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Hopkinton High School honored

US News ranks Hopkinton High School #3 in the state

US News has ranked Hopkinton High School as the third best high school in the state of NH, trailing only #1 Nashua's Academy of Design and #2 Sunapee.

Students have the opportunity to take Advanced Placement® coursework and exams. The AP® participation rate at Hopkinton High School is 65%. The total minority enrollment is 7%, and 6% of students are economically

disadvantaged.

Hopkinton High School is ranked #796 in the National Rankings. Schools are ranked on their performance on state-required tests, graduation and how well they prepare students for college.

54% of Hopkinton students passed at least one AP® Exam, 59% attained Mathematics Proficiency and 98% of students graduate.

Sununu extends State of Emergency order to May 15th

Gov. Chris Sununu renewed his COVID-19 "state of emergency" declaration through at least May 15 on Friday. The state's stay home order is still in place until at least May 4, though the governor could extend it too.

The order came at the end of a week that saw a sharp increase in the number of confirmed cases. Between April 17 and Friday, testing confirmed 433 new cases of COVID- 19 in New Hampshire, according to the state Department of Health and Human Services. "New Hampshire needs more time to stop the spread of coronavirus" Sununu's Friday declaration states.

New Hampshire's stay home order, and the order closing "non-essential" businesses is set to expire May 4, but the governor could extend that order further.

New London's goal 100% renewable electricity by 2030

New London's pledge to achieve renewable sources of electricity is making progress. There has been major progress on our municipal solar project, which will eventually supply 40% of the electricity used by all municipal buildings and facilities. We now have more than 200 solar panels on the roof of the large Public Works Garage.

These panels will produce a peak output 50 kilowatts of power during the sunniest part of the day, and over 50,000 kilowatt hours over the course of a year.

Behind the Sewer Department, contractors are preparing the site for an even larger solar array, with 400 panels producing up to 100 kilowatts of peak power, and over 100,000 kilowatt-hours on an annual basis.

Some if not all of the panels should be connected to the grid and producing electric power within the next month. This will put us well on our way toward our municipal goal, approved by Town Meeting in 2018, of achieving 100% renewable electricity by the year 2030.

DRY MOUTH—PART II



Can I prevent dry mouth?

Unfortunately there seems to be no way of actually preventing the problem, although there are products to ease the symptoms.

What problems can it cause?

Having less saliva can also affect the taste of food and makes it harder to eat drier foods. Sometimes it can affect your speech and it makes people more likely to have bad breath.

What products are there to help with dry mouth?

There are a number of gels or sprays designed to help your mouth stay moist and comfortable. Some have extra ingredients that may help prevent tooth and gum problems. There are also special products to help with your day-to-day oral hygiene (for example toothpastes and mouth rinses).

Vitamin D deficiency in expectant mothers during pregnancy has a negative effect on the social development and motor skills of pre-school age children, a new study in the *British Journal of Nutrition* reports.

A new study in *JAMA Surgery* analyzed more than 200,000 opioid-naive individuals who had undergone one of eight common surgical procedures between 2006 and 2014 and were subsequently prescribed

opioid pain medication. Every day, more than 90 Americans die after overdosing on opioids, according to the National Institute on Drug Abuse. Misuse of and addiction to opioids has become a public health crisis with more than 2 million Americans suffering from substance abuse issues related to prescription opioid pain medication. While over-prescription of pain medications has been implicated as a driver of this growing opioid epidemic, few guidelines exist on how to appropriately prescribe opioid pain medication following surgery with the goal of balancing pain with risk of addiction. Using a nationally representative sample of people who were opiate naive undergoing common procedures, researchers found that median prescription length for the first-time prescriptions was four to seven days, and that the number of people who required a refill of their opiate prescription varied from 11.3 percent to 39.3 percent depending on the type of procedure performed. The duration of the prescription also varied depending on the category of procedure, from nine days for general surgery to 15 days for musculoskeletal procedures. While seven days may be more than adequate for many patients undergoing common general surgery and gynecological procedures, prescription length limits may need to be extended to 10 days, recognizing that as many as 40 percent of patients may still require a refill at a seven-day limit for pain management, particularly following many orthopedic and neurosurgical procedures.

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Greenfield Volunteer Fire Department responded to a serious medical emergency which required a DART helicopter to transport the patient to a level 1 trauma Center. Bennington Fire Department, Wilton ambulance, Greenfield Police, and the Crotched Mountain staff helped to secure the landing zone.

