## **Weare Police Officer on leave**

#### 2nd officer involved in shooting requests personal leave

NH Attorney General Gordon McDonald has identified Sergeant Austin McGuire, the second Weare Police Officer involved in last week's standoff incident, which ended in the death of 43-year-old Weare resident Jeffrey Clough-Garvin.

Maguire and fellow officer William Paul Lewis IV arrived at Clough-Garvin's home following reports of a domestic dispute. Clough-Garvin exchanged gunfire with the officers during which Lewis suffered gunshot wounds to his arm.

A multi-hour long standoff involving Clough-Garvin and Weare Police and the State Police SWAT Team ended with the discovery of Clough-Garvin's body.

An autopsy found that he died from a selfinflicted shotgun wound. Weare Police Chief Christopher Moore reports that Sgt. Maguire has asked to be placed on voluntary leave following the incident.

Maguire joined the Weare Police Department as a full-time officer in 2013. He graduated from John Stark High School in 2010.

#### Support offered for Bradford's Economic Development

Mike Tardiff, of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, has offered support to Bradford's Economic Development Committee. Jared Reynolds, of the New Hampshire Cooperative Extension, has been mentoring the development of the committee and Tardiff proposed including CNHRP as an additional

#### 2018 Hillsboro-Deering graduate serves on a guided missile destroyer

A 2018 Hillsboro-Deering High School graduate and New Hampshire native is serving in the U.S. Navy aboard the guided-missile destroyer, USS Chung-Hoon. Seaman Taveya Ortiz works as a Navy boatswain's mate aboard the guided-missile destroyer operating out of Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii. Ortiz credits success in the Navy to many of the lessons learned back home in Hillsborough. "My hometown taught me to have determination, whether toward soccer games or class work, and now my job. I am determined to be better at my job every day," said Ortiz.

Chung-Hoon measures approximately 500 feet and is powered by four gas turbines that allow the destroyer to achieve more than 30 mph in open seas. Approximately 30 officers and 300 enlisted men and women make up the ship's company. Their jobs are highly specialized and keep each part of the cruiser running smoothly, according to Navy officials. The jobs range from maintaining engines and handling weaponry to washing dishes and preparing meals. As a Navy boatswain's mate, Ortiz is responsible for preserving and painting the ship, along with supporting major tasks at sea such as fuel and supply replenishments. According to Navy officials, destroyers are fast, maneuverable, and technically advanced tactical multi-mission surface combatants capable of conducting anti-air warfare, anti-submarine warfare and anti-surface warfare, as

well as humanitarian assistance.

Being stationed in Pearl Harbor, often referred to as the gateway to the Pacific in defense circles, means Ortiz is serving in a part of the world taking on a new importance in America's focus on rebuilding military readiness, strengthening alliances, and reforming business practices in support of the National Defense Strategy.

"Our priorities center on people, capabilities and processes, and will be achieved by our focus on speed, value, results and partnerships," said Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer. "Readiness, lethality and modernization are the requirements driving these priorities."

#### Merrimack County Attorney arrested on DWI charge

Merrimack County Sheriff Scott Hilliard has been arrested on a charge of driving while intoxicated. A caller reported to police that Hilliard, 58, of Northfield, was driving erratically on Route 3 on Friday, Tilton police said in a press release. The caller followed Hilliard's vehicle into the parking lot of the 99 Restaurant, police said, and officers arrived soon after.

The officers then took Hilliard into custody on a charge of aggravated driving while intoxicated. He was released on bail

and is set to be arraigned later this month. Hilliard was not on duty at the time of the incident.

In a statement to WMUR, Hilliard's attorney, Jared Bedrick, said: "We have become aware of his arrest and understand that, consistent with his decades of law enforcement service, Mr. Hilliard was cooperative with police. Critical evidence remains unanalyzed and we will refrain from further comment until we have had the chance to review the allegations."

#### **Jury finds accused child molester Not Guilty**

Accused Newport child molester Alan Wirkkala has been found not guilty on two felony counts of aggravated sexual assault, while the jury was deadlocked on two of the same additional charges. The alleged offenses took place between 1985 and 1987, and between 1987 and 1991 at various locations in Claremont when the alleged victim was between 5 and 8 years old, and later, when she was 12. "Obviously, we respect the judgment of the jury. We are going to prepare the other cases that remain," Sullivan County Attorney Marc Hathaway said after the 14-member jury announced the verdicts last Thursday in Superior Court. However, Alan Wirkkala may still stand trial in October on at least one felony count of sexual assault charges after a jury's split decisions last Friday. Wirkkala faces at least 20 counts of felonious sexual assault against four children from the 80's and 90's. This new trial can occur because under NH law, charges that result in a hung jury can be brought forward for a new trial later on.

