Town & school officials confer

Hillsborough Select Board H-D school officials meet

Representatives of the H-D School District, Superintendent Patricia Parenteau, Business Manager Mary Henry, and School Board Chair Herla Idonisi attended the recent Hillsborough Select Board meeting to discuss Town/School connections.

Town Administrator Laura Buono told the Board that they had a price for the replacement slide, mirror and Jumbo Flyer at the Grimes Field playground. After discussion about the viability of the mirror, it was decided by the Board that the \$2700 cost of the mirror could be better used for another interactive activity, but the rest of the items should be ordered now as it is estimated that it could take 14-16 weeks for the items to be delivered. Buono also told the Board that DOT has approved the crosswalk on West Main Street, west of Dr. Bara's office. The northern sidewalk will be extended further west in order to go past the culvert and headwall of the south side of the road. There will also be a signal light to warn drivers of the pedestrians who are trying to cross.

Steve Tower added to Fallen Firefighters Memorial

Steve Tower, a Goffstown Fire Department captain, died Aug. 31, 2020, after suffering a medical emergency during a physical test at the Concord Fire Academy in Concord.

Tower, 54, had served three decades with the Goffstown Fire Department, and came out of retirement to serve as interim chief of the department. He had decided to stay unretired after the town appointed a new chief, and was becoming certified again when he died.

Tower was on the Goffstown department panel that interviewed current Fire Chief Brian Allard for his first job as a firefighter.

"He was one of my early mentors. Not only me, but probably hundreds of firefighters across New Hampshire," Allard said at the time of Tower's death. "He would take them, myself included, under his wing and show them the expectations of becoming a firefighter."








Paroled for death of Officer Sean Powers - arrested again

A man who was arrested after a high-speed chase on Interstate 89 was on parole after serving time in prison for negligent homicide in a hit-and-run crash that killed an off-duty Hopkinton police officer in August 2008.

Court records show that Jeffrey Dennis, 35, was convicted in December 2008 in connection with the death of officer Sean Powers, who died after being rear-ended while riding his motorcycle on Route 202 in Henniker.

Dennis was returned to prison after his arrest Wednesday. Police said he

Weare Select Board responds to residents' complaints of flooding

Scott & Evelyn Garnett returned to the Weare Select Board to continue discussing the condition of the culvert installation that causes their property to flood when it rains. Scott explained they were told the road height would not be changed.

However, in front of their yard, the road has been raised a foot. Historically, there was never a culvert; water flowed down the west side of the road. DPW Director Benji Knapp said that he had a nice conversation with the Garnetts and courteously agreed to disagree.

He will follow whatever decision the Board concludes, but maintains the destroyed garden is because of the worst July rainfall we have ever had.

Selectman Van stated the Garnetts want it capped, though not admitting the Town caused the issue as his yard is also still water soaked from summer rains, but this would make them happy. If the culvert is closed, you have to be careful of rerouting

the water as not to undermine the roadway. Selectman Van questioned if the culvert were closed would this diversion create NHDES issues. Vice Chairman Meaney responded he did not think so. The Board's consensus is to cap the culvert with the condition if the problem makes road issues they will open it back up. DPW Director Knapp requested two weeks to do it and if a problem arises, he will discuss it with the Board before reopening.

- Install CO alarms near sleeping areas.
- Check heating systems and fuel-burning appliances annually.
- Avoid the use of non-vented combustion appliances.
- Never burn fuels indoors except in devices such as stoves or furnaces that are made for safe use.
- Be Attentive to possible symptoms of CO poisoning.

Other Tips for Preventing CO Poisoning:

- Have your heating system and chimney inspected and cleaned by a qualified technician annually.
- Make sure all interior fuel-burning appliances are in good condition and have proper ventilation.
- Never idle the car in the garage, even if the garage door is open to the ourside.
- Use proper fuel in kerosene space heaters.
- Over gas stoves, install and use an exhaust fan vented to the outdoors.
- Open flues when using the fireplace.
- Choose properly sized wood stoves that are certified to meet EPA emission standards. Ensure wood stove doors fit tightly.
- Only portable generators outside and far away from buildings, never on balconies or near doors, vents or windows, or near to where anyone sleeps.

