Hopkinton voters say "NO" again **Revised Hopkinton School District budget rejected**

After having a total of six alternative budgets rejected in drive-by voting on May 16th, the Hopkinton School Board put forth a 7th proposal, asking voters to approve a \$21,072,696 operating budget on May 30th.

With just over 1,400 voting previously, the numbers swelled to 1,717 Saturday, but the results were the same. The budget was easily rejected by a vote of Yes: 770, to No: 949. Because of the budget, Moderator James

Newson recessed the meeting until Wednesday, August 12, at 7 pm for an online meeting, and to Saturday, August 15, 2020, at 9 am, for voting at the Hopkinton Middle High School.


Newson cautioned that a further postponement of the recessed meeting may be necessary in order to hold the meeting safely and effectively. He hoped to be able to conduct that meeting under the regular meeting format.

NEC and Town to coordinate a smooth campus opening

Dr. Michelle Perkins, President of New England College and Dr. Wayne Lesperance, Vice President of Academic Affairs met with the Henniker Select Board to discuss reopening the campus this fall. President Perkins said that because of the virus, she expects a 20% reduction in the usual 1,000 students on campus. She stressed that students would be tested on arrival and classroom teaching would be only one day per week with the oth-

ers via Zoom. Lesperance apologized for not keeping the Board informed of campus plans, and promised future cooperation and coordination, and agreed to join a Town-Gown joint committee.

He said that he could not guarantee that students would follow the Covid guidelines on and off campus, but stresses that those who did not would be sent home with no refund.



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SAU 34 Task Force formed to plan for return to school

The District Leadership Team composed of SAU and Building Administration, the Facilities, Technology, and Food Service Directors, the District Nurse, the Grant Managers, and the Union Presidents held its second meeting on Tuesday, May 26, 2020. Surveys to obtain initial feedback from families and staff members are being finalized and will be distributed via email this week. Surveys for students and the community at large are in process and will be distributed soon. All the surveys will have a link to volunteer to participate in the planning process.

Stakeholder Forums are being organized and will be held between June 13 and June 30th. These forums will be an opportunity for members of our community to share their experiences and ideas

Fire causes heavy damage at Cousineau Forest Products

Firefighters from around the region responded to support Henniker in battling a fire at Cousineau Forest Products on Sunday. Firefighters were hampered by heavy winds which caused the fire to spread into nearby woods on the 26 acre facility.

Initially called to the scene just after 3 p.m., firefighters remained on the scene into Sunday evening. The fire consumed piles of logs and a building used for shredding and processing wood. At its Henniker operation, Cousineau company processes wood into chips, bark mulch, whole tree wood chips, biomass fuel, playground surfacing, pallets and clean wood waste.

Despite an estimated \$500,000 in damage, the company plans to be back operational soon.

Henniker Chamber plans to repair town's brick sidewalks

Administrator Joe Divine informed the Select Board that the Henniker Chamber of Commerce is requesting permission to replace and relay the brick downtown. They have partnered with NEC, Daniel's, and Davis & Towle. The Town would not be responsible for any of the costs associated with this downtown work. He has spoken with the Highway Superintendent, Leo Aucoin, who supports this project. Town Legal Counsel advises that the Chamber of Commerce and the Town enter an MOU that details the project with expectations and specifications for the work. After the job is completed, the Board can hold a public hearing on the acceptance per RSA 31:95-e. The Board unanimously approved.

TOOTH LOSS ASSOCIATED WITH HIGHER RISK OF HEART DISEASE



Adults who have lost teeth due to nontraumatic reasons may have a higher risk of developing cardiovascular disease, according to a new study.

Cardiovascular disease is the number one cause of death of men and women in the United States, and previous studies have linked cardiovascular disease with oral disease. Oral disease is an inflammatory disease that uses tooth loss due to the breakdown of periodontal tissue

frequently causes tooth loss due to the breakdown of periodontal tissue.

The causal association between oral disease and cardiovascular disease is not well known, so researchers in this study looked at tooth loss not caused by trauma, as well as cardiovascular disease, including heart attack, angina and/or stroke.

The study included 316,588 participants from the United States and territories between the ages of 40-79. Overall, 8 percent were edentulous (had no teeth) and 13 percent had cardiovascular disease. The percentage of people who had cardiovascular disease and were edentulous was 28 percent, compared to only 7 percent who had cardiovascular disease but did not have missing teeth.

In addition to edentulous participants, those who reported having one to five missing teeth or six or more, but not all, missing teeth were also more likely to develop cardiovascular disease, even after adjusting for other factors such as body mass index, age, race, alcohol consumption, smoking, diabetes and dental visits.

