
Hopkinton's Sean Powers Wood Bank "Wood For Warmth" project brings the town together

Have you ever dreamed of living in a community where people have the honor of serving their neighbors, in person, and with their own hands? Good people from all over the area chose to come out and work hard all day Saturday at the Sean Powers Wood Bank with just that in mind. Fathers and mothers were teaching their children a great deal more than the art of stacking firewood or of running a splitter. Elders and the experienced simply bent to the task and taught or helped many, just by example. With the same love of community, three ladies have turned a card table of snacks into 5-star dining with several entrees culminating in a whipped cream topped dessert. Even throughout the din of chain saws, trucks and splitters, could be heard the trail of gentle laughter following, usually, Chuck Rose, Jeff Dearborn, Steve Pecora or Pete Powers. Without words, or any sound at all, the joy of caring for each other was evervwhere. I tell you, a day like this completely fills you up.

Contributions came from all directions: The Hopkinton Food Pantry gave hot dogs; Gould Hill gave apples; Home Depot

gave bales of hay; Countryside Community Church loaned chairs; the Hopkinton Lions Club provided tables; H.R. Clough filled the propane tanks; the High School loaned a large grill; Neal Cass, Town Administrator, donated boxes of masks; Photographers Susan Lawless and Bob LaPree were everywhere; our chefs, Hillary, Rosie and Laurie provided homemade warmth; Ann Chehade brought her famous container of cookies; Greg Sagris (Dunkin Donuts) donated large urns of coffee and hot chocolate along with boxes of donuts; Best Septic Service donated 2 porta potties; Boy Scouts, Red Hawks and Interact teens worked hard at splitting stations and stacking firewood all day long; the transfer station ladies provided and moved pallets for us (they also plow the area during the winter so that people can get to the stacks of emergency wood); besides all the donations of wood, gasoline, trucks, splitters and manpower, pick up trucks filled with firewood (Lee Wilder and Tasha Dunning) drove right in to donate as well. And just to complete the day, Chief Steve Pecora had loaded his cruiser with boxes of Twizzlers to give to all the working youngsters - of all ages.


Realizing the tremendous hardship that would result, the local Lions Club & The Messenger agreed to step forward and provide this service each Christmas season.

While observing Covid-19 guidelines, the Hillsboro Lions Club was determined to sponsor the 44th Annual Senior Citizens Dinner, even if it had to be modified to a take-out only service. The American Legion donated the use of its kitchen, the Police Department contributed its digital direction sign, Marie Mogavaro of Greater Hillsborough Senior Services coordinated home delivery of 58 meals and GHSS made chocolate "turkey" treats. Besides Lions members, volunteers Bob Sewell, Bonnie Hadley, Riche Colcombe, and Keith Cobbett, Joyce and Grant Bosse stepped up to make it a true community project.

Under the direction of Chef Anna Anelly and master carver Ron Audet, preparation of the 10-20lb turkeys, mashed potatoes, squash, stuffing, green beans, dinner rolls and pumpkin pie went smoothly.

With the line of cars starting at the back of the Legion at noon and stretching through the parking lot to West Main Street, we were able to serve a record 220 meals. Unfortunately, for the first time, we ran out of food and were forced to turn away the final 16 cars waiting in line.

To those who received a meal — thank you for allowing us to honor you during this stressful year. To those we turned away — our sincere apologies. We could never have imagined a turnout nearly double of previous years, and promise more food next year.

21 students, 5 staff excluded from Kearsarge

Over the past weekend, two additional Covid-19 incidents occurred at Kearsarge Schools. The first required quarantining of a student who had contact with a family member who tested positive. The second involved a student and a staff member who received a "Probable Positive." As a result, those two, plus 20 students and 4 staff members at Simonds Elementary School and one crossover Sutton Elementary student have be excluded from school until the probable results can be verified.

New COVID-19 cases at Hillsboro-Deering Schools Two students infected, five staff and eighteen students quarantined

H-D officials have identified an additional two (2) confirmed cases of COV-ID-19, one at Hillsboro-Deering Elementary School and one at the High School, both cases are related. Anyone needing to quarantine will receive a phone call from a school administrator or health professional with further guidance. If you do not receive a phone call identifying you as a close contact, then there is no public health risk identified to you at this time.

Contact tracing has been completed at the elementary and high schools at this time. Hillsboro-Deering Elementary School has identified two (2) staff and six (6) students and Hillsboro-Deering High School has identified three (3) staff and twelve (12) students. NH DHHS will contact these individuals or their parent/ guardian and will instruct them how to self-quarantine at home.

Those families and staff will be directed to get tested and keep themselves or their children quarantined until 14 days following their last possible exposure.

If you or your child are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19, such as a fever,

chills, respiratory illness, aches or change in taste and smell, please stay home and away from others and get a COVID-19 PCR test.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A new study, published in Acta Psychiatrica Scandinavica, finds that medicine that inhibits inflammation, such as arthritis medicine, can also be effective in the treatment of people suffering from depression. In addition to looking into arthritis medicine, the researchers also examined the effect of other forms of medication which have an anti-inflammatory effect, including glucocorticoids and the antibiotic minocycline, adreno-

cortical hormone and the statins that are used in the treatment of high cholesterol levels. All of them showed antidepressant effects.

A new study published in *JAMA Network Open* has found that 81% of antibiotics prescribed by dentists — who are among the top prescribers in the U.S., accounting for about 10% of all antibiotic prescriptions — to prevent infections prior to dental visits are unnecessary.

