Four people injured in head-on collision in Antrim

Route 202 between Antrim and Hillsborough was closed for several hours Tuesday as authorities responded to a head on collision between a Jeep, which crossed the center line and collided with the bed of a flatbed tow truck. According to Antrim Police Chief Scott Lester, it is unclear if a medical emergency contributed to the cause. Police reports indicate that a Maryland man driving the Jeep Wrangler from Hillsborough toward Antrim was passing another car. The tow truck driver swerved to avoid the Jeep, which crashed into the bed of the tow truck anyway. The Jeep driver was airlifted to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center and his two unrelated teenage passengers sustained minor injuries. The tow truck driver sustained only a minor leg injury. Their names were not released.

New London solar soon Project will generate 40% of municipal electricity needs

Jamie Hess, Chair of the New London Energy Committee met with the Select Board Monday evening to update the Board on the status of the project to install solar panels at the Public Works Facility. With the planning and negotiating nearly complete, Hess said he expects construction to begin soon and will be generating electricity by this Fall.

Town Council had rejected the original draft agreement with the investors, but the committee has adapted another used by Colby-Sawyer College which should be acceptable. Once signed off, the Select Board will schedule a Public Hearing. The entire \$500,000 construction cost will be borne by the investors, who will own and control the project for the first five years. The town will then have an option to purchase the facility at a depreciated price, expected to be about 50% of the original cost. The agreement guarantees that during those five years the cost of electricity will not exceed what the town is currently paying.

History comes alive in Hillsborough August 17th-18th

For ten years, there was a living history event held at a series of sites in Hillsborough and it ended last year. However, a new group of citizens in town have created History Alive to replace it on Aug. 17 and 18. How will it be different from Living History? It will be held in only two sites in Hillsborough. Jones Road site will focus on the active reenactment of the Civil, and French and Indian Wars - complete with horses and cannons, and sutlers. (Sutlers are people, including women, who traveled with the soldiers to sell and provide things they need like shoes, mending of clothes, and weapons.) In addition, the popular gold panning for kids will be held down by the brook. At the historic Hillsborough Center, History Alive will be focusing on the hundred years from the 1760s to the 1860s of the more local NH history. Instead of having George Washington come, Oney, the slave of Martha Washington who escaped and spent the rest of her life in New Hampshire, will be there.

Instead of focusing on one small area, there will be tours and scavenger hunts all around the center's green, including Civil War quilts, writers on the underground railroad and slavery in the state.

A vehicle was driving westbound when it crossed into the eastbound lane, went off the road, over the embankment, and into trees and rocks. First responders discovered that two people were in the vehicle, and their injuries were severe enough to require two ambulances for the citizens. The driver, Megan M. Horsfield, 29, of Newport and her passenger, Justin Butler, 26, also of Newport remain hospitalized at DHMC. Horsfield has been charged with Aggravated Driving While Intoxicated, as both drugs and alcohol are suspected to be causes.

Missing 2 year old Bow child found safe

On Saturday, July 20th, Bow Police received a report of a missing 2 year old child on Erin Drive in Bow. The child had been last seen inside the residence but the parents could not locate him. Based upon the child's age, heat index of 95 degrees, and the terrain, there was an immediate threat to the child's safety. The Bow and State Police K-9 Units responded and the State Police helicopter also assisted with searching the woods from the air and were able to relay information to ground units and a Bow Officer using an ATV. An hour and a half later, the child was located by a person walking their dog on the hiking trails, 1/2 mile from his house. The child was medically evaluated by the Bow Fire Department and reunited with his parents.



Three people killed in New London rollover on Interstate 89

Three people died in a late morning, single-car accident Sunday on I-89 in New London. NH State Police report the accident took place when a northbound SUV left the highway near Exit 12 and rolled over several times with all three motorists ejected from the SUV.

New London Fire Chief Jay Lyon believes that despite the multiple rollover, the three would have survived and perhaps even walked away had they been belted in. State Police released a statement saying the vehicle was in the left lane of travel and another vehicle "may have merged into the left hand lane in front of

Fire at Francestown Post Office

Fire crews responded to an electrical fire at the Francestown Post Office last Wednesday, after a light fixture arced and caught fire when a post office employee was readying the office opening. The fire was contained to the light fixture and had burned itself out by the time the fire department arrived. Officials said that there was no damage to the building, which opened on time, just to the light fixture. the SUV. The vehicle involved in the crash subsequently swerved and may have lost control."