They may start as well-intentioned efforts to calm anxiety, improve sleep or ease depression, but prescriptions for sedatives known as benzodiazepines may lead to long-term use among one in four older adults who receive them, according to new research published in JAMA Internal Medicine. That's despite warnings against long-term use of these drugs, especially among older people, because they can increase

the risk of car crashes, falls and broken hips, as well as causing other side effects.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Libtayo (cemiplimabrwlc) injection for intravenous use for the treatment of patients with metastatic cutaneous squamous cell carcinoma (CSCC) or locally advanced CSCC who are not candidates for curative surgery or curative radiation. This is the first FDA approval of a drug specifically for advanced CSCC. CSCC is the second most common human cancer in the United States with an estimated annual incidence of approximately 700,000 cases. The most common form of skin cancer is basal cell cancer. Squamous cells are thin, flat cells that look like fish scales and are found in the tissue that forms the surface of the skin. CSCC usually develops in skin areas that have been regularly exposed to the sun or other forms of ultraviolet radiation. While the majority of patients with CSCC are cured with surgical resection, a small percentage of patients will develop advanced disease that no longer responds to local treatments including surgery and radiation. Advanced CSCC may cause disfigurement at the site of the tumor and local complications such as bleeding or infection, or it may spread (metastasize) to local lymph nodes, distant tissues and organs and become life-threatening.

Blagden is still working on gathering quotes for the project. Jason Allen reached out to Central New Hampshire Regional Planning to discuss the planning and design process. The Committee plans to submit the project for grant funding by the June 19 deadline and will keep the Board updated as activity progresses. A motion to move forward with the trail as proposed by the Rail Trail Committee provided that snowmobiling is allowed on the trail was unanimously approved.

The Board decided to revisit this issue in two weeks after a trip to Loudon, to gain insight as their Inspector is overseen by their fire department.

QUALIFYING FOR A MORTGAGE



To some potential buyers, particularly first-time buyers, the prospect of meeting a mortgage lender may seem a little scary. Lenders look first at your income, but not just the total amount; how you earn it is also important. For example, income from bonuses, commissions and overtime can vary from year to year. If these sources make up a large percentage of your income, your lender will want to know how reliable they are.

Your lender will also consider the relationship between your income and expenses. Generally, your fixed housing expenses (mortgage payment, insurance and property taxes, but not repairs or maintenance) should not be more than 28 percent of your gross monthly income, although this is not an absolute rule. Your lender will also consider other long-term debts, such as car loans or college loans. It is a good idea to bring the following when you meet with your lender:

Employment, salary and bonuses, and any other source of income for the past two years (bring your most recent pay stub, previous year's W-2 forms and tax returns if possible)

The most recent account statement showing the amount of any dividend and interest income you received during the past two years

Official documentation to support the amount of any other regular income you may receive (alimony, child support, etc.)

Job stability is a factor that a mortgage lender will look for, and two years at your current job helps, but this also is not an absolute requirement. If you change jobs but stay in the same line of work, you should not have a problem—especially if the job change is an advancement or increase in income.

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Weare Select Board approves opening Chase Park under Covid guidelines

Parks & Recreation Commission Chair JaNeen Lentsch and Parks Director Lisa Purington-Grollijahn met with the Weare Select Board to discuss opening the Chase Park beach and boat ramp on June 6th.

The beach will be open from 9 a.m.

to 8 p.m. with the boat ramp closing 1/2 hour earlier. Any vehicles left after closing will be towed at the owner's expense. Picnic tables will be spaced 10 ft. apart.

There will be no lifeguards on duty, but the bathrooms will be available. The Attorney General has advised that no parties larger than 10 will be permitted.

Earlier in the meeting the Board had approved the hiring of 18 new or returning staff, who will receive an orientation on June 5th. The Board recommended but did not mandate that the staff wear masks while on duty.

George Floyd R. I. P.

I had another Publisher's Perspective, written and ready for inclusion in this week's paper, celebrating the remarkable unity Americans have shown during this



Covid-19 pandemic. It will have to wait, as the death of George Floyd has reopened lingering racial tension which threaten to tear us apart.

This newspaper has always, and will continue to be a sup-

porter of our police. They are hometown heroes who risk their lives to keep us safe. The overwhelming majority are not only good cops, but good citizens. But, when cops cross the line, they must be immediately held accountable. Floyd's brutal treatment by Officer Derek Chauvin was appalling enough. It was magnified by Minneapolis officials' delay in arresting him, giving the impression of a coverup. Even today Chauvin has only been charged with second degree murder and the other officers who witnessed and assisted in the arrest have finally been charged.

While this tragedy has ripped us apart, it gives us the opportunity to heal wounds that have festered for centuries.

White Americans must immediately raise our voices, demand swift justice, applaud and join in the peaceful protests. While we condemn the looting and rioting, our judgement must be tempered by the knowledge that we didn't grow up Black, and that there is some validity to White privilege.

Black Americans must immediately raise their voices and while demanding equal treatment under the law, condemn the looting and rioting. Black leaders like former President Obama and Rev. Al Sharpton need to emphasize that looting and rioting demeans the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Rosa Parks and Medgar Evers.

We have come a long way from slavery to the election of a Black president, but racism and bigotry still exist in America. Together we can close the divide.

They may also call the library during hours of operation for personalized reader advisory service. The number is 428-3471. Emailed requests will also be accepted at tuckerfreestaff@comcast.net. June 9th library will begin offering CURBSIDE PICKUP at the rear of the building at the designated entrance. CURBSIDE PICKUP will occur daily Tuesday-Saturday. 


