Henniker girl saves family

Adelaide Meehan recognized for life-saving efforts

On July 30th at about 3:42 a.m. Adelaide Meehan awoke to the sound of glass cracking and breaking. There was an active fire in a barn attached to the house. She saw that the entire outside of the window was covered in flames, and she immediately ran upstairs and called 9-1-1. She then knocked on the locked bedroom door and tried unsuccessfully to wake up her mother, Louisa, and her brother, Finneas. She then ran downstairs to confirm the fire was real and to grab some of her belongings.

It was there and growing fast! Adelaide ran back upstairs and this time was successful in waking up her mother and brother and all escaped unharmed. The fire was in an adjacent barn, which did not have smoke alarms. The house did have working smoke alarms but they did not activate until they were leav-

ing the house.

Adelaide heard the fire and the breaking glass before the smoke alarms activated. The fire destroyed the barn and damaged a large portion of the house. There was smoke damage in the room her mother and brother were sleeping in, as well as the living room and much of the house. Without Adelaide's quick actions, herself, her mom, and brother, could have experienced a much more serious outcome. Adelaide displayed outstanding acts in the area of life safety that benefited the lives and wellbeing of her family members. State Fire Marshal's Award of Excellence in Fire & Life Safety Award program recognizes students pre-kindergarten through high school who perform a brave act in the area of fire & life safety; actions that benefit the lives and wellbeing of those around them.

Deering deliveries delayed by FedEx delivery truck crash

On December 1st at approximately 5:40 pm Captain Cavanaugh and Corporal McAllister of the Deering Police Department responded to a single motor vehicle accident involving a FedEx delivery truck.

Upon arrival officers found that the operator had failed to negotiate the turn from Peter Woods Hill Road onto North Road. The truck had driven off the road through the ditch and

stonewall coming to rest after coming into contact with a tree.

The driver appeared to have minor injuries resulting in the police requesting Deering Rescue to respond to the scene.

While officers waited for the ambulance, officers completed a brief investigation, the operator was issued a summons before being transported to Concord Hospital.

Hopkinton schools extend Remote Learning

Hopkinton's Harold Martin School had an additional confirmed case on Friday, forcing the school to remote learning for three days beginning Monday December 7th, in hopes that the five-day period of the weekend and the three days would provide time to understand the prevalence of the virus and the next course of action. However, two additional confirmed cases of Covid-19 at the school forced officials to extend remote learning through December 11th.

Maple Street School has had one confirmed case. The hybrid program was continued on Monday. Seven students, contact traced into three groups, have confirmed cases at Hopkinton Middle and High Schools. The students are participating in the remote program, and there was no impact on the in-person school community.

Board briefed on progress at the Fire Station

Ken Holmes updated the Newbury Select Board on progress at the new fire station. There has been a lot of progress since the last update. The concrete cistern is in place. The masonry walls have begun. The underground holding tanks and the septic system were installed this past month. The north parking lot is done with the base paving and half of the south parking lot base paving is done. The administrative area which is in the front near Route 103 is prepped and the plumbing is placed, the concrete slab being poured. More concrete walls to go up in the next couple of weeks. More masonry work happening for the next three weeks. Retaining walls for the south parking lot we would hopefully have done before winter depending on the weather. The project is on schedule and on budget. Holmes will be back on January 4, 2021 with an update.

Hopkinton Board approves all winter sports

The Hopkinton School Board met on Thursday, December 3rd for a regularly scheduled meeting. Major topics discussed included the first presentation of the Superintendent's Budget to the School Board, winter sports for middle and high school students, and the decision matrix. It was noted that the main budget drivers this year are: (1) the second phase of the building project bond and (2) a state-mandated increase to the amount the district must pay into the New Hampshire Retirement System (HSD must pay an increase of 21% for teachers and 14% for other employees). The budget also includes legally-required increases for student support services. At the last School Board meeting on November 19th, the School Board decided not to move forward with indoor community sports such as HYSA basketball, and did decide to move forward with Middle and High School Basketball open-gyms (at the time there was no certainty about ice hockey rink availability, so it was not discussed). At this most recent meeting, Hopkinton Athletic Director Dan Meserve gave an updated presentation on the proposed winter sports guidelines, including 100% mask wearing at all times, shutting down locker rooms except for players to use the restroom during a game, and limited fan attendance. After a lengthy discussion, the School Board agreed to move forward with all winter sports, based on the proposed safety and play guidelines, and will reassess in early January prior to any game-play.

