New England College Economic Impact reaches \$161 Million locally

A new economic impact study shows that New England College contributes significantly to its host community of Henniker, NH, and the surrounding region, directly enhancing the local economy and quality of life for local businesses and citizens. The study found that New England College generates \$161 million in economic impact each year for the local community. In addition to direct and indirect expenditures, New England College pays \$403,000 annually in local property taxes, making the College the largest property tax payer in Henniker.

"As a not-for-profit, private, higher education institution, New England College plays a key role in positively impacting our local and state community," said President Michele Perkins. "We work hard at being a good neighbor and community partner. We provide high quality jobs and draw students and families into the area who likely would never visit Henniker if the College was not located here."

New England College has an annual operating budget in excess of \$55 million and a payroll of almost \$15 million. The report highlights New England College's economic investment in the local community, including an estimate of student and family community expenditures of \$2.7 million annually.

The study also estimates that New England College employees spend over \$1 million locally each year at local retail stores and restaurants. With over 585 full and part-time employees the College estimations are likely below the actual impact on the greater Henniker community.

"This important report confirms what we have known for a long time, that institutions like New England College have tremendous economic, educational, and social impact in their local communities," said Mike Vlacich, President of the New Hampshire College & University Council (NHCUC), a statewide consortium of public and private colleges and universities in Concord, NH. "Not only do New Hampshire colleges and universities, like New England College, provide world-class educational experiences for their students, but they also provide vital support to their local communities, the state, and the country."

President Perkins added, "Small, private, non-profit colleges generate significant economic benefits for their communities that may not be well understood by our neighbors, government officials, and other stakeholders, which makes this report so necessary. We appreciate all the benefits of being located in Henniker, NH, and look forward to being an important part of the community moving forward." In 2021 New England College will celebrate the 75th anniversary of its founding in Henniker.

Goffstown Police arrest man who fled scene

Goffstown Police arrested Jesse Rondeau, 27, of Manchester for driving as a habitual offender and for having left the scene of a head-on, three-car collision that injured three last month in Goffstown, according to police. Authorities had been looking for Rondeau, maintaining that he had fled the scene of the three-car crash on Back Road on July 21. Officers arrived and found the male operator of a Nissan with serious injuries. A passenger of that car was also transported to an area hospital with unknown injuries. The third person brought for evaluation was a passenger in the Nissan Xterra that officials said Rondeau had been driving.

Representative Daniel Eaton (D-Stoddard) reprimanded by NH House

New Hampshire Public Radio has reported that Rep. Dan Eaton of Stoddard, one of the longest-serving Democrats in the New Hampshire Legislature, was reprimanded earlier this year after a State House employee reported that he had engaged in "a long pattern of behavior" that created a "hostile work environment."

The complaint alleges Eaton, 62, came into her office on April 26 and said to a colleague, "If you want to have a fun day, just walk into the room and tell [the complainant], I'm male - and I suck. Because she hates all men." When the complainant confronted Eaton, "he laughed and said, "I'm just messing with you," according to the complaint. The complainant wrote that

she replied, "Yes, you are," and then left the room. "This is just one incident in a long pattern of behavior that has made me feel uncomfortable. He constantly refers to me as 'the old bat' and sometimes the 'granny in the corner,' " the complaint reads. Eaton has served 14 terms in the House, has been a member of the powerful House Finance

Committee for a decade and served as floor leader for the House when Democrats held the majority.

He has also served on the Executive Committee of the New Hampshire Democratic Party and was police chief of his hometown of Stoddard for more than a decade in the 1970s and 1980s.

Less than half of patients received their insurer's approval for prescriptions of PCSK9 inhibitors, according to new research in the American Heart Association's journal *Circulation*. PCSK9 inhibitors, like Repatha (evolocumab) and Praluent (alirocumab), work by increasing the removal of low-density lipoprotein (LDL) or "bad" cholesterol from the blood. They have been shown to reduce LDL by 60 percent and decrease major cardiac events but cost much more than other


cholesterol-lowering drugs, with an average cost of \$14,3000 per year. Prescriptions require prior authorization by health insurance companies. The most significant factor associated with approval rates was insurance type, with the lowest approval rates for private insurance and the highest approval for Medicare.

New research examines the safety of mefloquine (Lariam) for preventing malaria in travelers. A Cochrane review brings together over 50 randomized and non-randomized studies, enrolling over 1,000,000 people, and compares mefloquine with all the alternatives in common use. While mefloquine was found to be at least as effective as other options, there can be no doubt that it does cause more sleeplessness, abnormal dreams, anxiety and depressed mood than the alternatives.

A new study published in *JAMA Internal Medicine* has found that use of the blood thinner warfarin was associated with lower risk of any cancer and of three of the most common cancers (prostate, lung, female breast) compared to warfarin non-use. In the subgroup of people using warfarin for atrial fibrillation or atrial flutter, cancer risk was lower at any size and in all four common sites (lung, prostate, breast, and colon). Warfarin is a widely used anticoagulant prescribed to as many as 10 percent of adults in Western countries.