The SUV came to rest in the highway median where two died on scene. Another was transported to New London Hospital and pronounced dead there. Authorities are investigating all factors, but driver impairment does not appear to play a role in the accident. The victims have been identified as: Sharon Nowrocki, 44, of West Roxbury, Massachusetts, as well as Angelo Rossi, 57, and his wife, Kelly, 56, both of Roslindale, MA.

Your dentist will evaluate your overall dental health and conduct an oral cancer screening by holding your tongue with gauze, checking it and your whole mouth, then feeling your jaw and neck.

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Honey and over-the-counter remedies should be a patient's first point of call to treat a cough, not antibiotics, says England's The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) in a new draft guidance. In most cases, acute coughs are caused by a cold or flu virus, or bronchitis, and last around three weeks. Honey and cough medicines containing pelargonium, guaifenesin or dextromethorphan have some

evidence of benefit for the relief of cough symptoms.

High doses of vitamin D taken one hour after sunburn significantly reduce skin redness, swelling, and inflammation, according to a double-blinded, placebo-controlled clinical trial. The trial results were recently published in the Journal of Investigative Dermatology.

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Up to half of people with Alzheimer's disease (AD) use a psychotropic drug, and one in five uses two or more psychotropics concomitantly, according to a new study. Psychotropic drug use was more common among persons with Alzheimer's disease already five years before the diagnosis, and the difference to comparison persons without AD increased at the time of diagnosis. Four years after the diagnosis, psychotropic drug use was three times more common in persons with AD than in comparison persons. Of psychotropic drugs, the use of antipsychotics was almost eight times more common among persons with Alzheimer's disease than among comparison persons. The use of at least two psychotropics concomitantly was three times more common among persons with Alzheimer's disease. • • •

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Governor critical of Franklin Representative

Gov. Chris Sununu called the comments of Rep. Werner Horn, R-Franklin, "racist and offensive," going so far as to say that the

New Hampshire Legislature would function better if the three-term Rep. was no longer a member of the 400-member House. Horn, in a political column on Thursday, defended his view that slave owners were not racists., saving, "Slavery later on in the American South was not about the color of the skin of the slaves but their value as workers on the plantations." Republican State Chairman Steve Stepanek also condemned Horn for the comments. "Representative

Horn is wrong and his comments are not based in our platform's belief in free people, free markets and free enterprise," Stepanek said in a statement. "Slavery throughout its history in the United States was a racist, inhuman, and immoral practice."

Mann is a dangerous, manipulative predator

A former Dunbarton Selectman has been sentenced to decades in prison for sexually assaulting two 5-year-old boys and exposing himself to a teenager. Prosecutors called the crimes committed by Merton Mann, 75, monstrous and wicked as they asked that Mann be given what amounts to a life sentence. Mann was sentenced to a minimum of 20 years in prison. Defense lawyers asked for a minimum of five years behind bars, but Judge John Kissinger said that wasn't nearly enough based on the crimes. "He is a dangerous, manipulative predator who needs to be isolated from society," Kissinger said.

Police addressing problems at Norway Pond

In response to complaints from residents about nonresidents on the beach at Norway Pond, Hancock Police have installed new signs hoping to combat recent problems with litter, parking, and nonresidential use of the area. Lake users with boat trailers are instructed to park their trailers behind the town offices across the street while accessing the lake.



Crotched Mountain Ski Area acquired as part of \$264 million package

Crotched Mountain Ski Area is included as part of Colorado-based Vail Resorts Inc's merger agreement with Peak Resorts, putting three additional New Hampshire ski areas under its control. Attitash and Wildcat are the other two.

The \$264 million transaction would include 17 ski areas in seven states. Other areas in the Northeast are Mount Snow in Vermont and Hunter Mountain in New York. Vail plans to invest \$15 million over the next two years in to "elevate the guest experience" at the Peak resorts. By June 2021, the company expects annual earnings of \$60 million from the transaction.

