
Couple transforms historic GAR Hall into a brewery

Erika Rosenfeld and her fiancé, Jeff Odland, the co-owners of Post & Beam Brewing, in Peterborough, had a soft opening last Friday night for invited guests followed by a Grand Opening on Saturday.

The brewery, located in the former GAR building on 40 Grove Street, offers a small menu of food items in addition to its beer selection. The couple bought the historic building last May for \$100,000 from the town of Peterborough, and have since invested nearly a million dollars for equipment. Post & Beam was scheduled to open in December, funding delays

and renovations progressed through the spring and into the summer. To assist them with "the final push" for the grand opening, they launched an online crowdfunding campaign on Indiegogo which raised more than \$18,000 to put the finishing touches on the taproom and patio. The Post & Beam is open from noon to 10 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays, and noon to 8 p.m. on Sundays, Mondays and Thursday. Originally built as a high school in 1837, the GAR Building became a meeting hall for Civil War veterans in 1889, called the A. F. Stevens Post of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR).

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Franklin Mayoral Committee to study Education for the 21st Century

Franklin Mayor Tony Giunta has established the "Mayoral Committee on Designing Franklin's Education for the 21st Century." Its vision is to offer the opportunity to every student to develop their innate talents and desires through a structured, supported school curriculum that addresses individual differences and promotes the development of caring adults able to function successfully in the work environment of today and in the future.

The Committee has been charged to study and provide suggestions on ways to restructure Franklin's primary (K-12) education system recognizing that its current system is based on an 18th Century model that has not fully incorporated the societal and technical changes resulting from our progression into the 21st Century. It will take into consideration that the delivery of a primary education is facing continuing revenue restraints, unfunded mandates, and other financial concerns that local property taxpayers are unable to sustain. The committee will provide suggestions on how major advancements in technology, consolidation, regional partnering, and other innovative solutions can be combined to reduce the cost of primary education while improving the educational experience of the city's students.

The end goal of the committee is to find ways to provide the greatest opportunity for every school student throughout the district/region to be successful while significantly reducing the cost to the district for delivering these opportunities.

The committee recognizes that the end result of a 21st Century education program isn't just about restructuring. More programs may be needed to create a 21st Century Education; others may need to

be deleted. However, there are technical skills and graduation requirements that still must be met. The present school day and school year are based on a farming, not an informational economy, and the committee will review the options with input from the community. Options for rebuilding and/or expanding the tax base will be considered as appropriate. The committee

was established on June 4, 2018 and will remain active for one year. It will issue a monthly report to the Franklin City Council to be included in its regularly scheduled meeting as part of the "committee report updates" agenda item. An interim report on committee progress and findings will be delivered semi-annually or when available, per discretion of the chairperson.

Cyanobacteria at Keyser Pond

A cyanobacteria bloom has been observed on Keyser Pond in Henniker. New Samples were collected from the middle of the lake and cells were identified as Oscillatoria, Spirulina and Lyngbya at over 230,000 cells/ml. Blooms were also observed along shorelines. It is possible that cyanobacteria concentrations are elevated throughout the lake.

As a result, the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) has issued a cyanobacteria lake warning for those who use the waterbody for recreation. It is also advised to look out for accumulations in other areas of the lake or shorelines. Please continue to monitor your individual shoreline for changing conditions. awarded to the Weare Police Department for the second time; the first award was made in 2015.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Approximately 10 percent of the general population take a proton pump inhibitor (PPI) drug to block stomach acid secretions and relieve symptoms of frequent heartburn, acid reflux and gastroesophageal reflux disease. That percentage can be as much as seven times higher for people with chronic liver disease. However, stomach (gastric) acid suppression alters specific gut bacteria in a way that promotes liver in-

jury and progression of three types of chronic liver disease, according to a new study published in *Nature Communications*. PPIs, which include brand names such as Prilosec, Nexium and Prevacid, are among the most commonly prescribed medications in the world. One study estimates Americans spend \$11 billion on PPIs each year.

Widely available ibuprofen is a better choice for pain relief in children who have undergone minor orthopedic outpatient surgery, as it has fewer adverse effects compared with oral morphine, according to results from a clinical trial published in *CMAJ* (Canadian Medical Association Journal). The study included 154 children aged 5 to 17 years who underwent minor orthopedic surgery, such as keyhole surgery on joints, ligament and tendon repair, suture or hardware removal at London Health Sciences Centre in London, Ontario. In the first 24 hours, more than 80% of the children in the study needed pain relief at home. Pain scores for children in both the oral morphine and ibuprofen groups were similar, but the children receiving oral morphine reported more adverse effects, such as nausea, vomiting, drowsiness, dizziness and constipation.

Belmont woman arrested on two charges

On Thursday July 26th a Bow Police Officer was patrolling the parking lot of the Hampton Inn, when he observed a female crouching down next to a vehicle, who abruptly stood up and began to walk away. The officer was able to make contact with the female, who was identified as Timiah Wilkins, 21, of Belmont. It was discovered that the vehicle Wilkins was crouched down next to was recently stolen out of Concord. Wilkins was then charged with two counts of receiving stolen property, and two counts of possession of controlled drugs.

Not Guilty of attempted murder, but ...

