Hillsborough Mini Meeting It doesn't take voters long to spend \$9 million

Hillsborough's Town Meeting began at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday evening and by 8:45 residents were leaving to return home. During that time voters managed to approve the proposed \$7,609,842.00 operating budget and another \$1,587,804.00 to fund the Sewer and Water Departments.

Several Capital Reserve Funds were replenished, including: \$50,000 for Highway Equipment; \$75,000 for Ambulance; \$100,000

Newport teachers celebrating new three year contract

Newport teachers are celebrating approval of their new 3-year contract which passed only by 17 votes in a record turnout of 1,245 voters. Contract increases for 2019-20 will be \$347,127. The amount in 2020-21 is pegged at \$301,693 and for 2021-22, \$139,194. The district's proposed \$18,963,855 operating budget passed by a more

ConVal School District files lawsuit against the State of NH

The Contoocook Valley School District filed a lawsuit against the state on Wednesday, claiming the state is in violation of a Supreme Court decision on adequate funding.

"The ConVal School Board has not taken this step lightly, it is time for the State to fulfill its promise to our children and to bring relief to the local taxpayers," said ConVal Superintendent Kimberly Rizzo Saunders in a statement released Wednesday. Rich Cahoon, of Antrim, the vice chairman of the ConVal School Board, said the district, like many others in the state, is tired of waiting for New Hampshire's government to follow the Supreme Court ruling.

"We are unwilling to keep waiting," Cahoon said. In 1997, the New Hampshire Supreme Court ruled in what is known as the Claremont case that the state's education funding system was unconstitutional and that the state has a constitutional obligation to provide adequate funding to pay for public schools. Claremont and other property-poor towns sued the state because they contended that using property taxes to pay for local education left poor towns with low property values at a near-constant financial disadvantage. Executive Councilor Andru Volinsky, D-Concord, was one of the lead attorneys in the Claremont lawsuit. While he and his Claremont lawsuit compatriots have no involvement with the ConVal lawsuit, he said the state is still failing to adhere to the Claremont decision.

"It's our position that the state's been out of compliance for 20 years," he said.

The failure to adhere to the school funding ruling has been a bipartisan problem, as it stretches across both Republican and Democratic administrations, Volinsky said. Gov. Chris Sununu said the lawsuit isn't the way to solve New Hampshire's funding problems.

"As history has shown, the only people who win in these lawsuits are the lawyers and the problem never gets solved," Sununu said.

Sununu said his administration is working to increase local aid, and pointed to increased funding for school building projects and school safety investments. While the state has been providing adequacy grants to districts, Cahoon said that that money is simply not enough. The state is paying \$3,636 per pupil in adequacy grants now, and the figure is expected to go up to \$3,700 in the coming school year. "Our per-pupil cost is around \$18,000," Cahoon said.

Rizzo Saunders said the grants don't come close to addressing the many public school expenses that are pushed onto local taxpayers, such as transportation, food services, and funding for state and federal education mandates.

While the state Legislature is considering some education funding changes, those proposals do not address the real issue, which is the baseline adequacy, Rizzo Saunders said.

Hopkinton School District voters OK \$9.8 million bond

Hopkinton voters were still streaming into the gym when Moderator James Newsom called the annual School District Meeting to order on Saturday. After taxpayers rejected a \$30 million bond last year for facility improvements, officials reworked the proposal, bringing the cost down to under \$9.8 million. The bond was easily approved by 78% of the 652 voters present. A two-thirds majority also supported a \$20.5 budget.

The project calls for improvements and updates at all three of the town's schools,

including updating the science labs in the middle-high school, which were last updated more than 20 years ago, four additional classrooms at Harold Martin, and address several deferred maintenance projects.

Bow voters spend little time approving all articles on the warrant

A sparse crowd, by Bow standards, took little time to deal with this year's warrant at Wednesday's Town Meeting. In just over an hour voters approved every article, including the \$11.78 million budget, which was up about \$100,000 over last year's. Voters' contentment can be attributed to the fact that the municipal tax rate dropped 3.21% to a projected \$7.83 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

During Tuesday's voting, voters approved a zoning amendment making the area a mixed use district, and followed it up at Wednesday evening's meeting by approving establishment of the TIF district and granting administrative authority to the board of selectmen. A petition warrant article to increase the town's tax credit to \$4,000 for veterans living with a serviceconnected total disability was also approved after being moved up from article 19 to 4.

Also approved was \$548,000 to be deposited in various capital reserve funds for bridge and highway construction (\$120,000), public works equipment (\$180,000), fire department equipment (\$37,000), police equipment (\$30,000),

recreation improvements (\$16,000), municipal buildings and grounds (\$65,000), and a fire truck (\$100,000).