Hillsboro-Deering School Board urged to reconsider staff reductions

Faced with a \$450,000 reduction in state aid and increased costs associated with the Covid pandemic, the Hillsboro-Deering School Board has been considering several ways to reduce expenditures. One proposal calls for a significant staff reduction including the elimination of a High School Math Teacher, the Middle School Music Teacher, and a Middle School English Language Teacher.

As expected, the proposal drew immediate concern from residents who watched Monday's streamed meeting from the adjacent cafeteria. During the Public Comment portion of the meeting, several spoke in opposition to the move.

Former H-D Music Director and NH Teacher of the Year Heidi Welch spoke passionately, urging the Board not to dismantle the award-winning program she and past Administrations had worked so hard and long to achieve.

H-D graduate Leah Dunbar, a product of that program, and now a music teacher herself, was equally adamant that the reduction was an unnecessary step back, that the community would regret for years to come.




This group eagerly watched the streaming of the H-D School Board meeting.

Melissa Multtrop and Michelle Prentis, speaking as both teachers and parents, urged retention of the English Language Arts as essential to overall learning.

Student Representative Cameron Garcia

was shocked to hear of the proposal to eliminate the Music Teacher and said his classmates would be up in arms when they found out about it.

The Board made no decision that night.



TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A new study suggests that sunscreen protects the skin's blood vessel function from harmful ultraviolet radiation (UVR) exposure by protecting dilation of the blood vessels. Perspiration on the skin may also provide protection to the skin's blood vessels from sun damage. The findings were presented at the American Physiological Society's (APS) annual meeting. UVR from the sun has been well-documented as a contributing factor to skin

cancer and premature skin aging. UVR has also been found to reduce nitric oxide associated dilation of skin blood vessels (vasodilation) by reducing the amount of nitric oxide available in the skin. Nitric oxide is a compound essential for blood vessel health. Vasodilation of the skin's blood vessels plays an important role in regulating body temperature and responding to heat stress, both locally in the skin and throughout the body.

An international study has shown that MDMA, also known as ecstasy, may be a valuable tool for treating post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Published recently in *Psychopharmacology*, the study demonstrated substantial improvements in individuals who had not responded to prior treatments.

Taking beta blockers — medications that reduce blood pressure and treat many heart conditions — can blunt the negative effects of stress and anger on people with a history of atrial fibrillation, or irregular heart rhythm. This strategy could potentially improve quality of life for many of the 2 million Americans with the condition, according to a new study published in *HeartRhythm*. Atrial fibrillation, or AFib, is an irregular and rapid heart rate that increases risk of stroke, heart failure, and other complications. There is no cure for AFib, and while medications and procedures can often help, they are not always successful.

PRIMER ON BRACES



Q: What is the value of braces?

A: While their cosmetic role is obvious, straightening teeth into an orderly smile, there are other reasons for braces.

Crooked teeth are harder to keep clean, a problem that can lead to tooth decay, gum disease and, down the

road, tooth loss. Misaligned teeth can also be an impediment to talking and chewing and over time can cause abnormal wear on tooth enamel.

Today's generation of braces, also known as orthodontic appliances, can be as visible or as inconspicuous as a patient likes. For instance some brackets, which are affixed to the tooth to hold wires and elastics, are clear or tooth-colored. Advances in the equipment also make braces more comfortable and more efficient than they were in the past.

There are two basic categories of braces: fixed, which are installed and removed by the dentist, and removable, which the patient can put in and take out according to the dentist's instructions for duration of wear. A person generally will wear braces from one to three years, followed by a shorter period of wearing a retainer to hold teeth in place. Talk with your dentist about whether you are a candidate for braces.

