Antrim teen indicted on two additional felony charges

Anthony Wheeler, 19, the Antrim teenager accused of posting a social media threat that closed the ConVal Schools last November has been indicted on two additional felony-level charges.

Wheeler was indicted on charges of reckless conduct and criminal threatening, both class-B felonies by the Hillsborough County Grand Jury. He had previously been indicted on three class-B felony counts of criminal threatening in December. The new criminal threaten-

ing indictment charges Wheeler with threatening to commit a violent act "with the purpose to cause the evacuation of... ConVal Regional High School" by posting the photo to his Snapchat account. The reckless conduct indictment charges Wheeler with recklessly engaging in conduct which may place another in fear of serious bodily injury.

Both felonies carry a penalty of three and a half to seven years in state prison and up to a \$4,000 fine.

New London considering establishing a Building & Facilities Committee

New London Select Board Chair Nancy Rollins has proposed that the Board establish a new Building & Facilities Committee to assist the Select Board in handling large projects, including:

- 1. Review, oversee and participate in developing Requests For Proposals for the Buker Building renovations,
- 2. Present recommendations for an RFB on that project.
- 3. With Public Works Director Bob Harrington, complete a status assessment of all town buildings and facilities, including but not limited to identification of need for immediate repairs, long range repair needs and long-term efficiency of any of those buildings based on future growth. The committee would be asked to assess and make recommendations for future space needs for existing departments including but not limited to the recreation department and the Kearsarge Regional School District's SAD expansion, and the facility needs of the recreation department and to explore a potential affiliation with the Outing Club.

They'll assess and make recommendations for a town building inspector,

determine if one is needed, determine the percent of time that would be necessary, outline job functions and job descriptions including an outline of experience and skill set that might be needed and then report as needed, at least quarterly, to the Selectmen with recommendations. The Board will make a decision at the next meeting.

AFTER A TOOTH EXTRACTION: WHEN TO CALL THE DENTIST

When you've had a tooth pulled, it is normal to feel some pain after the anesthesia wears off. For 24 hours after the extraction, you should also expect some swelling and residual bleeding. However, if either bleeding or pain is still severe more than four hours after your tooth is pulled, you should call your dentist. You should also call your dentist if you experience any of the following:

- Signs of infection, including fever and chills
- nausea or vomiting
- redness, swelling, or excessive discharge from the affected area
- cough, shortness of breath, chest pain, or severe nausea or vomiting

The initial healing period usually takes one to two weeks. New bone and gum tissue will grow into the gap. Over time, however, having a tooth (or teeth) missing can cause the remaining teeth to shift, affecting your bite and making it difficult to chew. For that reason, your dentist may advise replacing the missing tooth or teeth with an implant.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A new study in the *Journal of the National Cancer Institute* finds that higher circulating vitamin D concentrations are significantly associated with lower colorectal cancer risk. This study strengthens the evidence, previously considered inconclusive, for a protective relationship. Optimal vitamin D concentrations for colorectal cancer prevention may be higher than the current National Academy of Medicine recommendations, which are based only on bone health.

Opiods are commonly prescribed in the emergency department (ED) for the treatment of acute pain, but due to the epidemic of opioid misuse, analgesic alternatives are being explored. A new *Academic Emergency Medicine* analysis of relevant studies found that low-dose ketamine is as effective as opioids for the control of acute pain in the ED.

For people with type 2 diabetes, switching to sulfonylurea drugs to control blood sugar levels is associated with an increased risk of complications compared with staying on the drug metformin, finds a study in *The British Medical Journal*. Metformin is a "first-line" therapy (the first drug that will be tried) for patients with type 2 diabetes. But sulfonylureas are the most commonly prescribed "second line" treatment, and are often used in combination with metformin. Compared with adding sulfonylureas to metformin treatment, switching to sulfonylureas was associated with a greater risk of heart attack and all-cause mortality, but no differences were found for ischemic stroke, cardiovascular death, or sever hypoglycemia.

Peterborough Select Board approves \$250,000 for Cunningham Pond

During its meeting Tuesday evening, the Peterborough Select Board voted unanimously to use \$250,000 from the town's land acquisition Capital Reserve Fund toward the \$1.5 million purchase price of more than 100 acres on Cunningham Pond. The contribution brings the Monadnock Conservancy fund over the \$1 million mark.

