Peterborough woman killed

Another woman injured in three-car Peterborough crash

A Peterborough woman was killed and a Jaffrey woman critically injured in a threecar crash on Route 202 in Peterborough Wednesday morning.

Police said Jillian Bosworth, 30, was traveling south in a Honda Civic when she crossed the center line and collided with a northbound 2013 Hyundai Tucson driven by Kim Reth, 52, just after 7 a.m.

The Hyundai then crashed into a Ford Taurus driven by Robin Marmorstein, 47, of Peterborough, according to a news release.

Bosworth was pronounced dead at the scene. Reth was transported to the University of Massachusetts Medical Center with extremely critical injuries, police said. Marmorstein was not injured.

Route 202 was closed for approximately 31/2 hours while police investigated.

Bradford Select Board briefed on Economic Revitalization Zones

Sherry Gould of the Abenaki Trail Project updated the Bradford Select Board on things they have been working on. She gave her family's history in Bradford. She said they have met with members of the Historical Society and the Conservation Commission.

Sherry discussed the loss of cedar in the area. They plan to put a boardwalk out to the well in the bog and do a water test as well. They have purchased a cider press. Sherry also said there will be a talk on Indigenous People's Day at the Mt Kearsarge Indian Museum. Marlene asked about the Indian Tie Up.

Sherry said the Abenaki would winter up on the ledges and that this location appears to be where captives would be tied up. Mel asked how big the tribe was back then, and Sherry said she has no idea.

Matt Monahan spoke on the Economic Revitalization Zones (ERZ). He gave the background on the ERZ in the west and east end of Town. These are State tax incentives to attract businesses to particular locations. Town applies to the State, then the State promotes this project on their end. Board members reviewed maps of these zones. The Transfer Station and Naughton property are two identified properties in the overlay. Andrew asked what changes for the property owners would take place. Matt said nothing would change and it just gives the property owner another incentive to have someone purchase their property or use their property for a business. Andrew asked what the outreach out to abutters has been and what type of businesses could go into these areas.

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Antrim House Center for Women goes coed

Andrew West, director of business development for Sobriety Centers of New Hampshire, has announced that Antrim House, the region's only residential treatment facility exclusively for women with substance-use disorders, has gone coed. Although the 21-bed inpatient treatment center often was at capacity when it was for women only, there is a high demand for beds for men, with two to three men needing a bed for every woman. The upcoming closure of Farnum Center North, a 50-bed coed facility in Franklin will only ad to the demand. Women seeking gender-specific treatment must now travel out of state for treatment. In addition to Antrim House, there is another coed residential treatment facility in Dublin.

The Harris Center recognizes contributors

At its 51st Annual Meeting held via ZOOM, The Harris Center recognized several contributors: Robin Fairfield, kindergarten teacher at Marlborough Elementary School, was honored with the Educator of the Year Award.

The 2021 Laurie Bryan Partnership Award — honoring former Harris Center Executive Director Laurie Bryan's achievements in working with community partners — was presented to the Hancock Town Library, under the leadership of library director Amy Markus.

Volunteer Extraordinaire Awards were presented to two outstanding Harris Center volunteers— Hancock wood carver Jack McWhorter and Tom Delaney of Peterborough.

Harris Center Executive Director Jeremy Wilson also recognized Stephen Froling for 17 years of valued service to the Harris Center, both as a past board member and as the organization's volunteer corporate counsel for land protection projects. Stephen's considerable land conservation legacy spans thousands of acres.

In addition to these awards, outgoing trustees David Sobel, Carol Young, and Timothy Jordan were thanked for their service, and Steve Lamonde and Ethan Harper-Lentricchia were welcomed as new trustees.

Renovation of Antrim's historic Grange Hall are underway

Long planned renovations and repairs to Antrim's Grange Hall are underway, starting with foundation work under the northern area of the building. Typical of work on older buildings, once work began workers found that instead of minor foundation problems anticipated, the entire northern part of the building was sitting on bare ground and rotting.

According to Beth Merrill, Secretary of the Antrim Grange, the immediate goal is to get the foundation secured and stabilized and no longer subject to the elements or animals.

Andras Lazar, the stonemason directing the work, reports that the plan is to close up the building before the onset of winter. Begun in 2017, the project has been slow to develop, in part, because of funding delays.

Early on, the Grange received grants and community donations, but once underway, the group decided to pause while conducting a building assessment in order to apply for more grants. That took months, and



then COVID-19 further delayed the project. The historic Antrim Grange was the second floor of Antrim's first town hall, built in 1785 and moved to where it is now in 1832. As such, it was not initially designed to sit on the ground. The Grange bought the building in 1894 after having organized in 1883, and has owned the building ever since.



WHAT CAUSES TOOTH GRINDING?



The technical name for tooth grinding is bruxism. Stress is certainly one of the factors that can lead to grinding. A sleep disorder, an abnormal bite or crooked or missing teeth also can be factors. Some experts estimate that as many as 10 percent of the population deal with this condition to some extent, ranging from children to senior citizens.