The impact was so great it ripped the passenger tire cleanly off the vehicle and split a 14" oak tree up the middle. The operator was wearing a seat belt. Thanks to Bennington Police for their assistance at the scene.

One person injured in Goffstown home fire

One person was sent to the hospital with burns after the home they were in caught fire in Goffstown. According to Chief Brian Allard of the Goffstown Fire Department, firefighters responded to a report of a fire at 234 Tirrell Hill Road around 3:15 p.m. Friday. An off-duty firefighter who was nearby was able to confirm the home was fully-involved. Allard said the first engine arrived within four minutes and began an aggressive attack. The fire eventually went to two alarms, bringing in additional crews from Manchester, Bedford, Concord, Dunbarton, Hooksett, Londonderry and Merrimack. There were no fire hydrants in the area, so tanker shuttles had to be used to get water to the home. The fire was brought under control at 5:38 p.m. Allard said the home is close to a total loss. There were initial reports of an explosion along with the fire, but Allard said there was no confirmed information about that. No one else was in the home, other than the person who was transported with burns. During the fire, mutual aid crews responded to four additional calls in the town, none of which were major, according to Allard. The cause of the fire is under investigation.

Pedestrian injured in Peterborough pileup

Joshua Freeman, 32, of Milford, suffered minor injuries Saturday morning when he was struck by a tractor-trailer while assisting at a multi-car accident on Route 202 in Peterborough. Freeman was driving when his vehicle left the roadway due to Saturday's snowstorm. While he saw an accident he walked over to give what assistance he could. The accident was initially caused when a pickup truck lost control and became stuck in the middle of the highway. A second car was unable to stop, and hit the truck, and a third vehicle, which was able to stop, was hit by a tractor-trailer, which slid sideways, hitting Freeman in the right leg. Freeman was taken to Monadnock Community Hospital with minor scapes and injuries. All vehicles involved were able to be driven away.

Project C.L.I.M.B. students summited 2,936 foot Mount Kearsarge on Friday, November 20, for their first-of-the-year day hike. Students hiked along the Lincoln Trail, which is 4.5 miles from the high school to the summit, through rolling mixed-hardwood forests. With warm weather and clear skies, students could be heard laughing, telling stories, and playing games, despite being masked and socially distanced on the trail. The joy of being together outdoors and away from screens was not lost on members. They ate lunch together on the bald summit of Kearsarge and enjoyed locating the lakes and hills, roads and buildings of their home towns. Eight first time CLIMBers mixed right in with the group, keeping spirits high and sharing highlights at the end of the day. We are looking forward to the next trip and hope new members will continue to join in.

Deering hires a new part-time Police Officer

The Deering Select Board reviewed the Police Department budget with Police Chief Mark Philibert. Cost increases within the budget are from part-time wages. Chief Philibert explained that he is looking to have 3 part-time officers working 20-hour weeks. That will increase overall coverage particularly on weekends and evenings. There will be less reliance on stand-by coverage. Increases in NH retirement employer contributions and health insurance pushed the budget marginally higher within their respective benefit categories. The Board also interviewed a part-time officer candidate in non-public session and when they reconvened in public session they unanimously voted to hire Norman Parker at a rate of pay of \$20 per hour subject to a probationary period of 6 months.

Washington Fire Chief briefs Select Board

Washington Fire Chief Shawn Atkins informed the Select Board that Engine 3 needs tires, and the Board approved the expenditure. The old forestry truck has been purchased and the Chief would like the funds to be earmarked to be placed in the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund. Select Board approved. Library Trustee Peggy Carney informed the Board the furnace was serviced with no issues. The Board then discussed organizing a fundraiser to help offset some of the funding to purchase the property next to the library.

Crews address New London sewer main break

New London Public Works crews were kept busy into the early hours of Saturday, November 27th to address a sewer main break. The 10" main was 12' deep, requiring major excavation to get to the broken pipe to repair it, while avoiding the fiber optic and communication lines located above the sewer main.

