Kearsarge Principal remembered Robert Bennett, former teacher, coach & administrator

The Kearsarge Regional School District to was saddened to learn of the recent passing H



of former teacher, coach, and administrator, Robert Bennett, on Tuesday, October 26, 2021 after a battle with cancer. Bennett started in the Kearsarge Regional School District in 1994 as a paraprofessional at Ke-

arsarge Regional Elementary School in New London and Kearsarge Regional Middle School. He later became a beloved social studies teacher at Kearsarge Regional High School (KRHS) before taking on an administrator role as the first Student Assistance Coordinator at KRHS in 2006.

In 2012, he became assistant principal at the high school, then interim principal for the 2014-2015 school year, before being named principal in 2015. In 2020, Bennett left Kearsarge after more than 25 years and took on a position as principal at Laconia High School.

Though he possessed a strong passion for education and helping students, he had an equal love of sports. Bennett coached a variety of sports for KRHS as well as Keene State College. Most notably, for many seasons he coached field hockey, baseball, girls' basketball, and was assistant coach for boys' basketball and football. In 2012, he led the Kearsarge Cougars girls' basketball team to the NHIAA Division II championship game as well as many other tournament appearances in both field hockey and baseball.

"Rob Bennett was the consummate Kearsarge person and he championed students, families, and this school district," KRHS counselor Peter Angus said. "[He] led by example and was willing to tackle any job that needed to be done as evidenced by his many roles in our school district."




Antrim teen sentenced to 50 years in prison for killing his father

The Antrim teenager who stabbed and beat his father to death with a hammer on Halloween night two years ago was sentenced to 50 years in state prison, after pleading guilty to the crime. Joseph Beam, who is now 19, pleaded guilty to the first-degree murder of Jason Beam, and admitted that he also planned to kill his mother and brother.

His mother, Julie Patten, a nurse at the state psychiatric hospital at the time of the murder, said that she faults herself for not seeing her son's mental health issues earlier.

On that night, Joseph went trick-or treating with his family and 7-year-old brother, and they returned to the family home for a night of movies.



"Civics was a class that used to be required before you could graduate from high school. You were taught what was in the U.S. Constitution. "And after all the student rebellions in the Sixties, civics was banished from the student curriculum and was replaced by something called social studies. Here we live in a country that has a fabulous constitution and all these guarantees, a contract between the citizens and the government – nobody knows what's in it...

And furthermore, if you don't know what's in the document, how can you care if someone is shredding it?" - Frank Zappa At 9:30 p.m., Patten kissed her husband and went to bed while he and Joseph watched movies. She woke at 2:30 a.m. to the house filling with smoke, and found her husband's body in the living room. He had suffered 15 blows to the head, and 64 stab wounds. Police arrested Beam walking down the highway wearing a mask. He was laughing uncontrollably and eventually confessed to the killing. Beam said he just didn't like his family and had planned to kill his mother and younger brother, too, but lost motivation.

In court, Joseph Beam read a statement before being sentenced. "Two years ago today, I don't know who I was, what I was thinking. One thing I do know, my dad was a great man," he said. "Every time I'm in a quiet place, I talk to my dad," he said. "I really hope he can hear me. I miss him so much."

Planning Board establishing "Gateway Zoning District"

As a followup to Hillsborough's 2018 Master Plan, the Planning Board has agreed to partner with the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission to establish a Gateway Mixed Use District along Route 9. This large area would be designed to emphasize high quality, attractive and relatively dense development to be determined by the town's ability to extend municipal water and sewer service to the area. The project is scheduled to begin in April of 2022 for submission to the 2023 Town Meeting.

At Wednesday's meeting the Planning Board approved the project and its \$5,000 cost to the town.

New London Select Board divided over next steps for a Police Station

Town Administrator Kim Hallquist briefed the Board on the results of the recent Community Forums. 155 New London residents participated in one of the two October Forums and were appreciative of the opportunity to express their views.

In setting priorities for the future, citizens chose: 1. A new Police Station, 2. Work Force Housing, 3. Housing Opportunities. As far as the Police

Station, 27% favored relocating the Recreation Department and renovating the existing facility, while 56% preferred a new facility.

Selectwoman Nancy Rollins moved to charge the Building & Facilities Committee to work with the Planning Board to locate a new site, which was seconded by Chair John Cannon. Member Janet Kidder disagreed, saying the Building Committee had not properly considered a new facility, instead concentrating on renovating the Buker Building.

