## Bow agrees to pay \$10 million

#### Eversource settlement saves \$250,000 in legal fees

The Bow Selectboard has agreed to pay \$10 million to settle a long dispute with Eversource over property taxes at the Merrimack Station power plant. More than half of the payment will come in the form of tax breaks over the next four years. The settlement, announced Monday, results from last year's Supreme Court ruling that said Bow had over-valued the power plant in 2012 and 2013, charging \$5.5 million too much in taxes. Bow repaid that money last year, and this \$10 million settlement would cover excess tax payments from 2014-18, when Eversource sold the plant to investors. Bow decided not to take the issue of payments for those years to court, partly because it could

have cost "well over \$250,000" in legal fees.

If the settlement is approved by the Merrimack County Superior Court, Bow would pay \$4.25 million this year, using \$3.25 million that has been accumulated from past years as well as two \$500,000 payments, one made in August and one in December. The remaining \$5.75 million would be paid in annual installments from 2020-23 by collecting about \$1.5 million less in tax each year on property that Eversource owns in Bow. The town is in the process of negotiating the current and future valuation of the power plant with its current owners, the Connecticut-based investment group Granite Shore Power.

#### **Public Hearing on Barn Playhouse parking**

On Monday, July 8, 2019 at 6:00 PM at Whipple Memorial Hall, the New London Selectmen will open a public hearing to discuss parking on Main Street and parking in the area of the Barn Playhouse. During some performances of the iconic summer theatre, parking is a challenge as ticket holders try to find parking before the curtain goes up. The fire department has reported instances of cars

parked on both sides of roads, making passage by emergency vehicles impossible. On Main Street, safety issues related to parking spaces in front of hydrants and sight lines for cars attempting to get onto Main Street will be considered. The availability of safe adequate public parking is important to Main Street businesses and to customers who come to Main Street for the variety of retail and professional businesses.

#### "Birds of a Feather" has 200 Painted Birds Flying in Downtown Newport

The town of Newport recently had a flock of feathered friends take flight in the trees along Main Street downtown, as 200 painted wooden birds were hung as a largescale public art installation titled "Birds of a Feather." The project was launched by the Library Arts Center as a celebration of creativity and community. Wooden birds were painted on a Friday night in mid-June at the Arts Center's Community Art Night on the Newport Town Common as part of the Newport Chamber of Commerce's "Spring into Summer Weekend." In addition to the art project, participants enjoyed live music, as well as lively dinner & dessert options from area food trucks. The colorful group of 200 birds will fly high in the trees of downtown Newport for the duration of the summer. Birds are located along Main Street in the tulip trees on the border of

Newport's Municipal Parking lot at the corner of Main Street and Sunapee Street, as well as in the trees on the median along Main Street, in the courtyard near MJ Harrington & Co and Aurora Bakery, and in the tree outside the Arts Center's entrance. Everyone is encouraged to stop and take a look at the birds as they are out and about this summer.

The "Birds of a Feather" project is part of a larger series of community art projects that the Arts Center has been developing that help to engage large sectors of the community in the arts. This project, as well as last summer's successful "Fish Sticks" public art project were spearheaded by local artist and LAC board member Christie

Scott. The Center plans to add 100 more birds to the flock at the Newport Block Party hosted by the Chamber on the evening of Fri. July 12th. Anyone who would like to paint a bird that has not yet done so is encouraged to attend and join in. The project is free and open to all. The Center's next scheduled community arts project is "Making Faces"—a collaborative project that will produce temporary sculptural tree "faces" that will be mounted to trees in the downtown area. The project will take place at the Newport Farmer's Market on Friday, August 2nd. #### **5 STEPS TO A FLAWLESS FLOSS**



We know we should floss at least once a day, but not everyone knows the right way to do it. Use this step-by-step guide to find out how to properly floss your teeth:

 Break off about 18 inches of floss and wind most of it around one of your middle fingers. Wind the remaining floss around the same finger of the

opposite hand. This finger will take up the floss as it becomes dirty.

- Hold the floss tightly between your thumbs and forefingers.
- Guide the floss between your teeth, using a gentle rubbing motion.
   Never snap the floss into the gums.
- When the floss reaches the gum line, curve it into a C shape against one tooth. Gently slide it into the space between the gum and the tooth.
- Hold the floss tightly against the tooth. Gently rub the side of the tooth, moving the floss away from the gum with up and down motions. Repeat this method on the rest of your teeth. Don't forget the back side of your last tooth.
- Once you're finished, throw the floss away. A used piece of floss won't be as effective, and could leave bacteria behind in your mouth.

#### TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



The results for a study led by Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH) investigators support evidence from previous studies suggesting that regular use of aspirin can reduce the risk of developing primary liver cancer, also called hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC). Their report analyzing data from two long-term epidemiologic studies appears in *JAMA Oncology* and finds that regular aspirin use — taking two or more 325 mg

tablets a week for five years or more — led to a significantly reduced risk of developing HCC, which is the second leading cause of cancer death worldwide.

New research published in the *Journal of the American College of Cardiology's Heart Failure issue* found significant correlations between blood levels of EPA plus DHA omeg-3s in "cognitive" (as opposed to "somatic") depression among heart failure subjects. (Cognitive depression would include symptoms like sadness and pessimism, whereas somatic would include manifestations such as fatigue and sleep disturbances.)

Vitamin D is already well known for its benefits in building healthy bones. A new study supports the idea that it also may reduce cancer risk as well as breast cancer mortality, especially in women with a lower body mass index. Study results are published in *Menopause*, the journal of The North American Menopause Society (NAMS). Breast cancer remains the most common cancer in women worldwide and is the leading cause of death from cancer in women. Reproductive risk factors such as early onset of puberty, late menopause, later age at first pregnancy, never having been pregnant, obesity, and a family history have all been shown to be associated with breast cancer development.