Daughters of the American Revolution perform reinactment ceremony

On Tuesday, October 12, 2021, at 3pm, members of the Buntin-Rumford-Webster Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution met at the Old Fort Cemetery for a reenactment program to bring to life some of those who are buried there and who were connected with the American Revolution. The four BRW members dressed in costume and portrayed Elizabeth Eastman (Connie Guerin), Sarah Bradley (Sheila Knight), Ruth Bradley (Diana Duckoff), and Lucy Kimball (Linda Miccio).

The women gave those attending a glimpse into their lives. For example, Ruth Bradley Eastman spoke of her husband, Nathaniel Eastman, Jr., who served as a soldier, who enlisted on July 20, 1775 at the age of 19. He served in Major John Brown's detachment in Quebec, Canada. He received a pension of \$33.66 per month in 1831. Ruth married Nathaniel and they built a house on the bluff near the Eastman School. Together they had 8 children. Ruth's husband's uncle's wife, Eliza-

beth Kimball Eastman, spoke of her parents, who died eight days apart when she was 7 years old.

Elizabeth married Moses Eastman in 1756. She and her husband lived on Oak Hill on 80 acres acquired by Moses' father, Ebenezer. The house was "said to be the center of hospitality and good cheer." Moses was a soldier in the French and Indian War and he enlisted as a soldier in April 1775 and fought at the Battle of Bunker Hill. He served until 1778. Elizabeth and Moses had 7 children.

ARE YOUR GUMS SAYING SOMETHING ABOUT YOUR DEMENTIA RISK?



Gum disease, especially the kind that is irreversible and causes tooth loss, may be associated with mild cognitive impairment and dementia 20 years later, according to a new study.

The study found that people with the most severe gum disease at the start of the study had about twice the risk for mild cognitive impairment or dementia by the end. However, the good news was that people with minimal tooth loss and mild gum disease were no more likely to develop thinking

problems or dementia than people with no dental problems.

The study involved 8,275 people with an average age of 63 who did not have dementia at the start of the study.

Overall, 1,569 people developed dementia during the study, or 19%. This was the equivalent of 11.8 cases per every 1,000 person-years. The study found that of the people who had healthy gums and all their teeth at the start of the study, 264 out of 1,826, or 14%, developed dementia by the end of the study. For those with mild gum disease, 623 out of 3,470, or 18%, developed dementia. For participants with severe gum disease, 306 out of 1,368, or 22%, developed dementia. And 376 out of 1,611, or 23%, developed dementia in the group that had no teeth.

People with intermediate or severe gum disease, but who still had some teeth, had a 20% greater risk of developing mild cognitive impairment or dementia compared to the healthy group. These risks were after researchers accounted for other factors that could affect dementia risk, such as diabetes, high cholesterol and smoking.

A recent research article in the journal *PLoS ONE* examines inadequate nutrient intake and its relationship to poor bone health, specifically risk of osteoporosis. The research was a cross sectional analysis of the U.S. population with a specific focus on those below the poverty line with food insecurities. In the U.S., 25% of older Americans live below the poverty line. Within this population, 68% have inadequate calcium intakes, and 46% have inadequate vitamin D intakes. It has been

estimated in the U.S. population age 50 and older, about 10.2 million suffer from osteoporosis, and 80% of these affected cases are females. American women over the age of 50 consistently have inadequate calcium intake regardless of their economic status.

