Antrim Felony Indictments

Three residents face drug and firearm charges

A trio of Antrim residents have been indicted by the Hillsborough County Grand Jury.

Michael Beauchamp, 52, of Antrim was indicted on charges of burglary and theft by unauthorized taking. He has been charged with entering a Peterborough residence and taking two firearms, a Browning 243 and a Remington 870, between April 1 and May 19, 2017. Burglary is a Class B felony, punishable by three-and-a-half years in prison and a \$4,000 fine; Class A theft, a felony, carries a sentence of seven-and-a-

half to 15 years in prison.

Rachel O'Dell, 32, of Antrim has been indicted for possession of a controlled drug, authorities say for allegedly possessing fentanyl in Hillsborough on June 15. The Class A felony carries a seven-and-a-half to 15 years sentence and a \$50,000 fine. Ashley Roy, 30, of Antrim has been indicted for possession of methamphetamine in Hillsborough on June 18. The charge is punishable by seven-and-a-half to 15 years in prison and a \$4,000 fine.

Tilton unknown stabbing assailant remains at large

Tilton Police Department responded to the area of Lochmere Circle in Tilton for a male suffering from a stab wound.

Information provided by the victim was that an unknown male wearing dark colored clothing had stabbed him in the stomach and fled into the woods just west of Lochmere Circle. The Franklin and Bristol Police K-9 units, the NH State Police Air Unit and surrounding agencies conducted an extensive search, but did not locate anyone in the woods.

At this time authorities have no further description of the alleged perpetrator and believe this was an isolated incident.

Hillsborough man and 19 month old child die in North Hampton fire

Fire officials said Benjamin Fauteux, 23, of Hillsborough, and 1-year-old Emerson Quinonez, of North Hampton, died of smoke inhalation in a North Hampton house fire last week. Resident Susan MacDonald, who is in a wheelchair and has lived in the house for 45 years, said that when her smoke alarm started going off Friday night, she called the fire department and then her neighbors. "I called my next-door neighbors, and they came over, came into my bedroom and said, 'You've got to get out of the house. The upstairs is in flames," MacDonald said.

MacDonald lives on the first floor and said she rents the upstairs to a woman and

her child. After she was helped outside, MacDonald said her first thoughts were for her tenants. "Flames were coming out of my dining room," she said. "Smoke was billowing out of my window, my sliders and the attic." MacDonald said her heart goes out to the victims and the child's mother.

"I'm grateful that I'm OK, but I've got so many mixed emotions," she said. "I can't even begin to put them into words." The deaths were ruled to be accidental, officials said. See Emerson's obituary on page 24.

Higher intake of omega-3 fatty acids was associated with better sleep quality and a decrease in depressive symptoms in lupus patients, among other patient-reported outcomes, according to new research findings presented at the ACR/ARHP Annual Meeting. Lupus is a chronic (long-term) inflammatory autoimmune disease in which an unknown trigger causes the body's immune system to attack its own healthy tissues. The most common type of lupus is systemic

lupus erythematosus (SLE), a complex, multi-symptom disease that can cause inflammation, pain and damage to various parts of the body. While anyone can develop lupus, it occurs 9-10 times more often in women than in men, and is 2-3 times more common among women of color.

In just four months, high doses of vitamin D reduce arterial stiffness in young, overweight/obese, vitamin-deficient, but otherwise still healthy African-Americans, researchers write in the journal PLOS ONE. Rigid artery walls are an independent predictor of cardiovascular-related disease and death. Vitamin D deficiency appears to be a contributor.

Vitamin C may reduce the harm done to lungs in infants born to mothers who smoke during their pregnancy, according to a randomized, controlled trial published online in the American Thoracic Society's American Journal of Respiratory and Critical Care Medicine. At three months of age, the infants whose mothers took 500 mg of vitamin C in addition to their prenatal vitamin had significantly better forced expiratory flows (FEFs). FEFs measure how fast air can be exhaled from the lung and are an important measure of lung function because they can detect airway obstruction.

Her successful career in the gym and the classroom culminated by being named the 2012-13 NAC Woman of the Year award; the first Colby-Sawyer student-athlete to be honored.