Assisting town staff were contractors Stearns Septic Service and Clarke & Co.; New London—Springfield Water Precinct and Town of Sunapee Water & Sewer assisted with the loan of equipment. A more permanent repair will be made in the coming days by sliplining the sewer main with another pipe. Public Works staff thanks residents in the area for their patience during the repair, which went to 3am, likely disturbing the sleep of many. And special thanks to the family that came out with brownies for the crews.

Henniker Select Board deals with tax, sewer, planning & parking issues

SuperScoops owner Joshua Finet appeared before the Henniker Select Board to request that the Board designate one parking space in front of their business for 15 minute parking.

He stressed that his customers are generally in and out quickly but often can't park in front because the spaces are occupied by long term parkers. Member Leon Parker suggested that this would be a good opportunity to relook at parking throughout downtown. The Board voted to refer the matter to the Highway Safety Committee for evaluation.

Town Administrator Joe Devine presented the Board with a new contract with Planning Consultant Mark Fougere to provide services to the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, ZBA, Economic Development, and Historic Districts. The contract raises his rate from \$85 to \$95/ hour, which is the first increase since he began working for the down a decade ago. The board approved.

Representatives from Underwood Engineering appeared to discuss the upcoming Wastewater Treatment Plan upgrades.

They proposed a \$32 million Municipal Bond bank loan over 20 years @ 2% interest. That would result in an annual payment of \$195,000 to be paid 60% by water users and 40% by the whole town.

Tax Collector Kim Johnson was present to review the Tax Lien Abatement and Waiver List. The Board decided that going forward they would like semiannual updates in August and February.

Five Rivers Conservation Trust conserves 118 acres in Warner

Five Rivers Conservation Trust was awarded \$215,000 to help conserve 118 acres of the Pletcher Farm, also known as the Vegetable Ranch in Warner.

"The Pletcher Farm/Vegetable Ranch is an important part of our local food system," Beth McGuinn, executive director of Five Rivers Conservation Trust, said in a news release announcing the grant from the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP). Owner/Farmer Larry Pletcher has raised organic vegetable crops on the land for decades, McGuinn said.
"Larry has built quality farm soils using organic methods to increase nutrients and organic matter," she said. "Conserving this farm will ensure that future farmers can continue to use these soils for agricultural production." His produce is sold direct to consumers at the Concord Farmer's Market, Concord Cooperative Market, Local Harvest CSA, Concord Hospital, Warner Local Market, Whole Foods and many other

venues.

The grant will help conserve the 118-acre farm as well as the forested headwaters of Stevens and Willow brooks, identified as priorities for conservation by the town. According to the news release, the farm's wildlife habitat is ranked highly by New Hampshire Fish and Game, in part because the property is adjacent to a 10,000-acre block of undeveloped land including Mount Kearsarge and Black Mountain.

Hillsborough working to become area's only "Dark Sky Community"

Adam Charette and members of the town's energy commission presented the Select Board with a comprehensive proposal designed to earn Hillsborough the designation of a "Dark Sky Community."

As a first step, the Commission is asking the Select Board to sponsor a \$62,000 Warrant Article at March's Town Meeting, funding the conversion of the town's 200 street lights to LED bulbs. LED efficiencies will provide taxpayers with \$33,000 in annual energy savings, providing a two-year pay-back on the investment.

The goals of the conversion is to 1. Reduce energy consumption, 2. Lower operational cost of street lights, 3. Improve visibility & safety on the roads, and 4. Reduce light pollution.

Designation as a Dark Sky Community would require adoption of a Model Lighting Ordinance, designed to reduce light pollution. Member Brett Charrington pointed out that current Site Plan Regulations closely mirror the or-

dinance. It also requires broad support from community organizations such as the Chamber of Commerce, lighting retailers and homeowners associations. The Select Board agreed to post the Warrant Article while the Commission continues its work on the second phase of the project.

After a fatal fire on Ray Road in Henniker earlier this fall, the Henniker Community School staff pulled together to raise funds for a smoke alarm, carbon monoxide detector, and battery donation to the Henniker Fire Department.
