## New Boston Police sued

### Claims high speed chase violated department policy

Aaron Hodgdon, of Weare, one of the passengers involved in a fatal car crash in Weare in 2015, is suing the New Boston Police department and the officer who pursued the vehicle across town lines.

The suit accuses New Boston Police Sgt. Stephen Case of negligence and reckless conduct by violating the department's pursuit policy when he followed a truck from New Boston to Weare on July 3, 2015. Three teenagers – Hodgdon, Benjamin Cook and Trevor Gonyer

of Dunbarton, were ejected from the vehicle during the rollover crash. Gonyer died; while Hodgdon and Cook suffered serious injuries.

The suit was filed July 2 – one day before the statute of limitations expired, names Case and New Boston's Police department, claiming the department was "vicariously liable" for Case's actions as his employer. Hodgdon is seeking compensation for "personal injuries, chronic medical conditions and corresponding emotional distress and lost wages."

## NEC welcomes another large freshman class to school

A freshmen class of about 475 first-year students assembled at New England College last Friday, a class that is above the recent average of about 350 new students, and almost as large as the 490 who reported last fall.

The college's goal is to increase the size of the student body from roughly 600 a decade ago to about 900 currently, to a target of 1,500 in future years.

That figure was based both on finances, available and future facilities, and surveys ask-

ing people what size they thought would best suit the campus.

Many small colleges throughout New England are trying to cope with a slow decline in the number of graduating seniors in the region, some by dropping and changing majors to differentiate themselves, others by trying to grow their enrollment. NEC is also trying to boost its endowment and says it has raised \$36 million in its first capital campaign, which has a goal of \$37 million.



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## Duncan Jenkins funding for Performing Arts Center not guaranteed

Trustee Douglas Hatfield, on behalf of the Duncan-Jenkins Grant Committee has written a letter to clarify the Trust's position regarding the much talked about \$8-\$10 million Performing Arts auditorium. Hatfield believes that much of the re-

cent publicity has created a misperception as to what role the Duncan-Jenkins Trust can or will play. He states that "First, it is important to understand there is no current commitment on behalf of the Duncan-Jenkins Trust or its Grant Committee to participate in funding." (Emphasis added)

## Henniker Police, Fire and Rescue Chiefs meet with the Select Board

The Henniker Select Board entertained requests from the Chiefs of the Police, Fire and Rescue Departments at Tuesday's meeting. Police Chief Matt French requested an increase in the rates charged for private details. He told the Board that Henniker is the cheapest detail billing rate in the area, billing out at \$55 per hour, and requested an increase to \$68.00 per hour. Not content to just catch up, the Board approved a rate of \$70 and attached the rate to future cost of living increases.

Fire Chief Jim Morse and Rescue Chief Tom French asked the Board to consider allowing station coverage, of 7 days a week, 12 hours a day with two full time supervisors. This will be a 4 day on 4 day off schedule. The pay will not be an increase to the budget. We will pay 2 full time people for the year including benefits, the exact same as they pay Nick Costello, who will be retired on 8/31/2018 after 17 years of service. Both Chiefs and the Board applauded Costello, who is assuming a full-time position with the Concord Fire Department. Morse and French emphasized that they have had 78 unfilled shifts, mainly weekends. This means less than adequate service and longer wait times for people in need of an

ambulance. The department loses \$2000-\$4000 per call when it doesn't have 2 EMT's to man the ambulance. With that being said they have missed 18 calls this year.

That is an estimated loss of \$36,000.00 to \$72,000.00. Chair Kris Blomback delayed voting until next meeting when the cost could be projected out over 5-10 years.

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# TAKE YOUR MEDICINE

Atrial fibrillation is an irregular heart rhythm that increases ischemic stroke risk. To reduce this risk, patients often receive treatment with the blood thinner warfarin, which has been in use since the 1950s, or a newer alternative such as dabigatran, approved by FDA in late 2010. A new analysis published in the *Annals of Internal Medicine* showed that both medications were associated with similar rates of ischemic stroke and overall bleeding. However, people taking dabigatran were less likely to experience bleeding in the brain, which can be dangerous or deadly. These findings were consistent with the results of prior clinical trials that compared the two drugs. The study also addressed heart attack rates associated with each drug, but the results were inconclusive. Patients on dabigatran were more likely to experience a heart attack than patients on warfarin, but the statistical strength and consistency of this finding was unclear.

The drug metformin, typically prescribed to treat type 2 diabetes, keeps breast cancer cells from developing multiple drug resistance (MDR) and can reverse MDR after it's appeared, according to a study published December 6, 2017 in the journal *PLOS ONE*.

In a new study published in the *Journal of the American Association of Dermatology*, researchers have identified a clear connection between the use of the hypertension medicine hydrochlorothiazide and the chance of developing squamous cell carcinoma. The researchers have previously demonstrated that the medicine, which is one of the most commonly used drugs worldwide, can increase the risk of lip cancer. Hydrochlorothiazide belongs to a class of drugs known as diuretics (water pills). It works by causing you to make more urine. This helps your body get rid of extra salt and water.