The Cunningham Pond Conservation Alliance had asked the Monadnock Conservancy to assume the project, which now plans to complete fundraising and purchase the property, currently owned by the Peterson family, this spring.

The Select Board and Conservation Commission must both agree to spend the funds. The Conservation Commission and the Open Space Commission have already taken a unanimous vote to approve the contribution.

Francie Von Mertens of the Peterborough Conservation Commission said the \$250,000 represents a significant portion of the land acquisition capital reserve, which

has about \$390,000 total, but Cunningham Pond has been identified as a favored natural and recreation area and Peterborough residents are interested in seeing it

preserved. Anne McBride, land protection director of the Monadnock Conservancy, said the property is exactly the type of project the Conservancy is interested in.

An Indictment of Hillsboro-Deering Schools

As a proud H-D graduate, it gives me no pleasure to report that another year has gone by and Hillsboro-Deering School District voters continue to feel that they are doing the right thing by pouring more and more money into a failing school system. We who argue for fiscal restraint are often characterized as anti-education, and anti-kids. Nothing could be farther from the truth. I firmly believe that it is the prime duty of this generation to educate, train and prepare our children, the next generation, to be productive citizens in this vast and complex world. Let me take a moment to talk about both the financial and education concerns we do have.

FINANCIAL: In recent years we have seen a steady decline in school enrollment from 1,219 in 2015 to 1,122 today. Students with educational disabilities have declined from 241 in 2015 to 226 today. Yet, our total appropriations, the budget plus warrant articles, have gone from \$19,713,125 in 2012 to the \$25,474,037 asked for today. That is an increase of 29.2% in 7 years, at a time of minimum inflation. The Operating Budget itself has increased from \$21,525,228 last year to \$22,475,781 approved this year an increase of \$950,553 or 4.4%. Moreover, last year they had a surplus of \$1,618,030 which was supposedly returned to the taxpayers. How did you spend your refund? You didn't spend it because you didn't get it. That money was immediately re-taxed and rolled into this year's budget. With that \$1.6 million plus the \$951,493, actually gives the Board \$2,569,523 more than they actually spent last year to run the schools. In addition, the Board has placed an extra \$200,000 in the budget for Special Education services despite maintaining a \$500,000 reserve fund for just that purpose. All this while H-D spends \$16,359.86/student compared to the State average of \$15,397.60.

EDUCATIONALLY: This debate would be entirely different if Hillsboro-Deering had some of the best schools in the state. Unfortunately the opposite is true.

In grade 3 only 29.7% of 3rd graders were proficient in math compared to 55% statewide. In 4th grade HD 28.7% - NH 53.6% 5th grade HD 18.6% - NH 44.9%

In English 3RD; HD 26.5% - NH 54.6 4TH: HD 34.8% - NH55.6% 5TH: HD 48.5% - NH 61.6%. The Department of Education has labeled H-D Elementary

as a "School In Need oF Comprehensive Support And Improvement." SchoolDigger. com rates HDES 221st of 231 Elementary Schools, HDMS as 102 of 131 and HDHS as 64th of 81. How does the administration and School Board plan on correcting this? By re-naming the Elementary School Assistant Principal as a second Principal.

There are two concepts entirely missing in public education today: Accountability and Prioritization.

ACCOUNTABILITY: In the private sector if a business was only 28% successful, changes would be made and heads would roll. If only 28% of Sylvania's lights actually lit, the company would fold. I firmly believe that the key to a good education is a great classroom teacher and we have some excellent ones. But as with any other professions, we have some average and some below average teachers and administrators. I filed a Right To Know Request with the administration and after their reply, I can not cite a single teacher or administrator who has been fired or one who's contract was not renewed by the District after 2-3 decades of poor performance. They are simply rated as "sufficient" and kept on board. I would love to have H-D known for its highly paid and appreciated teachers, but only if they are held to the highest standards. When "sufficient" is the standard, we all suffer.

PRIORITIZATION: I recently attended a School Board meeting and expressed many of these sentiments. I was told that the reason for the low test scores in the elementary school was because the class sizes were too large and the teachers were overworked. If that is the case, how can you not place more teachers of paras in the elementary school, how when you propose adding Lacrosse, how when you support spending \$35,000 to study if we can afford an \$8-9 million performing arts center.

