105 abused dogs in Bradford 52 adult dogs and 53 puppies seized & relocated

More than 100 dogs have been seized from a Bradford kennel due to squalid living conditions, and half of those pets have been transferred to the local humane society for care and future adoption.

According to the humane society and police, an animal cruelty investigation in Bradford resulted in the removal Tuesday of 52 adult dogs and 53 puppies - mostly golden retrievers and Labrador mixes. Bradford Police have opened an investigation into suspected animal cruelty and neglect after a private buyer of two dogs from the kennel called police. There are several potential charges pending. "They are all doing well," Douglas Barry, president and CEO

of the Humane Society for Greater Nashua said of the dogs. "They are resting comfortably and in a very comfortable situation right now. They have been eating and I think they are at a very good point."

"We expect all of the dogs to improve physically and behaviorally, and hope to start adoptions in two to three weeks," Becky Longval, director of animal care, said. Initially, all of the dogs were taken Tuesday from Bradford to the Pope Memorial SPCA in Concord where they received physical exams. Half of the dogs were then transported to Nashua the following day, while the other half remained at the SPCA facility.

Newport town sewer & water rates to increase by 20%

The Newport Selectboard has approved a 20% increase in the town's water and sewer rates, the second increase in as many years with the strong likelihood for additional increases over the next few years. Finance Director Paul Brown explained why both systems need additional money for operating expenses, maintenance and capital projects. Brown said the biggest factor is a sharp reduction in water use

by Sturm, Ruger & Co., along with conservation, has resulted in water use decreasing from about 50 million gallons every four months in 2014 to around 30 million in the most recent billing period. Brown said the increases would raise the combined water and sewer bill for a family of four using a standard of 52,000 gallons a year from an average of \$965 to \$1,158 annually.

School Board Chair Zach Lawson echoed the thought, talking about how all stories have a beginning, middle and end and how high school

"This is the end of the middle," he said.

Principal Brian Emery reminded the crowd of teenagers eager to get on with life that speed isn't always everything. "It's so easy to get moving so fast, but take a minute at some point today to slow down, take a deep breath and enjoy the moment ... to cherish this moment," he said. "Then on Monday, or maybe Tuesday, it's time to get on with it."





WHAT IS THE BEST TIME TO CLEAN BETWEEN YOUR TEETH-BEFORE OR AFTER BRUSHING?



Plaque that is not removed by brushing and cleaning between your teeth can eventually harden into a rough substance called tartar (or calculus). Tartar collects along your gum line and can lead to gum disease. Once tartar forms, only your dentist can remove it.

The most important thing about cleaning between your teeth is to do it. As long as you do a thorough job, it

<u>Dr. Esin Narli-Trangaris</u> doesn't matter when. Pick a time of day when you can devote an extra couple of minutes to your dental care. People who are too tired at the end of the day may benefit from cleaning between their teeth first thing in the morning or after lunch. Others might like to go to bed with a clean mouth.

And don't forget, children need to clean between their teeth too! Start as soon as your child has two teeth that touch. Because cleaning between teeth demands more manual dexterity than very young children have, children are not usually able to do a thorough job on their own until age 10 or 11.

Keep in mind that cleaning between your teeth should not be painful. If you do it too hard, you could damage the tissue between your teeth. If you're too gentle, you might not be getting the food out. It's normal to feel some discomfort when you first start, but don't give up. With daily brushing and cleaning between your teeth, that discomfort should ease within a week or two. If your pain persists, talk to your dentist.

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Clinicians prescribed antibiotics without an infectionrelated diagnosis nearly half of the time and one in five prescriptions were provided without an in-person visit, according to research being presented at ID-Week 2018. The study, which is the first to look at overall outpatient antibiotic prescribing, analyzed more than half a million prescriptions from 514 outpatient clinics. Previous research has found antibi-

otics often are prescribed for certain symptoms (such as a sore throat or cough) when they shouldn't be. Most of these types of illnesses are caused by viruses and therefore don't benefit from antibiotics, which only treat bacterial infections.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved a supplemental application for Gardasil 9 (Human Papillomavirus (HPV) 9-valent Vaccine, Recombinant) expanding the approved use of the vaccine to include women and men aged 27 through 45 years. Gardasil 9 prevents certain cancers and diseases caused by the nine HPV types covered by the vaccine. In 2014, Gardasil 9 was approved for use in males and females aged 9 through 26 years. According to the CDC, every year about 14 million Americans become infected with HPV; about 12,000 women are diagnosed with and about 4,000 women die from cervical cancer caused by certain HPV viruses. Additionally, HPV viruses are associated with several other forms of cancer affecting men and women.

Pregnant women who had low plasma levels of long-chain n-3 fatty acids in their first and second trimesters were at a significantly higher risk of early preterm birth when compared with women who had higher levels of these fatty acids, according to new research published in *EBioMedcine*.

Franklin man killed in accident

A man was killed after being trapped under a car in Franklin on Wednesday afternoon, police said. Police said the death occurred around 4 p.m. at Beauchine Auto & Towing on North Main Street. 
