# Lightning strike

Community vows to restore extensive fire damage

Hopkinton's Town library remains closed until further notice after receiving extensive damage from a two-alarm fire that was ignited by a lightning strike on the cupola of the building's roof last Friday afternoon. When Hopkinton firefighters arrived at the library, patrons and staff had already evacuated. Chief Jeff Yale immediately called in a second alarm, which brought in mutual aid of fire

crews from Boscawen, Concord, Hillsborough, Henniker, Warner, Bow and Dunbarton. No injuries were sustained by firefighters, library patrons or library staff. The building's cupola



was completely destroyed as a result of the initial strike and the resulting flames, along with extensive smoke and water damage to the carpet and ceiling tiles. Library Director, Donna Dunlop, reports that the damage is extensive and almost the entire inventory will need to be replaced.

The library, which is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year, has yet to announce a formal fund-

raiser, but has directed anyone wishing to make a monetary contribution to make their checks payable to the Hopkinton Library Foundation, P.O. Box 217, Contoocook, NH 03229.

### SAU #24 school leaders receive Home Land Security training

All employees in leadership roles within SAU 24 along with emergency management and law enforcement from Henniker and Weare spent an entire day in July training with Home Land Security to prepare for school emergency readiness. SAU 24, which includes schools in Henniker, Weare, John Stark, and Stoddard school districts, brought together administrators from all schools to review each school's Emergency Operations Plan and practice various emergency events such as a wildfire encroaching on a school and an active shooter.

"Every school has an emergency plan, but this day gave us the opportunity to actually put our plans into practice in theoretical table top scenarios. We saw what worked well and where we could make changes and improve our plans," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. Lorraine Tacconi-Moore. The State of NH requires that every school in the state submits their Emergency Operating Plan each September 1.

"Student safety is always our number one priority," said Superintendent Tacconi-Moore. "While we all hope we won't need to activate our emergency plan in any school, we do know that a well thought out plan, one that has been practiced, offers the best protection for student and staff safety in an emergency," she continued.

Principals, assistant principals, and other school level administrators create plans that are specific to their school, building layout, geography, etc. The individual schools also work in concert with the leadership at the SAU 24 office to coordinate all emergency plans and, should an emergency arise, the school and SAU work together putting the emergency plan into

action. Following any emergency, all team members meet and discuss what worked well and what areas need revision.

"While by NH state statute we must file

school emergency plans each September, we continually work to update and improve our safety plans throughout the year," said Superintendent Tacconi-Moore.


#### Lord Henniker's daughter attends 250th anniversary

#### Antrim Wind construction to begin soon

Antrim Wind Energy has submitted a notice of the start of construction of the Antrim Wind Project to the state's Department of Environmental Services, stating that the company expects to begin construction on or about August 6th. Plans call for a 9-turbine, 29-megawatt project on the Tuttle Hill ridgeline, a project first announced in the spring of 2009. Although an earlier 10 turbine plan was rejected by the state's site evaluation committee in 2012, the company brought back a 9-turbine version in 2015, which was approved.

#### Weare man to serve 25 years in prison

Dustin Moss, 31, of Weare will spend 25 years in federal prison after being convicted of the delivery of 12 pounds of 92-percent pure "ice" methamphetamine into the state.

Prosecutors said Moss purchased the drugs through a Las Vegas supplier. Police said they intercepted the 12 pound package in April 2017, replaced it with dummy drugs, and traced an intermediary who delivered it to Moss in Manchester. When they arrested Moss, he had a loaded Smith & Wesson firearm, throwing knives, and \$10,590 in cash in his car.

#### **Speedway Concert issue to Supreme Court**

Arnold Alpert, Judith Elliot and James Snyder, all of Canterbury, have appealed a judge's decision to allow the NH Motor Speedway to hold a three-day country music festival to the NH Supreme Court. The lawsuit has already killed plans to hold a festival this summer, but track officials continue with next year's concert plans. Although the group was represented by attorney Steven Gordon of Shaheen & Gordon at the superior court, the trio plans to represent themselves at the Supreme Court.

#### New sex charges against Dunbarton man

Merton Mann, 74, the Dunbarton selectman recently accused of sexually assaulting two 5-year-old boys a decade ago, now faces new charges in Merrimack County. Mann was recently indicted on nine counts of aggravated felonious sexual assault and seven counts of felonious sexual assault alleging repeated sexual abuse of one boy during a four-month period in 2007 and of a second boy that April.