Shawn Dunstan turned in one of the most impressive careers on snow in men's alpine ski program history. He has the distinction as the only male student-athlete to have earned the Charger Award for Outstanding Male Athlete three times. His illustrious career began in grand fashion as he helped the Chargers win the 2009 United States Collegiate Ski & Snowboard Association (USCSA).

Allyson Le-Bruno is arguably the best to have played volleyball at Colby-Sawyer. Her numbers back it up as she holds numerous career and single season records. She is the all-time leader in digs with 2577 and digs per set at 5.49. The 2577 digs is also a New England Women's Volleyball Association (NEWVA) record. In addition, Allyson is the single-season record-holder in digs with 768 and has four of the top nine totals. Her 6.24 digs per set in 2010 is a record and 6.02 in 2011 is second best.

Danielle Shannon is the first three-time recipient of the Charger Award for Outstanding Female Athlete. She is undoubtedly the most successful alpine skier in program history and her accolades are a confirmation of an illustrious career. Danielle dominated the MacConnell division by winning 13 races and added a few second-place finishes as well. She led the team to a pair of MacConnell Division titles and was a two-time MacConnell Division Individual Champion.

Jennifer LaChance Taylor was an integral member of the 2009-10 Commonwealth Coast Conference (CCC) Championship Team that made the program's first appearance in the NCAA Tournament. She collected 107 career wins with 53 coming in singles and 54 in doubles. An inspiration to her teammates, Jennifer worked just as hard in practice as she did on game day. The perseverance paid off for Jennifer as she was named to the CCC Singles Second Team three times, the CCC Doubles First Team three times, the CCC Doubles Second Team once and the CCC Singles Honorable Mention Team once.

Ways to support shelter animals if you're not ready to adopt

The winter months, which are often considered some of the busiest for animal shelters, are approaching. According to the ASPCA, approximately 6.5 million companion animals enter shelters every year. Adding a shelter pet to your family can be fulfilling, but what if you're not ready or able to adopt? Hartz Loving Paws is committed to supporting companion animals in shelters through product donations and volunteer events. October is Adopt-A-Shelter-Dog Month, and Hartz is partnering with the Humane Society of the New Braunfels Area in Texas to share opportunities for you to give back to pets in need if you're not ready or able to adopt.

1. Donate money or product. Many animal shelters and rescue organizations have direct donation links posted on their websites. Monetary donations go toward pet food, medical attention and vaccines for the animals. Animal shelters and rescue organizations also often create Amazon wish lists with desired products. Shelters typically ask for pet treats, toys and grooming supplies. Sarah Hammond, executive director of the Humane Society of the New Braunfels Area in Texas, said she is grateful for donations from Hartz Loving Paws, which has given more than \$2 million worth of product to shelters and organizations, including her own, since its inception in 2016.

Provide a temporary home. An increased number of animals placed in shelters need foster care before they are ready to find their forever homes. Foster needs range from post-op surgical care to puppy growth care and medical support. Food, medication and other supplies are typically provided when fostering, and the length of time a foster pet may stay in your home varies depending on the animal's needs. Contact your local shelter to fill out an application. Once approved, your local shelter will work closely with you to find the right foster pet for your household.

3. Volunteer at your local shelter or rescue organization. Animal shelters and rescue organizations offer numerous volunteer roles, such as dog walkers, adoption support and training support. Many positions don't require prior experience and can be applied for on your local shelter or rescue organization's website. Volunteer positions vary in expectations and demand, so there is a position for everyone. You can also volunteer to participate in a shelter rebuild project. Hartz Loving Paws renovates shelters twice a year in partnership with GreaterGood.org's Rescue Rebuild program. These teams work with shelters to create playful and welcoming environments for animals.

4. Take photos of adoptable pets. Help animals find homes sooner by taking adoption photos for local shelters. Many people search for adoptable pets online, and with a great profile picture, animals have a greater chance at being adopted. If you're new to photography, there are free training videos available on the One Picture Saves a Life website that show how to take better photos of shelter pets.

5. Become an advocate. Follow animal shelters and rescue organizations on social media and reshare their content. Talk to your family and friends about the importance of caring for shelter pets while they await their forever homes and share how they can help. (BPT)