The green light was also given to \$370,000 for road repairs and paving;

\$38,892 for new police radios for officers and cruisers, \$675,000 for a new pumper truck for the fire department to be paid for through a capital reserve fund with no affect to the tax rate.

WHAT TO EXPECT WITH **OTH EXTRACTIO**



Dentists and oral surgeons (dentists with special training to perform surgery) perform tooth extractions. Before pulling the tooth, your dentist will give you an injection of a local anesthetic to numb the area where the tooth will be removed. In some instances, your dentist may use a strong general anesthetic. This will prevent pain throughout vour body and make you sleep through the procedure.

If the tooth is impacted, the dentist will cut away gum and bone tissue that cover the tooth and then, using forceps, grasp the tooth and gently rock it back and forth to loosen it from the jaw bone and ligaments that hold it in place. Sometimes, a hard-to-pull tooth must be removed in pieces.

Once the tooth has been pulled, a blood clot usually forms in the socket. The dentist will pack a gauze pad into the socket and have you bite down on it to help stop the bleeding. Sometimes the dentist will place a few stitches—usually the self-dissolving variety—to close the gum edges over the extraction site.

Sometimes, the blood clot in the socket breaks loose, exposing the bone in the socket. This is a painful condition called dry socket. If this happens, your dentist will likely place a sedative dressing over the socket for a few days to protect it as a new clot forms.

YOUR MEDIC TAKE



The U.S. Food and Drug Administration today expanded the approval of Xeljanz (tofacitinib) to include adults with moderately to severely active ulcerative colitis. Xeljanz is the first oral medication approved for chronic use in this indication. Other FDA-approved treatments for the chronic treatment of moderately to severely active ulcerative colitis must be administered through an intravenous infusion or subcutaneous injection. Ulcerative colitis is a chronic, inflam-

matory bowel disease affecting the colon. Patients experience recurrent flares of abdominal pain and bloody diarrhea. Other symptoms include fatigue, weight loss and fever. More than 900,000 patients are affected in the U.S., many of them experiencing moderately to severely active ulcerative colitis, and there is currently no cure.

The results of a study presented at the Annual European Congress of Rheumatology demonstrate that canakinumab (ILARIS®) significantly reduced the rate of gout by more than half compared to placebo, regardless of baseline serum urate level.

A study led by Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) investigators identifies two subanesthetic dosage levels of the anesthetic drug ketamine that appear to provide significant symptom relief to patients with treatment-resistant depression. In the October 2018 issue of Molecular Psychiatry they describe finding that single intravenous doses of 0.5 mg/ kg and 1.0 mg/kg were more effective than an active placebo in reducing depression symptoms over a three-day period. Two lower dosage levels that were tested did not provide significant symptom relief, although some improvement was noted with the lowest 0.1 mg/kg dose.

Gangel requests recount in Hopkinton Town Clerk election

Chuck Gangel, Hopkinton's town clerk since 2012, has requested a recount of Tuesday's election results. Former assistant town clerk Carol Harless unseated Gangel by nine votes. A recount is scheduled for Monday at 5:30 p.m. at Town Hall.

Harless tallied 469 votes, edging Gangel's 460 out of 1,324 votes cast, a 1% margin. Amy O'Brien, wife of Select Board Chair Jim O'Brien, came in third with 395 votes. This contest drew particular interest after the select board moved the clerk's office from the Bates building in Contoocook to town hall last fall, without saying why, other than the move was made on the advice of Town Council.

Picoult is Hale Award winner

This year's recipient of the legendary Hale Award is NH author Jodi Picoult. Jodi Picoult is a bestselling author of twenty-five novels including My Sister's Keeper, Nineteen Minutes, The Story-



teller, Leaving Time and her latest book, A Spark of Light.

The Sarah Josepha Hale Award has been presented annually since 1956 and is a New England award given by the trustees of the Richards Free Library in recognition of a distinguished body of work in the field of literature and letters. The award consists of a bronze medal and \$2500.00 honorarium with funding provided by the Holden-Yeomans Memorial Fund. The event is free and open to the public.

Newport man escapes fire after his pet cat wakes him up

New Hampshire Union Leader Officials say a Newport man was able to safely evacuate his burning home after he was woken up by his pet cat early Sunday.

The two-alarm blaze rendered the structure a total loss, but both the man and his pet cat were uninjured, Newport fire officials said.

According to Newport fire officials, around 8:04 a.m. dispatchers received a call from a resident at 289 Maple St. reporting the home was on fire. Upon arrival, fire personnel reported "substantial" fire conditions. At 8:23 a.m, a second alarm was requested for additional tankers to the scene.

