

Duston Country Club sold

Former cook is the new owner of the historic golf course

Henniker native Ryan Hall, 24, has purchased Duston Country Club in Hopkinton, first opened in 1926, and owned and operated by the White family for the last 38 years.

The former cook at Country Spirit began cooking for the Whites about 6 seasons ago and gradually assumed more duties as time went by. He and the Whites began talking about a transition in the fall and the agreement was finalized in late December.

The new owner, who has been a member at Duston ever since he was a child, plans on continuing the longstanding traditions of Duston and introducing a few more of his own, including a renovated "Tenth Tee Tavern," both inside and patio dining.

All current employees have agreed to stay, including Bob White, who remains as groundskeeper for two seasons.

Antrim man arrested for arson at Maplehurst Inn

New Hampshire State Fire Marshal



Sean P. Toomey, Antrim Police Chief Brian Lord and Antrim Fire Chief Marshall Gale announced the arrest of Daniel Thibeault, 25, of Antrim in connection with a fire that occurred on December

29, 2021 at the Maplehurst Inn. Thibeault was arrested on one felony level charge of Arson, and was released on PR bail. His arraignment date is to be determined at the Hillsborough County Superior Court.

The investigation remains ongoing. The

members of the NH State Fire Marshal's Office, the Antrim Police Department and the Antrim Fire Department would like to thank the Swanzey Police Department and the Keene Police Department for their assistance, which helped lead to Mr. Thibeault's arrest. Fire Marshal Toomey would like to remind our citizens that arson is not a victimless crime, as intentionally set fires jeopardize both the public and our First Responders' safety. Nationwide, intentionally set fires cause over 400 deaths, 1,300 injuries, and \$1.3 billion dollars in direct property damage annually.

Long discussions but no decisions at Economic Development Commission

Hillsborough's Economic Development Commission met last Thursday to discuss several issues. Laura Buono, Town Administrator informed the members that bids to demolish the old Post Office Building at 2 Bridge Street range from \$80,000 to \$112,000, not including hazardous waste disposal.

She further reported that investor Zander Kemp remains interested in a public/private partnership to develop that building and the one next to it, but it would involve the town applying for restoration grants in its name before selling to the investors at a bargain price.

The Commissioners were reminded about the \$50,000 T-Mobile grant which has been offered for months without action by the town. When it was suggested that the grant might be used to revitalize central square, the idea was dismissed as "not shovel ready." One member suggested planting flowers and shrubs at the Woolen Mill site, while another suggested spending the \$50,000 on planting flower barrels in central square. A further suggestion to use some of the \$600,000 ARPA Grant to double the size of the main street municipal parking lot was also summarily dismissed, with member Riche Colcomb denying the need for more parking in the area.

MORE ON THE BACTERIA LIVING ON YOUR TOOTHBRUSH



After studying microbial communities living on bristles from used toothbrushes, Northwestern University researchers found those communities matched microbes commonly found inside the mouth and on skin. This was true no matter where the toothbrushes had been stored, including shielded behind a closed medicine cabinet door or out in the open on the edge of a sink.

During the research, the team led by Erica Hartmann examined Dr. Esin Narli

how many different types of microbes lived on the toothbrushes. They found people with better oral hygiene, who regularly flossed and used mouthwash, had toothbrushes with less diverse microbial communities. "If you practice good oral hygiene, then your toothbrush also will be relatively clean," Hartmann said. "But it's a small difference. It's not like people who regularly floss, brush and use mouthwash have no microbes and those who don't have tons. There's just a bit less diversity on toothbrushes from people who do all those things."

The researchers also found that microbes from toothbrushes of people with better oral hygiene had slightly more antimicrobial-resistance genes. Hartmann said microbes with these genes did not match the human body and were likely from air or dust in the bathroom.

Hartmann stresses that there's no need to be alarmed by microbes living on your toothbrush. Unless your dentist recommends otherwise, people should not reach for antimicrobial toothpastes and toothbrushes.

"By using antimicrobials, you aren't just getting rid of microbes," Hartmann said. "You are pushing the surviving microbes toward antimicrobial resistance. In general, for most people, regular toothpaste is sufficient."

