Separate Newbury Fire and Police facilities proposed

Newbury's newly appointed Safety Services Building Committee has recommended that the town build a new Fire Station at the Bald Sunapee/Camacho property off Route 103 and renovate the existing facility for expanded use by the Police Department.

The Committee presented its 10 page report to the Select Board, estimating the total

cost of the two projects at \$4,760,000.

The proposal suggests staggering the projects over the next few years to limit the tax impact.

In March a \$3.8 million warrant article to build a combined facility failed to receive the necessary 2/3 support and was defeated for the third year in a row.

Mount Sunapee Resort hosts 86th Annual Craftsmen Fair

The 86th annual Craftsmen Fair will be held Aug. 3 to 11 at Mount Sunapee Resort in Newbury. The League is anticipating more than 25,000 will come during the week to meet with artisans and shop their works. The fair largely exhibits the works of its juried members representing forms such as basket-weaving, handblown glass, functional and decorative ceramics, printmaking and painting, metal sculptures, folk art, furniture-making, quilting and wearable art and jewelry.

"This year it's all about the new – exhibitions, workshops, bands and food, as well as inspiring crafts," said Miriam Carter, executive director of League of NH Craftsmen, in statement.

"This is more than a shopping experience, it's an opportunity to explore the world of fine craft making. As a statewide arts organization and nonprofit, this is our yearly opportunity to celebrate our members and their extraordinary talent."

The new presentations include "Art, Craft & Design: The exhibition," which intends to explore ideas about how to use fine crafts in everyday life. Likewise, the "Sculpture Garden" will present ideas to visitors on how to incorporate art and plantings in their own yards.

The 2019 fair will also feature guest artists who are not members of the League, but have gone through a similar jurying process to be accepted. Those artists are Jennifer Armstrong, a fiber artist from Kennbunk, Maine; Lori Austill, a mixed media artist from Portland, Maine; Pong Gaddi, a leatherworker from Buffalo, NY; Joel Hokkanen, a woodworker from Rockport, Mass.; Shaari Horowitz, a woodworker from Sharon, CT; Chong and Judi Lim, mixed media artists from Scarborough, Maine;

Among the exhibitors, 25 members of the New Hampshire Art Association will be displaying and selling their work. The artists include painters, photographers and printmakers.

In addition to the NHAA items for sale, the association will hold a Plein Air Paint Out and Wet Paint Sale on Aug. 7 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Visitors can watch the artists create their paintings, ask about their process, and view completed projects. Artists working at the Paint Out include Phil Bean, Eileen Belanger, Debbie Campbell and Maryclare Heffernan.

Loretta Hubley, an etching artist, will present a demonstration on Aug. 9 from 1 to 5 p.m. The etching process will be discussed in relation to Rembrandt's intaglio tech-

niques.

Webster man indicted for Franklin Hit & Run

A Merrimack County grand jury indicted Kevin Muzzey, 51, of Webster, who authorities say was driving in a hit-and-run incident in Franklin in February. Muzzey faces a felony charge of conduct after an accident. Muzzey turned himself in to police in May, months after the incident. Edward Douglas, 53, of Franklin, was found lying in the road on Central Street after he was hit by a car while attempting to cross about 6 p.m. on Feb. 27. He was taken to Concord Hospital with serious bodily injuries. Muzzey fled the scene, setting off a search by state police for a 2011 Mazda 6, which was later found at Muzzey's Webster home.

Hillsborough historic documents discovered

Historic documents recently found in the Gilbert Room in the Fuller Public Library will be on display Thursday, August 15 from 9am-7pm. The documents include Joseph Gilbert's military commission into the Massachusetts-Bay Colony Company Arms dated May 19, 1775 and George Washington's Army dated January 1, 1776. Through the generosity of a Hillsborough resident the documents were conserved for the town. Hillsborough Historical Society member Gary Sparks has researched the Gilbert family and has a created a great pamphlet documenting Joseph Gilbert's life. Missing Hillsborough woman's body found in her storage unit

The body of a Hillsborough woman, missing for several months, has been located in a storage unit at Hillsborough Mini-Storage on Henniker Street. Linda Minery, 53, had been missing since leaving her elderly mother suddenly at 2:30 a.m. on Sunday April 7th, without saying where she was going or what she was doing.

Minery was last seen wearing a black jacket and black pants and carrying a blue bag. Police had distributed a picture of Minery from 10 years ago to help in the search.

Reports indicated that she may have left on a maroon-colored road bicycle, which is missing. Her vehicle was left in the

driveway. Family members told police that she has undiagnosed mental health issues and had been displaying extreme paranoid behavior. In fact, Minery had stopped speaking, and was only communicating by writing things down.

Workmen at the mini-storage opened

Minery's unit to check on repairs to the adjacent unit and discovered the body. Authorities list the date of her death as April 7th, the day she disappeared. Foul play is not suspected and Hillsboro Police stress that there is no danger to the public.