Center Woods and Weare Middle School set for opening

Weare Middle and Center Woods Upper Elementary Schools will share the same start and end times this year with a 7:30 AM start and 2:05 PM end time each day in both schools."This change to a shared time will allow for a better learning environment for both schools. When we were on different schedules, the building would be noisy for those in class while others were coming to school or leaving for the day. It also lends for greater collaboration for staff across the whole building," said the Interim Principal of Weare Middle and Center Woods Elementary Schools Shawne Hilliard. "Last year we held scheduling workshops with community members and staff to see what we needed to add or change about our schedule," said Mrs. Hilliard. "We took those suggestions and were able to create a school day that allowed Weare Middle School to have consistent Flex Block times, E-Cubed opportunities, recess for 6th graders, and in 7th and 8th grade, a 15 minute scheduled outdoor break," she continued." Deans Phil Matzke and Brett Gottheimer and I are excited for the new school year for all the students in our shared building," concluded Mrs. Hilliard. Judge rejects aggravated DWI plea deal

Joseph Mays, 30, of Keene has been charged with aggravated DWI and DWI following an accident on November 10th, which seriously injured Merissa Aldrich, 33, of Peterborough and her 3-year-old daughter in a head-on crash in Hancock. Mays' case was scheduled sentencing on a plea arrangement, but the judge rejected the deal, saying the case should go to trial. A trial date is not scheduled at this time.

Hopkinton traffic detoured near dam

A portion of Route 127, Maple Street, in Hopkinton will be closed to through traffic from Monday, August 20, for about 10 weeks while a penstock can be replaced. The project is part of an upgrade of Hopkinton's hydroelectric dam, a detour that uses Interstate 89 and U.S. Route 202. Route 127 will still be accessible from both sides, but you won't be able to drive through. The 1-megawatt power plant that uses the penstock will be upgraded, during this time.

Congresswoman tours Newport Health

Rep. Ann Kuster toured the Newport Health Center Monday and spoke with local health care providers about the issues facing them. Bruce King, CEO of New London Hospital, of which the Newport Health Center is an affiliate, reminded Kuster that one year and eight months ago, the new building on John Stark Highway opened where the old clinic once stood. The \$9 million facility was built with \$2 million in local support. It provides primary care and a wide range of outpatient services, including minor surgical procedures, women's health care, lab, and EKG.

Loudon's Big Apple store closing soon

The Big Apple Store in Loudon, next to New Hampshire Motor Speedway, will shut its doors resulting in six employees losing their jobs. CN Brown, the company that owns Big Apple, told employees that business has declined since New Hampshire Motor Speedway surrendered one of its two major NASCAR races to Las Vegas last year. Some of the Loudon workers had been offered positions at the Big Apple Store in Tilton.

Peterborough Detox Center approved by Planning Board

The Peterborough Planning Board has given final approval to a proposed 64-bed detox center. The 1810 Realty Group, plans to build the detox center at 25 and 30 Bridge Street, behind the Peterborough Plaza off Route 101. Developers obtained a variance from the ZBA in June, which allows the detox center to operate in the village district, leaving a site plan review by the Planning Board as the last approval needed before the center can be constructed. The facility will be about 30,000 square feet, and hold 32 beds for detoxing patients, and 32 for those post-detox, transitioning to the next stage of treatment. The facility will provide between 50 and 70 new jobs for the area.


Dear Editor:

Goffstown rejects changing name to "Select Board"

The Goffstown Selectmen, on a 3-2 vote, decided to keep their current name, rather than changing it to the Select Board. Chairman Peter Georgantas joined members Mark Lemay and John "Allen" Brown in the majority.

"I don't see any reason to change something that we've had in this town for no reason," said Georgantas. "There's no reason for it, there's nothing that's compelling us to do it except that it sounds good, I guess? I'm not really sure."

The change was first proposed by Goffstown resident Karen Hewes in July. She said that changing the name from Board of Selectmen to Select Board would be a move toward a more gender inclusive environment. Selectwoman Kelly Boyer,

who joined Seletman David Pierce in the minority, asked Town Administrator Adam Jacobs to research the impacts that a name change would have on Goffstown's government. Jacobs said that the change would have a minimal affect on the town, saving that things like text on the town website and the banner on the town's government internet video stream could be changed within the week.

While Jacobs noted that the board would likely require new stationary and other physical signage, he estimated that the cost of new supplies would range somewhere between \$100 and \$200. Jacobs reported that at least 40 other New Hampshire towns that have made the change to Select Board.

Giunta leads effort to override veto

Franklin Mayor, Tony Giunta is one of eleven of NH's 13 mayors who support a letter to legislators asking them to override Gov. Chris Sununu's vetoes of two energy-related bills. The letter, drawn up by Giunta and Mayor Karen Weston of Dover asks the House and Senate to reverse the governor's position on Senate Bill 365, which would have required utilities to purchase power from New Hampshire's six independent biomass power plants; and Senate Bill 466, which would have expanded net metering – a system that allows smaller power generators to get credits for electricity they send to the grid. Supporters say the bills would have resulted in cheaper energy. Detractors saw them as subsidies that are passed on to consumers, driving up the cost of electricity in the state. Only Laconia's Ed Engler and Concord's Jim Bouley have declined to support the effort.

Supreme Court to hear NHMS concerts

After losing in Merrimack County Superior Court, Jim Snyder and two other Canterbury residents have appealed to the New Hampshire Supreme Court, saying they believe NHMS should not be allowed to host a country music festival next summer. They cite an agreement with the track made in 1989 that doesn't allow stand-alone concerts. But in May, a Superior Court judge ruled that only applies to the grandstands and racetrack, not the southern end of the property that was purchased later, where the concerts would take place next summer. The trio is currently representing themselves and said they are optimistic about their chances.