#### Long Pond advisory removed

New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (DES) has RE-MOVED a cyanobacteria advisory for Long Pond in Henniker issued on 8/2/2019. Samples have been collected weekly by New England College to monitor changing conditions. Surface accumulations had decreased by 8/6 but were found elevated deeper in the water column. As of 8/13 samples revealed that there were no colonies of cyanobacteria in the surface water. While the bloom has dissipated, DES advises that lake-goers continue to monitor your individual shoreline for changing conditions.

# ARE NUMBING GELS OR TEETHING TABLETS SAFE FOR MY BABY?



The Food and Drug Administration recommends that parents and caregivers not use benzocaine products for children younger than 2. "We are also warning that benzocaine oral drug products should only be used in adults and children 2 years and older if they contain certain warnings on the drug label," the FDA said in a May 2018 statement. "These products carry serious risks and provide little to no benefits

for treating oral pain, including sore gums in infants due to teething." Benzocaine is an over-the-counter anesthetic, which the FDA notes is marketed under the product names Anbesol, Hurricaine, Orajel, Baby Orajel and Orabase. Benzocaine has been associated with a rare but serious—and sometimes fatal-condition called methemoglobinemia, a disorder in which the amount of oxygen carried through the blood stream is greatly reduced.

The FDA also urges parents not to use—rather to dispose of—homeopathic teething tablets, after lab testing found "inconsistent amounts of belladonna, a toxic substance, in certain homeopathic teething tablets, sometimes far exceeding the amount claimed on the label."

"The body's response to belladonna in children under two years of age is unpredictable and puts them at unnecessary risk," said Janet Woodcock, M.D., director of the FDA's Center for Drug Evaluation and Research.

"Consumers should seek medical care immediately if their child experiences seizures, difficulty breathing, lethargy, excessive sleepiness, muscle weakness, skin flushing, constipation, difficulty urinating, or agitation after using homeopathic teething tablets or gels," the FDA states.

According to a recent report in the scientific journal Advances in Nutrition, after qualitatively analyzing the results of 28 nutritional studies involving 2,900 participants, researchers have concluded that supplementing the diet with omega 3 and coenzyme Q10 (in either liquid or tablet form) can have a beneficial effect on the quantity of spermatozoids in semen. Supplementing the diet with selenium, zinc, fatty acids, omega-3 and coenzyme-Q10 is associated with an increase in spermatozoid concentration; supplement-

ing the diet with selenium, zinc, omega-3, coenzyme-Q10 and carnitines has been associated with an improvement in sperm mobility, and finally, the combination of selenium, fatty acids, omega-3, coenzyme-Q10 and carnitines has a positive effect on the morphology of spermatozoids.

Higher blood levels of omega 3 fatty acids are associated with a higher likelihood of healthy aging among older adults, finds a new U.S. study published by *The BMJ*.

For years, it's remained an open question: what effects do dietary supplements such as high doses of vitamin D or omega-3 fatty acids derived from fish oil have on the risk of diseases such as heart attack, stroke and cancer? While there have been hints along the way, until now, no randomized clinical trial of a general population, especially a racially diverse population, has been large enough to adequately address these questions. According to a recent report in the New England Journal of Medicine, investigators conducted a rigorous placebo-controlled trial over the course of 5.3 years, gleaning a treasure trove of information on the effects of both supplements. The team found that omega-3 fish oil reduced heart attack rates but did not affect risk of stroke or cancer. Vitamin D was associated with a decrease in cancer deaths that started one to two years after participants began treatment.

#### Bow Crossroads Church steeple replaced after lightning strike

A nearly 200-year-old church in Bow reached a milestone Tuesday as a new steeple was hoisted into place to replace one that was destroyed in a lightning strike. Lightning hit the steeple of the Crossroads Community Church in July 2018. Firefighters were able to save most of the building, but the steeple was gone. The congregation was forced to meet elsewhere.

"We've been meeting in the basement after we used the old town hall for a period

of time," said the Rev. Richard Huntley.

The church building dates back to 1832 and likely played a part in the Underground Railroad, church leaders said. For Faye Johnson, who traces her ancestry back to the founding of the town, Tuesday's steeple raising was a way to stay in touch with the past.