The best person to talk to if you or a loved one has this condition is your dentist. It can be a serious problem. Some people who grind their teeth in their sleep may wake up feeling fine. Others, however, may wake with some combination of jaw, shoulder and neck pain. The grinding action also can significantly wear teeth and loosen them. In severe cases it can crack tooth enamel and chip or break teeth.

During sleep, bruxism can cause a person's jaw to clench at pressure up to six times the level exerted during waking hours. Your dentist will first try to diagnose the cause of the condition. If it is stress related, the result, say, of pressure at work, the dentist may recommend physical therapy or counseling. Muscle-relaxing medication and/or a nighttime mouth guard, specially fitted by the dentist, may be an answer.

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High doses of vitamin C for treating COVID-19 may benefit some populations, but investigators exploring its potential in aging say key factors in effectiveness include levels of the natural transporter needed to get the vitamin inside cells, according to a report in the journal Aging and Disease. Age, race, gender, as well as expression levels and genetic variations of those vitamin C transporters that make them less efficient, all may be factors in the effectiveness of vitamin C

therapy against COVID-19 and other maladies.

Children under age 2 who take antibiotics are at greater risk for childhood-onset asthma, respiratory allergies, eczema, celiac disease, obesity and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, according to a study published in the journal Mayo Clinic Proceedings. The researchers looked at 14,572 children, 70 percent of whom received at least one antibiotic prescription during their first two years, primarily for respiratory or ear infections.

Vitamin D and Omega-3s bolster health in some active older people. The largest European study on old age, DO-HEALTH, has investigated the effects of these supplements on aging. The study's findings, published in the journal JAMA, suggest that, compared to the control group, some subgroups experienced increased benefits of vitamin D and omega-3 supplementation when it comes to lowering infection rates and systolic blood pressure. Omega-3s reduced the risk of infections by 11% in total, in particular for upper respiratory (10%) and urinary tract infections (62%), while vitamin D lowered systolic blood pressure in men by 2.5 mmHg and the risk of infections in younger participants (70 to 74-yearold) by 16%.

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

America's Greatest Democrat

Statues of Thomas Jefferson are being removed from some State Houses because he was a slave owner, which supposedly negates all his other accomplishments. How absurd.

Thomas Jefferson was a very remarkable man who started learning very early in life and never stopped. At 5, began studying under his cousin's tutor. At 9, studied Latin, Greek and French. At 14, studied classical literature and additional languages. At 16, entered the College of William and Mary. He could write in Greek with one hand while writing the same in Latin with the other.

At 19, studied Law for 5 years starting under George Wythe. At 23, started his own law practice. At 25, was elected to the Virginia House of Burgesses. At 31, wrote the widely circulated "Summary View of the Rights of British America," and retired from his law practice. At 32, was a Delegate to the Second Continental Congress. At 33, wrote the Declaration of Independence. At 33, took three years to revise Virginia's legal code and wrote a Public Education bill and a statute for Religious Freedom.

At 36, was elected the second Governor of Virginia succeeding Patrick Henry. At 40, served in Congress for two years. At 41, was the American minister to France and negotiated commercial treaties with European nations along with Ben Franklin and John Adams. At 46, served as the first Secretary of State under George Washington.

At 53, served as Vice President and was elected president of the American Philosophical Society. At 55, drafted the Kentucky Resolutions and became the active head of Republican Party. At 57, was elected the third President of the United States. At 60, obtained the Louisiana Purchase doubling the nation's size. At 61, was elected to a second term as President. At 65, retired to Monticello. At 80, helped President Monroe shape the Monroe Doctrine. At 81, almost single-handedly created the University of Virginia and served as its first president. At 83, died on the 50th anniversary of the Signing of the Declaration of Independence along with John Adams.

Thomas Jefferson studied the previous failed attempts at government. His voice from the past can lead us in the future, if we take time to listen. Here is some of what he had to say:

1. "When we get piled upon one another in large cities, as in Europe, we shall become as corrupt as Europe."

2. "The democracy will cease to exist when you take away from those who are willing to work and give to those who would not."

3. "It is incumbent on every generation to pay its own debts as it goes. A principle which if acted on would save one-half the wars of the world."

4. "I predict future happiness for Americans if they can prevent the government from wasting the labors of the people under the pretense of taking care of them."

5. "My reading of history convinces me that most bad government results from too much government."

6. "No free man shall ever be debarred the use of arms."

7. "The strongest reason for the people to retain the right to keep and bear arms is, as a last resort, to protect themselves against tyranny in government."

8. "The tree of liberty must be refreshed from time to time with the blood of patriots and tyrants."

9. "To compel a man to subsidize with his taxes the propagation of ideas which he disbelieves and abhors is sinful and tyrannical."

Jefferson was one of our first, and perhaps the greatest Democrat, but if he said these things today, he would be ostracized from his own party.