### **Duncan Jenkins Performing Arts Center study committee appointed**

At Monday's meeting the Hillsboro-Deering School Board continued discussing a proposed Duncan Jenkins Performing Arts Center as suggested by the Trustees of the Duncan Jerkins Trust.

The Board appointed several members to a Feasibility Committee to study various options for the project, including location, size of the auditorium, meeting rooms, art display areas and the like and make periodic reports to the Board. Members appointed include two School Board members; Rich Pelletier and Kathryn McGinn; a Trustee, Superintendent Robert Hassett; a Selectman, David Fullerton; HDHS Principal

### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Proton pump inhibitors (PPIs) — medications commonly used to treat heartburn, acid reflux, and ulcers — have been linked with potentially serious side effects including possible increased risk of bone fractures. In a new Alimentary Pharmacology & Therapeutics study, however, patients with Barrett's esophagus — a long-term complication of acid reflux — who took high doses of PPIs for prolonged periods were no more likely to have

bone fractures or evidence of bone thinning (osteopenia or osteoporosis) than people in the general population.

Maintaining sufficient vitamin D levels may help to prevent tthe onset of inflammatory diseases like rheumatoid arthritis, according to a study published in the *Journal of Autoimmunity*.

Hope may be on the horizon for children and teens who suffer from migraine headaches that don't respond to traditional treatment. Injections of botulinum toxin (BOTOX®) may provide significant relief, suggests a small preliminary study presented at the ANESTHESIOLOGY® 2017 annual meeting. Currently, BOTOX® is approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Association (FDA) only to treat migraines in adults. One in 10 school-aged children and teens suffer from migraines, but there are few FDA-approved medications for this age group. Additionally, some children and teens don't respond well to available options, such as certain migraine "rescue" pain medications, and the pain and disability of migraines can have a severe impact on their lives. In some cases, preventive medications may help. However, currently only one preventive migraine medication, topiramate, is approved for adolescents.

#### T-Bird Mini Marts sold to Mass company

Cheshire Oil has sold ten local convenience stores to a Massachusetts-based company. The company's T-Bird Mini Mart locations have been purchased by Global Partners LP, a Waltham, Massachusetts-based company. Global Partners owns approximately 1,500 stores, primarily throughout the Northeast, making them one of the largest regional independent owners, suppliers and operators of gasoline stations and convenience stores.

#### Northfield invasion suspect still at large

Northfield Police are still searching for a man after a resident said he was threatened and robbed inside his home. Northfield Police said a man went to the victim's door Wednesday morning and said he was out of gas and needed help. When the victim offered to get the man a gas can and drive him to a gas station, the man started going through the victim's house, told the victim to get on the floor or he would be shot. The man took a laptop and some keys and left in the victim's car. Authorities later recovered the blue 2010 Nissan Altima, but the suspect remains at large.

#### **Deering man guilty of Domestic Violence**

On July 28th, Edward McGratty, 54, of Deering, was arrested and charged with Domestic Violence Simple Assault, as well as Subsequent Offense Driving While Intoxicated in relation to a car crash that had occured prior to the DV incident. He pled guilty to both charges. He was sentenced on the DWI charge, and a sentencing hearing was set at a later date for the Domestic Violence charge.

### Hillsboro teen airlifted with compound fractures to arms and leg

On Monday August 6th, at approximately 8:40pm the Hillsboro Police Department responded to a report of a motor vehicle accident on West Main St at the intersection of Saw Mill Road involving a car and a bicycle. Hillsboro Police were assisted by the Antrim Police Department and Hillsboro Fire and Rescue.

On scene it was determined that a

vehicle traveling West on West Main St was turning left onto Saw Mill Road when the vehicle collided with a bicycle being ridden by a 16 year old Hillsboro male, who suffered compound fractures of both arms and one leg.