## Site Evaluation Committee to rule on Antrim Wind ownership transfer

Walden Green Energy Northeast Wind LLC and Walden Antrim LLC, subsidiaries of Walden Green Energy, LLC have filed a joint petition with the NH Site Evaluation Committee requesting the appointment of a three-member subcommittee to review and approve the transfer interests in Antrim Wind Energy, LLC to Antrim Level LLC, a subsidiary of TransAlta Corp.

Antrim Wind Energy has already

submitted a notice for the start of construction of the Antrim Wind Project to install nine turbines along Tuttle Hill and Willard Mountain. The company plans for the project to reach commercial operation by August 30, 2019. Antrim Level is currently providing financing for the project. If the

change in ownership falls through, Antrim Wind Energy will complete construction and repay the debt owed to Antrim Level. An order appointing a subcommittee was issued and a pre-hearing conference has been set for September 25th. A public hearing has yet to be scheduled.

### Three vehicle Antrim accident

A mowing tractor operated by Cody Carroll, 27, of Stoddard was mowing on Route 9 with a state truck and was parked toward oncoming traffic when Liam Burns, 22, of Abington, MA, came around the corner giving the state truck a berth, putting his vehicle partially into the opposite lane. When Burns turned back into the eastbound lane to avoid oncoming traffic, he struck the tire of the mower. As Burns came to a stop, his vehicle was struck from behind by a Chevrolet pick up, driven by Daniel Byron, 46, of Hillsborough. Both vehicles sustained damage from the impact, but were able to be driven from the scene.

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Route 149 in Deering was reopened after a van caught fire on August 18th. The car fire happened around 3 p.m. near Wolf Hill Road. Police arrived to find the 1994 Ford Clubwagon van fully engulfed in flames. The driver and passenger were able to get out safely. During the fire, the tires, batteries and fuel tank began to rupture and explode. The road reopened about two hours later. No injuries were reported.



The Henniker Police have released no information in relation to this two-car crash on Route 202 last week.



As we go to press, no detail have been reported on this head-on collision Sunday on Route 114 between Goffstown and Weare.

## Greenfield woman injured in UTV crash

A Greenfield woman had to be flown to a Massachusetts hospital for treatment Friday after a Utility Terrain Vehicle she was in rolled on top of her. Sean Ferreira, 34, of Antrim, was driving the vehicle in a muddy area near 31 Webster Highway at a high rate of speed, Fish and Game officials said in a statement. Joanna Adams, 18, was a passenger. Ferreira lost control and the UTV rolled over several times, coming to rest on Adams' leg. Neither she nor Ferreira were wearing helmets or other safety gear, according to Fish and Game. After the UTV was lifted off Adams, she was airlifted to UMass Memorial Medical Center. The accident is under investigation.

Three area contests have been strongly contested and offer us a clear choice in the qualifications and temperament of the candidates. Obviously, your opinion is as good as mine. However, if you are a fellow Republican who remains undecided, I offer the following suggestions for you to consider.*

**U.S. Congress District 1**

**EDDIE EDWARDS** is the former chief of police for the town of South Hampton. He served as Chief of New Hampshire State Division of Liquor Enforcement, and under his leadership the Division



became New Hampshire's first statewide law enforcement agency to receive the distinction of Advanced National Law Enforcement Accreditation. ## Hancock approves Charter School Study Committee

The Hancock Select Board was informed that the School Board voted to submit a Warrant Article, for March, to close all elementary schools, and may offer the buildings to the towns, but would not allow charter schools.

According to Chair John Jordan, the Town's ground lease for the elementary school prevents the School Board from putting that restriction on Hancock. He recommended the Select Board start a Charter

School Study Committee, as there is a need to have an implementation plan in place if the School Board Warrant passes in March. Jordan also informed the Selectboard of a stipulation in the ground lease that would require the school district to pay for the removal of the building if the town chose to have it removed. Jordan moved to establish a Charter School Study Committee, Bryan seconded the motion; the motion was unanimously opposed.

## Antrim Wind blasting to continue for four months

On Monday, Antrim Fire Chief Marshall Gale issued a cease and desist order for blasting at the Antrim Wind Project site because a notification of blasting was not submitted as required, 24 hours in advance.

Blasting resumed Tuesday, after the proper notifications had been submitted.

Gale reports that the 24 hour notification, along with a one hour notification, prior to any blasting activity on the Antrim Wind Project had been previously agreed to by all parties as a procedure to follow. Blasting for the project began last Friday and is expected to last for the next four months.

## Northfield woman pleads guilty for fentanyl trafficking

Alisha Morin, 30, of Northfield pled guilty to trafficking fentanyl from Massachusetts to New Hampshire, and will be sentenced December 10th on a charge of participating in a conspiracy to distribute

fentanyl.

Authorities claimed Morin had ordered over 400 grams of fentanyl from the drug distributors in Massachusetts between February 23rd and April 25th.

## Sunapee Gardners secure town's \$\$\$\$ assistance

Betsy Lyons, President of the Sunapee Gardners, along with two dozen of her purple shirted colleagues met with the Select Board to make two requests.

First that the town increase it's current \$1,600 allotment to the club to maintain

the memorial Garden in the harbor to \$2,500. Second that the town assume the annual maintenance of the irrigation system for both the Memorial and raised bed gardens. The Board unanimously approved both.
