Legislative Session Update

State Senator Becky Whitley briefs Hopkinton Select Board

State Senator Becky Whitley (D-Hopkinton) met with the Select Board to update them on the results of the recently concluded legislative session. A member of the Judiciary and Health and Human Services Committees, Whitley was happy to report that the Budget contains an additional \$5.5 million dollars in aid to cities and towns, and a special appropriation of \$1 million for local police to purchase body or dash cameras.

She was upset that the Republican controlled legislature passed tax reductions for the Business Profits Tax, Rooms & Meals Tax and Interest & Dividends Tax.

As to State Aid to education, the budget continues State Aid at \$4,700 per student, while dramatically expanding the voucher program.

Senator Whitley plans to present the educational portions of her report to the Hopkinton School Board.

History comes alive in Hillsborough August 21 & 22

History Alive in Hillsborough, NH will hold its third annual weekend event on Saturday and Sunday, August 21st and 22nd. Warner considers joining the Community Power Coalition of NH

The Bradford Select Board met with Henry Herdon of the Community Power Coalition of NH to speak on the benefits of the Town of Warner joining the coalition. The newly formed Coalition already has several towns who are at various points in the process, with some having already had Public Hearings, and others, like Warner, who have been recently invited to join. The advantage of joining a coalition is to gain leverage by buying electricity in bulk and passing the savings on to residents. If the Town of Warner should join the Coalition, residents would still have the ability to "opt out" and buy their power directly. More information will be forthcoming as Warner's Energy Committee reviews the specifics of the program.

During Public Comment residents near Pumpkin Hill addressed the Board to formally complain about Pumpkin Blossom Farm and Lavender Fields. They stated that the traffic was horrible, people visiting the farm were inconsiderate to the neighbors and they felt that the activities had nothing to do with farming and therefore the Select Board should enforce the denial of a special exemption that was issued in 2016. Chairman Carson explained that since the Legislature changed the Agritourism laws and since Warner doesn't have the zoning ordinances up to date the Town has to go by the State RSA. He further stated that the newly formed Agricultural Committee would be looking into the zoning.

Townie Night at the Hopkinton Fair returns

After a year off due to the pandemic, the Hopkinton State Fair and "Townie Night" are back!

The Fair will open on Thursday, September 2, at 5:00 p.m. and run through Monday, Labor Day.

TOWNIE NIGHT

Hopkinton residents will be given free access to the Fair on Thursday, September 2 from 5:00-8:00 p.m. by following the procedures listed below. The Fair will be fully open during this time and there will be a Monster Truck show that night in the grandstand (tickets must be purchased separately for grandstand events).

TOWNIE NIGHT PROCEDURES

- Hopkinton residents wishing to participate must enter at the Green Gate on Kearsarge Avenue.
- The Town will have a table outside the Green Gate (5:00-8:00 p.m.) where residency will be verified, and a "Townie Night" voucher will be given. The voucher will provide free entrance to the Fair Thursday night.
- To receive a voucher, you must provide an ID with your Hopkinton address or a tax or utility bill with your Hopkinton address and your name on it.
- Vouchers will be given out between 5:00 and 8:00 p.m., but once you are in the Fair you may stay until closing.

Flood forces evacuation of Greenfield camp

Greenfield's Brantwood Camp had to evacuate part of the camp due to flooding damage. According to camp director Doug Sutherland, heavy rain knocked out part of the camp's road, as well as a bridge. The damage occurred during a storm Saturday night, and was discovered about 5:30 a.m. at which time the boys' side of the camp was quickly evacuated into the girls' side. Fortunately no one was injured, the road was repaired, and the camp has resumed scheduled activities.

Henniker Select Board accepts \$525,333 in Federal ARPA Funds

The Henniker Select Board had a relatively routine meeting Tuesday evening. The Board opened with a Public Hearing on accepting funds allocated to the town under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Town Administrator Joe Devine informed the Board that Henniker has been awarded \$525,333, of which the first installment of \$262,000 will arrive this year and the balance in 2022. He

Taylor Bridge bids over estimate

Hopkinton was relying on engineering estimates of \$644,000 to repair the Taylor Bridge, but Town Administrator Neal Cass informed the Board that the lowest bid came in at \$943,555.

He recommended rejecting all bids, repairing only one joint with the \$530,000 bond available and rebidding the remaining work. The Board agreed although this option will require closing the road for about two weeks.

suggested that \$70,000 to \$100,000 be set aside for engineering on the Waste Water Treatment Plant. The Board unanimously agreed and accepted the funds.

Deb Aucoin from the Safety Committee updated the Board on changes needed to the town's safety policy

which the Board accepted.

The Board approved the \$61,000 bid from Griffin Construction to replace the roof at the Waste Water Treatment Plant.

The Board also approved hiring Old Yankee Tree Service to remove several dead trees on town property.

Dental plans are similar to health insurance plans in some respects, but different in other ways. You'll generally have the following options:

Preferred Provider Organization (PPO): As with a health insurance PPO, these plans come with a list of dentists that accept the plan. You have the option of going out of network, but your out-of-pocket costs will be higher.

