# Colby-Sawyer reopens Sept. 7

12-week fall semester with in-person instruction

Colby-Sawyer College announced plans Thursday for a return to in-person instruction on its 200-acre New London, NH campus that will both best ensure the safety of the campus community and also comply with all government ordinances surrounding COVID-19.

The college will implement a 12-week fall semester with in-person instruction to begin on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 7, and conclude Tuesday, Nov. 24. Students will be required to leave campus prior to Thanksgiving, and will complete final exams remotely Dec. 2-5. A recess previously scheduled for Oct. 12-16 will no longer occur.

While on campus, all individuals will be required to wear a cloth face covering when maintaining a minimum social distance of 6-feet from others isn't possible, and confirm daily that they have neither had a temperature nor experienced symptoms consistent with COVID-19 over the previous 24 hours.

The college will implement additional precautions and safety measures as deemed necessary in order to best ensure the health and wellbeing of students, faculty and staff. In addition, college officials will continue to work closely with both state and local officials to make certain all ordinances surrounding COVID-19 are met.

# Henniker man charged with driving at over 100 mph

# Stark graduation speaker captures the essence of battling a pandemic

John Stark's Class of 2020 and their parents celebrated a simulated traditional commencement ceremony Saturday, on the athletic field while observing social distancing and Covid-19 guidelines. The 138 graduates heard words of wisdom and advice from Valedictorian Camryn Plaza. Salutatorian Hailey McKillop and Student Representative Lauren Zevos, but it was the non traditional words of Avery Forrestall, a two-time survivor of leukemia, which captured the spirit of this non traditional graduation.

"It's Resilience that breeds Brilliance," Forrestall said. Recalling his own struggles, he said, "I was resilient when I had to do remote learning before it was cool, when I was the only one in my school who was learning remotely because being around other people was too risky. I had to be resilient when doctors told me I had days to live and I looked back at them with a smile." "And now my fellow Generals," he continued, "we're faced with our own struggle, as conflict looks us in the eves to see if we are who we say we are. To see if we're resilient. In a time where we're plagued by a pandemic. In a time where leaders scream complacency in the face of

race driven murder. In a time where light seems to fade as fast as the money in our pockets. In a time where we're 6 feet away from the senior year we always dreamed about. It seems as if darkness surrounds us." "Today, we chase resilience. We catch resilience. We wear the word resilient like a badge of honor. To my fellow classmates, this pandemic, this trial, this will teach us more than any summative assessment. This will be more valuable than any SAT score or any scholarship. This will prepare

us for any conflict that will come our way. Because we've faced adversity. We've faced trauma. We've faced being let down. But today we face victory. Because it's the Resilience we have on this day that breeds our Brilliance tomorrow. I would say we're the future, but this year has pushed us to become the present and I'm so thankful that I get to be surrounded by so many beautiful people making meaningful changes. I can't wait to change the world with all of you."

# **New London Select Board reviews its financial options**

The New London Select Board held its final Zoom meeting Monday evening. Now that Governor Sununu has relaxed the 10 person rule, the Board will hold its next meeting at Whipple Hall in order to allow public attendance while maintaining social distancing. Arrangements for chairs, tables and audio are being made.

Finance Officer Wendy Johnson reported that the town's cash flow is on track with last year's, but the board authorized her to apply for a \$1 million Tax Anticipation Note as a precaution. As a further hedge against the pandemic, the Board approved going ahead with the 1.5% cola for

all employees (\$3,400/month) but decided to delay the Step Increases (\$42,167/ year) and the hiring of a new firefighter and highway employee (411,678/month) for at least a month. Highway Superintendent Bob Harrington asked the Board to approve Pike Industries for future work without issuing a RFP. Pike, he said, has given the town the lowest rate in the area and this would allow for earlier scheduling of work. He also recommended that he be allowed to proceed with the highway work previously approved because asphalt prices were now low but increasing. The Board unanimously agreed to both.

# Hopkinton's Class of 2020 "Always wanted to be out of the box"

Hopkinton High School's 73 graduates gathered with their parents, socially distanced, on the outfield grass, to celebrate a nearly traditional graduation on Saturday.

Valedictorian Emma Roth captured the feelings of "disappointment, sadness, fear, and downright heartbreaking realizations" shared by all when she said, "If someone had told me in September that this is how my senior year would end, I would never have thought that I would be able to get through it, but here we are, getting through it together." Quoting Les Misérables, she urged her classmates to remember that "even the darkest night will end, and the sun will rise." Salutatorian Georgia Westbrook recalled the importance of the Hopkinton community and the appreciation she felt for her classmates. "I spent a lot of high school looking forward to when I would meet new people who would have no idea what I was like when I was thirteen years old, but Hopkinton's small size has made us grow close, and we all share memories and experiences that have defined our childhood."

Principal Chris Kelley praised the school administrators, staff, parents and

graduates, who had adapted to this modified ceremony.

