Wreaths Across America

Bennington woman coordinating area Girl Scouts

Girl Scouts from Bennington, Hillsboro and Peterborough plan to lay 900 wreaths on the graves of veterans in several Peterborough cemeteries through the Wreaths Across America program.

The Girl Scout leader behind this effort, KaitLynne Foote of Bennington, says that honoring veterans and remembering their service are values that run deep in her family. Foote said she has sponsored wreaths for the program in the past, but wanted to get more involved. As co-leader of a Girl Scout Troop in Peterborough she brought up the idea and a handful of other troops

from Bennington and Hillsboro-Deering have joined the program with the Peterborough troop. She reached out to four towns, but Foote said she only heard back from Peterborough.

The December 18th event will include a brief ceremony at noon and then the wreaths will be laid at each grave. The Girl Scouts plan to continue this each year, and while they may not be able to get all 900 wreaths to be sponsored this first year they will try. Driver of Peterborough hit-and-run vehicle located

The driver of a hit-and-run accident in Peterborough last week has been located by the owner of the vehicle that was damaged. The trailer of Derek Bryant, of Bryant Landscapes and Constructions, had been hit by another car while turning onto Granite Street. The other driver continued westbound without stopping, but one of Bryant's employees watched the woman drive away.

When Police posted a request for assistance on Facebook, Bryant received a message saying that the car had been seen traveling toward Dublin with frontend damage. Bryant then drove there, spotted the car parked right next to the road, and called police.

The police announced November 26 that the case had been closed, without releasing details.

Bennington's GEP Dodge Library sponsors house decorating contest

Residents and businesses of Bennington can show their holiday spirit by decorating their doors or driveway ends. Trustees of the GEP Dodge Library have announced a contest for the best decorations. Entries will be accepted at the library or in the mail through December 13.

Jeanne Vint's family donates a Baby Grand Piano to Center Woods School

On Friday, November 19, the rich sounds of a Henry Miller Baby Grand Piano filled the room at the Weare Middle/Center Woods Upper Elementary Schools, the new home for a piano graciously donated to the school by the family of Jeanne Vint.

How did this piano make its way from Salem, NH, to the Weare Middle School? "The family of Ms. Vint knew Sue Williams, a music teacher at John Stark," said WMS/CWUES music teacher Serena Gorham. "When Ms. Williams told them that the high school already had a baby grand, but that the middle school did not, they graciously offered this beautiful piano to us," Gorham continued.

Principal Shawne Hilliard explained that the cost of moving and tuning the piano was a consideration in accepting the gift but that anonymous cash donations combined with a discount from the moving company (Trend Moving and Storage) covered nearly all of those costs. "In this

season of giving thanks and showing gratitude for others, these gifts are the ultimate demonstration of a giving community, and we are so grateful for this donation," said Principal Hilliard.

The gift of this piano comes at a time when the music program at WMS is exploding. "This is my third year here," said Ms. Gorham, "And we now have 130 students involved in music outside of the classroom in the choir, band, and beginning band." Due to the size of the groups and the new baby grand, music concerts have moved into the gym.

"Being involved in music is like being on a sports team," commented Ms. Gorham. "We have fewer games (concerts), but we have a lot of practices that allow students to learn, help each other grow, and celebrate that growth," she concluded.

Jeanne Vint attended the New School of Music in Philadelphia in 1949, training to become a concert pianist and spending time performing chamber music accompanied by violin and cello. She enjoyed playing classical music throughout her life and recorded a '78 phonograph record. The family hopes that the gifting of this piano to Weare Middle School will in some small way allow her legacy to live on.



Q: What should I do if I knock a tooth out in an accident?

A: Kids are not the only ones who are vulnerable to having a tooth knocked out in a rough-housing situation or a fall off a bike. A fall, car accident, collision with a tennis doubles partner—any number of sudden, unexpected events can result in a tooth loss.