#### Bennington man indicted on multiple sex charges

A Bennington man has been indicted on eight felony charges alleging he sexually assaulted a minor over the course of two years and then threatened his victim with a firearm.

Brandon Guillemette, 29, was initially arrested in April; he was indicted in June and charged with three counts of aggravated felonious sexual assault, witness tampering, two counts of criminal threatening with a deadly weapon, reckless conduct with a deadly weapon and attempted aggravated felonious sexual assault.

porations, pharmaceutical companies, Wal-Mart, and Wall Street.


- You can have your beloved lifelong welfare dwellers, food stamps, homeless, homeboys, hippies, druggies, and illegal aliens.

#### Henniker man arrested on multiple charges

Jason McGill, of Henniker, a man with a number of priors was arrested again after a high-speed chase. A trooper attempted to make a motor vehicle stop because the vehicle made multiple lane control violations. The driver failed to stop and led troopers on a chase on I-93 north, I-89 north, and into Concord. The vehicle was spiked on Pleasant Street and eventually came to a stop, where two men were taken into custody: McGill and Kevin Gobeil, 24, of Pembroke. McGill, the driver of the SUV, was charged on with aggravated driving under the influence, driving under the influence-subsequent, disobeying a police officer, reckless operation, operating while a habitual offender, possession of controlled drugs, and open container. #### **Elderly Newport man fired at his caregiver** Kenneth Rickard, 80, of Newport is being held without bail

Kenneth Rickard, 80, of Newport is being held without bail after he allegedly fired several shots at his paid caregiver. He is charged with reckless conduct with a deadly weapon for the incident, which took place at his home Monday morning. Police say the female caregiver ran away from the gunfire, out into the road, and flagged down a car for help. Police are not yet giving out a motive for the alleged shooting, but said the incident remains under investigation and more charges are expected.

#### Franklin female fugitive arrested at motel

Franklin police officers received information that wanted fugitive Quinn Young was at the DK Motel on North Main Street. Officers responded quickly to the information and surrounded the building. They located Young and two other males attempting to leave in a vehicle. Young was apprehended without incident. One of the male passengers, identified as Lee Hillsgrove, was also taken into custody. Hillsgrove had a no bail warrant out of Merrimack Superior Court. Both Hillsgrove and Young were transported to the Merrimack County House of Corrections.

#### **Motorcyclist attempts to avoid Bow Police**

Bow Police observed a motorcycle being operated erratically on Route 3A, and attempted to stop the motorcycle but the driver turned into the Blue Seal parking lot then fled on foot down the Hall Street railroad tracks. K-9 Roxy was called to track the suspect, who was located and taken into custody without incident. Timothy Field, 32, of Webster was arrested and charged with Reckless Operation, Disobeying an Officer, Resisting Arrest or Detention, and Operating without a valid motorcycle license.

#### Newport man to be retried after hung jury

The jury hearing the case of a Newport man accused of molesting four children in Claremont 30 years ago was unable to reach a verdict, resulting in a hung jury. Alan Wirkkala, 51, was tried in the Sullivan Superior Court on 17 felony counts that allege he molested four people when they were children. Sullivan County Attorney Marc Hathaway said Friday the jury was dismissed after it failed to come to a verdict, though that does not mean the charges are going away. When a jury is unable to come to a verdict, Hathaway said, the state has the right to seek a new trial on the charges. In Wirkkala's case, there is already a new trial coming based on new charges, Hathaway said.

#### **Monitor's Boy Track** Athlete of the Season

Hillsboro-Deering's Ben Ketterer, a junior on the Hillsboro-Deering boys' track team, ended up bringing home three banners to the HDHS gymnasium, winning the 100-meter dash (12.01 seconds) and long jump (20-71/2), finishing second in the triple jump (school-record 41-33/4) and running on the schoolrecord 4x100 relay (46.45 seconds), leading the Hillcats to their best season in program history and earning The Monitor's Boys' Track Athlete of the Season honors.

#### **Monitor's Girl Track Athlete of the Season**

Mya Dube had already won four titles at the Division III Track and Field Championship, but the fifth title was the one that mattered to her the most. The Kearsarge junior distance runner pulled off an incredible combination of events, defending her 1,600-meter title for the second time (5:07.78), winning the 800 (2:20.9), defending her 3,200 title (11:38.83) and anchoring the 4x400 relay to victory in the final event of the meet to deliver the Cougars their first girls' track championship. Dube's winning didn't stop there. She claimed the 1,600 meters at the Meet of Champions in a school-record



time (4:53.59) against the best from all three divisions of NHIAA competition. She wrapped up her 2019 campaign with a regional prize, winning the New England title in the 1,600.



#### New London Select Board deals with culverts, windows and benches

The New London Select Board dealt with a varied agenda Monday evening. Building & Facilities Chair Bob Bowers gave an update of his committee's activities

Town Administrator Kim Hallquist informed the Board that only one company responded to a Request For Bids on the Brookside Drive culvert project and its bid was about \$25,000 over what had been estimated and budgeted for. She

asked if the Board would like to award that bid or hold off and rebid it later. Public Works Director Bob Harrington said that although the culvert has been "Red Listed" it was not in danger of immediate collapse, so a delay would be appropriate. With that the board decided to rebid the project, possibly in February in hopes of getting a better price.

The Board accepted a \$4,000 donation to the Recreation Department by the

Frank M. Barnyard Foundation to be used for camp scholarships.

A bid for \$8,250 to repair the windows in Whipple Town Hall was accepted with work to start soon.

The Board also approved a request to place a Memorial Bench at Elkins Beach in memory of Don Preissler. Bob Harrington suggested removing one of the non-memorial benches to avoid clutter and the Board agreed.