Glucocorticoids are steroid hormones, a group that includes cortisone, prednisone and dexamethasone. Among the most frequently prescribed of medications, their anti-inflammatory properties make them useful in an array of forms and doses. Glucocorticoids are used as injections for hip or back pain, tablets for autoim-mune disease, nasal spray for sinus congestion, anti-itch BY SARAH CHAPIN SARAH CHAPIN has become the standard of care for COVID-19 treatment later in illness, as

it can help quiet overaggressive immune attacks in delicate lung tissue and blood vessels. But glucocorticoids are also among the more problematic of medicines, as prolonged use or high doses can lead to adverse events in-cluding high blood pressure, muscle wasting, bone loss, vulnerability to infections, vision problems, anxiety, swelling, weight gain, high blood sugar, insulin resistance, diabetes, and more, while naturally occurring glucocor-ticoids in the body can contribute to prostate cancer progression. But now, according to a report in the journal Nature Chemical Biology, researchers have developed a way to separate the beneficial anti-inflammatory properties of a group of steroids called glucocorticoids from some of their unwanted side-effects, through an optimization process they named "ligand class analysis." Their process enabled them to engineer two new, drug-like compounds that show steroidal anti-inflammatory action and other specific traits. One boosts muscle and energy supply, while the other reduces risk of muscle-wasting and bone loss typical of such drugs.

A recent study, appearing in the journal Academic Emergency Medicine, found that reducing the standard dose of IV-administered ketamine in half is as effective as the larger, standard dose in reducing pain in adults. Ketamine is known to provide pain relief comparable to opioid medications, which are highly addictive.



Henniker Community School Budget is lower than its Default Budget

The Henniker Community School Board unanimously approved the budget and warrant articles to be voted on at the Deliberative Session on February 7, 2022. Superintendent Dr. Jackie Coe made the presentation which included both the Operating Budget and the two warrant articles dealing with the Collective Bargaining Agreement for the teachers and the paraeducators. The Operating Budget is projected to be less than the Default Budget. The Default Budget is \$9,155,049, which is \$51,693 higher than the Proposed Budget.

The teachers' contract would increase by 4.13% the first year and 4.30% the second; however, in the second year the health care premiums and deductibles would shift with higher deductibles for the teachers.

The support staff contract would increase to a starting pay of \$15.00 per hour for the first year and \$17.01 for the second. This is to make the position more in line with entry level jobs in the private sector.

Joseph Siok, 83, of Stoddard, died Friday, two days after the injuries he suffered when his car collided with oncoming traffic last week in Peterborough. Peterborough Police Chief Scott Guinard reports that Siok lost control of his 2008 Cadillac while driving south on Route 202 (Hancock Road). The car crossed the center line and collided with a pickup truck. He suffered multiple injuries and was taken to Concord Hospital, Guinard said. The driver of the pickup truck, Stephen Smith, 42, of Peterborough, injured his hand.

Weare Town Budget up 4.6% to \$7,464.993 or 3.38 higher than the default

Weare voters will be asked to support a proposed operating budget of \$7,464,993, which is 4.6% over the budget approved for 2021 and 3.38% higher than the default budget of \$7,227,983.

Other articles call for 3% raises for non-union employees, as well as \$1.00/hour raises for library employees and returning Parks and Recreation staff.

Fire Rescue is requesting two additional full-time firefighter/EMTs, which completes the department's plan to have eight full-timers and allow for 24/7 coverage at the station. Rescue is also proposing the purchase of a new ambulance with funding for this coming from the Equipment and Vehicle Special Revenue Fund.

The Police Department is requesting a fully equipped cruiser and Public Works wants a 10-wheel dump truck and a one-ton truck for DPW, as well as asking to establish a special revenue fund for Transfer Station equipment using 50% of recycling revenues.

An article asks the town to establish a capital reserve fund to begin funding an update to the master plan and to place \$20,000 in that fund.

Voters will be asked to approve the

Weare Fire Rescue Department joining Capital Area Mutual Aid Fire Dispatch, and to authorize a lease agreement for all of the equipment for a Town Radio Communication Network for Safety Services.

New Boston voters asked to support a \$5,720,727 Operating Budget

A small group of New Boston voters breezed through an ambitious 30 article Warrant at Monday's Budget Hearing.

At February 7th Deliberative Session and March 8th Ballot Voting voters will be asked to support a proposed Operating Budget of \$5,720,727. If that fails, the Default Budget would be \$5,418,862. Other articles call for: 1. \$500,000 to be deposited into 9 Capital Improvement Trust Funds. 2. \$60,000 for GPS services; \$11,850 to support 4th of July Celebrations.

3. Modify the elders and Disability Exemptions, dissolve several unused Trust Funds and rename the Board of Selectmen to Select Board.

Community leaders are taking steps to reduce the effects of Hillsborough's next natural disaster event, including flooding, storms, severe winds and winter weather. A Hazard Mitigation Committee comprised of Town Departments, Boards, emergency personnel, and community stakeholders has completed the Town's updated draft Hillsborough Hazard Mitigation Plan 2022. This updated Plan is required to be approved by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) every five years to maintain continued eligibility for federal mitigation project funding.

A Public Information Meeting will be held on Wednesday, January 26, Jersey 25 years ago and believed we had found Eden; sunrises and sunsets that are often beyond belief, a Class A lake, a ski mountain, and a Donald Ross golf course.

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
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
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




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Betty Jane Ricketts
