Superintendent Steven Chamberlin introduced Jay Burgess, Facility Chair, to give an update on the school facility project. Burgess stated after last year's School District meeting the charge changed and the focus is now on the Middle/High School. He outlined the areas of focus being deferred maintenance, security, accessibility and educational space. ### Loudon Elementary School students hold Trash On the Lawn Day

The students of Loudon Elementary spent a very rainy election day (Nov. 6) learning the rules of recycling by conducting a school waste audit, known as Trash On the Lawn Day (T.O.L.D.), in their school gym. Gwen Erley, Sarah McGraw and Lindsay Dow from NRRA's School Recycling CLUB trained 252 students how to identify and pull recyclables from a sampling of typical school trash.


They were assisted by the school's Environmental Kids Club along with their special guests, the members of the Loudon Recycling Committee.

Outfitted with recyclable RightCycle® gloves, each group of students was given several bags of trash which were weighed, sorted into bins, then weighed again. When sorting was completed the students had a visual record of how much of their "trash" could have been diverted from the landfill. While there was not a lot of waste (an indicator of good recycling), the students still saw opportunities to improve their efforts. The students asked lots of questions and learned that diverting recyclables and reducing food waste saves energy, natural resources and landfill space. As many students recycle at home, the members of the Loudon Recycling Committee clarified the recycling rules at the Transfer Station which differ somewhat from the school's recycling policy.

Many thanks to Loudon Elementary Fourth Grade Teacher Brandon Raymond, who heads up the LES Environmental Kids Club and who spearheaded this event. He set up the schedule, organized the class rotations and supervised his student helpers throughout the day. Their help made the cleanup a breeze. Thanks also go out to the teachers who helped keep the students focused and for assisting with the gloves.

Special thanks to Custodian Larry
Hewey, who provided invaluable assistance
with logistics such as covering the gym
floor, setting up tables and chairs, finding
outlets and, most especially, setting up
the cleanup location. This event would not
have been possible without the support and
assistance of Principal Catherine Masterson, who was instrumental in overseeing
this all-day educational event.

Thanks to funding provided by the Loudon Recycling Committee, along with a generous grant from New Hampshire the Beautiful, this event was free to the school.

### Washington firefighter injured responding Rick Brown of Washington told authorities that he pulled

Rick Brown of Washington told authorities that he pulled himself out of Highland Lake after falling through thin ice last Thursday. First responders acted on a report of abandoned fishing gear and someone possibly going through the ice. Thursday afternoon it proved unfounded, though they found footprints on the lake around a hole in the ice. Later Thursday night, fire officials contacted Brown, who told them he had gotten himself out of the water but did not pick up his gear before he left. During the search, Washington's ambulance service transported a firefighter Sam Atkins to Concord Hospital for treatment after the thin ice gave way beneath him. Officials said he suffered a shoulder injury.

### Belmont woman convicted of theft 3rd time

Janell Dubreuil, 32, of Belmont has been sentenced to the Belknap County House of Corrections after pleading guilty to a reduced charge of theft. Dubreuil pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of theft by unauthorized taking involving items worth less than \$1,000. She had been facing a felony level charge of theft by unauthorized taking, an enhanced charge due to her two prior convictions for theft. As part of the negotiated plea, Judge James D. O'Neill III sentenced Dubreuil to 12 months in the House of Correction with six months suspended on condition of two years good behavior, and credit for the 112 days she had already spent in confinement.

### Bennington holding unique holiday parade

Bennington's recreation committee is hosting the town's first annual lighted truck and tractor parade on December 2nd at 5 PM. All vehicles and floats must have holiday lights, as it will be dark during the actual parade. Trucks, tractors, Jeeps, cars, and trailers are all allowed. The darkness of the evening also means no walkers or marchers or throwing candy or other items. No pre-registration is required. The parade lines up on Eaton Avenue heading toward the Historical Society and travels the following route: Eaton Avenue to Main Street to Acre Street to School Street. The parade is a part of a larger town wide event that begins at 3:30 p.m. The event includes a petting zoo, holiday treats, children's activities, a wreath sale, a lighting of the town's Christmas tree, and a live nativity in front of the Bennington Congregational Church at 4:30 p.m.



### Rita Murdough gets Spirit of NH Service Award

On the evening of November 13th, Rita Murdough, a long time parishioner of St. Theresa Parish, received a Spirit of NH Service Award for her many volunteer activities. For the past 14 years, Rita has taught CCD, cleaned the church and narthex every other Saturday and coordinates the Saturday Cleaning Crew. She has been the coordinator of the Family Promise Program, caring for the homeless at St. Theresa for the past four years. She also has been involved with the Kairos Ministry which is the prison ministry in NH for a number of years and is now the treasurer/accountant. The recognition this award represents is well deserved.

### Belmont neighbors rally to support local couple

Neighbors of a Belmont couple who lost their home, farm and many of their animals to a fire are stepping up to help. On the night before Thanksgiving, the five-alarm fire at Laran Farm drew the attention of everyone nearby. "And I looked out my sliding glass window and the whole sky was just glowing orange, bright orange," said neighbor Rhiannon Fee. Larry and Ann-Marie Carpenter got out safely but their house and barn were destroyed. The Carpenters also lost a dog, a cat and about a dozen goats. Three police officers suffered smoke inhalation trying to save them. The Carpenters are now trying to get back on their feet. With their animals safe and a GoFundMe account set up for them, their community is helping in every way possible.

