No contracts for Hopkinton staff

60 Hopkinton support staff without 2021 contracts

With voters rejecting seven alternative budget proposals during two drive-by sessions, 60 employees of the Hopkinton School District face an uncertain future, after the School Board decided not to vote to extend 2021 contracts to the support staff. According to Superintendent Steve Chamberlin, the Board's decision affects teacher aides and paraeducators, food service workers and office assistants.

School Board Chair Jim O'Brien explained that board members did not confirm contracts at Thursday's meeting because of a need to reduce district expenditures by \$500,000 in order to start the new fiscal year on July 1. The Board has until June 30 to extend contracts to these 60 employees before they lose their jobs and their health insurance.

Nancy Skarmeas, co-president of the educational support staff union, issued a statement saying staff members were "surprised and disappointed" by the announcement. "We ended the school year this week exhausted, but proud of what we had all accomplished together," she wrote.

"The disrespect shown for support staff employees by the board's actions Thursday night is unacceptable. Instead of looking back at work well done, support staff members now face possible loss of employment and health insurance in a very uncertain world."

The board had previously confirmed contracts for all Hopkinton teachers earlier this year. The School Board has scheduled a working session on June 18 to finalize which cuts will be made.

Henniker approves operating budgets before continuing meeting

Henniker's twice postponed Town Meeting suffered an additional 50 minute delay on Saturday when the Wifi failed to connect in several of the 12 rooms containing voters. Once underway, Moderator Cordell Johnson announced that the first six articles, dealing with election of officers and zoning amendments had been previously approved in March.

Article 7, requesting a \$3,200,000 bond for upgrades at the Wastewater Plant was tabled.

Article 8, requesting a \$350,000 bond for new water pipe was approved on a 70-10 ballot vote.

Article 10 asked to approve \$5,628,228 as the town 2020 operating budget, reelecting a \$199,974, or 3% increase. A amendment by resident Robert

Garrison, affecting several line items was soundly defeated and the article approved.

After repeated technical breakdowns, the meeting was moved to the gym, where several pressing articles were brought

Article 20 was passed, approving the \$229,379 Tucker Free Library operating budget, after another Garrison amendment was defeated.

Articles 34 and 35, calling for \$632,609 for the Wastewater Treatment Plant budget and \$515,003, for the Cogswell Spring Water Works budget were also approved. Finally, articles 14 and 15 were brought forward. Article 14 asked that \$62,200 be added to the Ambulance Capital Reserve fund while 15 asked that \$275,000 of that fund be used to purchase a new ambulance. Both were approved.

With that, the meeting was adjourned to Wednesday July 15th at 6:00 p.m. at the Community School to take up the 20 articles that had not been dealt with.

POOR ORAL HEALTH LINKED TO COGNITIVE DECLINE



Oral health is an essential part of psychological well-being and overall health in older adults. Poor oral health is associated with decreased quality of life, depression, hypertension, and cognitive decline. Two studies explored the relationship between poor oral health and cognitive decline and the effects of perceived stress and social support on dry mouth.

Researchers interviewed more than 2,700 Americans aged 60 and older and found that nearly 50 percent of study participants reported experiencing tooth symptoms; 25.5 percent reporting dry mouth. In the first study, those who reported tooth symptoms experienced declines in cognition and episodic memory, often precursors to dementia. In the second study, the researchers found that stress increased symptoms of dry mouth, leading to poorer overall oral health.

Key findings:

- 47.8 percent reported having teeth symptoms; participants who reported teeth symptoms at baseline experienced their global cognition and episodic memory decline.
- 18.9 percent reported gum symptoms.
- 15.6 percent reported teeth and gum symptoms.
- 25.5 percent reported dry mouth.

More perceived stress was associated with higher odds of dry mouth.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A large portion of patients taking prescription drugs that could affect driving may not be aware they could potentially be driving impaired, according to research in the November issue of the *Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs*. Nearly 20 percent of people in the study reported recent use of a prescription medication with the potential for impairment, but not all said they were aware that the medication could affect their driving, despite the

potential for receiving warnings from their doctor, their pharmacist, or the medication label itself. The percentages of those who said they had received a warning from one of those sources varied by type of medication: 86 percent for sedatives, 85 percent for narcotics, 58 percent for stimulants, and 63 percent for antidepressants. In this study, the type of medication in question was also related to drivers' perceptions about their impairment risk. They were most likely to think that sleep aids were the most likely to affect safe driving, followed by morphine/codeine, other amphetamines, and muscle relaxants. Attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) medications were viewed as least likely to affect driving risk.

