Chief Burroughs retiring

Newport Police Chief Jim Burroughs is retiring on Jan 31, 2020, concluding a career that covered more than 25 years.

Now 46, Burroughs graduated from Newport High School in 1993 and joined the Newport PD on August 5, 1994.



He became Newport's first School Resource Officer that year, a post he held for four years. At the time he was one of the first SRO's in the State and the first in this region.

Hopkinton Fire & Rescue at odds

Disagreement revolves around insurance and training

The Hopkinton Rescue Squad has been circulating a flyer stating that "Due to differences beyond our control with our Town Board of Selectmen and Fire Department, we are currently prevented from being in service."

The dispute, which has been brewing since this summer, has Fire Chief Jeffrey Yale directly in the center. According to the Squad, their insurance through the town was dropped without their knowledge and when they purchased their own policy, Chief Yale rejected it. Additionally, Yale has insisted that Squad members be certified as a Firefighter 1. The Squad objects, saying their members are not firefighters and their training complements and supplements that of the Fire Department.

In a series of letters exchanged since August, the insurance issues appear to be near resolution, with the Select Board and the Squad's attorney moving toward selecting an impartial third party to arbitrate the level of training required.

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
Area schools receive NH Department of Education Robotics Grants

The New Hampshire Department of Education today announced that 101 New Hampshire schools have been awarded grants so far this year from the Robotics Education Fund. That compares to 57 schools last year. The grants, which help fund the purchase of robotics kits, stipends for coaches, and competition expenses including transportation, total \$522,000 so far. Participating schools are eligible for another grant next year.

The purpose of the program is to motivate public school students, includ-

ing those attending traditional and charter schools, to pursue educational and career opportunities in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, while building critical life and work-related skills.

Grants from the robotics education fund established in RSA 188-E:24 shall be available to any eligible public school, traditional or charter, for the purpose of financing the establishment of a robotics team and its participation in competitive events. "Robotics tournaments combine team building, problem solving, and handson high-tech experience. I am thrilled that the Robotics Education Fund is helping more than 100 New Hampshire schools compete over the next two years," said Education Commissioner Frank Edelblut. "Funding is still available, and I would encourage any eligible school with a robotics team, or starting one, to apply." Area schools receiving grants include: Bow-\$3,968 ConVal--\$7,330-Franklin-\$7,370-Goffstown--\$10,700 Hopkinton-\$5,000 John Stark-\$5,000 Sunapee-\$3,555 and Winnisquam -\$3,804.

New Deputy Chiefs at Peterborough Fire & Rescue

Peterborough Fire Chief Ed Walker has announced that Captains Brad Winters and Matthew Robblee were promoted to the rank of Deputy Chief. Deputy Chiefs represent the Department whenever the Chief is unavailable. As the full-time Deputy Chief managing the Emergency Medical Service division, Robblee will manage the

day-to-day operations of the ambulance service, hiring staff, keeping up with the department's skills and equipment, and assisting Winters will serve as a Deputy Chief within the Fire department, along with Brian Wall on an on-call basis. They are responsible for overseeing training and education of the officers.



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TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A Canadian clinical trial published in the *New England Journal of Medicine* provides the first approach for safely preventing blood clots (or venous thromboembolism) in people with cancer. About half of people newly diagnosed with a solid cancer could be candidates for the strategy, which involves a low dose of a direct oral anticoagulant called apixaban.

Research presented at the 2018 San Antonio Breast Cancer Symposium found that the drug oxybutynin helps to reduce the frequency and intensity of hot flashes in women who are unable to take hormone replacement therapy, including breast cancer survivors. The drug is most commonly used to treat urinary incontinence.