### Epsom asked to vote for an all-day kindergarten

The Epsom School Board is asking residents to support a full-day kindergarten program, which would begin in the fall of 2019. Neighboring towns of Allenstown, Chichester, Pembroke and Deerfield, which share a school district with Epsom, have all implemented full-day programs. Epsom is one of only 15 towns in the state that still uses a half-day program. The Epsom committee on full-day kindergarten estimates a full-day program would require the district hires one additional teacher and one additional paraprofessional, for a total of about \$135,000 in new spending. About \$10,000 of that cost would be a one-time supply cost.

### Quick action by Goffstown first responders prevents more contamination

Goffstown Firefighters responded to a report of a fuel oil truck overturned on an icy road last Sunday, leaking hundreds of gallons of heating oil near a brook that feeds the town's water supply. Fire crews removed the driver, who was not injured, from the tanker truck around 7:30 a.m. The crash took place on a curvy stretch of Mountain Road, uphill from the Upper Reservoir along Whittle Brook, Goffstown. Fire Chief Richard O'Brien said that the primary concern was the fact that the town's water system is only about a quarter mile down the street. An Irving crew arrived to pump the remaining oil from the

crashed truck into an empty tanker sent by the company.

O'Brien believes that about 500 to 700 gallons may have leaked from the truck. Absorbent berms and pads were used to soak up the oil, blocking the flow at a small culvert under the road and stopping it from reaching the brook. Firefighters worked in the cold, soaking up the

contaminated water with pads that were placed in containers that could be hauled away.

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services was also on the scene, working with the company's spill response contractor to get the fuel that has contaminated the area and avoid the petroleum impacting the water supply.

### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Pembrolizumab, an antibody drug already used to treat other forms of cancer, can be effective in the treatment of the most common form of mesothelioma, according to a new study published in *The Lancet Oncology*. Malignant pleural mesothelioma is a rare and aggressive cancer that represents about 90 percent of all malignant mesothelioma cases. It is primarily caused by the inhalation of asbestos, a fiber commonly found in some forms

of insulation, vinyl floor tiles, and other material. Tumors form in the pleura, a thin membrane of cells that line the lungs and chest wall. Most patients survive less than a year. This poor prognosis is partially due to the fact that most patients are not diagnosed until they are already at a late stage of the disease. The standard first-line therapy treatment involves chemotherapy, and currently there is no approved second-line therapy.

Patients with age-related macular degeneration who received seven or more eye injections of the drug bevacizumab annually had a higher risk of having glaucoma surgery, according to a new study published in *JAMA Ophthalmology*.

A study published in *ACS Chemical Neuroscience* has found that the drug lorcaserin, prescribed for weight loss, reduced the use and craving for the opioid oxycodone. According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the number of deaths from prescription opiate overdose in America has quadrupled since 1999. High relapse rates and too few people remaining in treatment programs long enough for it to really benefit them continues to pose major challenges in treatment for the misuse of prescription opiates such as oxycodone and illegal opiates such as heroin.

### **Big Win for the Taxpayers**

On November 6 over 400,000 New Hampshire voters approved Constitutional Amendment #1 restoring the right of an average taxpayer to challenge illegal governmental spending in court.

For 150 years this had been the law until our Supreme Court decided the case of Duncan v. State of New Hampshire in 2014. At that point, the court adopted the restrictive federal standing requirements claiming they are the same under both Constitutions.

An overwhelming response by the legislature to amend the Constitution was forthcoming because the decision made no sense. Our Constitution was in effect for several years before there even was a federal Constitution, so the idea that the two documents are identical is wrong.

The challenge for both conservatives and liberals was to figure out how to gain support from the voters for an amendment that is hard to explain and contains 213 words. An analysis of the amendment revealed it would take almost a full minute just to read it and the ballot question was rated by linguists at a grade 13 level of readability, meaning that one would have to have high school plus one year of college education to read it and understand it.

A bipartisan coalition chaired by me with Bill Duncan as the Vice Chairman was created to raise money to provide information to the voters.

The "Yes on NH #1" Political Action Committee included a former Republican Mayor of Manchester, Ray Wieczorek, and a former Democratic Mayor of Manchester, Sylvio Dupuis. Representatives in the legislature included Bob Backus from Manchester, who is a well known liberal and progressive voice, as well as Dan McGuire, a libertarian and conservative from the Republican side of the aisle. Both political parties and both candidates for Governor supported Amendment 1 making it truly bipartisan in an era of warring tribes.

The Yes on NH 1 Committee was able to raise about \$16,000 which resulted in an internet presence with 35,440 Facebook users, three Sunday newspaper ads and 30,000 palm cards. In addition, ads on WMUR and 500 yard signs urging a "yes" vote were part of the mix.

In the end, Yes on NH 1 worked hard in getting the word out, especially since Massachusetts TV was confusing us with Yes

on 1 in Massachusetts that had to do with nurse staffing levels. It failed.

The end result is an Amendment to our Bill of Rights that restored Government accountability to the taxpayers. The 83% approval was 406,685 yes and 84,337 no votes.

Wendy Curry took the oath of office on November 19, 2018 as the newest member of the Weare School Board. Ms. Curry will