A jury acquitted Jason Alleyne, 29, of attempted murder, but convicted him of first-degree assault for purposely running over his wife with a car at a Bow gas station in August of 2017. Alleyne was also found guilty of second-degree assault and seven misdemeanor charges: four counts of simple assault, two counts of criminal mischief and one count of criminal threatening. He was found not guilty of three additional simple assault charges. Alleyne faces 7½ to 15 years in prison on the first-degree assault charge alone.

Spaulding critical of SAU 43 Superintendent

Frequent School Board critic, Bert Spaulding Sr., has leveled a personal attack on Superintendent of Schools Cindy Gallagher. Spaulding was critical of the job being done by Gallagher as the leader of SAU 43. "The time is now for a no-confidence vote and rid the SAU of its current superintendent," he said during a 20-minute critique of Gallagher's work. Spaulding also questioned the recent proposal of putting pre-K students in the White Building without notifying the community. "You work for the citizens. She works for you," he continued. After speaking his mind, he left the meeting.

Loudon woman denies assault charges

Kathleen Arrigo, 20, of Loudon has been accused of threatening and assaulting a juvenile at the Cawley Middle School eighth-grade graduation in June. Arrigo turned herself in to police Wednesday, after being wanted on a warrant for simple assault and criminal threatening in the June 18 incident. Arrigo claims she only spoke with the child, asking him to leave her little sister alone and has disputed the charges.

Sunapee to study proposed Boat Launch & Town Dock Ordinance

It was a full house at the Sunapee Select Board meeting Monday night. The large crowd of lake dwellers and boaters were drawn to learn about Highway Superintendent Scott Hazelton's proposed "Boat Launch & Town Dock Ordinance." With concerns over maintenance of the docks and boat ramp, Hazelton and Town Manager Donna Nashawaty drafted a comprehensive ordinance for review and adoption by the Board.

The three page draft includes sections on permitted and prohibited uses, fees, permitting and enforcement provisions. Board Chair Joshua Trow stressed that the draft was only "Step One" in a long review

Franklin Police officials are reaching out to Tilton and the Merrimack County Attorney's office for help in filling the department's immediate need for a prosecutor.

Weare Gazebo demolition delayed pending restoration plan

Former Selectman Tom Clough began the public session of the Weare Select Board asking that the Board rescind their previous motion to have the gazebo next to the Middle School demolished.

He stated that although the structure has some problems, he felt that they were not so bad that it needed to be removed. Also, it's over 30 years old and has become a landmark in a town that really doesn't have a town center. While the Board took no action at that time, later in the meeting they did discuss the suggestion.

Board Chair Ricky Hippler brought a letter to the Board from the Historical Society which echoed what Clough had said. They also asked that the Board rescind their previous motion and to give the Society until October 1 to come up with an acceptable plan to be able to keep the gazebo.

After discussion about the safety of the gazebo, and specifically about children who play on it while not supervised, the Board decided to send a letter to the school asking them to help keep

the children off it. Rather than rescinding their vote, they directed Town

Administrator Naomi Bolton to delay action on the gazebo until October 1.

Now Is The Time

On the heels of the resignation of four of the newest members of the Greater Hillsborough Chamber of Commerce, The Messenger has learned that two of the remaining four members of the Chamber's Executive Committee have placed their homes on the market.

Charles Denton is attempting to sell his house in Hillsborough Center and has told people he will move out of Hillsborough. Trim Hahn has listed her house on Windsor Road, presumably to move full time into the Peterborough home she and husband Steve have owned for some time.

With both the Board and Executive Committee so badly depleted, now is the perfect time to revamp and restructure the Chamber by holding actual elections for the Board of Directors.

The remaining members should immediately resign, with the understanding that they are free to stand for election. Hillsborough needs an active vital Chamber, one dedicated to serving its member businesses and the town itself. It can happen, but not under the current leadership.

An Open Letter to: Members of the Franklin School Board:

Once again the taxpayers of Franklin are confronted with a request for an increase in funds. Oddly with a declining population of students there is still a need for an increase in cost.

What concerns me is that the discussion regarding budgets center around teacher pay or the number of personnel required or facility needs. There is no discussion about job performance. The results demonstrate to the taxpayer the return on their invested tax dollar. When one examines the statistics at the Department of Education https://my.doe.nh.gov/profiles/ profile.aspx?d=185&vear=2018 they will see that the literacy of Franklin students at all levels of "assessment" are unacceptable. Obviously more money for teacher pay, personnel or facilities do not produce literate students. And this is not just a Franklin problem, the results for the state are equally depressing.

Franklin reading proficiency at 11th grade is 55% and math at 25% while the state average is reading at 66% and 44% respectively. Additionally examining similar results at all grade levels raises the question: why is this inadequacy not being

addressed at the lower levels instead of passing along the deficiencies?

Class size is not the problem. More funding is not the answer. Continuing to maintain and increase the SAU and teacher population is not improving the results. Contrast graduates of the current system with that of 1831 when Alexis de Toqueville speaking with the man on the street who could thoroughly discuss the Constitution of the United States. Could our current graduates do likewise?

Schools are tasked with teaching the students and the proof is in the performance of the students in an acceptable level of achievement. In other jobs were the employees to produce these results they would be looking for another position.

When I talk with employers about finding qualified workers their first concern is that 50-60% of the applicants cannot read, write or compute.

This means that roughly half the students who graduate are unemployable. This is a factor driving our drug crisis and our welfare dependency. Our children deserve better. Please tell me why the taxpayers of Franklin should continue to pay for such poor results.