Trooper justified in shooting Dylan Stahley

Attorney General Gordon MacDonald has ruled that a New Hampshire State Police trooper was justified in shooting Dylan Stahley, 22, of Windsor, who pointed a handgun at police. The shooting took place April 5 at White Park and resulted in a gunshot wound for Stahley. Authorities say they will release a full report of the shooting once Stahley's criminal charges are resolved. In New Hampshire, the Attorney General's office investigates all police shootings. Legally, the shooting constituted a use of deadly force even though Stahley survived, MacDonald's statement reads.

Citizen's petition calls for resignation of Weare School Board member

On April 23rd, Rochelle Kelley, a member of Weare School Board, visited a park in Concord, with friends and family. Ms.



Kelley and company, including small children, bypassed the police tape surrounding the playground that was in place to prevent the spread of Coronavirus per Governor Sununu's

Executive Order. They proceeded to play on the playground equipment until police were called. When Concord Police officers arrived, Ms. Kelley and company engaged in a confrontation with them while small children were present.

During the confrontation Ms. Kelley and company were asked to leave the playground several times by Concord Police. They disobeyed the order and stayed. They finally complied, but only after Ms. Kelley or others in her presence called the officers Nazis, told them they were crackheads, coughed in the officers presence, and argued with the officers in a disrespectful manner. Ms. Kelley claimed

to be a taxpayer of Concord with rights to use the playground, however she is a resident of Weare.


Later Ms. Kelley posted videos of the confrontation to Facebook to boast about the run-in. It has apparently backfired as a petition is circulating to have her removed from the Board. In part it says, "The undersigned residents of the Town of Weare do not disagree with Ms. Kelley's right to freedom of speech, however we take issue with the disrespect to law enforcement and language and/or actions that were witnessed in the video of the April 23rd

incident. Whether these actions and/or words were performed by her or in her presence, we the undersigned have lost faith in her ability to objectively, civilly, and maturely advocate for the children of Weare and its taxpayers.

At this time, per attorneys that have been consulted with by SAU 24, NH law does not have recall provisions for elected School Board members. Due to the lack of such law, we the undersigned request Rochelle Kelley to resign from her position as Weare School Board Member effective immediately."



Seven towns assist Antrim in battling house fire Sunday afternoon

Antrim firefighters, with assists from seven other towns, responded to a two-alarm fire at 47 Bridle Road East on Sunday afternoon, which caused significant damage to a dome house down a narrow dirt road in Antrim on Sunday afternoon. The residents were home, but were able to escape unharmed.

Officials believe the fire was caused by a wood stove, and caused significant damage, including the total destruction of an ell



attached to the main domed structure. Fire Chief Marshall Gale reported that part of the dome roof was damaged by fire, and he was unsure of the its integrity after being exposed to extreme heat. Gale said that the bulk of the fire was knocked down in the first 15 minutes but firefighters conducted an extensive check of the building to be sure there were no flareups.

Hopkinton Town Meeting delayed to 6/13

The Hopkinton Select Board held a brief meeting via Zoom on Monday evening. Members had been approached about reopening the tennis courts for public use. Although sympathetic, members felt it was necessary to be consistent, also because the skateboard park and other facilities were closed the courts should remain closed for the time being. The Board held a long discussion on Town Meeting, which was scheduled for May 16th. After conferring with the Moderator, the meeting was moved to June 13.

Peterborough Players canceling 2020 season

The 87-year-old professional theater, Peterborough Players, is canceling its summer season after already canceling the spring performances that had been scheduled — the first time the theater has gone dark in 45 years. "The more we look at it, the clearer it is for all kinds of reasons that it was prudent and safe to take an intermission this summer," said Keith Stevens, managing director for Peterborough Players. Stevens said that given the state of emergency caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, there is a good chance the Players' theater won't reopen until next summer.

Governor's Task Force examining four phase reopening of restaurants

Governor Chris Sununu's Reopening Task Force is focusing on how to reopen the hard-hit hospitality industry and considered a four-phase approach for lodging and restaurants. New Hampshire's hospitality industry has lost \$800 million during the COVID-19 pandemic so far. The head of the New Hampshire Lodging and Restaurants Association, Mike Somers, said roughly half of the industry's 70,000 employees have been laid off or furloughed.

During the week, the task force has been meeting this day at 3 p.m. to discuss reopening various industries. Two meetings were held for public comment, one on April 30 from 1-3 p.m. and the second on May 1 from 9-11 a.m. Somers sits on the governor's reopening task force and

presented a plan to reopen the hospitality industry. The four-phase approach would begin with outdoor dining and tables at least six feet apart. "We think that's a small step in the grand scheme of things, as an industry we'd like to see that happen relatively quickly, we'd like to see that happen May 5," Somers said.

Phase-two would reopen indoor seating with tables at least six feet apart, no buffets and no more than 10 people at a table.