Teeth grinding, also called bruxism, can be caused not just by stress and anxiety but by sleep disorders, an abnormal bite or teeth that are missing or crooked. A study in the November 2016 issue of the Journal of the American Dental Association suggests that teeth grinding is also associated with alcohol and tobacco use. People who drink alcohol and smokers are ap-

proximately twice as likely to grind their teeth. The symptoms of teeth grinding include dull headaches, jaw soreness, teeth that are painful or loose, and fractured teeth.

Your dentist can fit you with a mouth guard to protect your teeth during sleep. In some cases, your dentist or physician may recommend taking a muscle relaxant before bedtime. If stress is the cause, you need to find a way to relax. Meditation, counseling and exercise can all help reduce stress and anxiety.

Teeth grinding is also common in children. However, because their teeth and jaws change and grow so quickly it is not usually a damaging habit that requires treatment; most outgrow it by adolescence. Although in adults teeth grinding is often the result of stress, the same is not always true with children. Other possible causes of teeth grinding in children include irritation in the mouth, allergies, and misaligned teeth.

If you're concerned about your child's teeth grinding, ask your dentist about the potential causes and, if necessary, the possible solutions.

Historically, many weight-loss agents have had adverse cardiovascular effects, leading to dangerous conditions such as strokes, heart attacks, pulmonary hypertension and valvular heart disease, and have been withdrawn from the market. Balancing the need for treatments for obesity and the potential risk of such therapies, the FDA has approved weight-loss agents like lorcaserin contingent on dedicated follow-up studies to assess the risk of adverse cardiovascular outcomes. Now a study described in the New

England Journal of Medicine has shown that lorcaserin helps people lose weight without causing an increase in adverse cardiovascular events in a population at higher risk for heart attacks and strokes.

There is no significant difference between zinc acetate lozenges and zinc gluconate lozenges regarding their efficacy in shortening the duration of common colds, according to a meta-analysis published in *Journal of the* Royal Society of Medicine Open. Seven randomized trials with zinc acetate and zinc gluconate lozenges found that the duration of colds was shortened on average by 33%.

New research published in *Diabetologia* (the journal of the European Association for the Study of Diabetes [EASD]) suggests that omega 3 polyunsaturated fatty acids (PUFAs), derived primarily from fish in maternal diet during pregnancy or lactation, may help protect infants at hight risk of type 1 diabetes (T1D) from developing the disease.

Treatment options currently are limited for people suffering from secondary progressive multiple sclerosis. However, a pilot study suggests over-the-counter antioxidant lipoic acid holds promise in improving patients' lives. The research was published in the journal Neuroimmunology & Neuroinflammation.

Just before conservation officers arrived Lange was located around 12:03 p.m. on the Ridge Trail by a member of the Hillsborough fire department. Lange was transported out of the woods to Center Road by Hillsborough fire personnel using a UTV, then taken by ambulance to Concord Hospital.





Peterborough's Recreation Director on paid administrative leave

Peterborough Town Administrator Rodney Bartlett has announced that Recreation Director Jeffrey King has been placed on paid administrative leave, pending resolution of concerns that were brought to the town's attention. Although Bartlett confirmed that King was on leave, he refused further details, citing that it is a personnel matter. He would not say when the leave started, but stressed that King would remain on leave throughout a review process.

King has been employed by the town

since April 2003. He oversees two full-time year-round staff, three part-time year-round staff, and 43 seasonal employees, at an annual salary of \$78,561. Selectwoman Karen Hatcher said that

grievances against a department director must be submitted to the town administrator within five working days. The town administrator must then render a written decision within 10 working days from when the grievance was received.

If no decision is reached, or the employee does not agree with the decision of the town administrator, the complainant may request the matter be submitted to the Select Board, which can review written briefs or oral arguments within 15 calendar days, and can submit a final decision within 15 days of their final meeting on the matter

Court denies ConVal's motion for \$3 million transportation costs

The state is not going to have to pay close to \$3 million for school transportation costs, yet, after Cheshire Superior Court Judge David Ruoff denied the motion brought by the Contoocook Valley Regional School District.

ConVal won its lawsuit against the state when Ruoff ruled last month that the state is in violation of the New Hampshire constitution by failing to fund education as per the Claremont decisions.

ConVal and the other districts filed a motion for reconsideration, seeking immediate money to fund transportation, but Ruoff denied that motion, sticking to the philosophy behind his original order. Ruoff wants the state's lawmakers to fix the funding, including funding for transportation. "The Court will not instruct the Legislature on how to fund transportation; only that, if the Legislature determines transportation is part of the constitutional, fundamental right to the opportunity to an adequate education, it must cost and fully fund it for every student in the State in a way that withstands strict scrutiny review," Ruoff wrote.


