# **Show Me The Money**

### Dunbarton taxpayers sue to block special meeting

A group of Dunbarton taxpayers, led by State Rep. JR Hoell has brought suit demanding the immediate, full return of the \$1 million in takes wrongfully collected, as a one-time tax

The school district had petitioned the Merrimack County Superior Court, under RSA 197:3, which states that a school board must petition for a special meeting in cases of emergencies including an immediate expenditure of money, to host a special meeting to

allow voters to decide what to do with \$1.06 million after an independent audit of SAU19 found the extra money paid from Dunbarton taxpayers.

The Board wants the money placed in a trust fund that will be used to even the tax rate over five years. But, Hoell argues that, "The transfer of money from one account to an account to retain it for a five-year period doesn't seem to meet the requirements of an expenditure." A decision is expected soon.

### Henniker Board considering increased rental fees

The Henniker Select Board reviewed a proposal to increase the rental fees for the Community Center, the Park/Bandstand and the Grange Building. Currently residents and non-residents alike are charged \$25, which doesn't even cover the staff time to process the application. Staff also spends a lot of time chasing down the return of keys. Under the new proposal, residents would

be charged a \$50 rental fee and non-residents \$100. In addition a key deposit would be required to encourage the early return of the key.

At the suggestion of Vice-Chair Tia Hooper the matter was tabled and referred to the Community Center Governing Committee for their recommendation. A public hearing will then be scheduled.

### Franklin City Council adopts a \$18,571,401 school budget

After weeks of back and forth debate, and three hours of public comment, the Franklin City Council voted, 6-3, to pass a \$18,571,401 school budget Wednesday night. Two weeks ago the Council voted to break its tax cap and give the district an extra \$708,623, but a week later voted to rescind its decision, finding \$422,722 for the schools from fund balance and capital reserve money instead. In the last few years, Franklin Schools have suffered more than 20 staff cuts, and this year, the budget shortfall was about \$1 million for the third year in a row. Several parents said they faced the difficult decision of whether

Belmont Police seeking 2nd peeping Tom


Belmont Police are looking for a man suspected of peeking through a gap in the stall door of a public bathroom while it was being used by a child. According to Belmont Police Capt. Richard Mann, the same man also was observed watching kids in the mall's play area late Monday afternoon. Police do not believe the peeping incident is related to a similar crime in Tilton, where a man was arrested after he allegedly peered over the dividing wall of a changing room being used by a teen girl at the Gap store at Tanger Outlets in Tilton.

### Belmont man gets 4-8 years

Oliver Blackstone, 31, of Belmont, was sentenced to four to eight years for possession of methamphetamine with intent to distribute. Six months of the minimum sentence will be suspended on condition of good behavior for three years after his release from prison. In addition Blackstone was fined \$620, and ordered to make \$380 in restitution to the Laconia Police Department.

### Franklin Mill renovation receives PlanNH's top honors

PlanNH has recognized the renovation of the dilapidated Franklin Light & Power Mill into neighborhood housing as one of five renovation projects in the state to receive top honors from the group that supports urban projects.

The Merit Awards program recognizes outstanding building projects that embody what PlanNH calls Smart Growth principles, as well as social responsibility and collaboration. All four winners this year involved rehabilitat-

ing existing buildings, often with new uses.

In Franklin, CATCH Neighborhood Housing oversaw the rehabilitation of the old industrial building, which dates to 1895, into 45 lower-cost apartments. The \$12 million project was years in the making. The Franklin Light & Power Mill was previously recognized by the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance as one of 11 winners of the annual Preservation Achievement Awards.

### Police suspect juvenile filed a false report

Hancock Police Chief Andrew Wood reports that a juvenile faces a possible charge of false report, after telling police he had been attacked. Police, fire and rescue workers responded to Main Street last Friday for a report of a younger male voice yelling "help, help, help. I don't want to die, call 911." When they arrived, he said he had been jumped and beaten up. The juvenile had come to Hancock with three other males the night before, and had been camping in the woods, when the other 3 subjects attacked him. He was taken into protective custody and taken to Monadnock Community Hospital where he was treated, and released to one of his parents.

