Weare rejects Ban on teaching CRT

"Open inquiry and honest discussion" about U.S. history

At last Wednesday's Deliberative Session, Weare School District voters passed along an operating budget of \$17.3 million, which would raise the tax bill on a house assessed at \$350,000 by an estimated \$371 a year, a two-year teachers contract that would give raises of about 5% each year, and a one-year contract for support staff including paraprofessionals that would raise the average hourly rate from \$14.05 to a projected \$15.25. Also approved was changing half-day kindergarten to fullday kindergarten. The estimated cost of \$227,029 would be more than offset by \$246,133 from the state's adequacy funding, and extra staffing would be balanced by removing the current cost of mid-day bus transportation.

Discussion of those items was relatively routine compared to the remainder of the meeting which began when School Board Member Daniel Recupero refused to wear a mask or move from his seat in the middle of the table for the five-person board, under the COVID-19 rules established by the moderator. On a 17-16 vote to override the rules Recupero was allowed to stay in his seat.

The most heated discussion came over a petitioned article on Critical Race Theory that would have prohibited "any program that instructs that the United States, the State of New Hampshire, or any New Hampshire resident is inherently racist or intolerant." After a lengthy discussion, the article was amended into one that "encourages open inquiry and honest discussion" about U.S. history.

Moderator Luther Drake allowed the amendment to stand, though School District Attorney Diane Gorrow said that because the new language made no reference to the subject of critical race theory, that would "cross the line of legality about what changes could be made."


Eleanor Campbell Charitable Fund Scholarship application period open



Colby-Sawyer coach arrested on child sex charges

A former volunteer assistant basketball coach at Colby-Sawyer College faces more than 50 criminal charges including sexual abuse and manufacturing and possession of child sexual abuse images.

Joshua Pincoske, 47, appeared via video Wednesday for an arraignment on four counts of aggravated felonious sexual assault, 50 counts of manufacturing child sexual abuse images and one count of possession of child sexual abuse images, which are all Class A felonies. He is also charged with sexual assault, a Class A misdemeanor.

Pincoske entered pleas of not guilty for all charges.

Colby-Sawyer College released a statement on Tuesday afternoon to announce the school has rescinded Pincoske's status as a volunteer assistant coach.

New London approves renovation of the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog Walkway


The New London Select Board held a Public Hearing on a proposed \$600,000 bond for repairs and renovations to Whipple Town Hall and the Baker Building to open their meeting Monday ballot.

Bob Brown, Chair of the Conservation Commission appeared seeking the Board's approval of a \$50,000 withdrawal from the Mary Haddad Trust to replace 350' of a narrow wooden pathway through the Philbrick-Cricenti Bog. Brown proposes a 3' wide, aluminum framed walkway of slip proof material. Use of this fund requires approval of the Conservation Commission, the Rercreation Commission and the Select Board. With \$350,000 remaining in the fund, and the other two permissions in hand, the Board gave the final approval.

Town Administrator Kim Hallquist reported receipt of MRI's Safety/Security Assessment of the

Academy Building which she will discuss with department heads and

bring their recommendation to the Board at its next meeting.

Weare votes to reestablish previously abolished Ethics Commission

Concerned that the Weare Select Board ended the year with an over \$450,000 surplus, resident Frank Campana opened Saturday's meeting with a question, "What did not get done or accomplished with the budget last year?" Select Board Member Ricky Hipper cautioned not to worry because "we're not going to have that surplus this year."

Voters proposed amending an article to purchase a police cruiser for \$71,013, by requiring that \$40,000 of that be withdrawn from the town's unreserved fund balance but it was defeated by a vote of 24-26. However, an amendment raising the town's minimum wage to \$9, on



Hillsborough's economic recovery has begun. The Economic Development Commission has set a priority and has presented an application for a \$50,000 T-Mobil Small Town Revitalization Grant.

The commission wants to spend the \$50,000 to construct exercise stations along the town's Riverwalk, a project that was completed about 30 years ago, but was rarely used and fell into disrepair.

Diane Kendall selected as Henniker's new Town Administrator





People with periodontitis are at higher risk of experiencing major cardiovascular events, according to new research.

In a longitudinal study published recently in the Journal of Periodontology, researchers showed that inflammation associated with active gum disease was predictive of arterial inflammation, which can cause heart attacks, strokes, and other dangerous manifestations of cardiovascular disease.

For the study, researchers performed positron emission tomography and computer tomography (PET and CT) scans on 304 individuals to view and quantify inflammation in the arteries and gums of each patient. In follow-up studies approximately four years later, 13 of those individuals developed major adverse cardiovascular events. Presence of periodontal inflammation was shown to be predictive of cardiovascular events, even after researchers controlled for all other risk factors, such as smoking, high blood pressure, obesity, and diabetes.

Importantly, researchers found that bone loss from prior periodontal disease was not associated with cardiovascular events. Patients that did not have actively inflamed gums had a lower risk of cardiovascular disease — even if those individuals had a prior history of periodontal disease as evidenced by periodontal bone loss in their CT scans.

Researchers hypothesize that local periodontal inflammation activates and mobilizes cells signaling through bone marrow, which triggers the inflammation of arteries, leading to adverse cardiac events.

Semaglutide, an injectable medication taken once a week, offers a nonsurgical way to reduce weight and treat obesity according to a study published in The Lancet. It could help the more than 70 million adults in the United States who struggle with this chronic condition. People with diabetes benefit greatly from weight loss, yet they have a much harder time losing weight compared with those without diabetes. This study is the first to evaluate the weight loss effect of

this medication exclusively in patients with Type 2 diabetes.

While most adults over 50 understand that overuse of antibiotics is a problem, and say they're cautious about taking the drugs, a sizable minority have used antibiotics for something other than their original purpose, and appear to think the drugs could help treat colds, which are caused by viruses, not bacteria. These findings, contained in a new paper in Infection Control and Hospital Epidemiology, come from a national poll of people between the ages of 50 and 80 carried out as part of the National Poll on Healthy Aging.

Key data from the new paper: More than 91% of older adults said they are cautious about using antibiotics, and nearly 89% agreed that overuse can lead to antibiotics not working the next time they're needed. Nearly 56% agreed that doctors overprescribe antibiotics, but 41% said that if they had a cold or flu that lasted long enough to cause them to see a doctor, they would expect to receive a prescription for an antibiotic. 34% said they believe antibiotics can help them get better if they get a cold or the flu; these conditions are viral illnesses that do not respond to antibiotics, which aim to kill infectious bacteria. Nearly 48% of older adults had received at least one prescription for antibiotics in the past two years, and half of these said at least one prescription was for a respiratory condition.


