
Once the ceremony is completed, there will be a staggered dismissal of participants to their cars for parades let by Weare and Henniker police.

Marion Baker briefed the Hillsborough Select Board on plans for the 2020 "History Alive" event. To be held on Sunday only, August 16th, it will be presented on a single site at historic Hillsborough's Center.

The Civil War Reenactors will not be present, but John Porter will speak on the area's barns and Mary Kelly will speak on the Irish immigrants who settled in Hillsborough. Food vendors will not be included, but visitors are encouraged to bring their own picnic lunch on the lawn, under the trees.

Various exhibits and demonstrations will be spaced around the area including the school house and church. The entire event will be free to all, and although limited this year, will serve as a preview of next year's full blown 250th Celebration.



Private donations may fund major renovations to Project Genesis

Youth Services Director Chelsea Szalanski met with the Hillsborough Select Board to discuss potential renovations to the Project Genesis facility on West Main Street, and the possible private donations which could be used to fund the project.

She outlined the following renovations in order from highest to lowest priority:

1. Remove wall between the dining room and game room on the second story of the building to expand current dining room and create a larger space for groups and meetings and dinners

2. Replace wood flooring and carpet on second floor with vinyl flooring to create a cleaner and more durable work space for large groups and youth

3. Sand/Stain staircase to prohibit further wear and damage

4. Replace screens in all upstairs windows

5. Purchase larger dining room table to accommodate all attendees for groups and

6. Update computer systems so youth can access school work (2 new desktop computers)

7. Purchase 4 additional Wyze security cameras to have reliable surveillance of entire youth center that works with the current security system

8. Purchase a new trailer to allow deliveries of wood from our Wood Bank program that provides free wood to community members in need of fuel assistance Szalanski estimated the total cost to be approximately \$15,000 to \$17,000, and reported that she has been approached by two prominent Hillsborough families who are considering substantial donations which could cover the costs. She will be soliciting help from local contractors who might be willing to donate their labor and thus stretch the dollars given.

The Board was unanimously supportive and gave tentative approval subject to her return with final cost figures.

Newbury Select Board approves plan for reopening the Town Offices

The Newbury Select Board has approved plans for Reopening of the Town Office; Phase One: On Monday, June 1st the entrance will be by appointment only. You can call or email the department you need and request an appointment to come in. The department will get back to you with your appointment time.

The doors will remain locked, only appointments will be allowed in.

The employees will continue work in the office and remotely as they have been with limiting in office hours and staggered employees.

Suggestion that the Board authorizes that people entering the town office wear masks.

Have table with masks if needed for an appointment and hand sanitizer at door when walking in.

Wipes available if people would like to wipe down counter before use.

Recommendation for people to still use online services and mail.

In other business, Ken Holmes informed the Board that last week the civil engineer informed him that while the town had obtained approval from the State last fall for the 3" curb cut towards the north for the Playground/Vet's Memorial parking lot, on-site surveying and engineering has determined that the plan won't meet the required site distancing (due to rise in elevation of Rt. 103 as one approaches town offices) to make it work and obtain NHDOT approval. He presented a revised site plan that is being engineered. It still meets the primary goal of having a very distinct, separate parking area for the public to use, and will have traffic signage steering citizens to that lot, but eliminates the 3" curb cut so as to meet NHDOT requirements.

AS WE AGE, ORAL HEALTH PLAYS INCREASING ROLE IN OVERALL HEALTH



Oral health is a critical component to overall health for all ages, but according to a new report, vigilance is especially critical for the elderly.

In a review article recently published in the Journal of the American Geriatrics Society, the authors outline the potential complications that can arise from poor oral hygiene in older adults.

Data from the National Center for Health Statistics indicates that the prevalence of cavities is more than twice as high in older adults than younger adults. The prevalence of periodontitis—a serious gum infection that damages the soft tissue and destroys the bone that supports your teeth—also increases with age. As many as 64% of older adults in the U.S. have periodontitis.

Periodontitis is associated with a variety of medical conditions including cardiovascular disease and diabetes. Patients with replacement heart valves and prosthetic joints should be particularly careful regarding their oral hygiene, according to the authors.

It is well recognized that manipulation of teeth and their support structures can result in bacteria present in the oral cavity being released into the bloodstream, which may lead to infections in parts of the body far removed from the oral cavity.

Without good oral hygiene, the use of fluoride, and regular dental care, older adults are more prone to damage to the oral cavity and the extension of infection into surrounding tissues.

Tooth loss, for instance, can affect a person's ability to chew, which can lead to malnutrition. Chronic oral infection is a recognized risk factor for heart disease, and can also lead to the spread of infection to artificial joints and endocardial implants.