Dental Health Maintenance Organization (DHMO): Like a health insurance HMO, these plans provide a network of dentists that accept the plan for a set co-pay, or no fee at all. However, you may not be able to see an out-of-

Discount or referral dental plan: This is a plan in which you get a discount on dental services from a select group of dentists. Unlike health insurance, the discount or referral plan doesn't pay anything for your care. Rather, the dentists who participate agree to give you a discount for the care you receive.

What They Cover

Generally, dental policies cover some portion of the cost of preventive care, fillings, crowns, root canals, and oral surgery, such as tooth extractions. They might also cover orthodontics, periodontics (the structures that support and surround the tooth) and prosthodontics, such as dentures and bridges. You're usually covered for two preventive visits per year.

If you get an individual policy, periodontics and prosthodontics may not be available in the first year of coverage. And coverage for orthodontics often requires a rider, in which case you pay an additional fee, for any kind of policy.

TAKE YOUR MEDICINE



A drug once used to treat high blood pressure can help alcoholics with withdrawal symptoms reduce or eliminate their drinking, Yale University researchers report in the American Journal of Psychiatry. In a double-blind study, researchers gave the drug prazosin or a placebo to 100 people entering outpatient treatment after being diagnosed with alcohol use disorder. All of the patients had experienced varying degrees of withdrawal symptoms prior to entering treatment. According to the researchers, subjects with more

According to the researchers, subjects with more severe symptoms—including shakes, heightened cravings and anxiety, and difficulty sleeping—who received prazosin significantly reduced the number of heavy drinking episodes and days they drank compared to those who received a placebo. The drug had little effect on those with few or no withdrawal symptoms.

A new study published in *mBio*, an open-access journal of the American Society for Microbiology provides further proof that the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine provides protection against COVID-19.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has expanded the approved indication for Xofluza (baloxavir marboxil) to include post-exposure prevention of influenza (flu) for patients 12 years of age and older after contact with an individual who has the flu. Xofluza, previously available only in tablet form, is also now available as granules for mixing in water. Xofluza was originally approved in 2018 for treating uncomplicated flu in patients 12 years of age and older who have been symptomatic for no more than 48 hours. Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. Treating flu patients with antiviral drugs within 48 hours of their becoming sick can reduce symptoms and duration of the illness. An annual seasonal flu vaccine is the best way to protect against the flu.

Cleaning out your closets? Now you can bring your used clothing donations to At the Cross at 223 Clinton Road in Antrim. At the Cross is partnering with St. Pauly Textile Inc. to provide a wood-frame clothing drop-off shed for community use (see picture). This shed is designed to give community members a uniquely clean, convenient, and well-cared-for option to donate their used clothing. St. Pauly Textile Inc. partners with a network of businesses and various organizations to distribute donated items both here in the U.S. and worldwide, where they are ultimately re-worn by people who need them. At the Cross receives funding for donated clothing and has the option to use donations to serve community needs. With over 1,100 clothing drop-off sheds in place, St. Pauly Textile Inc. collects over 90,000 pounds of clothing every day and estimates that this clothing ends up in 44 different countries (including the U.S.) yearly. In 2018, the company was able to help keep over 20 million articles of clothing out of landfills. The company was founded in 1996 and is an A+ rated member of the Better Business Bureau. Accepted items: clothing, shoes, belts, purses, blankets, sheets, curtains, pillowcases, and stuffed animals.

Two people injured in Greenfield accident

Two people were sent to the hospital late Tuesday morning after an accident in Greenfield. Hancock Police Chief Tom Horne reports that a Jeep driven by Steven Chalmers, 48, of Gardner, MA, crossed into the oncoming lane and hit a van driven by Steven Marshall, 55, of West Chesterfield. The Jeep overturned onto the shoulder of Route 202, while the van sustained minor damage. Two adult passengers in the Jeep with Chalmers went to Monadnock Community Hospital with minor injuries, while Marshall and his passenger were uninjured. Chalmers was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled drug, transporting drugs in a motor vehicle, and reckless driving.

Shaw's supports Hillsborough Food Pantry



Hillsborough Planning Board puts Dominoes on hold

In a busy night of public hearings, the Hillsborough Planning Board approved two revocations/amendments to subdivisions and delayed a vote to approve a new business in town until its next meeting in two weeks.

Steve Mayer, a Civil Engineer from Allen and Mayer Associates presented a plan for a Dominoes on West Main Street. The building would also house a tenant and have 29 parking spaces. He answered concerns for lighting, snow removal and blasting, as well as the rebuilding of a stone wall. As the State DOT has not returned the request for a driveway permit and the Town has not received their engineering report, the Planning Board postponed any votes until their next meeting on August 4 at 7:05 PM.

Peter Mellen of Donald Mellen Surveyor, LLC presented a request to amend a subdivision that was approved in 2007. As the amendment didn't appreciably change the overall conservation easements and land

granted to the Town, the Planning Board granted the amendment.

The third hearing started with a presentation by Jim Murphy, one of the four owners of Partners Farm, LLC on Windsor Road. There had been a subdivision approval for 42 homes, which included roads, cisterns and

conservation easements. As Partners Farm now wants to sell this property to people who do not want to build houses on it, they're asking the Town to revoke the subdivision approval. The Planning Board approved the request. The deeds will now be presented to the Select Board for approval.