The bicycle was traveling East on West Main Street at the time of the incident. Hillsboro Rescue treated the 16 year old at the scene and transported him to Grimes Field where he was picked up by the DART helicopter and flown to Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center. The operator of the car was: Marcia Whitney, 46, of Hillsboro. Investigation into the accident is still on going. Anyone who has information about the accident should contact Sgt. #### **Grand Jury indicts three Antrim men**

Kyle Rajaniemi, 30,has been indicted for operating after being certified as a habitual offender and reckless conduct with a deadly weapon for allegedly driving at speeds in excess of the speed limit in unsafe driving conditions while attempting to elude an officer, with a three-year-old boy who was not wearing a seatbelt in the vehicle. Both charges are Class B felonies. Jeffrey Shea, 44, was indicted for reckless conduct when he allegedly discharged a firearm inside his home while his son was present. The charge is a Class B felony and carries with it a potential extended sentence of 10 to 30 years. Chapin Whiting, 27, was indicted for witness tampering for allegedly attempting to induce a witness to withhold information while she was being interviewed by a police officer.

#### Burst beaver dam overflows Epsom's Rt 4

A flood washed over Route 4 in Epsom on Monday night during evening commute time, snarling traffic and damaging the road. A burst beaver dam is to blame for the flooding. Roadblocks were set up near the Epsom traffic circle and Main Street in Chichester to keep traffic off the affected stretch of Route 4 while workers tried to find the source of the flooding. They eventually found the burst dam less than a half mile away on an unnamed pond. Crews will monitor the water levels downstream and will be back to repair the damage to the road's shoulder.

#### **Bennington Village Historic Walking Tour**

Bennington is an extraordinarily well-preserved example of a Northern New England mill village. The Monadnock Center for History and Culture and the Bennington Historical Society will host a walking tour through the village and examine the two centuries of history encompassed in this small town center. The walking tour will be held on Saturday, August 11 at 10:30 a.m. The walk will begin at the Bennington Historical Society located at 38 Main Street. This walking tour will take approximately 90 minutes and will be held rain or shine. Participants are encouraged to wear comfortable shoes and to bring a water bottle. The tour is free and all are welcome.

### Henniker Board reviews ambitious highway maintenance projects

Vice Chair, Tia Hooper opened Tuesday's Henniker Select Board meeting with high praise for the efforts of the 250th Anniversary Committee which resulted in a fantastic weekend celebration.

Accepting the report and recommendation of the Energy Committee, the Board unanimously approved a contract with Affinity Lighting to replace the town's street lights at a cost of \$24,575.21. After a \$7,825.00 rebate the net cost to taxpayers will be \$16.675.21.

With projected energy savings of \$8,000 per year the conversion will be paid off in just over two years.

Highway Superintendent Leo Aucoin offered three bids totaling \$267,670.00 which would provide reclamation and repaving of Ramsdell and Ruffle Roads and a 1" shim of Gulf Road from Butter to Flanders. The Board approved.

Engineer Mike Vignale recommended awarding RD Edmunds the bid for the Hall Avenue project. Road and sidewalk work will cost \$309,667.00 while water system work entails another \$220,566.00. Again the Board approved.

Vignale then outlined several future

projects facing the town: Phase II of Western Avenue from Cody Hill to the town line is projected at \$1,041,475.00, while Phase III, from Main Street to The Oaks comes in at \$840,000.00.

The Board then changed the date of its next meeting from August 21st to the 23rd, so members could attend the season's last concert at the Angela Robinson Bandstand.

#### Hilton Inn honors Weare Fire & Rescue

When a Hillsborough man was trapped in an industrial lathe with his upper body crushed, chances of survival were faint. Nick Keane, 21, however, lived through the horrifying March incident thanks to the quick response of the Weare Fire and Rescue Association. They stabilized the badly injured man and coordinated the arrival of the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Advanced Response Team to airlift him to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center in Lebanon. After spending nearly a month in the hospital, including 10 days in the intensive care unit, and having five surgeries performed on him, Keane eventually returned home and is continuing his road to recovery.

Keane was on hand when the Manchester honored the members of the Weare Fire and Rescue for their service by donating \$3,000 to the volunteer association during the Greater Manchester Chamber of Commerce's monthly Spotlight on Business. Twenty-five bags of non-perishable foods and personal items, which were used as centerpieces during the event, were also donated to the Weare Food Bank.

This is the third year HGI management has selected an organization to support during the annual chamber event they host.

Nick joined his mother Mandy Keane, the front desk manager at HGI Manchester, for the presentation.

"It's amazing what they did to keep him alive," Mandy Keane says. "When we started this two years ago, we wanted to make sure we were helping organizations that were making a difference", says Sharon Nista, Director of Sales for HGI Manchester. "These brave men and women are truly making a difference."