Last year, Vail took over ski operations at Mount Sunapee in New Hampshire when it announced it had acquired Triple

Elm Brook Park contamination

A cyanobacteria bloom has been observed along Elm Brook Park beach and shorelines around the reservoir in Hopkinton. As a result, the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) has issued a cyanobacteria advisory for those who use the waterbody for recreation. Peaks LLC from the Mueller family for \$82 million.

She was arrested and charged with Endangering Welfare Of Child/ Incompetent Domestic Violence; Assault and Simple Assault. She was released on PR bail with arraignment date to be determined at a later date per the Hillsboro County Attorney's Office.

OSHA investigates Franklin workplace death

Federal investigators are looking into possible workplace safety violations at a Franklin auto shop where an employee died last month after being trapped under a car. An Occupational Safety and Health Administration spokesperson confirmed Monday that an investigation was opened into the conditions at Beauchine Auto and Towing. Donald Eastman, 49, of Franklin was working at Beauchine Auto and Towing at 392 N. Main St. in Franklin when he became trapped under a passenger vehicle on June 19. He died before emergency responders were able to transport him to a hospital. Officials refused to estimate the completion date of the investigation into the working conditions at the facility.

PETS ARE FAMILY TOO!



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Tips for having pets:

Change might make an already-anxious cat more nervous and ready to lash out. The more preparation you do in a gradual and controlled way, the better it will be when big change happens, like a new baby. Ease the kitty into the new situation well in advance. paint the nursery, set up toys and play tapes of baby crying.

Adding a cat or dog to your household can mean more to your child than just companionship. When children interact with pets, they learn valuable lessons, as well as the opportunity to learn patience and respect. Encouraging children to care for their family pets is an excellent way to teach them a sense of responsibility. Osselets refers to swellings that appear along the front and sides of a horse's ankle joint, in the area just below the cannon bone. Osselets are commonly seen in young horses that are broken early and used hard.

When your dog is distracted, time your "come" cue for the moment the dog can most easily disengage from his other activity—for example, when he turns away from another dog he just greeted.

Dogs should not wear any gear when playing in groups. We have seen far too many dog fatalities death by choking or a broken neck—and injuries caused by one dog getting his jaw caught in another dog's collar or harness.



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

AARP warns seniors - beware of elder scams

New frauds and scams seem to crop up weekly. Identity theft and other scams rob millions of Americans of their hardearned money. Last year alone, Americans lost \$18 billion to fraud and scams. In fact, every two seconds, a con artist steals someone's identity.

What tricks do con artists use to steal your money? How can you outsmart scammers before they strike? Beat the con artists at their game. Medicare fraud 101 According to government estimates, Medicare lost \$52 billion to fraud, abuse and improper billing in FY2017. Medicare fraud typically involves rogue health care providers or medical suppliers who bill the program for services, equipment or medication that they don't actually provide - or else inflate the cost of those items. Some will even falsify patients' diagnoses to justify unnecessary tests, surgeries and other procedures or write prescriptions for patients they've never examined. Others use genuine patient information, sometimes obtained through identity theft, to create fake claims. One of the most effective ways to combat against Medicare fraud is to review your Medicare statements and make sure the dates and services listed are correct. If something doesn't look right, call your medical provider's office.

Do me a favor scam

We all want to please our bosses, especially when they need help. This fact is not lost on some scammers who have started sending fake boss messages asking employees for a favor. Several reports have emerged this summer of employees getting texts or emails from their "boss" asking them to purchase gift cards and send the account numbers. The supposed boss might be traveling or claim they are too busy to take care of the task. But once the gift cards are purchased and the information sent, the money is gone. Because scammers are good at spoofing email addresses and phone numbers, you don't always know when your boss really is your boss. However, whenever you are asked to purchase a gift card and give out the card information by phone or email, it is likely a scam.

Free medicare device scam

One tell-tale sign that should make every consumer suspicious is when something is offered "for free." These free offer scams are often associated with Medicare. The programs spends around \$6 billion a year on medical devices, and a market this big draws scammers. In a medical equipment scam, someone reaches out with an offer of a free brace, wheelchair or other device. All they need is your Medicare number. Once they have it, scammers can use it to bill the government for devices and services that aren't needed. Medicare fraud results in higher deductibles and copays for Medicare beneficiaries, and can even put affected patients at risk. Be suspicious of unsolicited free offers and never give out your Medicare number to anyone who isn't a trusted health care provider. 




