then moved in and picked up the area. This story highlights two connected problems, neither of which we are handling well.

1. Certainly these homeless camps are unsightly and panhandlers can be annoying, but these are human beings who have fallen on hard times for one of a number of reasons, War veterans who suffer from PTSD, unemployed, homeless, drug addicted, or mental health issues. Regardless of their issues, they

are our neighbors and we are failing them. It is not enough to evict them from public places. Even if we won't feed, clothe or care for them, at least we can provide a safe place for them to camp out.

2. Their plight is contrasted and exacerbated by our treatment of illegal aliens. Let it be said from the beginning: the vast majority of these immigrants are good people seeking to share in the American Dream. They are however, here illegally. American taxpayers are already struggling to care for our disadvantaged citizens. We are a caring and compassionate people, but we can not continue to feed, clothe, house, heal and educate the flood of immigrants at the expense of our own.

# **300 tons per day of solid waste in Weare**The Waste Management Division of the NH Department of En-

The Waste Management Division of the NH Department of Environmental Services held a public hearing Wednesday on Granite State Recycling's application to construct a 300 ton/day collection/transfer facility for single stream recyclables, municipal solid waste, along with construction and demolition debris at 33 B&B Lane in Weare.

Todd Moore from DES explained the permitting procedure and Engineer Michael Penny, representing the applicant, spoke of how the company is working to limit litter, odors and noise, which did little to appease the crowd of about 50 residents.

Jack Dearborn came armed with surveys of the plan approved by the Weare Planning Board in 2017 and the current plan. Pointing out the differences, he questioned how the business changed from a "Mom & Pop" operation to a 400 ton per day mega facility. Planning Board Vice Chair Bruce Fulmore told the panel that the current application violates many conditions of the local board's approval. His remarks were echoed by Planning Board members Tom Clow, who said the two plans, "Don't match up" and Neal Kirk who submitted a lengthly letter outlining the violations of both the Weare approvals and DES's regulations.

Dearborn seemed to sum up the crowd's feelings when he asked DES to deny the application as "inconsistent and non compliant" with the Weare conditions.