A clinical trial involving COVID-19 patients has found that a combination of the drugs baricitinib and remdesivir reduced time to recovery, according to results published in *The New England Journal of Medicine*.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved Zokinvy (Ionafarnib) capsules to reduce the risk of death due to Hutchinson-Gilford progeria syndrome and for the treatment of certain processing-deficient progeroid laminopathies in patients one year of age and older. Zokinvy is not approved for use in patients with other progeroid syndromes or laminopathies. Patients with Hutchinson-Gilford progeria syndrome and progeroid laminopathies experience accelerated cardiovascular disease from the buildup of defective progerin or progerin-like protein in cells. Most patients die before the age of 15 years from heart failure, heart attack or stroke. Before the recent approval, the only treatment options included supportive care and therapies directed towards the complications arising from the disease.

Warner farm receives \$250,000 USDA Grant

More than half of the \$500k project budget is dedicated to creating new jobs. New London's ClearChoice MD to run 4 clinics to deal with test shortage

ClearChoice MD of New London has won an \$8.8 million contract to conduct these tests, which should help cut down on the delays many parents have been facing trying to get schoolchildren tested, Health and Human Services Commissioner Lori Shibinette said.

The Executive Council unanimously endorsed the retroactive no-bid contract at its meeting

ClearChoice, which operates a network of urgent care centers in the state, was the only company with the staff and resources to immediately set up these testing sites, she said.

The Manchester and Claremont test sites will be in place later this week, and the Nashua and Newington programs will open next week, Shibinette said.

State officials did not have information about the sites' exact location, urging the public to check the company's website.

Each location will conduct at least 150 tests a day and be open a minimum of six hours, seven days a week.

Under this contract, all results must be completed within 48 hours.

Shibinette said ClearChoice will be shipping the results to be analyzed by NorDx Laboratories of Maine, which currently has a 24hour turnaround. Governor Chris Sununu said the national shortage of rapid antigen tests for the virus has forced states to "get creative" to help families of school children and employees needing COVID-19 testing.

"This is a big step forward for us," Sununu said.


State Epidemiologist Dr. Benjamin Chan said that in the past week the state's COVID positivity rate has risen above the 5% under control benchmark for the first time in months.

It's now at 6%, Chan said.

Hospitalizations remain "high but stable," while the average number of new positive cases daily has been roughly 500, he said.

Sununu said the state's rate of fatality from COVID19 is the third-lowest in the country, with the hospitalization rate the fifth-lowest.

"We follow data, we follow science and we do it the New Hampshire way every time," Sununu said.

Publisher's Perspective

Prioritizing Wants & Needs

In the last decade we have witnessed a classic example of what's wrong with politics as usual. Many politicians have used the Court's Claremont rulings as justification to pass an income tax. Advocates of expanded gambling use this decision as the excuse to turn New Hampshire into New Jersey. Some opponents of increased spending simply want to turn back the clock, pass a Constitutional Amendment to get the Court out of the education business, without addressing the underlying inequalities. The major problem with all this posturing is that common sense and reality are lost in a blustery cloud of partisan debate and nothing gets accomplished. It's time for politicians of both parties and all persuasions to stop shouting at each other, sit down together and make a serious attempt to restore reason and return to reality. As I see it the key facts are these:

- 1. Educating its young is the solemn obligation of each generation. Recognizing this obligation, the NH Legislature established the Foundation Aid Program. Ignoring the obligation, the Legislature and a series of Governors (Republican and Democrat) have under funded the program.
- 2. New Hampshire spending on education, from a combination of State funding and local property taxes, is sufficient to place NH students in the top ranks nationally. This does not mean that our system is perfect, only that it is better than most.
- 3. Relying too much on local property taxes creates a great disparity between property rich and property poor school districts. Recognizing the problem, the Legislature established the now famous Augenblick Formula to even out this disparity. Ignoring the problem, the Legislature and a series of Governors (Republican and Democrat) have underfunded the formula, which created the crisis, triggered the original

Claremont lawsuit and the Supreme Court decisions.

- 4. Special needs students had long been neglected in education nationally. Recognizing the problem, Congress passed legislation requiring districts to educate these students. Ignoring the problem, Congress and a series of Presidents (Republican and Democrat) have provided the states with only 6 to 8% of the funds necessary to run the program, instead of the 40% promised.
- 5. The current law requiring districts to spend unlimited funds to provide for special needs students' IEPs limits the school's ability to properly educate the rest of the student population.