Others said restoring the building is also about ensuring the future.

"Across the state, these old places are so

important to our economy," said Jennifer Goodman, of the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance. "They're what residents love. They're what draw visitors and businesses, as well."

By the end of the week, the exterior of the steeple will be enclosed.

"It looks beautiful up there, and it's something that people throughout Bow and the area will be able to look at and enjoy," Huntley said.

## Publisher's Perspective by Leigh Bosse

#### Set High Standards - Then Enforce Them

At last week's Hillsboro-Deering School Board meeting, Chair Kathryn McGinn was proud to read the Board's Mission Statement, which says "The Mission of the Hillsboro-Deering School Board is to articulate and develop the educational goals of the community..." Board members were not happy when I suggested that they have been failing in that mission for over a decade. I asked if members had read and digested the WestEd report developed after a thorough February to April diagnostic review of their

That report cited major disciplinary problems occurring year after year. In fact, none of the HD staff interviewed felt that the school's disciplinary policies were "effective in eliminating disruptive behavior." Not a single staff member.

Cognizant of a decade of failing to improve our schools' rankings near the bottom of state-wide comparisons, that the Department of Education has labeled H-D Elementary as a "School In Need of Comprehensive Support And Improvement" and that School Digger rates HDES 221st of 231 Elementary Schools, HDMS as 102 of 131 and HDHS as 64th of 81. The report quotes HD staff members who reported that "The school has too many ineffective teachers." Teachers aren't held accountable or "There is no clear exaction for how teachers deliver instruction to get students to their performance expectations."

I firmly believe that the key to a good education is a great classroom teacher and we have some excellent ones. I have, however, for about 6 years, suggested that as with any other profession, we also have some average and some below average teachers and administrators, which have been simply rated as "sufficient" and kept on board. Some of HD's best teachers have been saying this for years as they feel cheated with their superior performance treated the same as their colleagues who are just "punching the clock." Despite this long-time knowledge, not one teacher has had their contract non-renewed for poor performance, let alone been fired.

Each time I raise these criticisms I am met with eyeballs rolled back, disgusted looks and condescending replies. In fact, at the last meeting the only comment received was from the Board's newest member Herla Iadonisi who said, "If only we could get together, and promote the positive, things would improve." How naive.

Let me suggest ways to eliminate both problems by following the Mission Statement and "Clearly Articulating" two goals:

1.Discipline

Adopt the following policies and let the administration, faculty and students know it will be strictly adhered to:

1st offense- call the offender aside-teach the correct behavior.

2nd offense -inform the parents of the behavior and the consequences if it contin-

3rd offense - suspended the student for 3 days.

4th offense - expel the student.

Kids don't mind discipline that is fair and administered evenly. I guarantee that if this policy is enforced problems will shrink before the end of the first marking period.

2. Poor Test Scores:

Clearly articulate to all administrators, teachers and paras, that their students will show standard test results at least equal to the state wide average and that failure to meet that standard will result in termination or non-renewal of the contract.

I'll take anyone's bet that test scores will dramatically improve.

This bill establishes a committee of experts to study the best ways to prevent violence in our schools. In order to keep our kids safe, we need to make sure that the most up-to-date information and tools are available to us, and we need to work together to ensure the best ideas are implemented.

Additionally, I sponsored a number of bills dealing with the issues surrounding bullying in our schools. With the rise of technology and social media, bullying has become a much more complex and prevalent problem. That's why I co-sponsored and supported a number of bills that provide for training in both suicide and bullying awareness and prevention, including SB 282 which was signed into law this past week. Besides the parents themselves, often the persons most likely to notice problems with bullying or self-destructive behavior

among students are the teachers and school officials that spend half of the day with our children. Giving them the tools to recognize potential issues is crucial to prevention.

Finally, we also need to ensure that local towns have the resources and flexibility to provide the best education for our children. This is why I supported an increase in stabilization grant funding for local public schools. I also sponsored legislation that increases school choice and allows local school district to develop plans for becoming innovation schools. By allowing local school districts the ability and resources to provide their students with an education that best fits their needs and learning styles, we are giving our students a leg up along their educational path.

I believe that parents are the ones that know what is best when it comes to their children's education. That is why I have tried to spend as much time as I can speaking with parents about our local schools. If you have any ideas or comments on how we can provide our children with a first rate education I would encourage you to contact my office. I hope to hear from you and I hope that you all have a wonderful rest of the summer and start to the school year!