Children and young adults without psychosis who are prescribed high-dose antipsychotic medications are at increased risk of unexpected death, according to a new study published in *JAMA Psychiatry*. Unexpected death includes deaths due to unintentional drug overdose or cardiovascular/metabolic causes. In 2010, an estimated 1.3 million individuals 24 years of age or younger filled 7 million prescriptions, primarily for behavioral symptoms (such as ADHD), depression or bipolar disorders. However, antipsychotics have potentially lifethreatening effects, even in younger populations, and there are other medications for many of these conditions.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Spravato (esketamine) nasal spray, in conjunction with an oral antidepressant, for the treatment of depression in adults who have tried other antidepressant medicines but have not benefited from them (treatment-resistant depression).

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TONGUE PROBLEMS



Though often hailed as "the strongest muscle in the body," the tongue is made up of a group of muscles that allow us to taste food, swallow, and talk. A healthy tongue is pink and covered with small nodules called papillae.

Because you use your tongue constantly, it can be frustrating and uncomfortable when you experience tongue problems, including discoloration and soreness. There are a variety of causes for a number of common tongue symptoms. Fortunately, the majority of tongue problems are not serious and most can be resolved quickly.

In some instances, though, a discolored or painful tongue can indicate more serious conditions, including vitamin deficiencies, AIDS, or oral cancer. For this reason, it is important to seek medical advice if you have any ongoing problems with your tongue.

Antrim student's e-mail threat causes concern at ConVal

An Antrim student's threatening message on social media has triggered a police investigation and an email notice to ConVal parents Tuesday evening. Superintendent Kimberly Rizzo-Saunders said she couldn't comment on the nature of the threat, but is was serious enough that two police officers were posted at the school Wednesday morning. The threat was described as a

"potential safety concern to the school," but, in an email to parents by Principal Michelle Voto, she said, "We do not believe there is a threat to the safety of ConVal students or staff." According to Peterborough Police Chief Scott Guinard, the police officers posted at ConVal were intended, "just to be present and visible, to assure people that they were in a safe environment."

Two people injured in Franklin accident

Two people were taken to the hospital after a head-on crash on Route 3 in Franklin last Thursday. Crews responded to the scene just north of Punch Brook Road around 5:45 p.m., according to the Franklin Fire Department. The drivers of the two vehicles that hit head-on were taken to Concord Hospital. One suffered serious but non-life-threatening injuries, while the other had minor injuries. A third vehicle was also involved in the crash, but its driver was not transported to the hospital.

Declining enrollment threatens Francestown

The December 17th School Board meeting, held at Francestown Elementary School, may well decide the future of that school. Faced with a projected decline in enrollment from 53 to only 38 students next year, a ConVal administrative team has proposed the option of a warrant article to reassign those Francestown students to other schools until numbers increase. Superintendent Kimberly Rizzo-Saunders cautions that there's been no decision, no warrant, and not even a public discussion about any options to date, as it was first brought to the School Board at a November 2nd meeting, but the Board tabled the discussion.

Internal Stoddard dispute to be heard Dec. 23

A scheduled Non-Public Session with the Stoddard Select Board was not opened as Fire Chief Stephen McGerty stated that he had complaints with Town Administrator, Jim Coffey, who exercised his right for the session to be public. Coffey then requested that Chief McGerty's complaints be sent to the board in writing and there to be a scheduled public discussion at the December 23rd meeting. Chief McGerty also referenced a past complaint against the Fire Department that had been looked into by the Town's legal counsel.






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John Stark High School announces it's Connections Program

What you can do about your dog's stinky breath

Taking care of your dog's health is important, so it may be a good idea to spend more time focused on your fourlegged pal's mouth, helping you avoid potential problems down the road.

1. Check your dog's mouth

While you may take your dog in for periodic professional brushing - which is a great idea - frequent checks and brushing at home can help you notice problems earlier. While you're brushing, look for problem signs, such as:

- * Bad breath * Excessive drooling * Inflamed gums
- * Tumors in gums * Cysts under tongue * Loose teeth
- * Plaque and tartar build-up (yellowish brown coating around gum and teeth). If you spot any of these issues, make an appointment with your vet.

2. Dental care