So here's what to do if you have a tooth knocked out: First, retrieve the tooth if you can. Depending on the environment, keep the tooth moist with either saliva, or milk. Don't scrub it clean because any fibers still attached could be helpful if there's an opportunity to replant the tooth. That having been said, go to your dentist—as opposed to a hospital emergency room—as quickly as possible. If he can reseat it within a reasonable time,

Likewise, if you break or chip a tooth, try to retrieve the broken off fragment. If the dentist cannot repair the tooth with the retrieved part, depending on the size of the chip, he may be able to repair it with a tooth-colored resin. For a more sizable chip, the dentist may have to put a crown on the tooth.

the likelihood of saving the tooth increases.

If a tooth is knocked loose, you may be able to push it back into place yourself. But in any case involving dental trauma, you should see a dentist as soon as possible. The effects of trauma are not always evident. There may be damage that only an x-ray could detect.

Exposure to antibiotics in the first days of life is thought to affect various physiological aspects of neonatal development. A new study, led by Bar-Ilan University's Azrieli Faculty of Medicine, reveals that antibiotic treatment within 14 days of birth is associated with reduced weight and height in boys — but not girls — up to the age of six. By contrast, the study showed significantly higher body mass index (BMI) in both boys and girls following antibiotic use after the neonatal period, and within the first six years of life. The findings,

published in the journal Nature Communications, may be the result of changes in the development of the gut microbiome.

Cisplatin has been used to treat cancer since the 1970s. Since then, many other platinum-containing cytostatic drugs have been developed, such as triplatinNC, a highly charged complex that contains three ligand-bridged platinum atoms. Unlike cisplatin, this drug also directly inhibits metastasis, according to a research team in the journal Angewandte Chemie.

A new method of purifying gentamicin, a widely used antibiotic, reduces the risk that it will cause deafness, according to a new study. Gentamicin is used in U.S. hospitals to treat a variety of bacterial infections, including infections in newborns and in other susceptible patients, such as those with cystic fibrosis. It's a popular drug in developing countries because it is highly effective and inexpensive. Yet researchers estimate that up to 20% of patients who are treated with it experience some degree of irreversible hearing loss. Now, researchers have found a relatively inexpensive way to reformulate the drug, which belongs to a class of antibiotics called aminoglycosides, to be safer. Their findings were published in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

STEM Grants available to establish high school Robotics Teams

In an effort to support STEM concepts and exploration among New Hampshire youth, The New Hampshire Department of Education is offering competitive grants to public schools and public charter schools to establish robotics teams and participate in competitive events.

"Robotics is a great way to reinforce academic concepts while also fostering curiosity among children, promoting teamwork and improving critical technology skills," said Frank Edelblut, commissioner of education. "These grants will provide more New Hampshire students with the opportunity to embrace STEM concepts and learn through imaginative play and engineering."

Although there is no award minimum or maximum amount for each proposal, the estimated budget for each proposal is \$2,000 to \$15,000. There are select eligibility requirements for financing, and applications will be scored by independent peer

reviewers. To be eligible, schools must have an established partnership with at least one sponsor, and proposals must include participation in at least one competitive event.


Warner's Magdalen College accreditation placed on probation

The New England Commission of Higher Education has announced that Magdalen College's accreditation will be placed on probation for up to four years over concerns the tiny Catholic college cannot raise enough money to educate and support its students. The commission, which accredits the region's college and universities said Magdalen was not meeting its standards for "institutional resources." The college's academics are not in question, and it will remain accredited through the probation.

"(T)he institution did not demonstrate that its resources are sufficient to sustain the quality of its educational program and to support institutional improvement now and in the foreseeable future," the statement read.

During its probation, the college will still be accredited. Accreditation is needed to receive federal funding, including federal student aid. Magdalen was first accredited in 2018.

This spring, the commission con-




sidered placing Magdalen College on probation not just because of its finances, but because the commission believed Magdalen was not meeting accreditation standards for leadership and organization and for planning and evaluation.

The college appointed a new president, Ryan Messmore, over the summer. Messmore has served as the president of other small Christian schools and also has been a fellow of the Heritage Foundation, a conservative think tank.

In a statement, Messmore said the college's leadership would be launching new initiatives to enroll more students and raise more money.

"As a result, we are confident that Magdalen will overcome these challenges and move forward on even stronger footing," Messmore said. "The College looks forward to working with NECHE to achieve these goals, and we remain fully committed to—and deeply passionate about—the mission of offering students a transformative Catholic liberal arts education."