Women may only need three cervical screens in their lifetime if they have been given the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine, according to a new study published in the *International Journal of Cancer*. The HPV vaccine protects women against the most dangerous forms of HPV, significantly reducing the chance of developing cervical cancer.

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force has issued a new recommendation against the use of combined estrogen and progestin in postmenopausal women, or estrogen alone in postmenopausal women who have had a hysterectomy, to prevent chronic conditions such as heart disease, dementia and stroke.

Bret Ingold mentioned that the facility would also make a good commercial kitch-


en in conjunction with a Food Pantry.

WHAT'S IN A MORTGAGE PAYMENT



A monthly mortgage payment includes at least two parts: an amount that goes toward the principal of the loan (the money you've borrowed) and a second amount that goes toward interest (the cost of borrowing the money).

For most homeowners, however, there is also a third part of the mortgage payment: an amount that is paid into an escrow account that the lender maintains for

you to pay for things like homeowners hazard insurance, property taxes, condominium and association fees and mortgage insurance (if applicable). This is the element of the monthly payment that can go up or down even in a fixed-rate mortgage. Together, these elements are called PITI:

- P Principal
- I Interest
- T Taxes
- I Insurance

Homeowners must pay property taxes and they must have some type of homeowners insurance. Depending on state laws and other variables, most lenders require homeowners to pay into what is called an "escrow account." In this account, the lender or mortgage servicer keeps enough money to cover your property taxes and homeowners insurance. You pay into this account each month as part of your mortgage payment. When your taxes are due, the lender/servicer pays them for you. The same is true for your insurance. The lender/servicer sends you a periodic statement showing how much is in this account.

Publisher's Perspective

George Floyd - Come Together Over Me

I was pleased that last week's Publisher's Perspective on the death of George Floyd received such support and praise. There were a few, however, who questioned my assertion that racism still exists and that there is validity to the claims of White privilege.

To understand the truth of the matter, whites only need to acknowledge the fact that WE DIDN'T GROW UP BLACK. We didn't experience generations of being told that you are inferior, of fearing the police. We never experienced the stares and fears of others for simply standing in line at a bank or convenience store.

That is the essence of white privilege, not only an advantage, but by not suffering the disadvantage and disrespect of racial profiling.

I was fortunate to learn about racial profiling at an early age. I grew up in Hillsborough in the 50's and 60's and needless to say, didn't know any black people. In the

fall of 1965, prior to starting college, UNH hosted a camp for incoming freshmen to get acquianted with each other. Each day several of us would gather at the basketball court for a pickup game.

One morning I was selected to be one of the captains to choose a team. I noticed a tall, trim, black man, and knowing that all blacks are great athletes, I immediately chose him to be on my team. To my great surprise, not only was he not a great athlete, he could hardly walk and chew gum at the same time.

In that instant I realized that if all blacks were not great athletes, then perhaps they could also be great accountants, lawyers, and doctors. That lesson taught me that I was prejudiced, not from hate, but from the limits of my knowledge, experience and upbringing.

Racial tension is ripping us apart. Let George Floyd's death be the catalyst to finally unite us.

Don't Be Quick To Condemn

Many who attended Henniker's attempt at a virtual Town Meeting on Saturday suffered a combination of boredom, frustration and anger. Those feelings are justified.

What is not justified is turning that anger towards those who organized the event. Moderator Cordell Johnson, Town Administrator Joe Devine, the Select Board and the school staff worked tirelessly in an attempt to give Henniker citizens the opportunity to

attend, participate and vote in a Covid-19 challenged exercise in democracy.

Their efforts fell short, but rather than being condemned, they should be applauded as dedicated and committed public servants

We love our democracy, but no one claimed it was efficient. Without public servants like these and an appreciative citizenry democracy fails.



A total of 57 voters participated in the Emerald Like Village District's drive-by voting on Saturday, approving all 13 articles on the Warrant. The District's requested \$188,234 Operating Budget was approved by a vote of 47 yes to 8 no. Voters also approved \$357,000 to replace the Red Fox Crossing culvert and bridge, \$350,000 to obtain a new water source, and \$366,861 to operate the Water Department.





format, Articles would not be able to be amended. A virtual meeting is scheduled for June 16, with a follow up session on June 30. Voting is scheduled for July 14. In-person voting will occur at the Community Center, with limited numbers of voters in the building at a time.