A new study published in the *Journals of Gerontology: Series A* found that overweight and obese older women who took more than three times the recommended daily dose of vitamin D showed improvements in memory and learning — but also had slower reaction times. The researchers evaluated three groups of women between 50 and 70 years old in a randomized controlled trial. One group took the recommended daily dose of 600 IU of vitamin D each day for a year. Another group took 2,000 IU per day and the third took 4,000. The researchers found that memory and learning improved in the group that took 2,000 IU per day, but not in the group that took the higher dosage. Meanwhile, the women's reaction time showed a trend to be slower at 2,000 IU daily and was significantly slower at the higher dosage.

TEETHING CREAMS AND GELS HAVE RISKS



Parents and caregivers who are looking to relieve a teething baby's pain might try rubbing numbing medications on the child's gums. But the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) warns against using any sort of topical medication to treat teething pain in children, including prescription or OTC creams and gels, or homeopathic teething tablets. These medications offer little to no benefit and are associated with serious risk.

Utesin National Several OTC oral health care products such as Andesol, Baby Orajel, Cepacol, Chloraseptic, Hurricaine, Orabase, Orajel, and Topex. These products should not be used for teething because they can be dangerous and are not useful because they wash out of a baby's mouth within minutes.

The use of benzocaine gels, sprays, ointments, solutions, and lozenges for mouth and gum pain can lead to a serious—and sometimes fatal—condition called methemoglobinemia, in which the oxygen-carrying capacity of red blood cells is greatly reduced.

Prescription and OTC benzocaine oral health care drug products are also widely used in adults. Doctors and dentists often use sprays containing benzocaine to numb the mucous membranes of the mouth and throat or to suppress the gag reflex during medical and surgical procedures, such as transesophageal echocardiograms, endoscopy, intubation, and feeding tube replacements. But benzocaine sprays are not FDA-approved for these uses.

Talk to your health care professional about using benzocaine and other local anesthetics, especially if you have heart disease; are elderly; are a smoker; or have breathing problems such as asthma, bronchitis, or emphysema. Those conditions put you at greater risk for complications relating to methemoglobinemia.

Red Fox Crossing Bridge reopens in March

The Emerald Lake Village District Commissioners dealt with several issues at Thursday's work session. The District is awaiting word from the state on whether the Eastman Well will be classified as an "Emergency Well" or a permanent installation. The longdelayed Red Fox Crossing Bridge is back on track. The initial design was not useable as the foundation was too small. The culvert is now scheduled to be installed by Christmas, with excavation completed after January 1st and substantial completion by mid to late March.

Goffstown announces Water Parking Ban

The Goffstown Police Department announced that the winter parking ban took effect on November 15, 2020 and will run through the winter months ending on April 15, 2021. The parking ban is in effect between the hours of 2am and 5am and the Goffstown Police Department strictly enforces violations of the overnight parking ban. If weather conditions are favorable, written warnings may be issued during the first week of the ban. During snow removal operations, if a vehicle is parked so as to constitute a hazard, its removal may be requested by the highway department. In these instances, the Goffstown Police Department will investigate and make all reasonable attempts to locate the owner, but if the owner or operator is not located, the vehicle will be towed at the owner's expense.

New London to install bicycle & pedestrian safety signs

The Conservation Commission was about to hire a contractor to excavate a site for a driveway and parking area to the trail from West Main Street to the river. With winter approaching and the driveway permit expiring soon, Hillsborough Road Agent Bill Goss offered his services. Those of us who remember the string of less talented Road Agents in the past consider Bill a true Hometown Hero.

New London Outing Club seeks \$95,000

Pete Smith of The Outing Club presented the Select Board and Budget Committee with a proposal to coordinate the efforts of the New London Recreation Department and The Outing Club. A few goals included in the proposal are:

1. Provide subsidized program offerings to New London residents.

2. Hire a full time director with a \$60,000 salary with 30% fringe: \$78,000. 50% of allocation would be dedicated to this salary and additional staffing.

3. Provide additional Youth and Adult Programming such as a Youth Summer Camps Naturalist Camp

Both Boards felt the goals were laudable put premature, and urged the town's recreation commission and Outing Club to get together to finalize plans.

Bradford Fish & Game Club Grandfathered

The Bradford Planning Board held a "non-meeting meeting" with Attorney Christine Philmore to discuss activities at The Bradford Fish and Game Club. Shooting has occurred in the Fall and in the Spring for the Hunter Education Classes, and Dick Wright believes that the land should be considered grandfathered and if not, it would impact the Hunter Education Classes that the Club offers. He explained how the club will only use 22 long riffles and high-powered rifles will be banned. After a long discussion the Board grandfathered the prior use of the land of Bradford Fish and Game hunter safety courses 2-3 times a year, with the use of 22 long rifles and archery at the hunter education courses. If any other use is expanded a site plan will be needed.



Henniker considering major Personal Policy and Build Code changes

Town Administrator Joe Devine presented the Henniker Select Board with a draft of a new personal policy designed to increase recruitment and retention of town employees. Provisions include:

- 1. Increased vacation days.
- 2. Instituting personal days.
- 3. Instituting longevity pay
- 4. Improve insurance buy-out option.
- 5. Institute tuition reimbursement. Special provisions would be made for the Police Department:
- 1. Establish a shift differential.
- 2. Promote a Field Training Officer.
- 3. Establish a \$5,000 hiring bonus.

Devine estimated that the full cost of these changes would be \$57,000. Vice Chair Tia Hooper suggested making vacation, sick and personal days into a single "Paid Time Off" (PTO) account that employees could elect for whatever reason. The Board was generally supportive of the proposal but wanted more time to consider the full impact.

Devine also presented drafts of three ordinances to be presented to voters at Town Meeting: A Building Code, A Housing Standards Ordinance, and A

Citation Ordinance. After a brief discussion they were referred to the Planning Board for development and Public Hearings.