Hotels would reopen with extra sanitizing measures; exercise areas would remain closed and so would other gathering areas.

Phase-three would expand the number of people allowed at each table and hotels could reopen exercise facilities.

Phase-four would bring things back to

near-normal, with upgraded cleaning and sanitizing measures.

There is no timeline established, but in each phase, staff will get their temperatures taken when they arrive for their shift. Frequent hand-washing would be required, and personal protective equipment would be available to them.

Rochelle Kelley needs to resign

On page 7 you will read the story of Rochelle Kelley, a member of Weare School Board, who in defiance of Governor Sununu's Stay-Home Order and the advice of countless health officials, took her family and friends to a park in Concord, crossed police tape surrounding the playground, and company engaged in a confrontation with Concord Police when ordered to leave.

During the confrontation Kelley and company called the officers Nazis, told them they were crackheads, coughed at the officers presense, and acted in a totally disrespectful manner. In an attempt to embarrass the officers, Kelley posted videos of the confrontation to Facebook to boast about the run-in.

In an ironic twist, the Weare Police Department just posted this reminder on Facebook: "If a person violates an emergency order, rule, or regulation issued by the Governor, the person shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The person may also be in violation of NH RSA 644:2, the disorderly conduct statute, which prohibits: knowingly or purposely creating a condition hazardous to oneself or another in a public place by any action which serves no legitimate purpose; or, knowingly refusing to comply with a lawful order of a peace officer to move from or remain away from a public place."

Such actions by anyone in defiance of lawful authority is unacceptable. In a public official it is intolerable.

Her poor example to us all, let alone the children in the Weare school system demands that Rochelle Kelley resign from the Weare School Board immediately.

Teaching in a 5th Grade Self-Contained Remote

April 27, 2020-Weare, NH—Nothing compares to being in the classroom: the instant support based on a student's puzzled or "I understand" face; highfives as positive reinforcement to success; coopera-

tive kinesthetic activities - these things are gone, but in their place, new routines have developed, and we continue to thrive where possible.

We are lucky to be a remote classroom with 100% participation. I think it shows my students' drive for education and being a "Super" team and strong communication with their parents. Students seem to appreciate the Google Classroom structure where work is neatly presented, easily accessible and includes a check-off list of tasks to-do daily and for the week. This routine allows them to have less technology and "how-to" questions, and more questions focused on academics.

We still say "The Pledge" each morning and continue our Series of Unfortunate Events Reader's Theatre using a pdf copy of the book during our Morning Meeting - a continuation of in-class routines. For other assignments, students have enjoyed having a choice; whether it be the choice of science projects, math practice options, or Fantasy Book Club book choices. I've strived to provide assignments that let students pick related topics they are interested in, and present them in ways that are meaningful to them. I've received - and they've presented writing, hands-on projects, pictures, videos, and more! Some things that I would have never been able to see inside my classroom.

A downfall to remote learning that students encounter (besides technology bumps) is missing peers outside of their classroom. Some workarounds have included phones, social media, and gaming, but students agree that it's not the same as being face-to-face. Some student engagement is also tough. "We can only lead them to water, we can't make them drink," is a great analogy because we can only hope that students want to take education on with this support during remote learning. We can't reach everyone at every moment, but hopefully, we're providing enough support and interesting assignments to keep students coming back each day.

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Bradford's Lt. Ed Shaughnessy recognized for saving a baby's life

On April 28th Lt. Edward Shaughnessy received a commendation from Chief James Valiquet and Interim Fire Chief Christopher Olsen for his response to a call on April 17th. The photo shows the ceremony outside of the Bradford Fire House, on the left is Pam Drewniak, from New London Hospital, who presented the first responders with life saving pins.

On April 17th, 2020 Lt. Edward Shaughnessy of the Bradford Police Department responded to a medical call of a two month old baby "turning blue, not breathing CPR in progress." Upon arrival he found the baby unresponsive, very pale, and not breathing. He rolled the child onto her stomach tapped her on the back to let gravity clear her airway. Rolling her back onto her back he did chest compression, swept out the infants mouth and established air airway.

His swift and professional response in establishing an airway and chest compression were instrumental in the child becoming responsive. Capt. Regina MaCarthy and Lt. Rob Steiz arrived on scene and took over medical Care. The infant was then turned over to Henniker Ambulance for transport to the Concord Hospital.

This is a clear and convincing example of inter-departmental efforts and mutual aid agreements working to provide public safety.

Lieutenant Shaughnessy is commended for his life saving actions. Thank you to everyone that assisted in this amazing rescue call. Congratulations to all on a job, well done.

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
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