A man, whose name was not released, was home at the time of the fire. According to fire officials, he was asleep in his basement when the fire started, and was woken up by his pet cat as smoke began to fill the building.

Police reported heavy smoke and fire coming from the roof and eaves.

A single smoke detector was found in the kitchen area but was reported as not working.

Bradford Road was shut down for about

two hours. Crews were able to control the fire just after 9:30 a.m.

Officials say the home is considered a total loss. They believe the fire might have started by a wood stove in the basement.

An online assessors database lists the home as being owned by the 'Heirs of Lois A. Gamash.' Firefighters were able to save and secure some valuable tools from the back of the house.

Plan NH has scheduled a Community Design Charrette in Hillsborough

In December of 2018, the Town of Hillsborough submitted an application to be considered for a Plan NH, seeking "a clear analysis with suggestions on how to improve and revitalize the downtown as well as address ways to add parking spaces to entice businesses to the community." Town officials are looking for a way to create a walkable community, and would like "renderings of potential street scape options and a plan that can be the basis for forming private and public partnerships to achieve these goals. A charrette is a brainstorming session. For Plan NH, the focus is on the built environment and its effect on the community, usually around a downtown or other significant neighborhood.

At 10:30 AM on Friday, May 17, 2019, Plan NH team members will gather in Hillsborough. At 10:45, the team will introduce themselves to each other and community leaders. From then until about 12:30, there will be a walking tour of downtown Hillsborough (which may be augmented with a driving tour of the areas immediately surrounding the downtown), led by two or three community members who are knowledgeable about the Town, its center, and the challenges the Town faces. From 12:30 – 1:30, over lunch provided by the Town, the Plan NH Team will begin to discuss what they are learning, what they still need to know. From 1:30 – 3:00, the team will meet with key community and business leaders.

There will be two public listening sessions, the first from 3:30 - 5:00, the second from 6:30 - 8:00 PM. Each will

be conducted in a small group discussion format, with Plan NH Team members acting as facilitators and scribes. On Saturday morning the Team will reconvene between 8 and 8:30 AM (breakfast and lunch provided by the Town) to review what has been seen and heard, and begin to formulate recommendations. At 3:00, there will be a public presentation of what the Plan NH Team recommends.

Classic Veal Parmesan Sandwiches

Prep time: 10 minutes. Cook time: 10 minutes Serves: 6

6 veal cutlets (3 ounces each) salt, to taste ground black pepper, to taste 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1 egg wash 1 cup breadcrumbs 1 cup vegetable oil 12 tablespoons tomato sauce 3 tablespoons Parmesan cheese, grated 6 slices provolone cheese 6 slices mozzarella cheese 6 sub rolls Heat oven to 350 F.

Pound each veal cutlet between sheets of parchment or plastic wrap until 1/4-inch thick. Blot veal dry. Season each cutlet with salt and pepper, to taste. Dredge veal in flour; shake off excess. Dip in egg wash and dredge in breadcrumbs.

In large skillet over medium heat, heat about 1/8-inch oil to about 350 F. Working in batches, add breaded veal to hot oil and pan fry first side until golden brown and crisp, about 2 minutes. Turn once and pan fry second side until it reaches internal temperature of 160 F, about 1-2 minutes. Drain on paper towels or wire rack set over baking sheet.

Add 2 tablespoons tomato sauce to each veal cutlet and sprinkle 1/2 tablespoon Par-



and mozzarella cheese to each cutlet. Place

veal parmesan in oven 2-3 minutes, or until the cheese

begins to melt and yeal is hot. Add yeal to sub rolls and serve.

Veal Za'atar Flatbreads

Prep time: 15 minutes. Cook time: 25 minutes Serves: 4

- 1/4 cup za'atar seasoning 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided 1 package (10 ounces) flatbreads
- 1 onion (4 ounces), finely chopped 1/2 pound ground veal 1/4 cup crumbled feta cheese 1 tomato (6 ounces), cored and chopped

chopped parsley, for garnish Heat oven to 425 F. In small bowl,

combine za'atar seasoning and 2 tablespoons olive oil. Spread about 1 tablespoon za'atar mixture on each flatbread. Arrange flatbreads on large baking sheet; set aside.

In 10-inch skillet over medium heat, heat remaining olive oil. Cook onion 4-5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add veal and cook 4-5 minutes until no longer pink, stirring to break up meat. Remove skillet from heat; stir in feta cheese. Spoon 1/4 veal mixture onto each flatbread. Sprinkle each flatbread with tomato. Bake 8-10 minutes, or until hot. Sprinkle each flatbread with parsley.