She suggested a new citizens committee would be better. Rollins shot back that she was appalled that anyone would criticize the volunteer work of the Building Committee.

Public comment was divided on both sides of the issue, but the motion passed 2-1.

A comprehensive study involving more than 250,000 women shows that oral contraceptive use protects against ovarian and endometrial cancer. The protective effect remains for several decades after discontinuing the use. The study is published in the journal *Cancer Research*. Ovarian and endometrial cancer are among the most common gynecological cancers, with a lifetime risk of just over 2 per cent. Endometrial cancer

is slightly more common but as it has clearer symptoms and is therefore often detected at an early stage, the mortality rate is low. However, ovarian cancer is among the deadliest cancers, since it is often not detected until it has already spread to other parts of the body.

Repeated intravenous (IV) ketamine infusions significantly reduce symptom severity in individuals with chronic post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and the improvement is rapid and maintained for several weeks afterwards, according to a study conducted by researchers from the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. The study, published in the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, is the first randomized, controlled trial of repeated ketamine administration for chronic PTSD and suggests this may be a promising treatment for PTSD patients.

Due to its anti-clotting properties, aspirin is widely prescribed as a preventive measure to patients who have already had cardiovascular events, such as a heart attack or ischemic stroke. However, aspirin's role in primary prevention — averting first heart attacks and strokes — has been unclear. After decades of commonly prescribing aspirin for primary prevention, recent guidelines from the American Heart Association (AHA) and American College of Cardiology (ACC) now recommend more select use for those with the highest risk of cardiac events due to the increased risk of bleeding.

Hillsborough Select Board budget planning

The Hillsboro Select Board has begun meeting with department heads to prepare the 2022 town budget. First up was new Highway Department Supervisor Ernie Butler, who has requested \$1,356,751.06 which is down 2% from last year's \$1,382,924.11. Part of the reduction is a result of about \$50,000 being removed from the operating budget and added to the Capital Improvement budget, making it \$300,000 this year instead of the prior \$250,000 request. Butler is also asking voters to approve a new \$66,000 fully equipped plow truck which will be paid from Capital Reserves with our a tax impact.

Hopkinton tax rate increase \$1.62 or 5.54%

The 2021 Hopkinton tax rate has been set by the NH Department of Revenue Administration. The new rate for properties not in one of the precincts is \$30.87 per thousand of assessed value. This is a \$1.62 or 5.54% increase overall. The Town rate of \$6.54 is exactly what was presented at Town Meeting in the spring. Bills will be sent out shortly and due at the beginning of December.

Twice each year we pause to honor those who served in our armed forces. On Memorial Day, we honor those who paid the ultimate price and gave their lives defending our country. Veteran's Day is dedicated to all veterans who served America at the expense of their personal safety.

Some call us heroes - We are not! Some say we were brave - We were not!

America's veterans are ordinary men and women of which much was asked in extraordinary times; who overcame their fears to serve a nation that gave them so much; and who fought not for glory but out of a sense of duty to defend this great continuing experiment in democracy and personal liberty we call America.

I served in Vietnam and was away from my friends and family for one year. Some of my colleagues who fought WWII were gone for 3 or 4 years and recently our troops in Iraq and Afghanistan are serving extended or multiple tours of duty.

How can today's younger generation get a true a sense of what War is like? Imagine for a moment you are a track athlete and you can go home after running in 100 meets. Trouble is most runners die by the 33rd meet. That's what fighter pilots faced in Vietnam. But, the reward for surviving that mission is that you get to go on another with the same odds, and then another and another. Just like the Marines who fought at Guadalcanal, Korea, Viet Nam, Iraq or Afghanistan.

They knew the odds before they went but they went anyway.

Could you do the same? Would you? If you survive that experience you are a different person. Your whole outlook and philosophy of life changes in ways others will never understand.

With luck and God's grace, you will never have to experience that, but you can still honor those who have. Soon the future of America will be in your hands. When your turn comes, honor it, improve it and pass along a better life to your kids. That's all the thanks any veteran could ask.

He should have disclosed that he was an abutter and was asked why he was involved at the presentation to the Board of Selectmen. Fulton stated it was the will of the Commission. Selectman Van responded he is disappointed in Andy and shame on the Board of Selectmen for not researching it. Chairman Vice Chairman Meaney said it was slightly unethical being a property abutter and not disclosing that to the Board. At the Conservation meeting, though Fulton voted no, he should not have voted at all. After further discussion the Board voted 3-2 to approve the purchase.




