Who's laughing now

Two students have been arrested and accused of making a threat against

Friday night's graduation ceremony at Hillsboro-Deering High School, William Corey, 19, and John Thomas, 18, were charged with felony criminal threatening. The two told police they were joking and had no intentions of bringing guns to the graduation. Police said around noon on Friday, they started receiving multiple reports there were some threats made

about the ceremony. "Individuals think that what they say isn't going to be heard by other people and that those other people aren't going to perceive that as a serious threat," said Det. Christopher McGillicuddy of the Hillsborough Police Department. "That's exactly what happened in this case." Police said there was no danger to the public. Officials said they don't believe the suspects had any way to execute the threat. Extra officers were added to security preparations for the ceremony. "Things were taken care of very well today," said Hillsboro-Deering Superintendent Bob Hassett. "I couldn't be luckier to have the police department we have and the administration we have. They did a great job today to make everybody safe and to make sure that (the) night was a big success."

Know who you are

Bow High School graduates urged to know how to act

As Bow's 165 graduates marched down the center a"isle, it marked the first time that the graduating class included Dunbarton students who had attended the school as freshmen.

Class President John Rolla wondered what impact he would have after graduating and urged his classmates to "Leave an impact on the world." Repeating advice his parents gave him, he charged them to "leave something better off than when you found it."

Principal Brian O'connell warned the class to "always be prepared for what is new and unexpected," while Humanities teacher Lily Woo,

quoting from Hindu literature, advised "know who you are and know how to act." Zachary Udelson, suffering from cerebral palsy, was joined by classmate Ben Guertin repeating his words for clarity, said, "My great challenge is making you understand me, of course you can't and that's why Ben is here." Udelson gave an eloquent, passionate speech employing those in attendance not to put people in boxes. "We are quick to put a label on people who disagree with us," he said. "We ignore them rather than listen to what they have to say." He was given a prolonged, standing ovation.

Franklin parent demands Council 'raise my taxes'

A large group of Franklin parents and students came to Franklin City Hall Monday night, demanding that recent cuts to the school budget be restored. Resident Steven Bunker said he "begged them to make me pay more taxes." The city has a tax cap which effects both municipal and school funding, and many fear there are some who could not afford an increase in their taxes.

If given the bump in tax allocation this year, it could mean another \$412,000 toward the school budget.

"I can't tell you we're going to get you the whole \$412,000," Mayor Tony Guinta said, "but based on past experience, we're going to get you close." The tax allocation will be discussed in the budget workshop on June 18th.



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TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Babies classified as low birth weight are at risk of iron deficiency, which is linked to impaired neurological development. A long-term randomized study published in the journal *Pediatric Research* now shows that providing such babies with iron supplements can prevent behavioral problems at school age.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Mylotarg (gemtruzumab ozogamicin) for the treat-

ment of adults with newly diagnosed acute myeloid leukemia whose tumors express the CD33 antigen (CD33-positive AML). The FDA also approved Mylotarg for the treatment of patients aged 2 years and older with CD33-positive AML who have experienced a relapse or who have not responded to initial treatment. AML is a rapidly progressing cancer that forms in the bone marrow and results in an increased number of the National Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of Health estimates that approximately 21,380 people will be diagnosed with AML this year and that 10,590 patients with AML will die of the disease.

Rivaroxaban plus aspirin reduces major adverse cardiovascular and limb events by nearly one-third in patients with peripheral artery disease, according to results presented at the European Society of Cardiology Congress. Peripheral artery disease (PAD) affects an estimated 200 million people worldwide and is strongly associated with concomitant coronary, cerebral, and peripheral atherosclerosis. Patients are at increased risk of heart attack, stroke and death from cardiovascular causes, as well as limb-threatening ischemia and amputation. Aspirin is the standard anti-thrombotic therapy but is only modestly effective.

Hopkinton exploring a solar array on closed landfill

The Hopkinton Select Board is considering placing solar panels on a closed landfill. Jim O'Brien, Chair of the Select Board stressed that the idea is only at its preliminary stages.

"Right now the land is a capped landfill that's not really doing much for us. Hosting a solar site would be a fine use for the property."

Last month, Dominic LeBel of Granite Apollo, a new New Hampshire development company for large-scale solar projects met with the Board.

LeBel had been given a tour of townowned property around the landfill, which closed decades ago, and is now used for the town's wood bank and composting

The Board is expected to vote on whether to sign an agreement that would allow Granite Apollo to explore the site to determine what is doable.

Falling tree ravages Hillsborough house

Brian Blanchard and his granddaughter are lucky to be alive after a tree crashed down on his Hillsborough home late Tuesday. Blanchard and his 2-year-old granddaughter, Meadow, were in his home on Saw Mill Road when the tree fell. Meadow's mother and father were in the next room when part of the tree came down. Blanchard rolled over with the child in his arms as he tried to comprehend what was happening. He was able to pass the baby through a small hole in the debris to her dad. Blanchard said there was no storm that caused the section of the tree to give way, but he had been concerned about the tree because it was growing over a large rock so the roots couldn't get hold. Despite destruction and lack of insurance, Blanchard considers himself a lucky man. A GoFundMe page has been set up to help him with repairs.

Several changes at both of Weare's schools

Brett Gottheimer has been hired as Dean of Teaching and Learning for Center Woods Upper Elementary School in Weare, effective July 1, 2018. "We are keeping our three person administrative team at Weare Middle and Center Woods Upper Elementary, but parents and students will see some changes next year," said Superintendent Tacconi-Moore. Mr. Mark Willis will not return as principal, and as a result, Mrs. Shawne Hilliard has been appointed Interim Principal for both Weare Middle and Center Woods Upper Elementary School. Mr. Phil Matzke will continue as Dean of Teaching and Learning for the middle school, while Brett Gottheimer will be Dean of Teaching and Learning for Center Woods Upper Elementary School. Gottheimer is currently the Fine Arts Department Head at Pinkerton Academy in Derry. Prior to his move into school administration, he taught music in high schools and middle schools in Connecticut for 13 years. Earlier this year, the Weare School Board voted for both Center Woods Upper Elementary School and Weare Middle School to have the same start and end times for the 2018-19 school year. This change will alleviate crowding on busses and after-school use of the building will no longer interrupt learning for others.

Epsom woman given eight years in prison

Nicole Roskos, 30, of Epsom, was sentenced Monday in U.S. District Court in Concord to eight years in federal prison for conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute controlled substances and using and carrying a firearm during and in relation to a drug trafficking crime. Last September, police executed a search warrant at the Roskos' home that turned up four firearms, ammunition, over 511 grams of fentanyl, and approximately \$24,000 in cash.

Chichester teen given two year sentenceIn only the second case of its kind in Merrimack County, a judge

In only the second case of its kind in Merrimack County, a judge has sentenced David Browall, 19, of Chichester to two years in jail for uploading sexually explicit images of two ex-girlfriends to the internet without their consent. He shared private images of one of the girls "as payback" after she applied for a restraining order against him in mid-2017. Browall admitted to separately uploading nude photos of each of the two girls, whom he knew from Pembroke Academy, on at least three occasions between January and August of that year. The girls, then 16, were named in the posts.

Witnesses reported Marden had sped by several vehicles on Endicott North Street and Weirs Boulevard just before the crash. 