With these factors in mind, I suggest the following action to begin correcting the situation:

- A. The President and Congress are really determined to make education a priority, they could begin by funding special education costs at the 40% level as promised for years.
- B. The special education law must be amended to require spending no more than 150% of the school's average per pupil cost on a special needs student. These children need and deserve our attention, but spending unlimited funds on one child deprives districts of the resources to educate all our children.
- C. Governor Sununu and Legislative leaders must redirect all state aid currently being sent to cities and towns, reallocating it to school districts, on a targeted basis. While the state has a major obligation to guarantee equal educational access, it has no Constitutional responsibility to send communities money to pay for highway trucks, police and fire vehicles, municipal salaries and other local expenses. Admittedly this does nothing to reduce property taxes, as it simply shifts state aid from one local pocket to the other. It does however, dramatically increase ▶

state aid to education where our obligation and priorities should lie. It also forces local taxpayers to decide how much to spend on local projects and programs. For too many years we have subsidized municipal expenses, making Selectmen look good at the expense of School Boards.

D. Additional state funds must be dedicated to ensuring that New Hampshire students receive the best possible education, but under this proposal those "new" funds would be much smaller than the millions being spent now. The statewide property tax could then be made permanent at a much lower rate.

E. State leaders must realize that although education is a top priority, the state can not continue to increase its spending in other areas as if there were an unlimited supply of tax dollars. The last time I checked, no matter what level of tax raiser, or tax spender, there was only one level of taxpayer.

Cool heads and inter-party cooperation will go a long way toward getting us out of this crisis mentality. To do so, we must remember that as a State, we can do a lot, but, we can not do everything. As with our own household budgets, the State must set priorities, fund the essentials and have the courage to recognize that we can't afford to "do it all."

Although NH must increase its aid to education, we also need to recognize that money alone does not guarantee good results. Good teachers and parental involvement are essential if we are going to dramatically improve our children's education. Yes, educating its young is a solemn obligation of each generation. However, it is an obligation that parents and educators have too long defaulted to a system of escalating cost and declining results. It's time to reassert this obligation and demand high academic standards and accountability for results.

More than an obligation, educating the next generation is an investment in both prosperity and posterity. The legacy of this generation will be the groundwork we lay for the next. Our leaders, if they are to deserve the label, must now abandon the partisan posturing of party politics and display the courage, commitment and common sense required to address the challenge before us.



Charrette denounces Hearts of Hillsborough but competes with Project Genesis

Katherine Charrette spoke to the Hillsborough Select Board with regard to the use of Butler Park for events. She said that she has a Halloween event which is scheduled for October 31st in Butler Park but there is also another Halloween event that was approved for Butler Park on the 23rd which is being sponsored by Hearts of Hillsborough which is Leigh Bosse's organization.

Ms. Charrette said the organization is not a non-profit but is being portrayed as one and said by approving this event as well as hers will affect how successful her event is and she has vendors lined up.

Ms. Charrette continued about her feelings with regard to this. Ms. Buono, who is tasked with approving the use of the Park said the rule is that if the Park is not being used and either an organization or a person wishes to use the Park for legal events, it is approved. Ms. Buono responded to Ms. Charrette's comment about Hearts of Hillsborough not being a non-profit

and said that on the application, Mr. Bosse said it was a pending non-profit which means it is not a non-profit. She added that if the Selectmen wish to limit the amount of public events based on theme, they should do so in the rules and regulations so that she is not accused of discrimination if someone is denied use of the Park for their event.

This was discussed further, with the Selectmen not making changes to the use of the Park at this time.

Charrette also failed to mention that her Trunk or Treat event is in direct competition with the town's longstanding Trunk or Treat sponsored by the kids of Project Genesis and Kid Adventures at the Middle School.