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TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



Patients who suffer from Aspirin Exacerbated Respiratory Disease (AERD) often experience an additional allergic reaction when drinking alcohol, including nasal congestion, wheezing, and a runny nose. Now a new study published in the journal *International Forum of Allergy and Rhinology* finds a common treatment for AERD — aspirin desensitization — can

also help alleviate the alcohol-induced symptoms of the condition.

Taking a low-dose aspirin daily may help women lower their risk of developing ovarian cancer. A new study published in *JAMA Oncology* found that women who reported taking a low-dose aspirin every day had a 23 percent lower risk of ovarian cancer compared to nonaspirin users. The research also found that women who were heavy users of nonaspirin nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), such as ibuprofen (Advil) or naproxen (Aleve), over a long period of time had a higher risk of developing ovarian cancer. Ovarian cancer is the most fatal gynecological cancer, largely due to lack of early detection strategies.

Two recent studies published in the journals *Frontiers in Pharmacology* and *Medicines*, document that patients experienced statistically and clinically significant therapeutic benefits when they used cannabis for dozens of health symptoms, ranging from chronic pain to insomnia, with relatively minimal negative side effects.

New London's solar farm operational - producing 25% of town's needs

Jamie Hess, New London Energy Committee Chair has announced that the Municipal Solar Project recently began producing electricity Thanks to abundant sunshine last week. the 400-panel Sewer Department array is already generating enough power to satisfy more than 25% of the electrical needs of all Town facilities.

When the 200-panel Public Works array goes online in early June, nearly 40% of our electric needs will be met with solar. This is a 'revenue-neutral' project that will incur no cost to the Town or its taxpayers.

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SHOPPING FOR A MORTGAGE: BE CAREFUL WITH ADVERTISEMENTS



Any initial information you receive about mortgages probably will come from advertisements, mail, phone, and door-to-door solicitations from builders, real estate brokers, mortgage brokers, and lenders. Although this information can be helpful, keep in mind that these are marketing materials-the ads and mailings are designed to make the mortgage look as attractive as possible. These advertisements may play up low initial interest rates and monthly payments, without emphasizing that

those rates and payments could increase substantially later. So get all the facts and make sure any offers you consider meet your financial needs.

Any ad for an ARM that shows an introductory interest rate should also show how long the rate is in effect and the annual percentage rate, or APR, on the loan. If the APR is much higher than the initial rate, that is a sign that your payments may increase a lot after the introductory period, even if market interest rates stay the same.

Tip: If there is a big difference between the initial interest rate and the APR listed in the ad, it may mean that there are high fees associated with the loan.

Choosing a mortgage may be the most important financial decision you will make. You should get all the information you need to make the right decision. Ask questions about loan features when you talk to lenders, mortgage brokers, settlement or closing agents, your attorney, and other professionals involved in the transaction-and keep asking until you get clear and complete answers.

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New London Select Board closes two beaches

The New London Board of Selectmen voted to close the town's two beaches: Bucklin Beach and Elkins Beach. These closures are effective immediately. The Selectmen took this action in the interest of the health and safety of the citizens of New London during the COVID-19 pandemic. In coming to this decision, the Selectmen pointed to the need to be consistent with the Governor's guidance on steps that must be taken to stop the spread of the coronavirus. The Selectmen will monitor this issue on a daily basis to ensure that the beaches are re-opened as soon as it is reasonable to do so.

Deering Lake beach & picnic area are closed

The Deering Lake beach and picnic area is closed because of the COVID-19 global pandemic. There is a slow opening of parking for cars carrying canoes and kayaks, but the parking remains limited. Parking fees are applicable. Our Lake Host employees will be checking boats before they enter the lake. Please maintain social distancing to ensure their safety. Toilet facilities are for use by lake host employees only. There is no public facility. The Boat launch remains open and there is designated parking for boat trailers. The parking is limited to only that designated space. Only boat trailer parking is allowed. Other vehicles will be ticketed. There is no parking fee for boat trailers.

The current plan is to not have lifeguards and place signage requiring proper social distancing and require self-monitoring, and carry-in and carry-out for trash and other items. It was also decided to remove the diving float from the property.


ConVal Board reverses decision - sends solar array project out to bid

In a reversal of a prior decision to award the solar array project to ReVision Energy, the ConVal School Board has decided to open the project to competitive bidding. The delay makes it unlikely the district will qualify for the financial incentives that justified ReVision as the sole source provider.

Last November, the Board authorized the district to award ReVision a sole source provider agreement to take advantage of time-sensitive tax credit benefits that would result in lowering the power purchase agreement rates and buyout cost. The tax credit for the solar project dropped from 30 percent to 26 in 2019, and if the project is delayed until 2021, the




