Area schools mask policies vary

Hillsboro-Deering, ConVal & Weare Boards differ

The Hillsboro-Deering School Board reviewed the updated CDC and DHHS Guidelines for K-12 Schools and Decision Matrix which recommended a strict mask policy. Chair Herla Iadonisi moved to approve the decision matrix as presented. No second was given, so the motion failed.

After additional discussion on the matrix that was presented, the consensus was that none of the other mitigation methods are controversial, it's just the masks. Member Chris Bober then moved to approve the matrix with the change of the "Substantial" category to have mask wearing be "recommended" indoors, which passed on a vote of 3-1-1, with Iadonisi opposed, and Morris abstained. A motion to approve the Updated 2021-22 School Pandemic Response Plan as presented passed 3-0-2 with Welch and Morris abstaining.

The ConVal School Board voted to require all schools to begin the school year with masks required indoors as part of the district's "green phase" of its reopening plan. Once a community school has verified that 80 percent of students and staff have been vaccinated against COVID-19, Superintendent Kimberly Rizzo Saunders said that any indoor mask requirement in place at the time would end.

Elementary and middle school students in the Weare schools will not be required to wear masks when they return to school, but Henniker, Stoddard and John Stark, the other districts in the SAU, will begin the school year with universal masking.

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NH Fish & Game honored Hillsborough's Russell Galpin for volunteering as a Hunter Safety Instructor for 60 years. Russ has taught more than 1,400 students.

6-year-old Contoocook girl dies in car crash

A 6-year-old girl was killed in a head-on collision along the Warner-Webster town line last Thursday. A car driven by Janice Bergeron, 77, from Contoocook was heading west on Dustin Road with the child in the back seat, when she veered into oncoming traffic. That car swerved and struck a pickup truck driven by Cameron Tillman, 21, of Penacook. The child, whose name was not released, was pronounced dead at the scene. The drivers were transported to the hospital and are expected to recover. The cause of the crash remains under investigation.

No injuries reported in Antrim accident

No serious injuries were reported in a two-vehicle crash in downtown Antrim last Monday. Police reports indicated that a Toyota Avalon driven by Jeremy Koutoubas, 23, of Antrim was taking a left from Summer Street onto Main Street when it collided with a pickup truck driven by Elkanah Kerimu, 52, of Greenfield, which was headed south on Main Street. Neither operator was injured, but Kerimu's 20-year-old passenger was evaluated for leg pain but refused further treatment.

Only minor injuries in Interstate-89 rollover

State police reported that Interstate 89 south in Hopkinton was temporarily closed Sunday morning because of a crash. The driver of a Toyota Rav4 hit a guard rail then rolled over and it caught on fire. The highway was closed until firefighters could put out the fire and remove the car. The driver was able to get out of the car and escaped with only minor injuries. Authorities say the cause of the crash was because of driver fatigue.

Hopkinton Public Schools Foundation donates \$10,995

The biweekly meeting of the Hopkinton School Board began with a public hearing to accept over \$360,000 in ESSER II and ESSER III funds. They had previously used ESSER I funds to support outdoor classrooms and lunch with picnic tables, umbrellas and tents, to buy air purifiers, and to buy additional tables, desks and chairs for the Maple Street school. ESSER II and ESSER III funds could be used to pay for an additional fourth grade teacher in order to give students more space, more wellness classes, and more specialists for math and reading. While there was some public discussion, the Board did

approve to accept the funds.

Anne Wells of the Hopkinton Public Schools Foundation asked the Board to accept a check for \$10,995 to go toward a pre-K outdoor classroom near the pre-K drop off area. The site is currently unused and could provide an area where children could experience a variety of sensory learning opportunities, including an art and music wall and a sensory garden. There would also be a wheelchair path. The Board gratefully accepted the donation and it was noted that the Foundation had previously supported all three libraries among others.

Henniker shows dramatic growth 2010-20

Henniker officials were shocked to learn that the Census Bureau reports that Henniker grew 27.9% between 2010 and 2020, faster than any town or city in the state. By comparison, Bow and Dunbarton grew about 9% each, while neighboring Hopkinton grew only 5.8%.

Weare Board accepts \$951,733 of ARPA funds

After a public hearing to accept ARPA funds from the Federal Government, the Weare Select Board voted to accept a total of \$951,733.58, which will be received in two equal parts in 2021 and 2022. Department heads were asked for recommendations on how this money should be spent, and while there were many ideas the consensus was that the upgrading of the Town's emergency communications system should be the number one priority.

Weare School Board votes to censure Rochelle Kelley



The Weare School Board has voted to censure one of its members following her arrest last month. Rochelle Kelley is fac-

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New research published in The FEBS Journal has found a significant association of low plasma vitamin D level with the likelihood of COVID-19 infection among patients who were tested for COVID-19, even after adjustment for age, gender, socio-economic status and chronic mental and physical disorders. Furthermore, low vitamin D level was associated with the risk of hospitalization due to COVID-19 infection, although this association wasn't significant after adjustment for other confounders.

Appendicitis is the most common cause for emergency abdominal surgery in childhood, affecting 80,000 children in the United States each year, but nonoperative treatment options are viable. A new study published in JAMA found antibiotics alone successfully treated children with uncomplicated appendicitis and was associated with fewer disability days at one year.

For patients, especially those living with chronic conditions, nonadherence to prescription medicines due to cost is a common problem. By not filling prescriptions, skipping doses, delaying refills, or splitting pills, patients risk compromising the therapeutic benefit of their treatments. A new study looked at survey data from 11 high-income countries. They found that the largest disparities for non-adherence occurred among younger women in the U.S. The study results are pub-lished in the journal *Health Affairs*. The study also showed that in the U.S., one in four younger women reported cost-related nonadherence compared with one in seven younger men, with no significant female differences among older adults in any of the eleven countries. • ٠

TOOTH DISCOLORATION



In the 1950s, doctors discovered that the use of tetracycline antibiotics during pregnancy led to brownish-color teeth in children. When a person takes tetracycline, some of the medicine settles into the calcium that the body uses to build teeth. When the teeth grow in, they are a yellowish-color, and they gradually turn brown when exposed to sunlight.

Dr. Esin Narli Tetracycline, however, does not cause tooth discoloration if taken after all teeth are formed. It only causes a change in tooth color if you take the medicine before the primary or secondary teeth come in. Today, tetracycline and related antibiotics are not recommended during pregnancy or in young children (under age 8) whose teeth are still forming.

Other medicines are believed to affect materials in or on existing teeth, causing staining. The following medicines can cause brown, yellow-brown, or gray tooth discoloration:

Amoxicillin-clavulanate (Augmentin), an antibiotic used to treat a number of bacterial infections; chlorhexidine, an antiseptic/disinfectant; doxycycline, an antibiotic related to tetracycline that is often used to treat acne; and tetracycline, an antibiotic used to treat acne and some respiratory infections.

Too much fluoride (found in some chewable vitamins, toothpastes, and mouthwash) can lead to white streaks on the tooth enamel, or a whitishbrown discoloration. In severe cases, excess fluoride (called fluorosis) can lead to permanently stained brown teeth.

The following drugs may cause greenish or a blue-green grayish color: ciprofloxacin (Cipro), an antibiotic known as a quinolone; minocycline, an antibiotic related to tetracycline. Iron salts taken by mouth can lead to black teeth.


