Double Henniker fatality

Husband arrives as his wife and child perish

New Hampshire State Fire Marshal Paul J. Parisi, Henniker Fire Chief Jim Morse, and Henniker Police Chief Matt French announced that on November 9th, a call was received for a reported fire at a mobile home located at 41 Ryan Road. Henniker Fire and Police units along with Mutual Aid units responded to the scene and encountered heavy smoke and fire coming out of the rear of the residence. The fire, which was started by a candle, was quickly extinguished, however, Amy Chapman and her daughter Trislynn were unable to escape and were later pronounced dead. A Go-Fund-Me Page has been established at Amy and Trislyn Chapman Mellor Memorial Fund.

The New Hampshire Fire Marshal's

Office – Bureau of Investigations is investigating the incident with assistance from the Henniker Police and Fire Departments. Autopsies were conducted by the NH State Medical Examiner's Office on Wednesday morning at Concord Hospital.



TEETHING PRODUCTS COULD BE HARMFUL



Teething is normal, but it can be a painful experience for infants and toddlers. Too often, well-meaning parents and caregivers who want to ease a child's pain turn to medications and products that could be harmful.

Soothing children's gums with prescription or over-thecounter (OTC) drugs, homeopathic drugs, or teething jewelry marketed for relieving teething pain may seem like good

options. But those products can be dangerous and can lead to serious injury or even death. This also applies to older children with special needs who may use teething jewelry for sensory stimulation.

The American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommends alternative ways to treat teething pain, including rubbing infants' gums with a clean finger or providing a teething ring made of firm rubber to chew on. For children with sensory stimulation needs, parents and caregivers should talk to their child's health care provider about safer options.

On average, children begin teething around 4 to 7 months, and have a total of 20 "baby teeth" by age 3. According to the AAP, occasional symptoms of teething include mild irritability, a low-level fever, drooling, and an urge to chew something hard.

According to a study recently published in *The Lancet*, giving a single dose of preventive antibiotics to all women after childbirth involving forceps or vacuum extraction could prevent almost half of maternal infections including sepsis-equivalent to around 5,000 in the USA. The study found that for every additional 100 doses of antibiotic given prophylactically, 168 doses could be avoided due to fewer postdelivery infections mean-

ing that a policy of universal prophylaxis after birth could help to reduce antibiotic use by 17%. Infection rates after assisted vaginal birth without antibiotic prophylaxis are around 16% worldwide, and up to 25% after caesarean section. In 2016, an estimated 19,500 women died because of pregnancy-related infections globally. Even in high-income settings, infections account for 1 in 20 maternal deaths, and as many as 1 in 8 in the USA. For every woman who dies from pregnancy-related infection, another 70 women develop a severe infection and survive, often with long-term health consequences.

New research published in the *American Journal of Psychiatry* supports the effectiveness and safety of esketamine nasal spray in treating depression in people who have not responded to previous treatment. This study is one of the key studies that led to the recent Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approval of esketamine nasal spray, in conjunction with an oral antidepressant, for use in people with treatment-resistant depression. Depression is common, and as many as one-third of people with depression are considered treatment resistant-not finding relief from symptoms even after trying several antidepressants. Esketamine offers a new fast-acting treatment for people that have not responded to other depression treatments.

Both vehicles sustained extensive damage and were towed, but Brouillet was not injured. Police have not released the name of the suspected driver and owner of the Subaru.

They took a second look at all the ballots cast in the hometowns of both candidates. When that didn't change the outcome very much, Dietsch called an end to the recount.

Francestown Winter Parking Ban in effect

Francestown's winter parking ordinance prohibits parking in any way that impedes snow removal on public roads. It took effect at the start of November and stays in effect until April 1. Vehicles parked in violation of the ordinance may be towed by Francestown Police or their designees at the owner's expense, and violators can be subject to a \$50 fine for each violation, according to the town ordinance.

They knew the odds before they went but they went anyway.

Could you do the same? Would you? If you survive that experience you are a different person. Your whole outlook and philosophy of life changes in ways others will never understand.

With luck and God's grace, you will never have to experience that, but you can still honor those who have. Soon the future of America will be in your hands. When your turn comes, honor it, improve it and pass along a better life to your kids. That's all the thanks any veteran could ask.