How, when you propose spending \$75,000 on a new playground. How when you spend \$420,277.34 on an Alternative High School for 12 students, proposed building an additional school building and refuse to return those 12 students to the high school? How when you offer 124 after school programs including Budget Cooking, Gym Games, Skating & Sledding, Craft Creation, Sewing, Nail Art, T-Shirt Design and Lego Club? Much of it is funded with grants and Dunkin-Jenkins. But not one cent of tax-

payer money should be spent on this while legitimate needs suffer. How when you offer 56 classes which teach 10 students or less, 17 of which contain less than 3 students. All of these projects may be wonderful and nice to have but can not be put before the basic education needs of our children.

As Bill Belichek says, "Do Your Job," which as defined by the NH School Boards Association is to balance the needs of children with the ability of the taxpayers to provide them. I don't often agree with Hillary Clinton, but in one instance she is right. It does take a village to raise a child, and we, all of us, are failing miserably.

The definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over, and expecting

a different result. It's time for the School Board and administration to wake up and get their collective acts together. With the new school year in September, I urge the Board and administration to set high standards, prioritize spending and most of all - Hold People Accountable.

When it comes to educating our children "sufficient" is NOT sufficient. Please set the goal the H-D test results, at all levels, will be at least equal to the state averages. If those results are not met, teachers of those children should not have their contracts renewed or fired for cause. Once that is done, the School Board should resign and let someone who cares begin reclaiming our


Only minor injuries from Peterborough crash

Car's computer thinks Mom is a thief

When my mother drives her car, the alarm goes o. and the theft deterrent light comes on. Then the car will barely run. When this happens, the power steering light, the brake light and even the tire pressure light will come on.

She then has to turn the car o., take the key out, open the door and press the unlock button on the remote to get things working again. After doing that, she can restart the car and it will be alright for a while. We took it to get checked out and they couldn't fi gure it out. She really needs your help. Thanks. — Mary

Well, that's inconvenient, Mary. Her car thinks she's stealing it. How sad. After all these years, it doesn't recognize the hand that fuels it. It sounds like there's a problem with the theft deterrent system, also known as the immobilizer. It's activating while the car is being driven for some reason. And when the immobilizer is activated, it's putting the car into what's called "limp home mode." Generally, "limp home mode" is engaged by the car's computer when there's a danger that driving the car at normal speed will do serious damage to the engine or catalytic converter. It prevents the car from going more than a few miles an hour; enough to let you "limp" off the next exit ramp, or home if it's nearby. The fact that she can "reset" the car by using the remote to unlock the doors tells me it's definitely a problem with the immobilizer. Unfortunately, on modern cars, the immobilizer is built into the car's computer. So you can't simply disconnect the alarm system by cutting a wire, like you could in the old days. That means your dealer is your best bet here. The dealership is most likely to have seen this problem before. And if they haven't, they're most likely to know how the system works in your car, and where to start looking. And brace yourself, because it's not likely to be a simple short in a wire, and may even require a new computer. In the meantime, tell your mother to stop wearing a ski mask when she gets into her car. That may be confusing things. Good luck.



Goffstown Police are frustrated over the release of a repeat criminal offender on \$0 bail following an early morning altercation with multiple officers. Matthew Gedney, 36, was arrested by local police early Tuesday morning after they said a patrol officer observed him dressed in dark clothing and acting suspiciously in the area of several closed businesses.

Gedney fled the scene on a bicycle when the officer attempted to make contact with him. At least six officers responded to the scene, formed a perimeter where the suspect was last seen and went yard to yard in the neighborhood of nearby Cross Street, where Gedney was eventually discovered while he was attempting to hide. After a brief struggle with police, Gedney was taken into custody and charged with prowling and resisting arrest.


While processing Gedney, police determined he had several outstanding misdemeanor and felony warrants in multiple towns. Despite the lengthy list of outstanding warrants, a bail commissioner set a bail amount of zero, with a court date of April 4 in the 9th Circuit District Court, Goffstown. Goffstown Police Chief Robert Browne had harsh words for the bail reform legislation that allowed Gedney to be released on zero bail, calling the decision to release someone with so many outstanding warrants "a head scratcher."