The senior class honored Corrine Lajoie, a school counselor and director of guidance, who is retiring after 20 years with the school district, by selecting her to deliver their commencement address. She urged her students to always look for the silver lining, because this nontraditional ceremony was appropriate for a class that "has always wanted to be outside of the box." She left them with a final thought. "I share your mixed feelings about leaving good friends, poignant memories, and safe surroundings," she said. "At the same time, I feel the anticipation of new adventures, new friendships, and new learning." Lajoie left the graduates with a final wish: "I hope you always carry a piece of Hopkinton, and this school, in your hearts because, you can take the student out of Hopkinton, but you can't take Hopkinton out of the student."



# SOFT DRINKS FOUND TO BE THE CRUCIAL **LINK BETWEEN OBESITY & TOOTH WEAR**



A new study has found that sugar-sweetened acidic drinks, such as soft drinks, is the common factor between obesity and tooth wear among adults.

Scientists found that being overweight or obese was undoubtedly associated with having tooth wear. Significantly, they also found Dr. Esin Narli-Trangaris that the increased consumption of sugary soft drinks may be a lead-

ing cause of the erosion of tooth enamel and dentine in obese patients.

It is the acidic nature of some drinks such as carbonated drinks and acidic fruit juices that leads to tooth wear.

Tooth wear is ranked as the third most important dental condition, after cavities and gum disease. The consumption of acidic food and drink is a leading cause of this. Obese patients also have other risk factors such as increased likelihood of gastric reflux disease (heartburn) which was controlled for in this study.

Previous research has found that tooth wear affects up to 30% of adults. It is the premature wearing of teeth due to the softening of the dental enamel from dietary or gastric acids, combined with wear and tear. It occurs when the outer layer (enamel) of the tooth slowly dissolves. This can lead to changes in the shape or appearance of teeth, and they can become sensitive when eating or drinking cold food and drinks. At its worst, the tooth structure can gradually wear away. Severe Erosive Tooth Wear reduces quality of life and can mean complex and costly procedures. Tooth wear is preventable; changes to consumption habits can help stop people from getting it or making it worse.

According to a network meta-analysis research article published in the May 1, 2018 issue of the Journal of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons (JAAOS), the nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drug (NSAID) naproxen was ranked most effective in individual knee osteoarthritis treatment.

Researchers have shown that color vision problems caused by retinal damage on a cellular level can result from a high dose of sildenafil citrate, the popular erectile-dysfunction medication sold under the brand name Viagra. The results demonstrate that excessive use of the drug could lead to long-term vision problems, including irreversible damage. The findings have been published in the fall issue of Retinal Cases.

Antibiotics have saved many lives by rescuing patients with bacterial or fungal infections, but these valuable drugs also have a dark side. Many antibiotics can have undesired effects on the body's metabolism, causing more or less severe symptoms. Fluoroguinolones are some of the most frequently used broad-spectrum antibacterial antibiotics, and usually prescribed for respiratory, urinary or ear infections. While they are generally well tolerated, some patients receiving fluoroquinolones develop severe health problems, among them tendon rupture, permanent nerve damage, or depression. A new study published in Nucleic Acids Research investigated the effect of ciprofloxacin a commonly prescribed fluoroquinolone — on mitochondrea. Ciprofloxacin caused impaired mitochondrial energy production and blocked cellular growth and differentiation. This dramatic impact on mitochondrial DNA is the likely cause for most negative side effects experienced by patients, and also a reason to use fluoroquinolone antibiotics with great caution.

Riché and Marc, her husband of 30 years, chose to make Hillsborough home in 2016, after living in the small community of Wales, Massachusetts for 26 years.





# Town of Antrim reopening town buildings

# **Only minor iniuries from Weare ATV crash**

On Saturday June 13, 2020 New Hampshire Fish and Game Conservation Officers were notified of an All-Terrain Vehicle (ATV) crash in the Hopkinton-Everett Riding Area in Weare. Members of the Dunbarton Police and Fire Departments, Weare Police and Fire Departments, U.S. Army Corps Rangers, and Conservations Officers responded to the scene of the crash. The operator was identified as 38-year-old Jonathan Mendez of Lowell, MA. It was discovered that Mendez was attempting to pass another ATV operator and lost control of his machine, resulting in Mendez being thrown from the ATV and sustaining a minor injury. Excessive speed and inexperience were found to be the two major contributing factors of the crash. Mendez was wearing protective equipment, including a helmet and eye protection, which helped save him from suffering further injuries.



# H-D Board prepares for its annual retreat



# State outlines procedures for September voting

According to new state guidance, prospective voters, wishing to register, would request an absentee ballot from their city or town clerk's office, or from the NH Secretary of State. Along with filling out a registration form, voters will need to provide a current photo ID and a proof of residency (e.g. a bank statement, bill, or other document with person's address). Also needed will be a witness, standing six feet away or behind a window, to watch the voter sign their form and to attest via affidavit to the voter's identity. Forms will need to be returned, by mail or by hand, to local clerk's.



ing of Town Hall to the public on June 22nd, subject to social distancing requirements and the recommendation that visitors use masks.