### Tilton Police arrest peeping Tom at outlet

Eric Muldowney, 30, of Somerville, Massachusetts, has been accused of peeping at a 12-year-old girl over the weekend in a dressing room at the Tilton outlet stores. He was charged with simple assault and violation of privacy. Tilton Police said the girl's mother noticed something odd in the mirror of a changing room at the Gap Outlet Store, and realized it was someone basically looking over the stall door at her daughter changing. Chief Robert Cormier said the man was later identified as Muldowney. Officials said the mother tried to keep him in the store until police arrived, but did get a description of him and the vehicle. Police pulled over Muldowney just before he got on the highway. Muldowney faced similar charges in July 2015 in Boston.

### Medical emergency causes Goffstown crash

A woman was transported to Catholic Medical Center on Saturday evening after a medical emergency that caused her to drive her car into a parked vehicle on the lot of Northstar Auto Sales in Goffstown. The woman whose name police have yet to release was traveling in a southeasterly direction on Mast Road in a silver Toyota sedan when she experienced an unspecified medical emergency that caused her to lose control of the vehicle. She veered off the road onto the Northstar lot where she collided head on with a red Ford sedan that belonged to the dealership. When her car came to a complete stop, the woman's Toyota was resting directly on top of the Ford's hood.

### Select Board given an update on sale of Antrim Wind Project

Antrim Board Chair Bob Edwards opened the discussion of the Antrim Wind Project by stating that the Board would not be asking technical questions until an application had been submitted to the SEC. He then asked Jack Kenworthy of Walden Green Energy to give an overview of their plans. It is their intention to sell the project to TransAlta.

He explained that they would continue to oversee the project until the sale is complete, and if the SEC denied the sale, they would continue to see it through. It is expected that the application will be submitted within the next two weeks, but any timeline is dependent upon the SEC. Kelly List of TransAlta stated that they have been in business for over 100 years and started in Alberta, Canada. They are currently transitioning their coal operations in Canada and the State of Washington to cleaner fuels, because of government mandates. Board Chair Edwards told the audience that after the application is filed, there would be another public meeting.

It appears that all points in the agreement between Antrim and the Town are be-

ing adhered to and when questioned by the Fire Chief, Dustin Littlefield explained that prior to any blasting being done, the Fire and Police Chiefs would be notified both one day and then one hour in advance.

In other business, the Selectmen signed

a notice of award to Cold River Bridges of Walpole, NH to begin the bridge project. They were the low bid at \$623,334. Once Cold River receives the notice they can proceed with the paperwork and then the actual project.

### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



The use of benzodiazepine and related drugs (Vanaax, Valium, Klonopin, etc.) is associated with a 40 per cent increase in mortality among persons with Alzheimer's disease, according to a new study published in the *International Journal of Geriatric Psychiatry*. The study found that the risk of death was increased right from the initiation of benzodiazepine and related drug use. The increased risk of death may result from the adverse events of these drugs, including fall-related injuries such as hip fractures, as well as pneumonia

and stroke. Benzodiazepines are man-made medications that are prescribed for anxiety, panic attacks, depression, insomnia, seizures, nausea, vomiting, and muscle spasms.

Introducing "biosimilar" versions of complex biologic drugs used to treat illnesses such as cancer and rheumatoid arthritis could cut health care spending in the United States by \$54 billion over the next decade, according to new analysis from the RAND Corporation. Biologics are complex, protein-based drugs manufactured in living systems. They include insulin, monoclonal antibodies to block inflammation in rheumatoid arthritis, and a range of drugs to treat cancer, multiple sclerosis and other serious diseases. Biosimilars are very close to already-approved "reference" biologics in terms of potency, safety and efficacy, but manufactured by different companies. Biosimilars can be approved for marketing by the federal Food and Drug Administration after the manufacturer of the reference biologic enjoys several years of patent and exclusivity protection. While biologics are important treatments for many conditions, they often are expensive and patient copays for the treatments can be several thousand dollars per year. Only 1 percent to 2 percent of the nation's population is treated with a biologic each year; however, the drugs accounted for 38 percent of prescription drug spending in 2015.

### New Boston to receive a \$1.1 million school tax refund

Because of a miscalculation in last year's SAU #19 school budget, New Boston is scheduled to receive a \$1.1 million return of tax revenue. At Monday's meeting, Steve Hamilton of the Department of Revenue Administration briefed the Select Board on procedures for handling the large return.

### Franklin woman arrested for child neglect
